Apparently the Berezina offensive, a direct



threat to Moscow, was alternating between heavy blows at Borisov, forty miles northeast of Minsk, and Bobruisk, ninety miles southeast. Today the Russians said that Bobruisk was the centre of the fighting. Since the ancient day when the warning fires of King Alfred the Great sprang to light from hill to hill across a threatened countryside, the CALL TO ARMS has been an unfailing rallying cry to the British tribes at war. There has been no challenge to the security of Canada when its summoning message has not run like a flame from ocean to ocean to bring a grim and swift

response. There has been no emergency threatening Canada when the CALL TO ARMS has not been answered by an instant and resolute mustering of Canada's citizen soldiery.

Whether it was the drum's beat behind the frontier stockade, or the silver voice of 1914 bugles, Canadians rallied instantly to the defence of their country. Whether it was the bells which roused Quebec City when de Salaberry's French-Canadians defeated the invader at Chateauguay in 1775, or the cannon's boom which told York of its peril in 1813, the result was the same. Whether it shocked or thrilled or angered, the CALL TO ARMS has not failed to inspire all loyal Canadians to stand to their arms in a concerted defence of freedom.
