RUPERT MAKING GOOD IN LONDON MONEY MART

PRINCE RUPERT NOTE ISSUE REALIZES VERY GOOD PRICE

Special Cable Through Daily News Correspondent from London States That Issue Has Been Placed Privately at 99 5-8--- Comparison with Prices Realized by Other Municipal Issues in the West Very Favorable to Rupert

From London, England, yesterday afternoon The Daily News was informed through a special correspondent by wire that the issue of Prince Rupert municipal 5 per cent. 3 year notes had all been placed privately at the price of 99 5/8. This price is considered a very good one under the conditions at present prevailing throughout financial centres.

Daily News Bulletins.
As soon as the telegram was received The Daily News had special bulletins posted in the principal business premises down town for the information of the public, as the evening's issue was already on the streets and The News was in the position of being the first and only source for the information in the city. A copy of the bulletin issued was sent to the Finance Minister, who expressed great interest in the news, the substance of which had not been then made known by the bank.

Substantial Effect.
From this it will be seen that Prince Rupert's financial transaction, effected through the medium of the Bank of Montreal, has been carried out in business like manner, and the best market price available for the note issue has been obtained by the bank's

agents in London. This should create a still more firmly settled feeling of security for the city in its undertakings, both private and municipal, for the coming summer. There is good cause for satisfaction that the city's credit should be so confidently regarded in the financial centre of the world, from which is drawn the real pecuniary strength that is required for the development of Prince Rupert.
With the other great undertakings opening up for the summer, and the city's own concerns in a healthy state, all classes of business will prosper and Prince Rupert will continue to forge ahead.

IDENTIFYING THE DROWNED SAD TASK AT HALIFAX TODAY

Return of Morgue Ship McKay Bennett Relieves Dreary Suspense of the Waiting Bereaved, But Many are Disappointed in the Hope of Identification---Pathetic Scenes at Dock--- Five Women and One Drowned Baby Unknown

(Special to Daily News.)
Halifax, May 1.—Following the arrival of the cable ship Mackay Bennett with 190 bodies of victims of the Titanic disaster, the White Star officials have given out a list of 55 identified dead and of 110 buried at sea. Most of these appear to be members of the crew of the ill fated liner. J. J. Astor's body was recovered standing almost erect in the water and that of Isadore Strauss was aboard. The work of identification has not been completed yet.
Five Women; One Baby.
Halifax, May 1.—Of the 190 bodies of the Titanic victims

brought here today by the cable ship Mackay Bennett, sixty remain tonight unidentified. Of these there are five women and one child two years old. The remainder have all been claimed by relatives and friends. Surprise was expressed at first that 57 bodies had been buried at sea, but the announcement by the captain of the Mackay Bennett that lack of accommodation and embalming equipment made this necessary was accepted without criticism. H. V. Harris and Senator McKeen are here searching for the bodies of Hugo Ross and Thomson Beatty of Winnipeg, but have practically given up all hopes of finding them, and as only fourteen bodies have been picked up by the Minia there is little further chance of finding of the morgue ship this morning them. The scene on the arrival was an impressive one, the church bells tolling and flags half masted all over the harbor and city.

"UNDER THE LAURELS" WON ITS LAURELS

Establishes a New Record in Successful Amateur Stage-Craft and Performance in Prince Rupert

All the promise given of splendid effect in its actual production by Prince Rupert's amateur company in "Under the Laurels" was more than made good at the performance of the pretty southern play last night in the Westholme Theatre. Before a densely crowded house the young players, each letter perfect in his and her part, all enthusiastically working for the success of the play as a whole rather than for individual distinction, scored a great and well deserved success. The theatre rang with applause.
Not only was the work of the amateurs of exceptional merit, equal to very good professional work in fact, but the play itself was well chosen for its purpose of giving entertainment to a Prince Rupert audience. The flavor of southern romance, the tender scenes, the clever introduction of coon songs and dances, all were thoroughly popular features. The play as a

