DUKE OF CONNAUGHT TO VISIT RUPERT SEPT. 23

NAAS RIVER INDIANS ONLY DESIRED TO QUARANTINE

Old Chief's Alarm at Wrong Idea That Smallpox Was Raging on the Coast Led to Indian Resistance to Incoming White Men

Within the past month there have been disquieting rumors filtering into the city from the Naas River valley in regard to the alleged hostile attitude of the Indians there towards the incoming of white settlers. In view of these accounts, some of which went so far as to state that the Indians had threatened white men with guns and driven them off from the banks of the river above the canyon, in fear of their lives.

Official Investigation
To investigate this state of affairs Sergeant "Pat" Phillips has been on a tour through the district. He returned yesterday, bringing reassuring news to all the many settlers who are about to take their departure into the fertile and promising Naas River country.

Smallpox Scare.
It appears that there was really some fairly strong opposition on the part of the Indians to the incoming of white men, and also to going up river of the coast Indians, but the opposition to these people has not arisen as a result of any desire on the part of the Indians to resist their occupying the land, but as a result of a distorted idea of the recent quarantining of the C.P.R. Princess Beatrice, because of the suspected presence on board of her of a smallpox patient.

Rifle Quarantine
An old Indian chief up there got hold of this story when he was down at the coast, and carried back with him to his own district a regular fiery cross about it. He declared that the dread disease was raging all along the coast, and that his people ought on no account to admit anybody, Indian or white man, from the direction of the sea. As a primitive precaution against the spread of infection, the keeping of strangers at their distance at the rifle's point is excellent, no doubt, but in this case there was no infection. The Indians, however, as Sergt. Phillips knows, have terribly real reason to fear smallpox brought in by strangers. There was a

time not so very long ago when their tribe was all but decimated by the disease which they utterly failed to cure or stamp out by themselves.

Certified Germ Proof
White men coming up the Naas were advised to return by their guides, and told to get some kind of certificate from the nearest doctor that they had no smallpox germs about them. This was all the Indians required to satisfy them that the incomers would bring them no harm. But some coast Indians going up the Naas with a quantity of herring spawn which they intended to barter with the up-river Indians for Oolachans were forced angrily back, and lost all their herring spawn which spoiled. Apparently it is easier for the white man armed with a medical certificate of freedom from infection to get into the Naas district than for a coast Indian, but the difficulty is practically at an end now, and there should be no trouble for ingoing settlers from the Indians at all events.

THE HILDITCH CASE DISMISSED

Magistrate Carss Finds Evidence Against Former Chairman of Board of Works Unsufticient to Make Charge Stick.

This morning the celebrated case of the city versus John H. Hilditch came up in the Police Court, adjourned from Saturday.

Magistrate Carss had thought it over meantime, and the eloquence of the defendant had evidently impressed him. The case was dismissed.

Congratulations have been showered by those interested upon John Hilditch, who maintained that he had done more than he need have done for the city over fixing the lane behind the new post office, and making the sidewalk passable.

The council's wholesale attack on the contractor has been met by the imperturbable serenity of the magistrate, who holds that a sidewalk which the city Engineer admits was "never safe" can hardly be made dangerous by a contractor.

New York April 22—Instead of becoming panic stricken when a haze of smoke filled the auditorium and flames circled the loft, an audience in the 8th Avenue moving picture theatre, sat tight tonight and demanded its money's worth. When evidences of fire in the building became too pronounced to go unheeded the operator of the picture machine, after displaying part of an exciting western film, turned off the electric lights in the metal compartment in the front of the theatre and hurried to the street while the lady pianist played a march, thinking the people would immediately leave in an orderly manner. They did not budge.

Refused to Leave
"Show the rest of the film," shouted a boy in the back of the theatre. The cry was taken up by others. Even when the manager shouted to the spectators that a fire was in progress beneath the roof of the building and that the fire engines were coming, he was met by the cry "Let us see the rest of the film and we will go!"

