## War News

PROVINCIAL GOVT. LIBRARY PARLIAMENT BLDGS. 51 MAR 22 1942

**NAZIS INVADE CRETE**  
**CAIRO**—The Germans attempted to land in Crete today by landing parachute troops. Five hundred Nazis were disguised as New Zealand soldiers. In London Prime Minister Winston Churchill said a serious battle was in progress but he expressed confidence that British New Zealand and Greek forces would be able to dispose of the German invaders.

**FRENCH FIGHT FRENCH**  
**LONDON**—The Vichy government of France may launch an attack against Free French forces in French Equatorial Africa with a view to regaining control of Togoland and the Kameruns and turn them back to Germany to whom they belonged before the First Great War. Free French forces are fully prepared to meet any attack, it is stated.

**ICELAND IN DANGER**  
**LONDON**—The British Broadcasting Corporation says that Iceland is in danger of Nazi attack. Troops, naval vessels and aircraft being concentrated at Narvik in Norway may be used for the purpose, it is suggested. The Parliament of Iceland last Friday dissolved the union with Denmark which has existed since 1918 when Iceland became a sovereign state after having been a Danish protectorate. The Danish King, as a result, is no longer King of Iceland. The move is made, it is explained, because of communication difficulties and not because Iceland is no longer loyal to King Christian.

**QUIET IN ENGLAND**  
**LONDON**—Some damage was caused by air raids in southwest and east England but, on the whole it was a quiet night. Some damage was done but casualties were not serious. The Royal Naval College and the Royal College of Surgeons are among buildings recently hit by bombs in London.

**BRITISH ADVANCING**  
**CAIRO**—British forces have advanced fifteen miles from the direction of Habbaniyah towards Bagdad. The Euphrates was crossed on a bridge which was left intact.

# Nazis Land On Crete

## Fifteen Hundred Parachute Troops Are Dropped By Air On Strategic Island Today

Announcement in Regard to "Serious Battle" Made to Parliament by Prime Minister—Were Disguised as New Zealanders

**LONDON, May 20: (CP)**—Prime Minister Winston Churchill announced today that 1500 German troops wearing New Zealand battle dress had landed by gliders, parachutes and troop carriers in Crete to which island the Greek government fled and made its headquarters after the Nazi conquest. The Prime Minister added, that, according to reports to the government, the military situation was in hand. Savage fighting had taken place and was still in progress, Mr. Churchill said, but he stated that, although a serious battle was developing, there was confidence that the British, New Zealand and Greek forces would offer stern and resolute resistance and that the enemy would be successfully disposed of. It was the first indication that the enemy air infantry had operated in disguise. It was the largest mass parachute attack so far in the war.

Mr. Churchill told the House of Commons that a military hospital between Canea, the capital of Crete, and Malemi had been captured by the parachutists but had been recaptured. The Germans also failed thus far to capture a British airdrome although several attempts had been made. The Prime Minister said that a fairly strong attacking group on the Canea-Malemi road had not yet been mopped up but other parties have been accounted for. The Germans flew about one hundred miles from Greece in great strength to invade Crete, preceding the invasion with intense aerial bombardment of the Suda Bay naval base. The invasion started suddenly this morning but was not unexpected as it was apparent that preparations were being made for such a move. Night after night the Royal Air Force has been carrying out destructive raids on airdromes in Greece from which the Germans are attacking Crete. The sudden invasion of Crete is regarded not only as an Axis attempt to gain a stepping stone for passage to the Near East mainland but also as a possible dress rehearsal for airborne invasion of the British Isles.

These Syrian airdromes are being used by the German planes as stopping places on the way to Iraq. The Vichy government's air minister, General Jean-Marie Bergeter, arrived in Beirut last night to organize anti-aircraft defences in Syria against British aircraft which attacked the German planes, using Syrian bases. Exodus of British, American and Palestinian from Syria has begun.

