## B. C. Election Lines Are Drawn

### NAZIS ARE IN DONETZ

Moscow Admits Retreat There But Holding Strong Elsewhere  
**Huge Nazi Losses**  
No Less Than 260,000 Germans Killed Around Leningrad And Odessa

MOSCOW, October 1: (P)—A retreat of the Red Army into the rich industrial Donetz valley is admitted, a city 180 miles south-east of Kiev and eighty miles west of Kharkov having been taken by the Nazis.  
All along the Russo-German front the struggle continues without respite. Everywhere the Russians are continuing strong counter-attacks, the Red Army being particularly firm in the Leningrad area.  
The Russian air force is also hitting hard at many points, causing heavy damage to Nazi fighting equipment.  
The Red Army reported today it had crushed two battalions of German reinforcements rushed to a sector of the southern front to replace two shattered Rumanian infantry brigades.  
In two days, the report stated, the Germans lost two thousand men killed in fierce Red Army counter-attacks on the southern front where battles were developing.  
These German losses were in addition it was stated, to 260,000 soldiers reported killed in prolonged battles for Leningrad and Odessa.

### FRENCHMAN EXECUTED

Put to Death in Paris by Nazis for Having Arms.  
NEW YORK, Oct. 1: (P)—The Berlin radio yesterday broadcast a Paris dispatch reporting execution of a Frenchman convicted of illegal possession of arms.

### Big Nazi Guns Fire On Convoy

LONDON, Oct. 1: (P)—Germany's long-range guns from the French coast fired for ten minutes yesterday on a convoy in the English Channel but scored no hits.

### EXECUTION OF CZECHS

Ninety-five Have So Far Become The Victims Of Gestapo, London Says.  
LONDON, October 1:—Fifty-eight more Czechs have been executed for anti-Nazi activities in Bohemia and Moravia, according to an announcement made in Berlin. The Germans state that so far eighty-eight Czechs have been executed but London places the number of Gestapo victims at ninety-five.

### BUILDING GOES UP

List For September Is \$28,685, Bringing 1941 To Date Up To \$128,563

Building permits issued from the city engineer's office during the month of September this year totalled \$28,685, being the heaviest total for any month so far this year and bringing the total for 1941 to date up to \$128,563 as compared with \$35,179 in the first nine months of 1940. ### SENTENCE SUSPENDED

Robert Henry Phillips Of Kitsumkalum Released At Assizes—Has Enlisted

Two year's suspended sentence was passed yesterday afternoon by Mr. Justice A. M. Manson upon Robert Henry Phillips of Kitsumkalum Lake who had been convicted by a jury at the Supreme Court Assizes here at the end of last week on a charge of shooting with intent. Phillips has enlisted for active service.

His Lordship congratulated Phillips on having enlisted. He was young, able-bodied and ought to give good service.

Asked if he had anything to say why sentence should not be passed upon him, Phillips merely mentioned that he had had no legal counsel and had tried to conduct his own defence.

Mr. Justice Manson observed that the use of firearms was a serious matter. He was satisfied, however, that accused had had some aggravation and also that he had not intended to shoot to kill or he would have done so as the boy whom he had shot was at his mercy.

Crown counsel having no objection to a suspended sentence being passed, His Lordship thereupon proceeded to release Phillips on the undertaking that he would keep the peace, be of good behaviour and be ready to return to the court for passage of sentence.

In the army there would be discipline and good company and he was confident in hoping that accused would be a good soldier and a credit to the army.

"Good Luck," said His Lordship in conclusion "be a tip-top soldier, be a credit to the army and your country, my boy, and may you come back safely."

### YANKEES WINNERS SEPTEMBER

Took First Game of World Series Today by Score of 3 to 2.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1:—New York Yankees won the first game of the World Series today from the Brooklyn Dodgers by a score of 3-2. Each team made six hits and each was charged with one error.  
Dodgers threatened a rally in the ninth but ran into a double play.  
Joe DiMaggio went hitless.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1: (P)—Red Ruffing's brilliant six-hit pitching and Joe Gordon's slugging enabled the Yankees to defeat Brooklyn Dodgers in the opening series battle today before a record throng of 68,540 spectators. Ruffing became the fourth pitcher in history to win six world series games as he held Dodgers batting order helpless all the way and struck out the principal slugger, Dolph Camilli three times. Gordon put the Yankees ahead in the second game with a towering home run with none on and provided winning score in the sixth when he lined a single to the left field to score Charley Keller who had walked. Brooklyn counted their first run in the fifth on Reese's single and Owen's long triple. Pinch-hitter Lew Riggs drove in second flat bush tally with single in seventh.