The police finally had to drive the determined audience from the theatre building before the firemen who arrived to fight the flames could get to work.

Demand for Trained Aviators for the British Army

London, April 23--Details were issued last night in regard to Great Britain's aviation scheme. The plan calls for 364 trained flyers for the army and forty at the beginning for the navy. Not more than sixty of these flyers, however, will be ordered this year. Provision is made for 84 aeroplanes for the army and 12 aeroplanes and hydro-aeroplanes for the navy. About one-half of the machines will be bought in Great Britain with a view of encouraging the industry.

MOST MOURNFUL CARGO WILL BE LANDED AT HALIFAX, N.S.

Floating Morgue Mackay Bennett Still at Her Sad Task of Salvaging the Pitiful Flotsam of the Titanic Disaster---White Star Company Sparing No Expense for the Dead Though Charged With the Loss of the Living

(Special to Daily News.)
Washington, April 24—Like the missing horse shoe nail that cost the monarch his kingdom, failure to provide binoculars or spyglasses for the lookouts on the Titanic was one contributing cause of the great ship's loss, and with it the loss of 1600 lives.

Two witnesses before the Senate investigation today agreed to this. They were Frederick Fleet, lookout on liner, and Major Peuchen, Toronto, who was among the rescued passengers. Fleet acknowledged that had he been supplied with a pair of glasses he would have seen the berg in time to avoid the collision. The White Star company had refused his request for glasses prior to the Titanic's departure from Southampton on her fatal voyage.

"White Starve?"

This statement rather bears out the seafarers' nickname for the White Star Line on account of its alleged reputation for looking after the passengers fairly well, but stinting the crew of all except the barest necessities for the working of the ship and for their own support. "The White Starve Line" says the sailor men with experience of Transatlantic conditions. The line having the best reputation

for well found ships is of course the Cunard, made famous in many ways, but in this sense singled out by Rudyard Kipling in his ballad of the Deep Sea-Going Engineer.

A Ghastly Cargo

Halifax, April 24—Preparations are being completed by the agents of the White Star Line for the reception of the sad cargo of the morgue-ship Mackay-Bennett, when she reaches here with the bodies of victims of the Titanic disaster. This will probably not be until Friday, possibly not before Saturday, as the bodies are reported to be floating northeasterly in the gulf stream. All the bodies will be held here for the second identification and will then be sent wherever relatives or friends request. Some of the bodies of third class passengers will be buried here. No word of steamers passing Titanic wreckage was received today.

Vice-President Kelly, of the Grand Trunk will arrive tomorrow, and hopes to be able to identify the body of the late C. M. Hays among those recovered by the Mackay-Bennett cable ship. Elaborate preparations have been made to display the bodies and so facilitate the work of identification.

NO NEW TEACHER NEEDED UNTIL THE FALL

School Board at Meeting Yesterday Decided to Postpone Engagement Until After Holidays---Parents are Warned

Probably another assistant teacher will not be engaged for Prince Rupert public school until after the summer holidays. There was a meeting of the school board yesterday called for the purpose of deciding this matter, and the decision was come to that as there is only a very slight increase in the number of pupils in the lower forms, and the upper forms can be handled by the staff as at present, it will be unnecessary to engage further help until after the vacation. Probably had it been possible to secure sufficiently trained services more easily to add to the present staff, an effort would have been made to secure another teacher, but the scarcity of competent teachers continues to be considerable.

