Germany Looking Towards Turkey

Invasion of Continent Is Being Urged Military Activity In Dardanelles Direction Cause of Speculation

Strategists Would Land Forces to Find Weakest Nazi Link

Norwegians Favor Plan Whereby Corridor Would be Opened North of Narvik Through Finland to Russia

LONDON, August 21: (CP)— Unofficial British, Polish and Norwegian strategists today urged anew a British invasion of the continent, contending that current Royal Air Force bombings of Germany and occupied territories are insufficient. Some military men have urged landings at numerous points on the European coast in an effort to find the weakest spot in German defences. Favored particularly by the Norwegians is a landing in Norway north of Narvik to open a corridor through Finland to Russia.

PREMIER GREETED

Mackenzie King Is Welcomed To Britain By King And Prime Minister Churchill

LONDON, August 21: (CP)— Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King entered the secret confines of Great Britain's war cabinet room today after being greeted warmly by Prime Minister Winston Churchill on the limestone step of No. 10 Downing Street. In the view of camera and news men, Mr. Churchill gave a hearty welcome to Mr. Mackenzie King who had just driven from Buckingham Palace where he met the King's private secretary, Sir Alexander Hardinge. Earlier the Canadian Premier had received a letter from His Majesty expressing a royal welcome to England.

ALL QUIET IN ORIENT

Little Change In Critical Situation, According To Latest Reports To Tokyo

TOKYO, August 21:—The Oriental situation was quiet last night, according to reports received here. 70,000 British troops and two hundred and fifty planes have been assembled in Burma near Thailand.

Australia Is Ready For War

Will Fight If Malaya Or Singapore Are Threatened, Premier Menzies Says

CANBERRA, August 21:— Australia is ready to fight if Malaya or Singapore should be threatened, Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies declared last night.

War News

AIR OFFENSIVE CONTINUED

LONDON—Two big waves of Royal Air Force planes roared over the Channel and France in daylight sweeps today, continuing the smashing British offensive. Observers on the southeast coast saw a large force of bombers head over the Channel in the afternoon shortly after a previous attacking force returned.

REPAIRING AIRCRAFT CARRIER

NEW YORK—The British Press Service announced today that the battle-scarred aircraft carrier *Illustrious* was in a United States shipyard undergoing repairs and that Capt. Lord Louis Mountbatten, cousin of the King, who arrived by clipper Tuesday, will command the ship and supervise repairs. Admiralty reports on June 18 had said that the mighty vessel was almost destroyed by Axis plane attacks on January 10 near Sicily.

Battle of Russia— BIG DAM BLOWN UP BY REDS

Thousands of German Soldiers Engulfed in Desperate Defence Measure—Leningrad Situation Serious

RED POSITION GRAVE
LONDON, August 21:—The third German offensive against Russia appeared nearing a close today with German advances on both the Ukrainian and Leningrad fronts. Authoritative quarters here made no attempt to hide that the Russian position was regarded with gravity. The Soviet information bureau at Moscow said that fighting raged overnight in the Novgorod area about one hundred miles south of Leningrad, in the Gomel area in the central front and around Odessa in the south.

LONDON, Aug. 21: (CP)—The Daily Mail, in a Stockholm dispatch quoting a Russian source, said today that the great Dniepropetrovsk dam on the Dnieper River in the Ukraine was destroyed Tuesday night by the Russians, releasing a tremendous volume of water to halve the German forces. The dispatch said that Premier Joseph Stalin had ordered the destruction and that thousands of German troops as well as fleeing Russian peasants and stragglers Soviet soldiery, trying to gain the eastern banks of the river, were said to have been engulfed.

As the Battle of Russia entered its third month today the Soviet general in command at Leningrad, where the situation is serious, appealed to the people of the former capital city, fighting now with their backs to the wall, to resist to the last man. Russian forces in the Ukraine had, it was believed, escaped a German trap and were launching a fierce counter-offensive. Leningrad was proclaimed under "direct threat of attack" by the Red Army northwest command today as Marshal Voroshilov called on the people to rise in arms and defend the city to the death. Voroshilov acknowledged "dread danger" to the city.

Another Warsaw

The Nazi radio from Berlin said that, if Leningrad was defended, it would meet the same fate as Warsaw.

The German High Command today claimed that three cities in the main Leningrad defence ring—Novgorod, Kingisepp and Narva—had been captured in the German drive which is within seventy-five miles of Russia's second city. The communique repeated last night's special claim of partial destruction of twenty-five Red Army divisions in the Ukraine and also claimed capture of Kherson at the mouth of the Dnieper River.

