LONDON, May 8: (CP)—It was authoritatively an-

bag having been sixteen. During the past seven nights seventy-three enemy planes have been brought down. Moonlight raids took place on British port areas, particularly on the west coast, centering on Liverpool for the seventh consecutive night.

A heavy casualty toll was also feared in a northeast town, possibly Hull, Hartlepool or Middlesbrough, which was subjected to a threehour pounding last night.

German planes clashed with Royal Air Force patrols in numerous daylight air battles over the English Channel today.

The sky over the English Channel was filled with the roar of motors recalling the vest daylight fighting of last fall.

The Royal Air Force, in counter raids, made direct hits on the battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau at Brest as well as other objectives on the invasion coast, Holland and western Germany including Bremen.

The Air Ministry News Service, describing raids on Brest last night, said that a large and brilliant explosion resulted when a very heavy bomb hit the forepart of the battleship Scharnhorst and another equally heavy bomb burst forward of the Gneisenau's funnel.

KITKATLA DROWNING

Mrs. Henry Brown Lost Her Life Yesterday Afternoon in Capsizing of Rowboat Near Village

Kitkatla people arriving in the city today in connection with the making of arrangements for the funeral reported the drowning there about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon of Mrs. Henry Brown, one of the best known women of the village. Mrs. Brown was out rowing with her eighteen-year-old daughter, Freda, when the boat capsized. Mrs. Brown became entangled in a rope and was held down but the daughter was able to swim ashore taking the boat with her. By that time Mrs. Brown was dead.

Mrs. Brown, before her marriage to Henry Brown, was Betsy Price of Port Simpson . Besides the daughter, Freda, there is a son, John, aged eleven, as well as the widower. Paul and Joshua Price of Port Simpson are brothers. Deceased was 50 years of age.

The funeral will take place at Kitkatla on Saturday afternoon.

EDITORIAL

There were only minor criticisms of the government in the debate on the conduct of the war in the British House of Commons this week. Three members were opposed but all others supported the general policy, a few being critical of the information department, a job usually handled by a person who knows nothing whatever about publicity.

Looking across at this distance from the field of bat-St. Louis tle, it seems to us that the British reluctance to give out Philadelphia news until every doubt as to its authenticity has been set aside has given the German a great advantage. The Germans tell the world about any advantages the moment it happens and sometimes even before it happens. They manage to give the first impression which often sticks. A little more speed in the propaganda department would be decidedly advantageous. We would like to see a man like Beverley Baxter placed in charge of the ministry of propaganda. If he were given a free hand there would be little opportunity for complaint, we feel sure.
