Mussolini's Newspaper Says They Will Withdraw from Somaliland and Eritrea for Last Stand in Ethiopia

CAIRO, Feb. 28: (CP)-British headquarters announced today that a British and Free French column which is driving into Eritrea from the north is now in contact with enemy troops covering positions north of Cheren-Italian desence centre which has stalled the British advance for weeks.

In Rome Premier Benito Mussolini's own newspaper suggested that the Italians would withdraw entirely from Italian Somaliland and Eritrea to make a strong and final stand in the mountains of Ethiopia.

Just now we are not campaigning for payment of bills but we are out to boost the investment of savings in war certificates to help send more munitions to blow Hitler and his minions off the map and to feed the British people so that they may be able to continue the fight. You are not asked to give. All that is asked is that you lend your money and it will be repaid with interest.



Prince Rupert's War Savings and waypoints. campaign although late in starting, is now well under way and, during the next few days, canvassers will call at every place of business and home in the city with the request that we pledge ourselves to invest all that we possibly can regularly in War Savings Certificates. There must be few of us indeed

who do not realize the necessity of this appeal. The briefest glance at the newspaper hadlines is sufficient to tell us that Canada is spending money on this war effort on an unprecedentedly large scale. For this present year it is \$700,-000,000. Next year we are told it will be \$1,300,000,000. No one can say how much this figure may be exceeded. In order to maintain our sup-

plies of munitions and all the other implements of war, these vast sums of money must be returned to the government to finance further and further efforts until victory is ours. One way in which this can be done is by every citizen of Canada cutting down on luxuries and investing his savings in certificates to swell our government's war coffers.

In England, men, women and children are enduring unspeakable hardships, cheerfully accepting sacrifices that we can scarecly imagine. The least that we can do is to help them and encourage them in their efforts by diverting part of our present income to produce the planes, guns and tanks which they so badly need.


