DUBLIN—A German warplane crashed late Tuesday in Waterford County, Eire. The crew was interned.

TROUBLE IN SOFIA

SOFIA—Anti-Axis demonstrations in protest at the occupation of the country by the Nazis have broken out in Sofia with counter-demonstrations favoring Soviet Russia.

AMERICAN STRIKE TROUBLES

WASHINGTON—Twenty thousand men are involved in a strike called by the C. I. O. in the Ford Dearborn plant of the Ford Motor Co. The Allis-Chalmers plant at Milwaukee was closed down again today to avoid bloodshed and possible loss of life after serious riots yesterday resulting in injury to 32 persons.

HARRISON LAKE DROWNING

BOSTON WINS

TORONTO—The Stanley Cup semi-final series was tied up at three games each last night when Boston beat Toronto 2 to 1. The three goals came within two minutes and 14 seconds in the third period.

STUDENT FLIERS KILLED

MACLEOD, Alberta—Two instructors were killed today in the first fatal accident at Macleod service flying training school when a plane crashed. They were Pilot Officer Robert Condie of Crystal City, Manitoba, and Sergeant Pilot James White McIntosh of Winnipeg.

TURKISH CONGRATULATIONS

ANKARA—President Inonu of Turkey has sent a message to King Peter of Yugoslavia congratulating him in connection with the crisis with Germany.

Attorney General Robert H. Jackson Promises Action Against Italian Ship Wreckers

WASHINGTON, April 2:—Attorney General Robert H. Jackson, who returned with President Roosevelt from his fishing holiday, promises there will be full prosecution by the Federal Bureau of Investigation of Italian seamen who scuttled their ships in American ports.

MORE ITALIAN SEA LOSSES

LONDON—The Admiralty today announced that a British submarine in the Mediterranean had sunk an Italian U-boat and an Italian tanker.

MASSAUA NEXT

CAIRO—Early capture of Massaua, last Italian port on the Red Sea, by the British is expected. Asmara, the capital of Eritrea, fell much more readily than had been expected.

ITALIANS WIPED OUT

ATHENS—Two more Italian companies have been wiped out by the Greeks in Albania. Eighty prisoners were taken.

LONDON—First Lord of the Admiralty A. V. Alexander says that the present rate of Allied shipping losses are not great enough for Hitler to have any chance of winning the war this year.

Possibility Of Peace Negotiations Said To Be Getting Nowhere

Some Signs Point to Early Conflict While Other Indications Are of Settlement—Fighting Forces Massing

BELGRADE, April 2: (CP)—An Italian Legation spokesman announced today that "certain conversations" between Italy and Yugoslavia leading to reports of possible mediation by Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy in the YugoSlav-German crisis "have attained no result and no negotiations are now in progress."

Destroyer Sent Down

LONDON, April 2: (CP)—The Admiralty today announced the sinking of an Italian destroyer in the Red Sea by British naval aircraft of the East Indies command and the interception of the German merchantman Bertram Rickmers in the same vicinity. The destroyer was sunk after leaving Massaua in Eritrea.

EDITORIAL

Defining War Aims - - -

There is still talk of the British Empire defining her war aims. Those who urge this policy usually are those who have, to say the least, been lukewarm in their war effort. Prime Minister Churchill declares his war aim is to defeat the Nazis and that is as far as he is willing to go at present.

This move to have the war aims defined is an effort on the part of the Nazis to divide the British just when they need greater solidification. We all know that Prime Minister Churchill is President of the British Conservatives and that Ernest Beven is a labor leader. To make a definite pronouncement in regard to what is to happen after the war might tend to make these groups suspicious of each other just at a time when the greatest undivided war effort is necessary. We can fight out the post-war aims after the war is won. The first thing to do is to down Hitlerism and Mussolinism. When that is completely accomplished there will be a new fight to establish a better democracy. That is really the continuation of an old struggle and will be carried on for many years after the passing of Nazism or Fascism.

Gross Foolishness - - -

Up to the time when France collapsed Italy was building up her merchant marine, constructing ships and improving her world condition. Her territories were respected and she bid fair to emerge from the period of struggle much stronger than when it commenced. Urged by Germany she thought she saw a chance to extend her empire at the expense of Britain, possibly without even striking a blow, for it seemed to her that her old ally was about to fall.