A matter which has been causing annoyance to the principal in connection with the maintenance of regularity in the attendance of pupils is the fact that parents are apparently refusing to give written excuses for the

absence of certain pupils. As authoritative reason for absence or lateness is absolutely necessary so that the headmaster can administer the school regulations justly and fairly, dealing out penalties for truant-playing where they are deserved, and acquitting those who have had good cause for absence, this point requires the attention of parents. THE PROSPECTS OF CHURCH UNION

The observations of President Murray, of the University of Saskatchewan, published the other day leading him to the conclusion that the proposed union of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches in Canada, would be carried into effect before long should be supplemented by the recalling of the fact that the Presbyterians are called upon to vote upon two questions, the one as to the desirability of organic union, and the other as to the proposed basis. It will be remembered that the leaders of the movement declared at its very inception that they had no desire to have union forced upon any considerable opposing minority, but would rather see no attempt made to unite the churches unless the union could be effected by an almost unanimous vote. The majorities in favor of union have been large in most of the courts of all the churches, but the minorities against have been too considerable to be ignored. The situation might be compared with that of the miners of England in voting on the recent strike question. The majority of the men were not in favor of returning to work, but the authorities of the union saw that the minority of the contrary view was too large to be ignored.

In Western Canada the church union sentiment is so overwhelmingly strong that there does not appear to be any danger of any large secessions from the united organization; but in East

ern Canada, there is a much larger number of ministers and laymen who speak and write strongly against the basis of union.

Dr. Murray may be right in his opinion that the union will eventually come to pass, but the indications are that the negotiating bodies will continue to 'make haste slowly'; and that some time will yet elapse before they will actually become organically one.

In the meantime the spirit of union may be cultivated with profit as it has been in the past. There has been co-operation in mission work, in education work, and along the lines of temperance and moral reform, in the promotion of Sabbath observance, the Y.M.C.A. and the Y.W.C.A., the circulation and study of the bible, and in other ways. Ministers of the different denominations have often exchanged pulpits from the earliest years in Winnipeg and elsewhere throughout the west, with results that have been gratifying to the hearers. Young people especially, have joined in missionary work for the benefit of Chinese and other foreign immigrants. A young Presbyterian is at the present time doing good work among boys in one of the Methodist missions in Winnipeg. Such instances might easily be multiplied. This helping one another is, after all, the best form of union; and it is the best preparation for carrying out any organic union that may in the end commend itself to the wisdom and Christian sentiment of the Canadian churches.

KIPLING NOT TO BE PROSECUTED

Joe Martin Wanted to Know if He Was to Be Charged With Sedition for His Latest Poem.

London, April 22—Jos. Martin received a negative answer in the House of Commons today, when he asked the Attorney-General if he intended to prosecute Kipling for sedition for verses entitled "Ulster," published last week.

Wm. Redmond raised a laugh by asking if such doggerel was entitled to be called verse.

In more than one country of continental Europe a writer uttering such language as these two lines from Rudyard Kipling's poem "Ulster"—

"England may drive us forth, We shall not fall alone."

would find himself promptly in jail for treason, together with those who printed and published the poem. But there is no likelihood of any such action being taken. Kipling has simply paraphrased Lord Randolph Churchill's famous "Ulster will fight, and Ulster will be right." It is a subject in regard to which violent language is taken, in a Pickwickian sense, as a matter of course.

ILLUMINATED HATS THE LATEST

Blaze of Light When You Press the Button and there You are in the Fashion at a Flash.

Chicago, April 22—An active demand for "incandescent hats," the first of which was displayed here several days ago during the convention of dressmakers, has caused a local concern to get out a number of designs, all operated from small dry batteries in the crown of the hat.

One new design was completed and exposed to the winds yesterday. It contains tiny orange buds about the size and shape of a small tangerine, and are connected up with green wires looped with orange and other blossoms in decorative fashion. The hat is considerably heavier than the ordinary "lid" because of the wiring and the battery.

The lights are turned on by means of a push button that takes the form of an imitation hat pin at one side.

New designs to be completed this week will imitate rosebuds and all sorts of flowers in which a bulb formation can figure. It is also planned to relieve the weight of the electric hat by carrying the battery in the corset.