whole was a good interest compelling one, and capably produced.
While the well trained theatre troupe which died down correctly so that the principals speaking during the storm could be heard distinctly, was immensely appreciated as an example of the careful stage craft expended on the whole production, the performers themselves each and all earned particular appreciation in their respective parts.
Charles Vaughan made a famous "Frank Colewood," C. R. Simpson as "Kyle Branford" delighted, Frank A. Ellis as "The Hopper" was imitable, Robert McIntosh as "Bob Button" and George Weston as "Zeke" both thoroughly made good, while A. N. Other as the sheriff filled his part admirably.
The ladies, too, were really actresses of the most conscientious type, and their efforts were

beyond reproach. Mrs. S. P. Mc-Mordie as "Mrs. Milford" proved herself a restrained and attractive interpreter. Miss Fedora Alder as "Rose" had a heavy part which she performed admirably. Mrs. Morgan as "Sorky Button" was really good, while Miss Margaret McDonald as "Molly" simply brought down the house and earned the general comment that she is a regular star of the Prince Rupert amateur stage.
Throughout the evening, too, comment was heard very appreciative indeed of the merits of Mrs. Chisholm as an organizer and stage manager. Her work is beyond criticism. She deserves every success and secures it. From the point of view of the Baptist Brotherhood, the entertainment was an immense success, and on behalf of the brotherhood Mr. Clyde Rogers, its president, gracefully thanked the audience for their support of the club room scheme.

Ottawa Excited Over Remarkable Rise in Figures.

Ottawa, May 1.—The first month of the fiscal year shows an extraordinary increase in revenue from customs duties and bets are made that if this be maintained throughout the year it will produce a total in the neighborhood of a hundred million. The customs receipts for the month of April just closing have reached \$8,075,982.25. The figures for last year were less by \$2,588,819.67.

IRISH HOME RULE BILL

Winston Churchill Supports the Measure at Second Reading in Strongly Imperial Speech—Unionist Lined Up Against It.
(Special to Daily News.)
London, May 1.—Winston Churchill opened the debate on the second reading of the Irish home rule bill in the Commons today. He declared he saw the question with a modern eye and said the whole character of the movement has moderated since the Gladstonian period. The question in his opinion is not comparable in importance to the problem of the growing dissatisfaction among the laboring classes in England, nor to necessity for guarding British possessions. He thought home rule for Ireland the first step to further consolidate the United Kingdom. Walter Long, Unionist, moved the rejection of the bill along with other Unionists and severely condemned the measure, while a number of Irish members supported it.

SEAMEN STAND FIRM FOR UNION

Effect of Recent Disaster Has Been to Increase Vigilance of Sailors' Unions in Britain.

Liverpool, May 1.—The Seamen and Firemen's Union passed a resolution today declaring that its members would refuse to sail on any vessel unless a union official was present when the men signed for the voyage. The members of the union were not permitted to sign for several ships today pending the granting of the union's demands for increased rates of pay to both firemen and seamen. The wages demanded are \$22.50 for seamen and \$25 for firemen per month.
The Seamen and Firemen's Union also resolved that its members refuse to coal, load or provision any vessel which carried non-union or Chinese seamen.

Mathematician Calculates Odds in Favor of Your Life in Ocean Travel—Second Class Little Better Than Steerage.

New York, May 1.—In a summary of the lessons of the Titanic disaster, Lawrence Beasley, a University of Cambridge man, who was among the survivors, asks:
"What was the relative chance of escape for a first class passenger and a steerage passenger?"
His answer is: "I have worked out the percentage of the saved of the four classes and find it as follows:
"First class, 63.6; second class, 39; steerage, 36.7; officers and crew, 22.3 per cent.
"The payment of about \$75 excess of first over third gives you more than twice the chance of your life being saved."

A PROMISE TO BE FULFILLED.

During the late campaign William Manson promised that the Provincial government would lend assistance for the building of a highway around Kaien Island. Prince Rupert needs a boulevard, macadamized, broad and of low percentage grade, serving the commercial interests about to be established at Porpoise Harbor, as well as giving to Prince Rupert a scenic asset unparalleled on the Pacific Coast.

It is a project of moment, and with concerted and united effort something could possibly be accomplished before the present year is at an end.

INSPECTION OF EXPLOSIVES.

