# Bill To Aid Britain Is Approved

## Committee Puts Only Minor Amendments On Vital Measure

Refuses to Hamper Important Legislation With Financial Limit—President Given Power Until Middle of 1943

WASHINGTON, D.C., January 30: (CP)—The administration's British aid bill was approved by the United States House of Representatives foreign affairs committee today after efforts to write in a financial limit had been defeated. There were, however, some minor amendments in this "lease-lend" measure the committee action on which clears the way for House debate which will probably commence Monday. The vote on final approval was taken after the committee defeated a proposal to place a \$2,000,000,000 limit on transactions under the bill.

## INVASION EXPECTED

Consensus of Military Opinion is That Hitler Will Make Attempt On England

LONDON, January 30.—Notwithstanding some opinions to the contrary, the consensus of views of military observers still inclines to an attempted invasion of Britain as the main danger in a supreme effort which Chancellor Adolf Hitler will undoubtedly make this year, possibly in the spring, to win the war before United States aid can start coming in larger volume. There is still talk of a crisis within ninety days.

## Big Break In Stock Market

Issues Off One to Four Points Yesterday in Worst Collapse Since November

NEW YORK, January 30.—The New York market had its worst break yesterday since last November when issues declined from one to four points. The turnover for yesterday amounted to 600,000 shares, industrial average at closing was 126.04, off 2.50; rails, 23.72, off .76, and utilities 19.94, off .30.

## SILVER PRICES

NEW YORK, January 30.—The price of silver was unchanged at 34½¢ per fine ounce on the New York metal market yesterday. The London price stands at 23¼ pence.

## Motor Vessel Cancolim, Under Captain William Thomas, Did Heroic Rescue Work At Wreck

KETCHIKAN, January 30: (CP)—The crew of the American Can Co.'s service boat Cancolim was hailed today for its rescue work in connection with the wreck of the United States Army tender Kvichak on Sisters Island in Finlayson Channel, south of Prince Rupert. The Cancolim braved heavy seas and treacherous rocks to pick up twenty-three survivors from the rocky island 500 yards from the wreck and ferry them to the United States gunboat Charleston. She made three trips, grounding once, but managed to work herself free.

## WILL HURRY BACK HOME

Wendell Wilkie Will Not Stay as Long in England as First Expected

LONDON, Jan. 30.—In order to testify before the Senate foreign relations committee and campaign for further and immediate aid for Great Britain, Wendell Wilkie will hurry home sooner than he expected. His visit to England will last only a few days longer.

Wilkie, who dined last night in an air raid shelter, hinted that he believed "the British are a good war risk." He was touring London again during today's raids.

## IRELAND IS IN DANGER

Premier De Valera Admits That Position of His Country is More Serious

DUBLIN, Jan. 30.—Grave new dangers face his country, Premier Eamon de Valera admitted today in announcing the rationing tea and a further cut in the petrol ration. Nevertheless, de Valera said, Eire is much better equipped to meet aggression today than it was eight months ago.

# Hitler Is Boastful In Speech

## War News

### AFRICAN OPERATIONS ACCELERATED

CAIRO—Great Britain's triumphant desert armies captured the Italian stronghold of Derna, 175 miles inside of Libya from the Egyptian border, this morning, at the same time continuing their advance westward towards Bengasi, the last important port in Libya. Apart from announcing that the capture of Derna was completed this morning, British general headquarters gave no details. Operations on all Italian fronts are reported under acceleration in the hope of cracking Italy's African Empire before German intervention can materialize on a large scale. The British forces are reported to be pushing toward Bengasi. With Bardia falling January 5, Tobruk January 22 and Derna January 30, it looks like the promise of Prime Minister to tear the Italian Empire in Africa to shreds is being made good. In East Africa the British forces are driving steadily through Eritrea towards the Red Sea. In Ethiopia and Italian Somaliland operations continue satisfactorily. In central Libya Free French forces captured a secret Italian air patrol base and blew the hangar and planes to pieces.

### LONDON AIR RAIDS

LONDON—London had four daylight air raid alarms today and, in one, an invading bomber dropped bombs in a suburb, causing several deaths. The capital last night also had its first after dark raid in ten nights. Bombs were dropped in East Anglia today and a village in the East Midlands was both bombed and machine-gunned.

### SUEZ CANAL BOMBED

ALEXANDRIA—Axis planes, either Italian or German, raided the Suez Canal area this morning and dropped bombs but caused no casualties or damage.

### COUNTER-OFFENSIVE STOPPED

ATHENS—A strong attack by the Greeks north of Klisura is reported to have halted the Italian counter-offensive which has completely failed, leaving the Fascists once again on the defensive. The Greeks have assumed new positions of importance.

### SECOND SUBMARINE LOST

LONDON—Loss of the second Dutch submarine in naval action has been announced. The Dutch navy is operating in collaboration with the British.

### LENGTHEN DRAFT PERIOD

OTTAWA—Lengthening of the National Service draft training period from thirty days to four months is expected to be announced at any time. This would reduce the number of men called and would tend to interfere less with the pursuit of industry. As few skilled craftsmen as possible are to be called from the trades, particularly those engaged in actual production for the carrying on of the war.

### EXPRESSES WAR AIMS

LONDON—Jeffrey Mander, Liberal, told Parliament today what he thought should be British war aims and asked that they be given serious consideration. He would restore the freedom of all peoples who had been overridden by aggressors and provide food for all European nations as soon as the enemy had laid down arms. He would refuse to negotiate with the present rulers of Germany and Italy but would give those countries the kind of government they wanted after they had been freed of their tyrant control.