### War Cost Enormous

LONDON, Oct. 1: (P)—The House of Commons today voted a new war credit of one billion pounds asked for by Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Kingsley Wood, to meet the rising costs of war. British war expenditures are now running to £11,000,000,000 daily, the chancellor said.

### Bulletins

ARCHDUKE IS SPEAKER VANCOUVER — Speaking before the Vancouver Rotary Club yesterday, Archduke Otto declared that underground activity at present going on in Austria would develop into open and large-scale revolt against Nazi rule.

BUILD WOODEN SHIPS VANCOUVER — Arthur Mercer of New Westminster, and Gilbert Duke of Vancouver, are going to Ottawa in connection with a scheme for the building of wooden ships in Vancouver and Fraser River yards.

QUEBEC TRAIN WRECK THREE RIVERS — J. A. Couture, a trainman, was killed and twenty other persons were injured when a crack Montreal to Quebec-bound train hit a split rail near here last night and was derailed. Hon. Maurice Dupre, former speaker of the House of Commons, sustained a fractured skull. Passengers included several prominent men who had been in Montreal for the funerals of Sir Herbert Holt and Senator Lorne Webster.

### SEPTEMBER WAS DAMP

But There Was Also a Goodly Amount of Sunshine.

If Prince Rupert people thought they might have been having a drought during the earlier part of this year, September, at least, gave them ample moisture for there was precipitation to the amount of 12.01 inches during the month just ended. In spite of all the rain, however, there was a goodly measure of sunshine which totalled 117.7 hours. These are the figures as issued this morning by the Dominion meteorologist, S. G. Mellor of Digby Island.  
So far this year there has been 1071.1 hours of sunshine in Prince Rupert compared with 830.8 hours in the first nine months of 1940, while the precipitation this year has totalled 40.88 inches as against 59.16 inches.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1: (P)—Government figures show soldiers "dogs" have increased in size since the First Great War, the average army dog now being 10 as compared with nine in 1917-18.

### BIG ATTACK ON GERMANY

Royal Air Force Assault Upon Baltic Port of Stettin.

LONDON, Oct. 1: (P)—A large number of RAF planes again roared over Germany last night as they had done late Monday night and early Tuesday, starting great fires at the Baltic port of Stettin, the Air Ministry said. Stettin is a vital point from which supplies are shipped to Nazi armies in Russia.

Other strong forces also bombed dock areas of Hamburg during the past two nights, while subsidiary attacks were made on docks at Cherbourg and Le Havre.

Eight British bombers were lost and three fighters failed to return during twenty-four hours.

Tuesday a great back-and-forth rush of British fighters over the channel led shore watchers to believe a series of low-level attacks on German positions in France was also in progress.

### BEHNKE IS ACQUITTED

Francois Lake Farmer Is Freed By Jury On Charge Of Perjury As Result Of Hay Deal

William F. Behnke, Francois Lake farmer, was acquitted late yesterday afternoon by a jury at the Supreme Court Assizes of a charge of perjury which had been laid against him as a sequel to a County Court case at Burns Lake last spring arising out of a deal in hay at Coileymount. The jury had retired at 12:45 noon to consider its verdict and it was not until 5:20 p.m. that it returned to the court room with its decision. Mr. Justice A. M. Manson commented that he found it difficult to understand the verdict. He had held an opposite view which, of course, he admitted might be wrong. In any case, His Lordship admitted, that the length of time the jury had spent in deliberation indicated that it viewed the matter in seriousness and with anxiety.

Addressing the accused whom he thereupon liberated, the judge said that this should be a warning to him. He had caused a great deal of expense to the country and anxiety to the jury. Doubtless acquittal had been under the circumstances of a reasonable doubt having been given in his benefit. He trusted that accused would never find himself in the courts again.  
Speaking again to the jury, His Lordship remarked that it was one of the mottoes of British justice that it was better ten guilty men should go free than that one innocent man should be wrongly convicted. British justice was respected even in nations which did not have the same system as Britain's. When all civilization was at stake as it was today, it was well to remember that its system of justice was one of the things that had made Britain great. He urged all men to observe the principles of British justice in their daily affairs, ever tempering justice with mercy.

### Residence Had Narrow Escape

New Home of Dr. and Mrs. McColl at Queen Charlotte Nearly Destroyed.