**Free French Also in Fight With American Planes—Enemy Suffers Losses—British Consulates Closed**  
**CAIRO, May 20.**—The Free French using latest American planes to bomb air bases in Syria with the Royal Air Force, have destroyed a number of German planes. At Beirut in Lebanon the Vichy authorities have ordered the British consulates in Syria and Lebanon closed and the personnel removed before the end of the week as reprisal for Royal Air Force bombing of Syrian airdromes. French planes have been sent aloft to defend airdromes in Syria. A French pursuit plane was reported today to have shot down the first British bomber over Syria. Last night British bombers destroyed a large German transport plane at Palmyra airdrome, also wrecking a Heinkel 111. At Damascus and another Syrian airdrome German planes were also attacked by bombing.

**PRISONERS NUMEROUS**  
**No Less Than 35,000 Fascists Surrendered in Ethiopia Yesterday—Aosta Gets Sword Back**  
**CAIRO, May 20: (CP)**—It is estimated that a total of 35,000 Italian and native troops surrendered in Ethiopia on Monday. Following the surrender of Amba Alaji and the Duke of Aosta, Italian military governor, today, there have been further British successes in southwest and northwest Ethiopia, particularly around Gondar. The Duke offered to turn over his sword to the British in surrendering but it was returned to him. In Rome Premier Benito Mussolini, admitting the surrender of Amba Alaji, predicted that Fascist forces would some time regain East Africa. He said that some Italian units in the country would stand out for a long time yet.

## STATEMENT BY BERLIN ON ZAMZAM

Was Sunk By German Sea Raider And All Those On Board Are Safe In Nazi Hands, It Is Announced

**WASHINGTON, D.C., May 20: (CP)**—The United States today asked the German government for full details about 138 Americans reported at Berlin to have been saved from the Egyptian liner Zamzam. This request was made after a Nazi spokesman at Berlin had said that the Zamzam had been sunk, presumably by a surface raider, and her crew and passengers, including 22 Canadians, were safe in German occupied territory. Until the statement was made at Berlin it was feared that the passengers might have perished, announcement having been made at New York that the Zamzam was a month overdue out of Pernambuco enroute to Capetown and must be considered lost. It was feared that it might be the first major incident involving the loss of Americans since the Athenia. There is no indication as to where the passengers may be held. The expectation is that Germany will release all the Americans as neutrals.

**BERLIN, May 20: (CP)**—Mystery which had cloaked the fate of twenty or more Canadians as well as over 100 Americans and members of the crew of the Egyptian liner Zamzam, reported sunk by German naval action on a voyage from New York to Alexandria, was lifted today with the announcement by a Nazi spokesman that the vessel had been sunk by a surface raider and those who had been aboard the 8200-ton ship were safe and being well cared for in German-occupied territory. The German announcement said that there had been 322 passengers on board the vessel including 138 Americans and twenty-two Canadians. It was hardly to be presumed, commented the spokesman, that the Zamzam had been sunk by a submarine which it was unlikely would be able to take hundreds of survivors on board. The explanation given for the sinking of the Zamzam was because she had goods of value on board for the enemy. The idea of unrestricted submarine warfare was scouted. Further inquiries are being made by United States diplomatic representatives here. The Zamzam had left New York on March 20 for Alexandria. On April 9 she cleared Pernambuco for Capetown. Canadians aboard the liner included Mrs. Tarrant Guernsey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. R. McD. Russel of Vancouver and daughter-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Guernsey. She was on her way to Rhodesia to join her husband who is a geologist with a mining company there. Mrs. Guernsey was born in Vancouver.

**ICELAND IS REPUBLIC**  
**Island Country Dissolves Union With Denmark Which Has Existed Since 1918**  
**STOCKHOLM, May 20: (CP)**—Delayed advice reported today that the Parliament of Iceland resolved last Friday to dissolve the union with Denmark which existed since 1918. A temporary chief of state has been appointed to take the place of King Christian. The report reaching Copenhagen said that Iceland had decided to become a republic. British troops are at present stationed in Iceland to protect the country against possible German invasion. This action was taken by the British after Denmark surrendered to Germany a year ago. Canadians were at first stationed here but were recently withdrawn.

## U.S. PLANES BEING USED

Royal Air Force Making Continued Blows At Enemy In North Africa

**CAIRO, May 20: (CP)**—The Royal Air Force carried out continued raids on Bengasi harbor in Libya, the Royal Air Force announced.