Explosives have from the first played a very important part in the development of Prince Rupert. In view of the fact that a number of lives have been lost during the course of the railway and other development work undertaken so far, and that only the other night the city found itself under liability to support a workman injured by a shot which had apparently hung fire while more grading work is also about to be undertaken, the following from the Canadian Mining Journal has a considerable local bearing: "According to the report of the Chief Inspector of Mines for Ontario 50 per cent. of the fatalities in the mines of Ontario for 1911 were due to explosives. The report further states:

"There has never been in Canada any legislation dealing with the inspection of explosives, which is a matter coming within the jurisdiction of the Federal government. At present anyone who has a substance that will explode may sell it, if he can get a buyer. Before the quality of the explosive is proven accidents may result. It is not only the small dealer who needs inspection, but also the large producers. In the competition for making sales and the desire for large profits, the grade of the explosive may not be kept up to the standard. Improper mixing, improper proportion of ingredients, improper packing, all tend to render the explosive unsafe and to increase the accident rate. Old explosives that have been in storage for more than a year are sometimes shipped into the less accessible camps in the winter time, and have to be used by the mining companies during the summer, as no others can be obtained. When an accident occurs now from an explosive there is no way by which this explosive may be thoroughly tested to ascertain wherein the fault lies."

"We regret to note that the session of the Dominion parliament has come to a close without taking up the question of the inspection of explosives. This neglect is inexcusable. Even while parliament was in session the country was shocked to hear of a premature explosion near Fort Frances, where some fourteen men while engaged on railway construction lost their lives.

"We would urge that the explosives bill be prepared during the recess and brought up at the next session at the earliest possible moment. In the meantime all arrangements should be made by the mines branch to have the bill brought into operation at an early date after its passage."

DR. NESBITT TO FACE TRIAL

Willing to Waive Extradition and Return to Canada in Custody—Greer, Not Satisfied, Insists on Examination.

Chicago, April 29.—Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, who is under forgery charges in connection with the Farmers' Bank of Toronto, has declared his willingness to waive examination before United States Commissioner Foote and return to Canada to face his accusers.

This arrangement is not satisfactory to W. D. Greer, of the Investigating department of Ontario Provincial Police, who insisted that Nesbitt be examined. Mr. Greer announced that if Nesbitt was dismissed by the Federal commissioner he would rearrest him on a warrant charging him with making false and deceptive statements to the Canadian Minister of Finance while he was president and a director of the Toronto bank.

It was expected that the Canadian physician-banker would go before Commissioner Foote on Saturday and declare his willingness to return to Toronto.

WHITE SLAVERS AND TITANIC

Ghouls of New York Dens of Iniquity Even Harrassed the Newly Landed Women Waifs of the Disaster.

New York, April 29.—Even the immigrants from the Titanic's steerage have not been exempt from the lures of New York. Mrs. Edward R. Hewitt, chairman of committee, has made the following statement:

"A thing which is gratifying and for which we are thanking God is that we lost none of the girls in our care. We found in the confusion five or six men at different times trying to lure away innocent girls who could speak no English and were easy prey for the plausible white slaver.

"We would see one of these men talking to a fresh faced girl and all we had to do to scare him off was to ask him whether he knew the girl or was a relative.

"Each proved his cowardice by hardly answering and slinking off in the dark. Doesn't it seem really that at least in this instance these shameful creatures might have recalled some slight bit of self respect and human consideration."

