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

Awaiting Results Of Attack - - -

Some observers seem to be of the opinion that Italy will not give up until that country sees what comes of the projected invasion attempt on Britain. If by any chances this should be successful Italy then would have an opportunity of rehabilitation. But it will not. In the meantime. Britain is keeping busy in the Mediterranean, hammering at Italian bases and steadily driving the enemy out of Africa. Once the African situation is cleared up, morej attention can be devoted to Italy proper. Her ports are particularly vulnerable to attack.

The Japanese situation is rather different. So far Japan has not committed any overt act that would draw that country into the war. She has declared herself on the side of the Axis but Russia has done the same and yet Russia is giving very material aid to China against Japan.

While it is very difficult to say if or when Japan will openly declare war on Canada or the United States, it is not at all unlikely that she may make some move toward control of the East Indies and the Malay Peninsula which would be considered a cause for war. Yet we do not thinkthat will be done until Germany has made a move against? Britain. Willkie's Position - - -

Wendell Willkie, Republican standard-bearer at the recent election, has thrown himself heart and soul into the aid to Britain campaign in the United States. He is of German descent but is not a Nazi.

Now it is evident that Willkie is not pleasing that element of the Republican party that is pro-Nazi. He is a great disappointment to them. They expected he would be with them but he is not and they are making it clear that WANTED to rent by March 1st, five he does not in this case represent them.

It was expected by some that Willkie would make the most of the present situation to insure his selection four years from now in the presidential election. With the war over, that is what may happen. Just at present it does not look that way. It seems as if he would find very serious opposition from some elements in his own party.

There is one admirable thing about Willkie. He seems to know his own mind and, like Pattullo, has the courage of his convictions.

Premier Pattullo, who is also member of the Legislature representing Prince Rupert, is to address a public meeting next week. He has lost no time in reporting to his constituents his reasons for opposing the implementation of the recommendations made in the Sirois report at the inter-provincial conference. 
