War News

DOVER HEAVILY SHelled

DOVER—German big guns today engaged in the longest cannonading so far in the war on the sea. Shells fell within Dover and nearby. British guns fired effectively to the cross-channel firing. The regular tempo of the German salvos gradually increased until they were coming over at one-minute intervals. A high explosive type of shells was being used. After four hours the bombardment was still going on. The day was clear and observers from this side could clearly see where the British shells were landing around Boulogne and Cap Griz Nez, indications being that damage was being done there. British aircraft also went into action against the enemy big gun emplacements. German speed boats of the type which it has been said would be used in an invasion attempt also launched an attack on the southeast coast of England, Berlin saying that all returned safely although engaged by British speed boats.

PLYMOUTH ATTACKED AGAIN

LONDON—Fires were started by incendiaries and oil bombs and damage was done but casualties were not believed heavy as a result of another two-hour attack by the German Luftwaffe on Plymouth during the night. The attack came after a day during which mass burial had taken place of victims of previous air raids. Elsewhere on the east coast and in East Anglia the enemy struck during last night.

ENEMY TAKES SALUM

CAIRO—Capture of Salum in Egypt, around which there has been fierce fighting between British and Axis forces, by the Germans and Italians was admitted here today. The next objective in the Axis drive toward the Suez Canal is expected to be Marsa Matruh.

WITHDRAWAL FROM GREECE

SYDNEY—British forces are withdrawing from Greece under heavy enemy pressure, Acting Premier A. W. Fadden of Australia said today. Many troops had already left there. Fadden said, but "unfortunately casualties cannot be avoided and must be prepared for them."

CANNOT MOVE BATTLESHIP

LONDON—The Royal Air Force raided the Nazi battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau at Brest last night for the twelfth time in a month and well informed sources said the vessels were still in the French port because they were so badly damaged the Germans could not move them.

THE NEXT AXIS MOVES

Attack on Gibraltar, Suez and Cyprus White Making Invasion Attempt

OTTAWA, April 29.—Speaking to the press yesterday on the subject of the war, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King said he was not surprised if attacks on Gibraltar, Suez and Singapore were synchronized with an attempted invasion of Great Britain.

Attack On French Somaliland Denied

General Charles DeGaulle Denies Knowledge Of Free French And British Activity

LONDON, April 29.—General Charles DeGaulle, head of the Free French forces, denies any knowledge of reported attacking by Free French and British forces on French Somaliland in connection with the campaign against Ethiopia. It might have been spontaneous action on the part of the French garrison in Somaliland as a result of pressure against Nazi influences. London heard that Free French forces had surrounded Djibouti.

NORWAY TO VANCOUVER

Fishing Vessel Completes Long And Arduous Journey From Old Land To This Coast

VANCOUVER, April 29.—After an arduous voyage from Nazi-occupied Norway from which they managed to make their escape, eight Norwegian men have arrived here on the fishing vessel Hjalgar II. The fishing vessel Hjalgar II, carrying two men on the Hjalgar and fourteen disembarked at Hallifax and the remainder brought to this coast here by way of Panama Canal.

UKRAINE IS NEXT

Germany Expected by Vichy to Move on Soviet Granary

VICHY, April 29.—Belief is expressed here that the next German thrust will be towards the granaries of the Ukraine in Russia.

BIG GUNS IN ACTION

Mammoth Duel Between Nazis And Britons Over Channel—Speedboats Also Used

DOVER, April 29: (CP)—For nearly six hours today German guns on the French coast shelled the Dover area in the heaviest of such cross channel action of the war and such as might be expected in connection with an invasion attempt. British guns replied, making it a mammoth duel across the water and the Royal Air Force went out to blast Nazi gun emplacements. Berlin reported a speedboat attack on that section of the English coast. This was, apparently, timed to coincide with the shelling.

STRIKE IS NEAR OVER

Expected Bituminous Collieries of Appalachians Will Soon Be Returning to Work

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 29.—At the suggestion of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, coal miners of the southern Appalachians have agreed to return to work pending solution of the strike which has now been in progress for six weeks. Yesterday President John L. Lewis of the United Mine Workers has guaranteed that north Appalachian workers shall return to work if sustenance is granted the southern workers pending settlement of their dispute.

Turkey Thumbs Down On Reich

Is Not Consenting To Give Over Control Of Dardanelles And Bosphorus

LONDON, April 29.—The Daily Herald reports that Turkey has thumbed down a proposal from Germany to be given control of the Dardanelles and Bosphorus in return for which a slice of Thrace would be given Turkey. Territorial demands against Turkey will be regarded by Turkey as a declaration of war, it is reported.