At the same time it was disclosed that American-made bombing planes have struck the first blow in North Africa, being used to drive back an attempted Axis advance into Egypt from the Libyan border base of Fort Capuzzo. Two Axis thrusts have been driven back with heavy casualties. British and Axis forces are locked in battle along the Egyptian-Libyan frontiers.

## CANNOT BE HELD DOWN

**Spirit of Norway in Support of Ideals and Institutions Unquenchable, Declares General Steffens to Gyros**

Declaring that the spirit and love of Norway for the institutions of liberty and democracy would be unquenchable as Norsemen continued the fight both from within and without against the Nazis and their ruthless and cruel aggression, General William Steffens, commander-in-chief of the Norwegian forces in Canada, spoke before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday with fifty members and guests in attendance reiterated his confidence that Norway would eventually crown the glory of Great Britain and its allies and thereby bring about the liberation of the Norwegian homeland. General Steffens gave an interesting personal account of the events leading up to the invasion of Norway and described his own experiences as commander-in-chief of the small army of western Norway which resisted so valiantly against overwhelming odds. The general closed his talk on a note of good humor, recounting some light incidents which showed how Norwegians had kept up their spirits and good nature even in the darkest days of the invasion. The Gyros made a special occasion of this luncheon which was thrown open to all persons desirous of hearing so distinguished a speaker. President W. F. Stone was in the chair and Dr. Jens Munthe introduced General Steffens. Rev. J. H. Myrswang, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, said the singing of the Norwegian national anthem and "God Save the King." Peter Lien presided at the organ. The guests of the day included General Steffens; Lieut. Commander Piers R.C.N.V.R., Lieut. Col. J. E. Wood, Flying Officer H. J. Stephenson R.C.A.F., Rev. J. H. ## EDITORIAL

### Ethiopia Is Free . . .

One of the first results of the war is the freeing of Ethiopia and its reversion to the former control. The capital was captured and the former king restored a while ago but the Italian forces have officially given up the struggle. From now on only a police force will be required in that country, the British army there being free to join other units in the eastern Mediterranean area. The probability is they will be sent to help defend the Mosul oil wells.

### Facing Reality . . .

There comes a time in the lives of most men when they come face to face with reality and cannot dodge it. Such a time has arrived for every man and woman in Canada who has a sum of money over and above that needed for ordinary expenditures.

There are few Canadians who do not treasure money, either for the protection it affords the individual against unforeseen calamity or for the value it represents in terms of goods which it will buy. Some treasure money because it is the concrete result of years of hard work. Others are reluctant to part with money because to them it is a sheltering arm around the family.

Now, however, Canadians are faced with the realization that, no matter how highly they regard their personal cash reserves, they must loan it in order to keep it.

The battle against Germany can be viewed in part as a battle in behalf of Canadian cash in hand. Let Germany win and assets of Canadians will dry up almost to the vanishing point.

Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, India and Canada have been left alone to fight the Nazi monster. The challenge, undoubtedly the most stupendous in world history, demands the active help of every Canadian. Those with money, be it fifty dollars or two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, must loan their cash to the government if Canada is to carry on with her present share in the big battle.

The man or woman who shrugs his or her shoulder and deliberately attempts to duck from under the responsibility of each individual in this time of national crisis will earn the contempt of his fellow citizens.

## TO TELL AMERICA

LONDON, May 20: (CP)—Three members of the London Fire brigade who have gone through the worst air attacks the capital has endured are to tour the United States and Canada. The trio, District officer D. D. Ivall and auxiliary firemen R. Haybrook and C. Palmer, will tell people in America first-hand stories of big fire raids on London.

Last winter Fire Chief McElligott of New York sent two of his officers to study raid conditions in the metropolis. The coming tour will constitute a return visit.

District Officer Ivall was a professional fireman before the war. He has been fighting fire in London almost continuously since the severe attacks began last September. Haybrook was formerly a professional artist and also one of the crew of the fireboat *Massy Shaw* which rescued many survivors from the beaches at Dunkerque.

The firemen are taking with them 100 paintings and water-colors of fire scenes in London, most of them the work of auxiliary firemen who were professional painters before the war. Some are the work of Haybrook. The pictures will be sold in America for the benefit of the firemen's fund.

