Year Of Good Hospital Work Reviewed In Annual Report; Continued Support Invited

"Measured by service to the sick our hospital has done excellent work and, if financial return alone is considered, it has been very satisfactory indeed considering the many changes that have taken place in the everyday activities of so many of us during the past year, both in our thinking and our finances," Frank Dibb told the members of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association in presenting the report of the board of directors for the year 1940 at the annual meeting last night.

The growing tendency, probably subconscious as yet, with many of our citizens to expect the state to provide hospital services without charge leads many to avoid payment of hospital charges as long as possible, thus throwing the burden upon the state and on other patients. Without the support received from the city and provincial government by way of per capita grants it would be impossible for us to continue our work to provide the facilities necessary for modern hospitalization. We do not need money for selfish purposes. We need it for the efficient care of the patient.

Increasing Problem "With so much of our war effort diverted to war time charities, the problem of maintaining our voluntary institutions has become steadily more difficult. The situation has not been helped by rising taxation. The ultimate effect is becoming apparent and we do know that many people who might ordinarily be devoting their time and resources to hospital work are now diverting their efforts elsewhere. Even though this does keep alive the spirit of voluntary service, it is a distinct loss to hospitals whose work must go on. We are all agreed that our military efforts must come first but it behooves every one of us to see that the public never loses sight of the fact that our civilian population must be cared for despite changing personnel and higher costs. In fact we need more personal and financial assistance during a time of war than we do in peace.

It is interesting to note that our hospital still merits the good wishes of many organizations in the community as well as individual's and I wish to express the thanks of the board to the Gyro Club for the generous gift of an incubator, the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, the hospital staff for their loyal co-operation, the Doctors, who render such magnificent service through this hospital to the indigent sick, the Ministerial Association, tradesmen and individuals who were most kind in furnishing comforts to patients at the Christmas season, to the press and all those persons and societies who have in any way showed sympathy and help in our hospital work.

"Miss Margaret Jamieson R. N., lady superintendent, in her report tells us that the year opened with 42 patients in residence and that it closed with 45 in residence. She also attaches a detailed analysis of hospital services which in part shows that there were 1,165 adult admissions and 1,108 discharged; 222 major operations and 325 minor operations. The total number of cases x-rayed were 852 besides 558 chest films processed for the Army Medical Corps.

"Weddings, prospective ones, accidents and illness have caused changes in the nursing staff. Fortunately, at all times, it was possible to get sufficient nurses to carry on the hospital routine. There is no lack of excellent applicants for any possible future vacancy.

"There have been some changes in the maintenance staff and, so far, it has been possible to secure any necessary replacements on this staff. "Due to rising costs for hospital supplies, it is going to be difficult for the hospital to continue adding the necessary new equipment as well as replacements, needed, if Continued on PAGE FOUR

BANTING HERO AS HE DIED

Famous Canadian Doctor-Scientist Before Succumbing Himself

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, Feb. 26: (CP)—Bodies of Sir Frederick Banting and two companions killed when a military plane enroute to England crashed were taken Monday night to Musgrave Harbor, Newfoundland, according to information reaching here. They will be flown into St. John's when weather permits and on to Canada. It is understood that Sir Frederick was alive after the plane crashed but he died shortly afterwards. The two companions were killed instantly.

All four occupants of the plane were wearing parachutes when the military machine crashed, it is disclosed, but none attempted to jump with the possible exception of Banting, the possibility being seen that he might have made a leap by parachute but at too low an altitude. A copyright dispatch said that Banting expended his strength in tending the wounds of Pilot Joseph Mackey and then lay down on a bed of branches and died.

CAPTURE CAPITAL

British Take Mogadiscio in Italian Somaliland—Advancing Elsewhere

NAIROBI, Kenya, Feb. 26: (CP)—British Empire forces, pounding the defenders of Italian Somaliland by land, sea and air, have captured Mogadiscio, the colony's capital on the sea coast, and have advanced sixty miles up the Juba River in the interior, it was announced officially today. The communique said that, by conservative estimate, three thousand prisoners had been taken in the interior in addition to many other Italians who escaped to the bush country and are now returning and surrendering.

With the capture of Mogadiscio, the Empire forces have penetrated four hundred miles into Eritrea since a month ago. Mogadiscio was taken by advance elements of British east and west African troops early last evening.

It will probably be used as a spring board for a new drive by the British into Ethiopia.