Premier's Parley To Be Held Soon

Important Gathering May Take Place In London Following King-Roosevelt Conference

LONDON, August 21:—A conference between British premiers is expected to take place here as a sequel to the recent conference of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Premier Winston Churchill of England. In addition to Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King of Canada, Premier Peter Fraser of New Zealand is in London.

ROOSEVELT IS HEARD

Compromise With Nazism Only Alternative to Atlantic Agreement, He Tells Congress

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 21: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt, reporting to Congress on the sea meeting with Prime Minister Winston Churchill, said today the declaration of principles agreed upon there was so clear cut it would be difficult to oppose "without automatically admitting willingness to accept a compromise" with Nazism. He added that the principles would be hard to oppose without admitting willingness to "agree to world peace which would give to Nazism domination over large numbers of conquered nations." Such a peace would be a gift to Nazism to take breath—armed breath for a second war to extend control over Europe and Asia to the American hemisphere itself.

LOCAL DISPUTE SETTLED

OTTAWA—Hon. Norman McLarty, minister of labor, announced today that a board of conciliation and arbitration had settled a dispute between the Prince Rupert dry dock and shipyard and shipwrights and joiners. The agreement was that an increase in pay from 83c to 90c per hour would be retroactive to March 1 and that there would be a cost of living bonus as from October 1 last. The board consisted of R. O. Campney, chairman, Rev. C. D. Clarke and T. W. Brown.

AMERICANS RELEASED

TOKYO—Nipponese Yusen Kaisha Line, apparently under Foreign office pressure, suddenly announced tonight that it had reservations for twenty-six United States embassy and consular officials aboard the liner *Tatsuta Maru* scheduled to sail August 28 for Shanghai.

Car On Train Is Broken Into

Eight Transients Facing Trial At Terrace As Result

On Monday night's train, a car belonging to Ralph Sinkewicz of Stewart, which was being shipped from here to Hazelton on a box car, was broken into on the train and a number of articles stolen. Constable B. E. Munkley, who was on the train, rode to Terrace, where Constable Peter Cartwright of Terrace, arrested eight transients who had been riding on the train. They were detained pending further investigation. The stolen property was later found around Amhurst. On last night's train Constable C. S. Oland went to Terrace to assist in the trial.

LONG WITH AIR LINES

Both Old and New Vice-Presidents Of T.C.A. Have Had Much Experience

MONTREAL, Aug. 21.—Duard Browning Colyer, who has resigned as vice-president of Trans-Canada Air Lines, came to T.C.A. as chief technical adviser at the start of the company in August 1937. He was previously vice-president in charge of operation for United Air Lines. In his new post he was largely responsible for the technical side of this big operation of flying Canada from coast to coast twice daily. Upon the retirement of P. G. Johnson from the Trans-Canada vice-presidency in 1939 to become president of Boeing Aircraft Corporation, Mr. Colyer was promoted from chief technical adviser to the post of vice-president.

Nazis At Iceland

LONDON, August 21:—A German bomber yesterday flew over Iceland, where United States troops are now stationed on western hemisphere defence, according to reports here, but was driven off by Tomahawk planes manned by British fliers. Informed German quarters in Berlin said they had no confirmation of German air activity over Iceland.

HOUSES ARE COMMENCED

Heads of E. J. Ryan Contracting Co. Are Visiting City in Connection with Starting of Work

Col. E. J. Ryan, president, and J. E. Amundsen, general manager of the E. J. Ryan Contracting Co. are visiting the city in connection with the starting of the work of building 125 houses in the vicinity of Overlook Street beyond Ambrose Avenue for Wartime Housing Limited. Breaking of ground for the industrial settlement is about to commence and the contract calls for the houses to be ready for occupation within three months. A. E. Richards, at present in charge of air base construction here, will also superintend the house building project.

Advance Units of Two Nazi Divisions Arrive in Bulgaria—Italian Patrols Scouting Border of Ottoman Empire

ANKARA, August 21: (CP)— Foreign diplomatic sources reported today that advance units of two German army divisions had arrived in Bulgaria and that Italian patrols have been scouting the Greek-Turkish border. One competent source said that developments could mean that either the Axis was taking over policing duties from the Bulgarians or else planned aggressive action against Turkey with the object of opening the Dardanelles to permit German ships to enter the Black Sea to supply Nazi troops fighting in the Ukraine.

PARISIANS ARRESTED

Nazis Staging Big Round-up Designed To Strike At Sources Of Unrest In City

VICHY, August 21: (CP)—Police were reported today to have arrested six thousand persons in German-occupied Paris. Most of these were arrested in a great round-up, apparently aimed at striking at the sources of public unrest in the city. Many were claimed to be Jews. At the same time it was learned that two men had been shot for alleged participation in a Communist manifestation against German occupation authorities.