## "WEE MAC" IS POET

Former Prince Rupert Newspaperman, Now Air Raid Warden, Inspired To Verse

Norman Mackintosh, for several years a newspaperman in Prince Rupert in the early days, is an air raid warden in London now. In civil life he is Canadian Pacific Railway Company press officer.

One raidless night, while on telephone duty at his ARP post, Mackintosh, moved by the way London has stood up before incessant bombing, composed a poem which he called "London Triumphant." He submitted it to a London newspaper which published it in a Sunday edition. Here it is:

Old London on her time-worn face  
Wears many a new made scar;  
Foul foemen leaving there their trace  
Her beauty strives to mar.

But from each wound a flower has bloomed  
Another London pride;  
The knives that deemed our city doomed  
Find their vain boast belied.

From every scar a glory's spread  
Radiant for countless years;  
London defies her hours of dread,  
And laughs even through her tears.

With dignity she bears each blemish;  
Naught has she to conceal;  
A city that can stoutly choose  
To brave her dire ordeal.

Firmly for Freedom, Honor, Truth  
Stands she unflinchingly;  
Her men and women, age and youth  
In their extremity.

Quitting themselves as unperturbed  
As veteran; on parade;  
Through daily danger, nights disturbed,  
Londoners unafraid.

Time's touch all wounds of warfare heals;  
Let time the fame extol  
Of London—for each scar reveals  
The triumph of her soul.

Better to wear ten thousand scars,  
Ten thousand wounds to feel,  
Than craven-hearted lower the bars,  
And cringe 'neath conquering heel.

**TRAPPERS WARDENS**

North Manitoba Program For Pelt Industry Brings Results

THE PAS, Man., May 20: (CP)—Muskrats producing two litters averaging five each every summer, are rolling in dollars for northern Manitoba trappers who for years have faced poverty due to lack of an organized fur industry.

Muskrats fell in production from around 800,000 a year at the turn of the century to but a few thousand by 1936, when the Manitoba government rehabilitation program was started. Four years later 400 heads of families received \$21.75 a month from rat pelts trapped on the 131,000 acre Summerberry Preserve, 40 miles south of The Pas.

This year the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources sent 700 heads of families into the preserve and the 1941 catch of 200,000 animals is expected to give each family \$25 a month for 12 months. Last year's catch was 126,000 animals. At public auction they brought an average of \$1.32 each.

Trappers are placed in zones under supervision of a head trapper who directs operations and enforces game laws. Pelts from various ones are delivered to a control point and later transported to

market for auctioning. From the sale proceeds the provincial government takes five cents a pelt as royalty. In addition 20 percent is deducted to cover costs of patrolling and other services and to be used toward development of other areas. The remainder goes to trappers in regular monthly instalments.

Registered trapline districts have been set aside with a view to ending ruthless competition between resident and itinerant trappers.

### Whifflets From The Waterfront

### KEEP COSTS IN BOUNDS

Co-operation Between Control Board And Responsible Commercial Bodies Factors In Australia

SYDNEY, N. S. W., May 20: (CP)—Wartime profiteering as a whole has been successfully checked in Australia although there are still certain abuses under consideration, the office of the Canadian Trade Commissioner has reported.

It said price increases have apparently been successfully restricted to those that were "unavoidable," and retail prices have increased by approximately five per cent. Chief reason for these results, it said, has been "close and cordial co-operation between the Price Control Board and responsible commercial bodies."

"As compared with the limited sphere of price-fixing during the First World War, the establishment of price-fixing machinery in Australia in the present war has been extremely rapid," a report from the office said. "At the commencement of 1940 the Commonwealth Prices Commissioner had fully organized for this important phase of wartime control, with the result that price increases were checked throughout the Commonwealth before they had developed any momentum or become uncontrollable."

Several methods had been used by the commissioner to control prices, the "most important" being that of "declaring" prices of particular commodities. The prices fixed might be either maximum or

minimum but, in actual practice, a maximum price has been the rule.

Declared prices have been established for such commodities as bread, butter, coal, refrigerators, tea and other domestic requirements, building materials, tin and copper. The power to set prices also extends to all services; for example, an increase of 12½ per cent has been permitted in shipping freights between Australia and its territories, the amount being designed to compensate for increased war-risk insurance, seamen's awards and maintenance costs.