KILLED IN TRAINING

Two British Flying Students Lose Their Lives Near Medicine Hat

MEDICINE HAT, Alta., April 29: (CP)—Flying Officer A. F. M. McLean and Leading Aircraftman E. Walton of the Royal Air Force were killed last night when a training plane crashed near here. Both were from England and were in Canada training under the Empire Air Training Plan.

DESTROYER BADLY HIT

Four Royal Air Force Planes Lost in Assault on Naval Vessel Off Dutch Coast

LONDON, April 29: (CP)—British bombers left a German destroyer spouting a great volume of smoke after an attack yesterday morning off the Netherlands coast which cost the Royal Air Force four planes. Last night the Royal Air Force again bombed the French coast port of Brest where the German battleship Scharnhorst and Gneisenau have for some time been targets.

Malcolm M'Donald Visits Washington

British High Commissioner To Canada Off To United States Capital To Meet Lord Halifax

OTTAWA, April 29.—Rt. Hon. Malcolm MacDonald, British High Commissioner to Canada, left yesterday for Washington to meet Lord Halifax, British ambassador to the United States. Co-operation in connection with delivery of war supplies to Great Britain will be discussed, it is understood.

MAKE NO HEADWAY

Axis Forces Stationary Yesterday—Greek Withdrawal Continues

CAIRO, April 29: (CP)—Axis forces which penetrated five or six miles inside the Egyptian frontier near Salum on Saturday had made little or no further progress Monday and were still stationary then. British general headquarters announced.

The daily communique yesterday did not mention British forces in Greece but today said withdrawal was continuing. Only official word on the situation in Greece yesterday came from Hon. Percy Spender, army minister for Australia, who declared at Sydney that the evacuation of Greece was under way and, "as far as this has proceeded, it has been successful."

As for the campaign elsewhere in Africa than Egypt, repeated sallies by the British out of Tobruk were reported with the enemy taking defensive positions. Following capture of Dessie in Ethiopia, Italians were still in flight with British and South Africans in pursuit.

SWITZERLAND WARNED

BERLIN — Germany today warned Switzerland, particularly the newspapers of that country, against unneutral attitude. Germany had no aggressive intentions against Switzerland, the Nazis warn, but that country must refrain from undue criticism.

LONDON—Two young sons of exiled Premier Pierlot of Belgium were killed when fire destroyed a London-Newcastle Express train.

Proposed Arrangement For Provinces To Vacate Field Of Income Impost Disclosed

Third War Budget Presented to Parliament at Ottawa Today by Minister of Finance Isley—Revenue and Expenditures Vastly Increased

Sales Tax Unchanged

OTTAWA, April 29: (CP)—No increase in general sales tax is made in the budget presented to Parliament today. The automobile tax on value up to \$700 is increased from twenty to twenty-five per cent. Tax on ordinary wines is increased from 15c to 45c per gallon. Taxes are also increased on malt, playing cards, carbonic acid gas, cosmetics, long distance telephoning, lighters and cigarette tubes.

GIBRALTAR VULNERABLE

Great Britain Doubts if it Could be Held Against Land Attack

LONDON, April 29: (CP)—In connection with reports that Raymond Suneer, Spanish foreign minister, is about to sign up his country with the Axis, doubts are held in some military quarters here that Great Britain would be able to defend Gibraltar from land attack to the rear. There is considered to be a real possibility of Hitler striking soon to break the British hold on the western Mediterranean. Four German motorized divisions have reached the French-Spanish frontier, it is reported, in readiness for an early attack on Gibraltar.

Cabinet IS MERELY NAZI PLOT

Government and Labor Leaders in Australia Scent German Propaganda

SYDNEY, April 29.—Both Australian government and labor leaders agree that German propagandists are endeavouring to cause a rift between Australia and the Mother Country over the Greek campaign. The Australian government is endeavouring to effect even greater assistance to Britain.

RESIGNATION IS ACCEPTED ONLY SHOT AND SHELL

Charles A. Lindbergh Is No Longer Officer In United States Air Reserve Corps

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 29: (CP)—The United States War Department announced today Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's resignation as a reserve air corps officer had been accepted. Col. Lindbergh had written President Franklin D. Roosevelt that he was resigning because of the President's comments on his attitude at a press conference last Friday.

TAX ON INCOME HIGHER

Sharp Increases Announced by Hon. J. L. Isley in His Budget Today

OTTAWA, April 29: (CP)—Giving details of sharp personal income and national defence increases in his budget today, Hon. J. L. Isley, minister of finance, announced that new graduated rates of income tax would start at fifteen per cent on the first \$1000, increasing by five per cent on each additional \$1000.