### PRISONERS TELL FACTS

TOBRUK—Italian officers who have been taken prisoner by the British here tell of hundreds of first line German planes now being in southern Italy. There are also hundreds of thousands of German soldiers. All the officers agree that it would be impossible for Italy to hold out unless given large measure of assistance by Germany.

## NAVY BASE HIT AGAIN

Wilhelmshaven is Subjected to Further Attack by Royal Air Force

LONDON, Jan. 30.—The German naval base of Wilhelmshaven was raided again last night with good results by the Royal Air Force. All British planes returned safely. It was the 42nd raid of the war on Wilhelmshaven.

### GRAND NATIONAL OFF

LIVERPOOL—For the first time in 104 years the Grand National Steeplechase, feature early spring race at Aintree, will not be run this year.

## Victory For Nazis In 1941 Is Predicted By Fuehrer; Warns U.S.

Declares That Europe Will Rise up if Any Outside Powers Attempt to Intervene—Typical Pep Talk

BERLIN, January 30: (CP)—In a speech at the Sports Palace to 20,000 followers who smiled, cheered and "heiled" in noisy automatic manner, Chancellor Adolf Hitler today predicted a Nazi victory within a year. He boasted that Germany is "a thousand times as strong as the strength we have already displayed."

## TO FIGHT IN INDIES

Japanese Admiral See Dutch Islands as Inevitable Scene of United States-Japanese Conflict

TOKYO, January 30.—Retired Admiral Nakamura declares that the Netherlands East Indies will be the inevitable scene of conflict between Japan and the United States. Which ever side steps in first will be the winner, he declares.

### POUND STERLING

NEW YORK, January 30.—The British pound sterling was trading at \$4.03¼ on the New York foreign exchange market today.

## DERNA IS TAKEN TODAY BY BRITISH; DRIVE TO WEST BEING KEPT UP

Increased Resistance by Italians Fails to Hold up Advance—Many Sunken Ships Captured at Tobruk—Serious Ethiopian Situation

CAIRO, January 30.—British forces captured Derna, another port on the coast of Libya today, as they continued their drive westward towards Bomba and Bengasi. The capture of Derna was accomplished despite increased resistance by the Italians. Royal Air Force planes are ranging hundreds of miles west of Derna to soften the Italian resistance prior to assault by naval and land forces.

## RESUMING AIR RAIDS

London and Rest of England Under Attack Both By Night and Day Again

LONDON, Jan. 30.—London had four air raid alarms today—two this morning and two this afternoon. Several deaths resulted from the dropping of bombs.

During last night there was intermittent bombings of London for four hours. A few persons were killed and others were injured by explosive bombs. Roof watchers were at their posts in full force but not a single fire was started.

There were also raids during the night on west and northeast England as well as central Scotland but no extensive damage was done. The raiders came a few at a time and were in no mass formation on this occasion.

German long range guns were fired again last night and this morning from Calais on the Dover area but there were no casualties.

### Wonderful Little Man . . .

The life of John Metaxas, Prime Minister of Greece was made up of a series of contradictions. He was dictator of the country and followed out many of the policies of the other dictators such as institution of the youth movement and yet he died while his country was defending itself against the other European dictators on the side of the democracies.

At one time Metaxas was strongly pro-German, going so far as to wear German decorations at an official reception to Lord Kitchener. Yet he ended his life planning campaigns against the Germans and Italians.

The little Greek dictator announced only a few years ago that the country would never again return to the Parliamentary system of government. He believed in strengthening the monarchy, supporting the church and continuing the present regime. He ruthlessly suppressed communism and exiled opposition leaders. Of late months his people had acclaimed him as the savior of their country in stopping the advance of the Italian armies and driving the enemy from at least a part of Albania.

The death of their leader is not likely to stop the victorious advance of the Greeks. There must be plenty of good men among their military officers who will carry on without any break.

### Mr. Bracewell Arrives . . .

The new municipal commissioner arrived yesterday and is already on the job at the City Hall. While he is here we plan to give him every possible support and suggest it would be in the best interests of the city for all to do the same. While we are opposed to the system, we are not opposed to Mr. Bracewell personally and we feel sure he will do what he considers best for the city. We still think the commissioner should be a resident of the city.

### What Australia Is Doing . . .

Australia has over one hundred thousand men enlisted for service overseas and a similar number of men have been trained for self-defence with another batch of about fifty thousand now being trained.

It is in the air force that Australia really has done wonders. That country has forty thousand trained men and applications from 140,000 more. Some of the flying men are drafted to Canada and from there proceed to England. A good many are serving around the Mediterranean.

The Australian Navy naturally has to guard the country's own coast line but also takes part in other operations. It was the cruiser Sydney that sank the Italian cruiser Bartolomeo Colleoni in the Mediterranean in July.

Australian wool is all supplied to the British government for war purposes. Foodstuffs help to feed the British army and shells, guns, tanks, airplanes, small arms and ammunition are manufactured and shipped to Britain. She is also building ships to add to her fighting strength and for her merchant marine. She is making a notable contribution to war services.

## LACK OF INTEREST

Officials of Local St. John Ambulance Feet Disappointed

Officials of the local centre of the St. John Ambulance Association, which was formed late in 1938, feel it is unfortunate that such little interest appears to be taken in this work in the city and district. "While we are not a large industrial city" they say, "yet there are many men engaged in industrial occupations in which an knowledge of First Aid is almost essential. Yet only twenty in the city and seventeen in the St. John Ambulance district took the lectures with eleven taking the examination here and twelve at St. John's."

"As a matter of fact a knowledge of First Aid is almost a necessary part of our every day life as most of us, at one time or another find that such knowledge would be very valuable even in our own homes. In these times, particularly every person, man and woman should acquaint themselves with the principles of First Aid.