Co-operation  
The prices commission has full power to co-operate with established organizations controlling prices and to inspect and investigate all classes of goods and public services.

"Owing to its possession of these powers, it is believed that traders as a whole have conformed to the principles of price control without the inconvenience and expense of direct government action and, in the opinion of responsible bodies, price control in Australia was definitely successful during 1940," the trade commissioner's office said.

Situation In Canada  
(Shortly after the outbreak of war, a Wartime Prices and Trade Board was established in Canada with power to fix maximum prices but the power has been seldom used. Rents have been fixed in a number of communities, however, and temporary maximum prices were established on bread, flour and butter but now have been removed.

Officials said the situation in Canada so far had been "most fortunate" with few shortages occurring which might cause a major price rise).

### Tablet Unveiled At Gitlakdamiks

Memory Of Late George Adams, For Years Cannery Contractor At Carlisle, Honored

Last week in the Anglican Church at Gitlakdamiks on the Naas River the resident missionary, Rev. S. Kinley, unveiled a tablet which had been presented by the Canadian Fishing Co. to the church for erection in memory of the late George Adams, for years a native cannery contractor at Carlisle Cannery on the Skeena. Adams had died at Gitlakdamiks during the past winter.

### Fire-Fighting Nerve Centre

Located Deep Down In London It Enables Calling For Help When Needed

LONDON, May 20: (CP)—Nerve centre of Britain's fire-fighting armies is a small room hung with maps of the British Isles. This secret fire control room is situated deep in the bowels of a substantial building "somewhere in England." It is the heart of the operations, and intelligence side of a reinforced organization, based upon plans worked out in detail before the war.

The maps on the walls are dotted with colored pieces. Movement of these pieces indicates movements of fire-fighting appliances. Information is relayed to any of the 12 regions into which the country is divided. Each region is divided into districts and the principal is that a brigade which is in trouble receives help from three "enforcement in turn."

### PLANS FOR AFTER-WAR

To Rebuild Shattered Cities To The Best Advantage Of Families Of Future Years

LONDON, May 20: (CP)—Gallant fighting women of the Old Land are not sitting around wringing their hands between the devastating visits of the Hun. They are planning and commenting on plans for the post-war rebuilding of their shattered cities, particularly residential districts, school areas, parks and the future safety of children against traffic hazards. This widespread expression of women interest has led to the appointment of one woman to the 19-man commission appointed under Lord Reith, minister of works and buildings, for the planning and rebuilding of these cities.

Mrs. Hichens' Work  
On the committee are Britain's

10 foremost architects headed by Professor L. Patrick Abercrombie. London County Council town-planning expert; W. H. Ansell, president of the Royal Institute of British Architects and Sir Walter Citrine. The one woman member is Mrs. Lionel Hichens, a member of the Royal Commission on distribution of industrial population.

The first study the commission is making is how to prevent speculation in valuable building sites in bombed areas. Seven cities have been chosen as test cities and plans for the rebuilding of each are being drawn up. They include four large ones, London, Liverpool, Bristol and Birmingham, and the smaller ones Southampton and Coventry and finally the fishing town of Exmouth. In addition special committees are working on Manchester and Sheffield.

These are considered typical examples of towns which will have to be replanned and rebuilt after the war. The committee is co-operating with the Ministry of Transport for the re-routing and

organizing of the great trunk highways beyond the boundaries of London.

#### Noise-Free Schools

Women are asking for noise-free school and receiving the co-operation of the officials of the Board of Education and the teachers' association. In reconstruction the committee is considering schools with sound-proof walls, special playgrounds and sites in neighborhoods as "dust-free" as possible. Mrs. Hichens suggests also that they should be far from factories, cemeteries, sewage works or trades having offensive odors.

A further idea submitted by the committee is that the East End of London should be so rebuilt "as to incorporate many gardens, beautiful squares and blocks of flats so that not only thousands of workers, but also the many thousands of city clerks may find agreeable living quarters there."

Evidently the "white collar" occupations are not to be forgotten after the war.
