R.A.F. MAULS GERMANY

LONDON- The Royal Air Force mauled frequen. mbed Hamburg overnight in the greatest assault yet. Oil falities at Rotterdam were set ablaze, minor attacks were delied against Bremen and Emden and a supply ship sunk off e Frisian Islands, the Air Ministry announced today. It was e second straight night of trip-hammer blows, indicating that e northwestern corner of Germany had become the principal rget of the Royal Air Force in the all-out offensive following nactment of the British aid bill.

GLASGOW-LIVERPOOL "BLITZED"

LONDON-Glasgow and Liverpool were the principal obctives of a German blitz air attack by large forces of bombers vernight on Britain. Hull on the east coast was also subjected a heavy attack and London was hammered as was Central cotland. The enemy fanned out over other parts of England cluding East Anglia and other widely scattered points over the ountry were bombed. The raids cost eleven German planes rought down during the night, all being credited to night fights. Daylight raids on both sides are continuing today.

AID ALREADY MOVING

WASHINGTON-Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson today old reporters that some defence materials, transferred to Great ritain under the "lease-lend" act, had already started towards heir destination. He, however, did not give details as that would ot be fair to Great Britain.

FRANCE AIDING GERMANY

WASHINGTON, D.C.—It is learned on good authority here nat factories in unoccupied France are making war supplies for sermany. For instance the silk mills at Lyon are producing arachutes for the German air force. In view of this United tates may be reluctant to ask Great Britain to lift the blockade gainst France. It is considered likely that Britain will permit he passage of food and medical supplies from the American led Cross for the use of French children but not for adults.

WASHINGTON, D.C.,-It is felt here that Germany has ndefinitely postponed plans for an invasion attempt on Great Britain. The principal menace to Britain now is submarine and ombing attack on shipping.

Royal Air Force Continues All Out Offensive With Biggest Attack Yet

LONDON, March 14: - The Royal Air Force continued its all-cut air offensive against Germany last night. The important German port of Hamburg was singled out for the heaviest single bombing attack which British planes have delivered since the war began. The Air Ministry announced that the attack was an "outstanding success." From other quarters it was learned that devastating damage had been done. Shipbuilding establishments, dockyards, warehouses, and other important objectives were hit, A fu'l moon favored the British attack.

Off the Friesian Islands British planes bombed and sank a German supply ship.

The Royal Air Force attack kent up today on Channel invasion ports.

Six British planes were lost during the night.

In Berlin German authorities, while admitting a heavy raid on Hamburg, minimized, as usual, the damage to military objectives but asserted that fifty patients and nurses had been killed in the bombing of two hospitals in Hamburg.

GLASGOW ASSAILED BY NAZIS

Liverpool Also Subjected to Another Heavy Bombing Attack Last Night

LONDON, March 14:-Liverpool, for the second successive night, and Glasgow were heavily attacked by Nazi bombers last night.

The raid on Liverpool was of ferocity equal to that of Wednesday night. Tons of high explosive and incendiary bombs were dropped and damage was quite extensive. (Germany claimed a devastating four-mile corridor had been blasted in the dock and shipbuilding area.)

Waves of German planes came over Glasgow for hours in the longest and heaviest raid the Scottish port has had in months. Many buildings were hit and there were heavy casualties. Fire fighters did valiant and effective work in extinguishing fires set by the incendiaries.

Other areas of Scotland were pounded and an unnamed northeast English town was also heavily attacked for hours. There was much greater resist-

Italian Offensive Fails Miserably Under Eyes Of Il Duce; 14 Planes Down

ATHENS, March 14: (CP)-Royal Air Force headquarters announced today that fourteen Italian fighter planes were shot down and a number of others badly damaged yesterday in a fierce battle over the Klisura-Tepelini sector f the Albanian front without a single British loss. The Royal Air Force also carried out a successful bombing attack on the airdrome at the port of Valona.

Greek dispatches declared that five Italian divisions had been shattered in Italian offensives launched in the last seven days in response to Premier Benito Mussolini's reported adjuration to his officers to "do something."

Instead, however, the Italian offensive crumbled and bogged down under the very eyes of Il Duce who was forced to witness his troops be either shot down or surrender to the Greeks.

Where Will Japan Strike? - - -

Japan is now concentrating troops on Hainan Island in the China Sea and in French Indo-China. Units of heri navy are in the Gulf of Siam and anchored at Saigon in the south of Indo-China. Japan is almost certainly putting pressure on Thailand to allow her to establish bases in that country. From these new vantage points in the south, where is she most likely to strike?

The Dutch East Indies and British Malaya are the richest colonial territories in the world and Japan would certainly like them. The most adjacent prize is Borneo, largely owned by the Dutch with British territory in the north. It is sparsely populated and rich in oil. 