Cuban Consulates Being Expelled

German Government Is Ordering Diplomatic Representatives To Leave Country

BERLIN, August 21:—The German government has ordered all Cuban consulates in Germany closed. Personnel will be permitted to leave for their homes.

SEATTLE, August 21:—Benjamin Roy, aged 76, was killed when struck by a car driven by K. K. Yamaguchi. It was the forty-sixth traffic fatality of the year in Seattle.

IT'S AN ILL WIND

LONDON, August 20: Only 56 able-bodied persons are receiving outdoor relief in London, compared with 1,131 before war broke out.

Debt To Russia - - -

No matter what the outcome of the war in Russia, the democracies owe a deep debt to Russia for putting up such a magnificent fight. Of course Russia is fighting primarily in her own defence and we feel confident she will not again be subjugated but in the meantime she is suffering severe losses. How severe we shall not know, possibly for years to come. Although driven back in some sections the fight continues and it has done a great deal toward exhausting Germany.

Russia will probably continue to fight until winter sets in when fighting will be difficult if not impossible. The British assaults from the air will increase in severity and may be followed by a land invasion, all of which will make it more and more difficult for Germany.

We believe that we shall win this war. We believe that in collaboration with Russia we shall subdue Germany. Then there will be a great period of reconstruction when Germany will have to amend her ways and all the countries she has occupied will also have an opportunity to reconstruct with the aid of Britain and United States.

Let's Show The Way - - -

The governments at Washington and at Ottawa suddenly realized recently that the peoples of United States and Canada would have to curtail their consumption of gasoline and oil in order to keep Great Britain adequately supplied. The loss of tankers through enemy action and the ever increasing demand for motor fuel by the Empire flying forces could only be met by diverting tankers from American and Canadian ports to ports of Great Britain.

Both governments elected to effect the necessary reduction in Canada and United States through the voluntary effort of private motor car owners, motorboat owners and by economies set up by business firms using large numbers of trucks and cars.

Because the majority of United States citizens are wholly in sympathy with Great Britain in the battle she is putting up against the dictators, there are thousands south of the border who are responding to the appeal made from Washington.

In Canada, the response has been generous. It is estimated that the gross consumption of gasoline and oil in this country has been reduced by about 15 per cent. But Canadians will not likely be satisfied with this result. This country is at war, fighting for its very existence and the realization of Canada's stake in the battle for Victory should produce, and will produce, a motor fuel saving which will set a real pace for her neighboring motorists in the Republic.

We think Prince Rupert has done better than fifteen per cent but that is no reason why the people here should not do better yet. It is part of our job to save in every possible way.

It's interesting to know when reading the Daily News that the people of the whole district are doing the same.

THRILL OF CLIMBING

Dr. Neal Carter Tells Graphic Story to Gyro Club of Conquest of Seven Sisters' Loftiest Peak

Thrills of mountain climbing where there are difficulties and dangers, where all that holds a person from plunging into abysses of rock and ice or into glacial crevices may be a half-inch lamp wick and an ice pick, where loose rock might precipitate a person hundreds of feet over a sheer precipice were told in graphic word picture before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday by Dr. Neal M. Carter. Others might choose to go through all sorts of inconvenience and hardship to get a few little fish in some remote stream or lake, a few birds in a boggy quagmire or an animal's carcass in the deep and damp woods but his fancy was to get satisfaction by climbing to the tops of mountains for the mere reward of accomplishment and seeing what might lie beyond.

Dr. Carter told the Gyros of his recent successful ascent with party of four of the highest peak of the Seven Sisters Mountains across the Skeena River from Cedarvale. He summed it up as a highly interesting trip attended with the mountaineer's satisfaction of scaling a peak which had never before been ascended. He also expressed hope of further mountaineering accomplishments at a later date in the same area.

The highest of the Seven Sisters, the one which Dr. Carter and party succeeded in climbing, has an altitude of 9150 feet and is the highest mountain within a radius of fifty miles. It is 8650 feet above Cedarvale and the peak is 4100 feet higher than the base camp of D.W. Mines Ltd. The ascent from the base camp to the summit took eleven and a half hours. It was a good deal more difficult and hazardous undertaking than had been anticipated. All those unconquerable obstacles, bad pinnacles, deep glaciers, sheer cliffs, ice gullies, sharp ridges, glacial crevices, loose rocks sliding snows, knife edge peaks, all climaxed in a dizzy summit where there was no desire to tarry even to take pictures of the scenery and of such nature that it was discretionary to back down rather than face a seemingly bottomless pit under an overhanging snow cliff. However, a few feet from the top a cairn had been established, recording the ascent.

