Compromise With Nazism Only Alternative to Atlantic Agreement, He Tells Congress

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 21: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt, reporting Congress on the sea meeting with Prime Minister Winston Churchill, said today the declaration of principles agreed upon there was so clear cut it would be difficult to oppose "without automatically admitting willingness to accept a compromise" with Nazism. He added that the principles would be hard to oppose without admitting willingness to "agree to world peace which would give to Nazism domination over large numbers of conquered nations." Such a peace would be a gift to Nazism to take breath- armed breath for a second war to extend control over Europe and Asia to the American hemisphere itself."

Russia will probably continue to fight until winter sets in when fighting will be difficult if not impossible. The British assaults from the air will increase in severity and may be followed by a land invasion, all of which will make, it more and more difficult for Germany.

We believe that we shall win this war. We believe! that in collaboration with Russia we shall subdue Germany. Then there will be a great period of reconstruction when Germany will have to amend her ways and all the countries she has occupied will also have an opportunity to reconstruct with the aid of Britain and United States.

Let's Show The Way - - -