The national defence tax is increased as from July 1 from three per cent to seven per cent and from two per cent to five per cent. The defence tax minimum exemption is raised from \$600 to \$660 and exemption for dependents is increased from \$8 to \$20.

The instalment income tax payment principle is to be extended next year and the due date is changed from April 30 to March 31. Exemptions for gifts to charitable organizations are cut from fifty per cent to ten per cent.

New surtax of four per cent on investment income and present surtax are to be absorbed in the new rates. Corporation income tax minimum rate is to be increased to forty per cent.

### EDITORIAL

#### Increasing Danger - - -

The expected tension with Japan seems to have started. On Saturday Japanese ships were ruled out by the British and American insurance companies. Only by special application can insurance be obtained on these vessels. As Lloyds' are apt to get first notice of any possible extra risks this seems to be a very important ruling.

Again on Saturday there was trouble in Shanghai, a place where the Japanese have been making themselves very objectionable and where it would take very little now to cause a war issue.

We suggest that this is a time when Prince Rupert should be ready in case of anything happening. It may be nothing to worry about but it is something to prepare for. The difficulty everywhere in Europe has been that the nations were not prepared.

Our air raid precautions were a step in the right direction. Possibly this may be the time to increase the precautions and have another test blackout. At any rate it is a time to be watchful and careful and to keep in mind that no place is safe on the Pacific or the Atlantic and possibly the Pacific is the more vulnerable and liable to attack.

We do not think there is likely to be an invasion of Canada but there may be nuisance raids. If bases were sought, Prince Rupert would be the most likely place to be chosen by the enemy.

#### Highway To Seal Cove - - -

One of the important needed improvements in Prince Rupert just now is the widening of the highway to Seal Cove. There is a great deal of traffic over that road and it will tend to increase rather than decrease. When a loaded car meets one of the wide busses there is danger to both vehicles. At night driving there is extremely difficult.

#### Better Bus Service - - -

We are getting very near the time when a much better bus service will be required for the people of Seal Cove and possibly for the people of Westview also. That is the reason why we have felt that the city should take over the franchise and run a regular half hourly service from one end of the city to the other.

The present service is a great convenience to the people beyond Hays Creek but it is not anything like as useful as a regular half hourly service would be. It is difficult for those not travelling regularly to remember when a bus may be expected. The idea of a bus service is not to make big profits but to serve the people.

#### Needed Landing Field - - -

The local airport will not be complete until it has a landing field. This will cost a lot of money but it will be necessary sooner or later. The various surveys of possible sites in the neighborhood have not been successful in finding one that fills the bill in every respect and at anything like a reasonable cost. From those chosen tentatively it will be necessary to choose the best possible, even though not anywhere near perfect. It seems as if a site somewhere across from Kaien Island will be most useful. According to most authorities any landing field that is to be used much should be level for a mile square so that advantage may be taken of the wind in landing or taking off. No site on Kaien Island could be made anything like level for a mile in each direction.

her home was bombed out. The factory employed forty men.

Having lost all her worldly possessions, Mrs. Atkinson is now evacuated to Woodhall Spa in the country. Even there they are not free of bombings.

Writing to her brother in Prince Rupert, Mrs. Atkinson describes scenes of horror and devastation as a result of Nazi frightfulness.