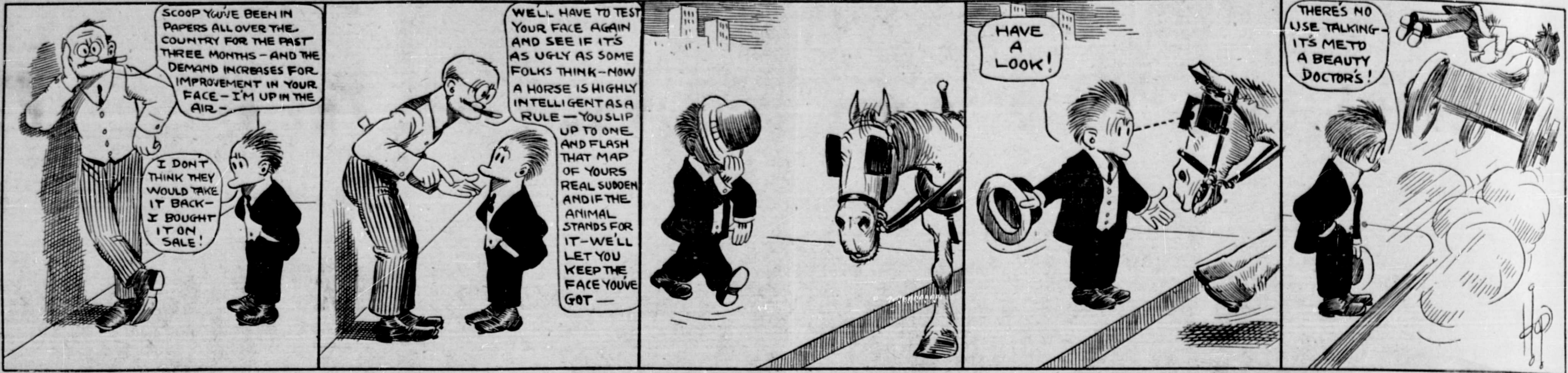

BRITISH BUY LARGE TRACTS NEAR HAZELTON

Duke of Sutherland, Lord Charles Beresford, Lord Desborough and Others Acquire Large Areas Along the Railway

Vancouver, April 24—Entrusted with the commission of selecting large tracts of land in British Columbia for prominent British land owners, Captain C. E. Hutton of London, England, reached Vancouver last night and is a guest at the Hotel Vancouver. The visitor is a former resident of the Okanagan Valley. He was a member of the Duke of Sutherland's party which visited British Columbia last summer and which also included Lord Desborough and Lord Charles Beresford. Largely owing to his representations the Duke of Sutherland acquired large areas of farm lands in the Fort George district on the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. The Duke, it is understood, will visit this province shortly in connection with plans for a colonization project involving the settlement of his farm tenants on these lands. His visit is expected to be a short one, to be followed by a second visit in August.

The example set by the Scottish peer so impressed other titled land owners that they requested Captain Hutton to act on their behalf. Several of these clients will shortly reach here to close the deals he has come to arrange. "The investment of large sums of British capital will mean a great deal in the way of development of the agricultural resources of this province as several of my clients purpose using the land for colonization purposes," said Captain Hutton today to a representative of the province. "This will mean the sending out of carefully selected people, many direct from the farms of their landlords. Apart from the favorable attitude of last year's visitors the taxation measures of Right Hon. Lloyd-George, chancellor of the exchequer, is contributing largely to the movement of the capital of landed proprietors abroad for investment purposes. Looking around they realize that British Columbia offers better and safer inducements than any other portion of the globe. There is no question that among this class British Columbia is regarded more favorably than any province of the Dominion."

Among the prominent Britishers for whom Captain Hutton has made investments are Captain Geoffrey Bowly, adjutant of the Royal Horse Guards, and Sir Reginald Macleod. The former owns 2,400 acres in the Nechacho Valley, which he intends to visit next year. Sir Reginald has purchased 1,500 acres near Quesnel. Another titled investor is Viscount Castlereigh, M. P., heir of the Marquis of Londonderry. His holdings comprise 1,500 acres in the Fort George district; also Mr. Alexander Simpson, private secretary to the Duke of Sutherland. Mr. Simpson is the owner of 4,000 acres of land equally divided between the Fort George and Hazelton districts.