The result is that she has lost her African Empire, her merchant marine, most of her navy and all her world prestige. If Germany should win she becomes a vassal state. Her only hope is that Britain may be magnanimous when the war is over. She will be in a much better position if Britain wins than if Germany should win.

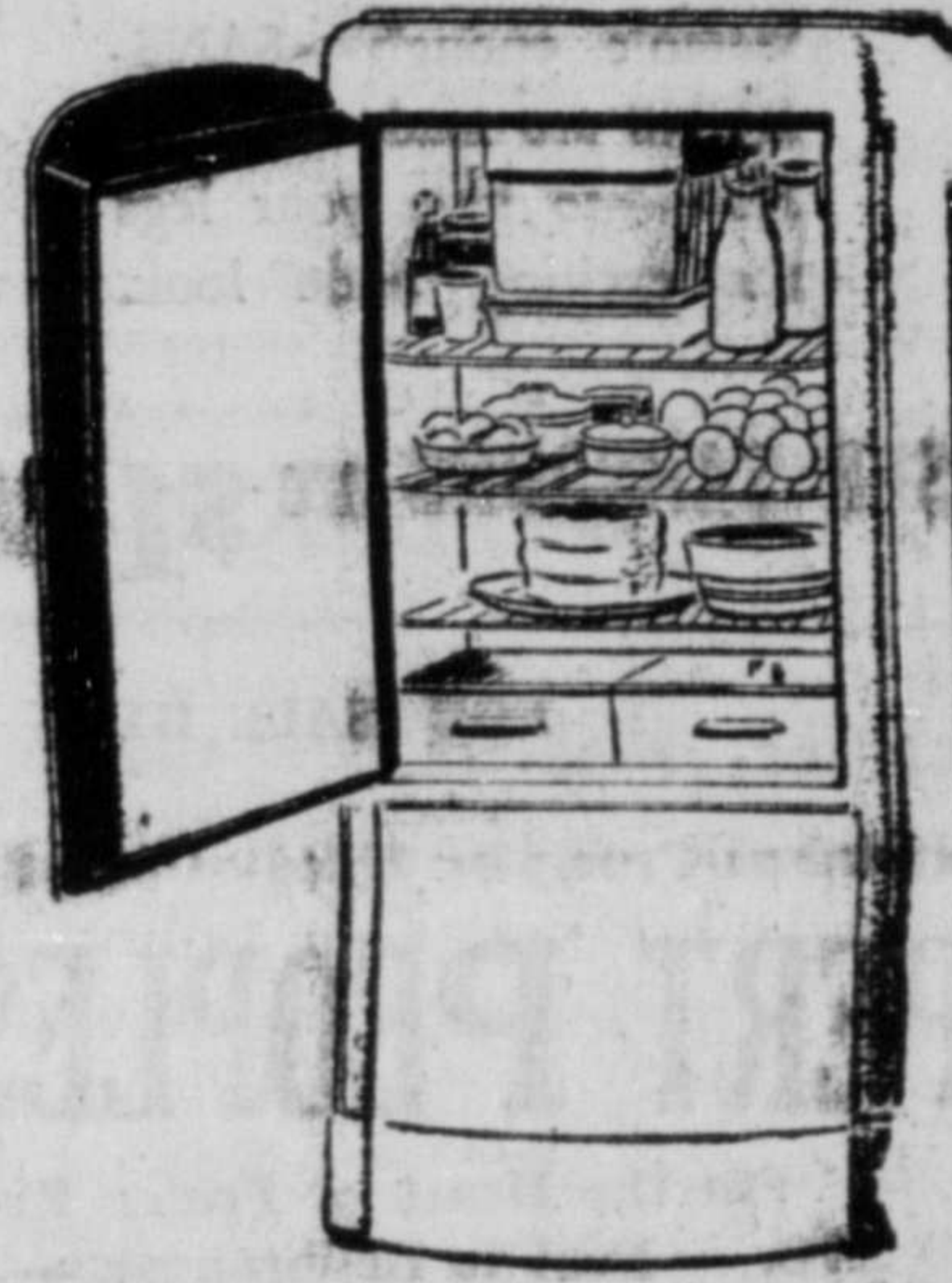

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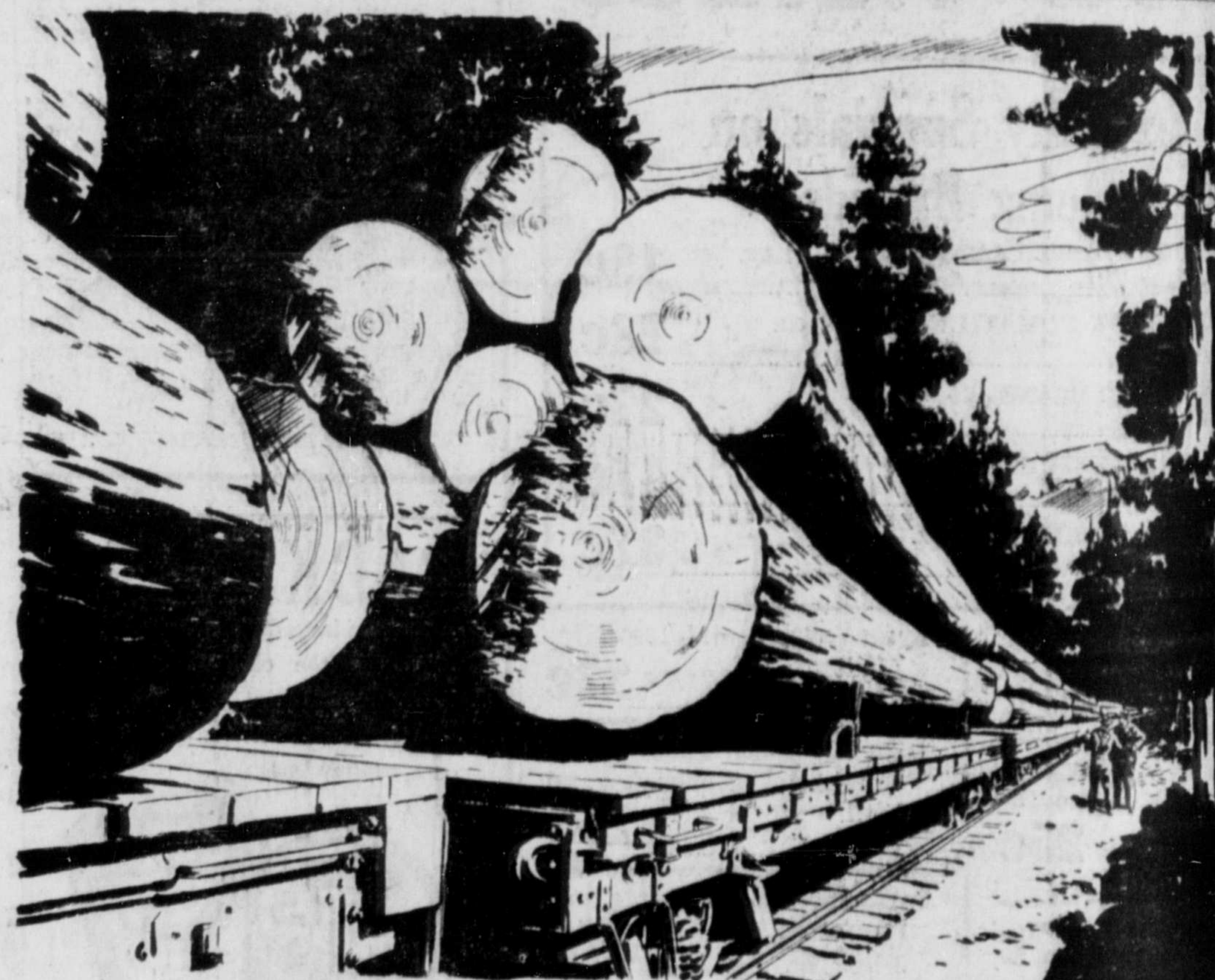
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