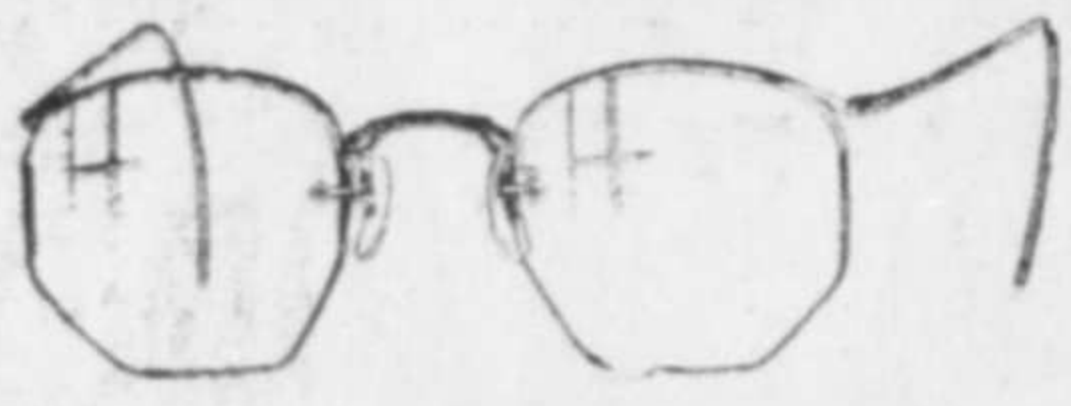

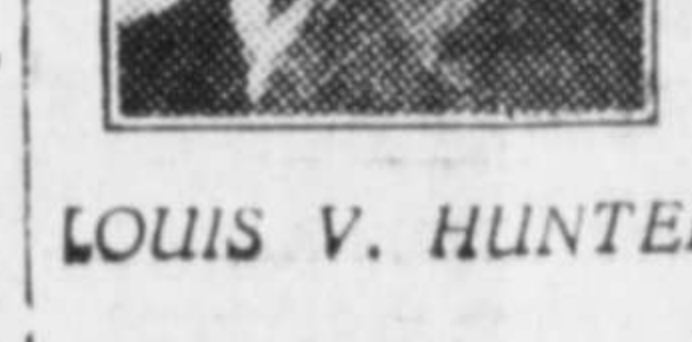

### R. A. F. Records— AIR NEWS SERVICE FAMILIAR

Born With the War Clouds of 1938,  
It Has Become Vital Agency

LONDON, April 29: (CP)—"By the Air Ministry News Service." This credit line at the start of a story is as familiar to newspaper readers of the United Kingdom as "By the Canadian Press" is to readers of Canada's daily papers.

Just as the Canadian Press Canada's co-operative news gathering organization, and its allied agencies "cover" the world for the Dominion, the Air Ministry News Service "covers" the widespread activities of the Royal Air Force.

It operates like any of the big news agencies and differs in that it concentrates, exclusively on the R. A. F., and, as a government agency—probably the most unique of its kind in the world—its output is available for the asking to news associations and publishers of daily and weekly newspapers in the United Kingdom.

Many of the stories published in Canadian papers relating the activities of the R. A. F. originated with the Air Ministry News Service. Other stories, particularly in connection with the R. A. F.'s Canadian squadron, were obtained by CP staff writers during periodic visits to the stations.

#### Unique Source Of News

As a news service, the Ministry organization is "just a baby." But its development has been phenomenal. Offspring of the comparatively long established Air Ministry Press Section, it is a unique source of news. No such organization had ever been attempted in Britain.

The service dates from the crisis of September, 1938, when war clouds were approaching. Air Ministry authorities realized that if the new R. A. F., then being built, ever went into action, a detailed news service would be demanded and it was obvious that official reports which would come to the Ministry in the normal way would not enable a news service of that nature to be provided. It was decided to set up, in effect, a service press agency to relate the activities of the R. A. F.

The manner and methods by which complete stories became available is a story in itself. The task was twofold: How best to provide news from the operational and other commands stationed at home and how to do likewise in respect to overseas commands

which might be actively engaged in a major war.

Promoting British Besides being a fertile source of news, the Air Ministry News Service is a vital link in the British promotion chain. As well as its news stories, the service provides material for recruiting campaigns, prepares radio scripts and now is working on a motion picture which will take the movie fan on a bombing trip against enemy objectives. A weekly news letter primarily for use by weekly newspapers is published.

The man responsible for organization of the service is C. P. Robertson, Air Ministry Press and Publicity Officer. His scheme developed fast after the crisis of 1938 and early in 1940 the Ministry created a Directorate of Public Relations, which incorporated the news service.

Air Commodore H. Peake, a former director of the Auxiliary Air Force, was appointed Director of Public Relations and for the first time the personnel of the new service came under the immediate control of a serving officer.

### Coffee For Reich Is Intercepted At Port Of Vancouver

VANCOUVER, April 29:—A cargo of a million and a half pounds of coffee beans believed to have been destined for Germany has been seized here. It was consigned by way of San Francisco and Russia.

### KAMLOOPS NEWS R.M.R.'S "HOME TOWN"

The Kamloops Athletic Association Hall was the scene of a two-day affair—a Parade of Manufacturers and Entertainment Revue—in aid of the Canadian War Services Fund campaign. There were more than three thousand paid admissions to the novel undertaking and the net proceeds amounted to \$294.10.

As a "Salute to Britain," the Sons of England Society of Kamloops held a monster open-air service in Riverside Park on Sunday afternoon. A parade preceded the service and a large congregation turned out. Military units and various civilian organizations took part in the parade in which the city band also participated. Mayor Charles E. Scanlon made a short address and pastors of the Protestant churches also took part.

The funeral of Clarence William Johnston of the Royal Canadian Air Force, killed in a motor accident at Victoria, took place in Kamloops last Friday afternoon with Rev. James Dunn, Presbyterian Church pastor, officiating. Deceased was the son of the late W. H. Johnston, well known Kamloops business man and contractor. He was born in Kamloops thirty-seven years ago.

The annual graduation exercises of the Royal Inland Hospital will be held on May 16. There are ten graduates.