A garage and power plant at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Duncan McColl at Queen Charlotte City was destroyed by fire a couple of nights ago and the new residence itself narrowly escaped destruction. Only the valiant work of volunteer fire fighters saved the property.

## One Hundred and Fifty Candidates Nominated; 48 Liberals Are In Field

Conservatives Forty-Four and C.C.F. Forty-Five—Premier Pattullo Gives Radio Address.

VICTORIA, Oct. 1: (CP)—Battle lines in the British Columbia elections were drawn today following the nomination yesterday of 156 candidates, thirty-one less than in 1937. The field includes forty-eight Liberals, forty-five Co-operative Commonwealth Federationists and forty-four Conservatives. The Conservatives include Canon Joshua Hinchliffe, not officially recognized by the party. His opponents in North Vancouver include Dr. A. H. Bayne, formerly Prince Rupert, who has the Conservative blessing.

### BIG RAIDS RESUMING

Two Northwest Towns Heavily Hit by Luftwaffe Last Night.

LONDON, Oct. 1:—Striking with the greatest force in several months, the German Luftwaffe was over the northeastern coastal area during the night for several hours dropping explosive and fire bombs. Five towns were raided but two were concentrated upon. Casualties are reported to have been quite heavy, although fires were soon brought under control. Rescue workers were still digging dead and wounded out of the debris today.

It marked the end of the second month during which London had been without an air raid alarm, the last having been on July 27.

### REVENUE MOUNTING

Customs and Excise Collections Continue Big Increase Over Last Year.

Customs and excise revenue at the port of Prince Rupert for this year to date as compared with last year continues to mount. The collections for this September totalled \$74,115.28 as compared with \$32,543.78 in the same month last year, bringing the total for 1941 to date up to \$392,894.92 in comparison with \$165,822.70 in the corresponding period last year.

LONDON, Oct. 1: (P)—The London Star said that Rudolf Hess has asked that, in his capacity as an envoy rather than as a prisoner of war, he should be returned to Germany. Although treated as a captured officer, he objects to being retained in this country. The Star says that he is being confined at a point close to London.

### OUR APPLES TO BRITAIN

HAMILTON, Oct. 1:—Six hundred thousand barrels of Canadian apples are to be sent to Great Britain this winter. As a consequence, there may be a shortage in Canada.

Richard Thomas, Book-Keeper for Dept. of National Defence, Dies Suddenly.

Richard Thomas, book-keeper for the Department of National Defence at Seal Cove, passed away about midnight last night at Seal Cove at the residence of his brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. George Thomas, where he made his home.

### Asking for Men . . .

Once again the military authorities are asking for men. Curiously at the same time Lieutenant General McNaughton says there is no immediate need of men in Britain. Anyone who knows anything about soldiering is aware that, when the army is asking for additional men to take part in the great adventure, these men are not to supply the immediate need. They have to be trained. The army heads take the long view, having in mind the possibilities of the next few months. Men will be needed, perhaps badly needed, before those joining now are ready to leave. Evidently the Empire needs men who have courage enough to face the Germans on their own soil.

### Leaders Wanted . . .

Writers and speakers are often asking for political leaders. Just now Grattan O'Leary, the journalist, is saying what we have said before that the greatest need of the Conservative party in Canada is leaders, young and fearless. He thinks a revival of the Conservative party is vital to the future of the country. The difficulty with O'Leary is that he does not point to the man. By inference he lets us know that the present leadership is wholly inadequate but all he does is to bewail the fact and ask for better.

What Conservatives have to ask themselves is not so much whether they have leaders but whether there is anything in the party as at present constituted to inspire leadership. As we see it the Conservatives of the Dominion are even less united than the Liberals, and we all have to admit that there is little real unity among Liberals. All that is asked of them is that they agree on some essentials and one of the essentials just now is that they agree to support the present leader.

Mr. O'Leary has a lot to say about the Conservative reactionaries. They are evidently holders of the money bags of the party and keep a tight hand on the strings that tie those money bags. Any leader that seeks the leadership of the party must show that he is in sympathy with those who hold the money bags. The first object of the party, then, must be to cut the strings that tie the party to the big financial interests. Money has its place but its place is not to control any political party, Liberal or Conservative.

### IS HEAD OF RENT BOARD

Mr. Justice Hyndman to Succeed Mr. Justice Martin.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1: (C)—Mr. Justice James Duncan Hyndman of Ottawa, has been selected to succeed Mr. Justice W. V. Martin as rentals administrator for the War-Time Prices and Trade Board, it was learned on good authority late yesterday.