A Cairo communique disclosed that Ethiopian insurgents, supported by British troops, had forced the Italians to abandon more posts in the Gojjam area of Ethiopia.

Capture of the important Ethiopian town of Moyale was claimed today.

The army of all nations has surrounded the important railway centre of Cheren in Eritrea on the way to the capital of Asmara.

Italian Police Force Increase

Three and a Half Thousand Men to Be Added to Civilian Strength

EDITORIAL

Do You Earn \$100? . . .

If you earn \$100 here is a suggestion as to how the money might be appropriated if there is only a man and wife: food \$22, rent \$22, clothing \$10, social and sundry \$10, life insurance \$5, operating routine, \$17, War Savings Certificates \$9. This seems to be an average of a number of budgets which are being faithfully carried out by real households. The only objection we have is that it does not provide for sickness and especially for additions to the family. Perhaps these items are included under operating routine or social and sundry.

Hitler's Problem . . .

Hitler is finding it more and more difficult to persuade his people that he is winning this war. His lies have to be more daring and he has almost to plead with them to continue to give him their full support. Various little incidents seem to lead to the conclusion that April is the month chosen for the attempted invasion of Britain if the Germans are not prevented from doing so by the Royal Air Force bombings. It is possible that the invasion attempt may come at any time—even tonight, if the weather continues favorable. What we know is that, whenever and however they make the attempt, the British will be prepared to meet them. It is quite possible that the attempted invasion is necessary to keep up the morale of the German troops. A long period of inaction might prove fatal.

Invasion Scouts . . .

From time to time during the winter and during last autumn the Germans have been sending out weather airplanes for the purpose of studying weather trends over Britain. These planes are operated by scientists who do nothing else but advise as to the best time and place for the proposed invasion attempt. The time chosen for this bold gesture, if it is ever made, will be chosen just as much by the flying weather bureaux as by the German commanders.

What About Petain? . . .

Henri Phillippe Petain, Marshal of France, still remains one of the enigmas of the present war. Years ago he was thought to be losing his mental alertness and, when he trusted to the magnanimity of Hitler by surrendering to him, it was thought he had lost all sense. Yet today French people look to him to protect their nation and to assist in bringing it through the present difficult time with honor. He and his colleagues have been able so far to hold back the Germans from using the French army and navy against the British and, by holding the army and navy as a threat, has prevented the Germans from wholly ruining his country. How long he will be able to continue to hold out no one knows.

PLANS ARE COMPLETED

Provincial Architect's Department
Finishes Drawings For New
Prince Rupert Hospital

VICTORIA, Feb. 26.—The provincial architect's department is applying final touches to plans for a new military hospital at Prince Rupert and the drawings are to be turned over to Dominion authorities this week with tender call to be handled from Ottawa. Plans call for erection of a three-story building of monolithic concrete construction, measuring 78 by 44 feet and capable of accommodating 50 beds. It will have asphalt shingle roof, and heating will be by means of extending the steam heating system of the existing Prince Rupert General Hospital.

A new 20-bed hospital for Atlin is also planned.

VICTORY IS FIRST AIM

President Roosevelt Not Favorably
Disposed to Suggesting Peace
Move to Great Britain

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 26.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt asked yesterday what he thought about the possibilities of mediation in the war and if the new ambassador to Great Britain, John G. Winant, would advance any peace move, said that peace terms must wait until the war was won on the battlefield. He said that the United States did not wish to embarrass Great Britain or confuse the issue over aid to Britain by inquiring about war aims at this time.

The administration, Roosevelt said, did not wish to weaken the "lease-lend" bill with amendments tending to render it innocuous.

An "all out" battle looms in the Senate this week against one proposed amendment which would ban the second of expeditionary forces from the United States. Such an amendment would only tend to encourage Japan in aggressive moves in the Orient, it is declared by supporters of the bill.

The administration is still hopeful that the bill may be passed by the Senate by Saturday.

Threat To Blow Up Waterworks In City Of Sofia

SOFIA, Feb. 26.—The Bulgarian police announced today the discovery of a plot to blow up the Sofia waterworks and make the water supply unfit for use. This defense measure arose over the expected entry of German troops into the country.

RUSSO-RUMANIAN PACT
MOSCOW—Russia today signed a commerce and navigation treaty with Rumania.

LONDON SILVER
LONDON, Feb. 26.—The London price of silver yesterday was 23½ pence per fine ounce.