Dr. Carter showed some interesting pictures of the climb as well as a fossil exhibit taken near the top which showed the imprint of fern at an altitude far above timber line and matching similar rock which was to be found in the low country around Cedarvale, indicating that one day there had been a great upheaval there.

Some humorous incidents of the trip were also recounted by Dr. Carter.

President W. F. Stone was in the chair and expressed to Dr. Carter appreciation of the club for the interesting discourse.

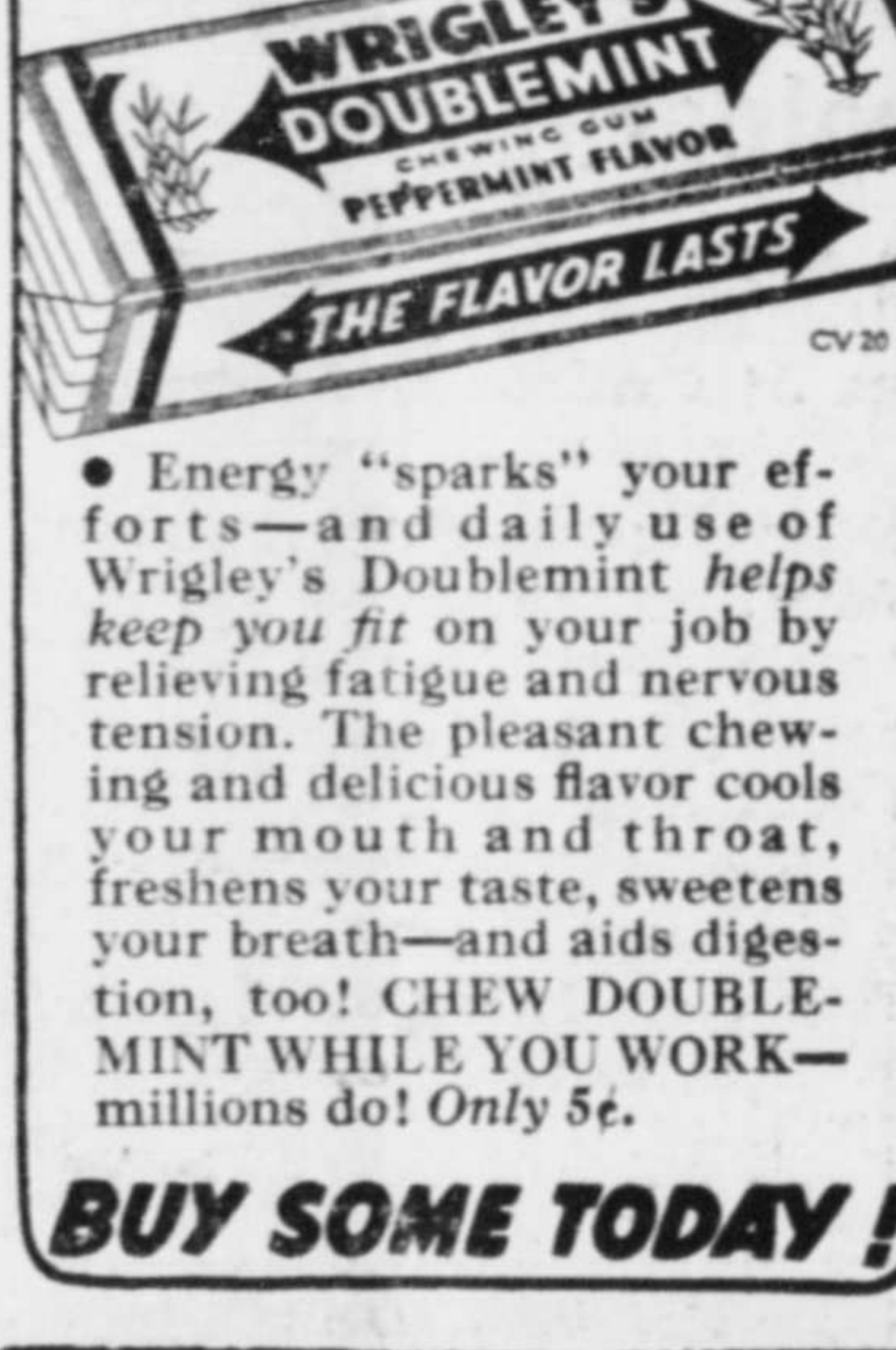
