### News War

NO ITALIANS ARE LEFT

CAIRO-British general headquarter; announced today that there are no Italian soldiers left in Egypt, Sudan or Kenya Colony except as prisoners. Referring to the fall of Kurmuk, strategic Ethiopian frontier post, the High Command said that, in effect, all Italian invaders of the three zones had been repulsed, killed or captured. The situation in North Africa was described as unchanged. Large quantities of war materials have been captured from the Italians in Somaliland. Belgian colonial troops have reached the Sudan to co-operate with the British forces.

RECORD R.A.F. FLIGHT

LONDON-A round trip flight of about two thousand miles, the longest so far in the war, rivalled only to that of 1600 miles to Danzig lastNovember, to western Poland and back in which propaganda leaflets rather than bombs were showered on German-occupied area was announced by the Air Ministry. The leaflets reminded the people that bombs could just as easily have been dumped. A flight of such long distance brings the deepest part of industrial Germany into Royal Air Force range. The Poland venture was disclosed with the announcement that Great Britain's offensive operations on Sunday included bombing of Netherlands and Belgian coastal objectives. Ships and docks were bombed Saturday night at Calais, Ostend, Boulogne and Rotterdam and vital industries in the Ruhr Valley were struck in the new attacks. The Saturday night attack on the Channel coast ports was the most violent and longest so far in the war lasting from 6:30 p.m. until 3:30 a.m.. Large damage was done and new fires started as the British planes carried on their job of breaking up German invasion concentrations. Five British planes failed to return. Bad weather last night interfered with activities of the Royal Air Force as it did with the German Luftwaffe.

LONDON ALARM TODAY

LONDON-Londan this afternoon had its 475th air raid arlam of the war. A small formation of enemy bombers passed over the Kent coast, one split in two, moving off in different directions. British fighter planes gave chase.

SOUTHAMPTON CASUALTY

LONDON-It is officially announced by the Admiralty that eighty-lives were lost in the sinking a few weeks ago of H.M.S. Southampton in the Mediterranean.

MEETING NIGHT RAIDERS

LONDON-The Air Ministry intimates that British pilots are now finding means to cope with night air raids. Means are being found of finding the enemy night raiders and keeping them in sight. Over the week-end Royal Air Force pursuit planes were successful in bringing down Nazi planes by night.

BAG OF NAZI RAIDER

FUNCHAL, Madeira-Six and possibly nine British ships of a convoy of eighteen are now believed to have been sunk when a German raider attacked the convoy last week. The German vessel ignored appeals for help from those going down with the sinking ships.

# TURKEY IN PACT WITH BULGARIA

Non-Aggression Agreement Reported But It Bay Be Merely Nazi Trial Balloon

SOFIA, Feb. 17: (CP)-Informants regarded as reliable told the Associated Press today that Bulgaria and Turkey have negotiated a non-aggression accord. These informants interpreted the reported pact as meaning Turkey would not fight in event of German invasion of Bulgaria.

There was no immediate comment from Turkish or German sources and it is possible the report was a Nazi-inspired trial balloon to test Turkey's reaction.

Bulgaria refused yesterday to give Great Britain assurance that she would resist German troop movements through the country.

# HE SAYS BRITAIN CAN WIN:

Hopkins Does Not Expect to See Hitler Victory-Stresses Need of United States Helping

NEW YORK, Feb. 17 .- "I don" think the British will be licked by Adolf Hitler," said Harry Hopkins personal envoy of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, on his return to New York Sunday after spending several weeks in England. "With our BRINGS IN effective help, there is no question of England winning the war and it will be a stalemate victory."

"Churchill is a great man." declared Hopkins "and the spirit of the British people is wonderful but they need help desperately-not in man but in war sumlins"

Honkins soon proceeded to Washington where he was to meet Presidon't Franklin D. Roosevelt and Secretary of State Cordell Hull to present a confidential report.

# UNCLE SAM, SAYS JAPAN

United States Action Will Determine Future Developments-War Preparations Continue

LONDON, Feb. 17: (CP)- The Tokyo newspaper Nichi Nichi said in an article quoted by the British Broadcasting Corporation that "future developments in the Far East depend exclusively on United States action." The newspaper was quoted to the effect that "Japan's advance to the south has been spurred by British-American policy in aiding the Chungking regime and antagonizing Japan."

Speaking today, Japanese Foreign Minister Matsuoka said, in commenting upon the refusal of the Dutch East Indies to come under Japan's "new order" in the Orient, that Japan does not claim leadership over all people in the Far East but does insist upon racial equality for Japan.

At Washington the Dutch minister to United States told Secretary of State Cordell Hull that the Netherlands East Indies will fight if attacked by Japan or any other aggressor. This is the fixed policy. The minister said that the Netherlands East Indies took its orders from the exiled home government in London.

# R.A.F. GOES FAR AFIELD

Penetrates 2000 Miles Into Poland As Well As Continuing Near Attacks-Six Nazis Downed In Britain

LONDON, Feb. 17: - During the night the Royal Air Force again found targets in western Germany and Channel in asion ports and penetrated 2000 miles into Poland to drop pamy hlets. There were attacks also on Southern Italy and Sicily. After widespread operations, only two British aircraft are missing. Extensive damage was done at Syracuse, Taranto and Brindizi.

Five German aircraft were brought down while attacking Britain during the week-end and another was destroyed off the Norfolk coast today, It has been announced. One of the German planes Saturday was brought down in Southwest England, another in the northeast and a third in East Anglia. The bombing of London Saturday was heavier than usual but it was officially announced that damage was not serious and casualties were light. Bad weather last night curtailed operations on both sides.



There is a heavy Newfoundland representation in the Royal Navy and fishermen who earned their livelihood on the Grand Banks now are doing important war work on trawlers around the fortified coasts of the United Kingdom.

Crossed As Civilians

All the Newfoundlanders serving with the Imperial Forces in Britain are volunteers. They were examined and attested at home and crossed to Great Britain as civilians. They enlisted and were equipped on this side of the Atlantic. and fishermen, but they include. too. trappers, solicitors, school teachers, college students and of-! fice workers. Some of them hiked hundreds of miles to the recruiting offices at St. John's, ,the capital.

Recruits travelled from as far afield as inner Labrador which sent two Eskimo brothers, 24-year old F. Benoit and M. J. Benoit. 27. One is a fisherman and the other a trapper. Their companions call them "Bennett," and both are anxious, in the words of their commanding officer, to "have a go! at the Germans."

Majority of the men with the artillery regiment training in this section of the Eastern Command are from Newfoundland's outposts. and life in England is strange to them. They are billeted in palatial homes which are a far cry from the small, frame buildings of the fishermen's villages of the Isl-

H. Russell, a fisherman from Carbonear, said his companions like nothing better than to spend lively evening "in town." The town is a small English village.

Preferred Imperials

The commanding officer, a Briton who knows Newfoundland like a book although he has never been there, is satisfied with the progress his charges have made since their arrival here several months