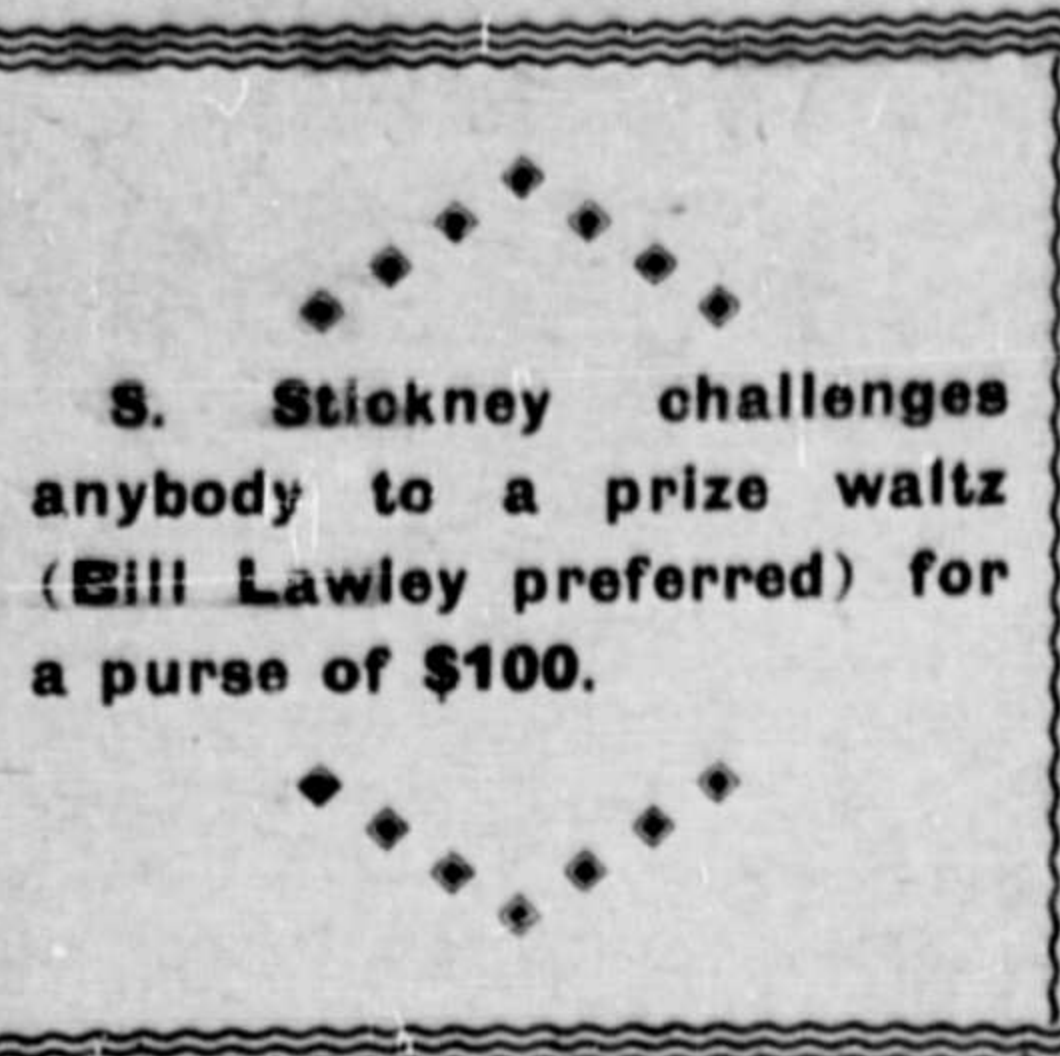

FLIGHT OVER IRISH CHANNEL. Corbett Wilson, English Aviator, Conquers the Space of Sea Hitherto Crossed Only By Balloon. Wexford, Ireland, April 30—Making the first aeroplane flight across the Irish channel in a rainstorm and heavy fog, Corbett Wilson landed at Enniscorthy, just north of here. Except for smashing his propeller in making his descent, Wilson made the trip without mishap. Wilson started from London to cross the Irish channel. Alien has not been heard from since he started. Wilson started over the channel from Fishguard. The weather became so thick that he was forced to descend at Enniscorthy, although he had planned to continue to Dublin.

TEN MILLIONS SAFE ACROSS. Titanic Disaster is First Really Serious Mid-ocean Mishap in Fifteen Years of Transatlantic Traffic. It is pointed out that in the fifteen years between the sinking of the Bourgoyne in a collision and the sinking of the Titanic by an iceberg, 10,000,000 immigrants have crossed the Atlantic to this continent, and in all those fifteen years no disaster has befallen a big trans-Atlantic liner while fairly out in the open sea. In the accidents to such vessels that have happened near shore the loss of life has been too small to be expressed in percentages. In fifteen years no modern liner has succumbed to any internal accident, or to wind or wave. The disaster to the Titanic was a needless disaster.—Manitoba Free Press.

GRAND TRUNK RAISES Two Thousand Men Affected by Recent Increases Granted. Montreal, April 28.—It is officially announced that an agreement has been entered into between the Grand Trunk Railway Company and its locomotive engineers, which agreement was duly signed the other day on behalf of both parties, by which the engineers will get an increase of from 12 to 15 per cent. in their wages, bringing them up to practically the same wage standard as the locomotive engineers on the Canadian Pacific.

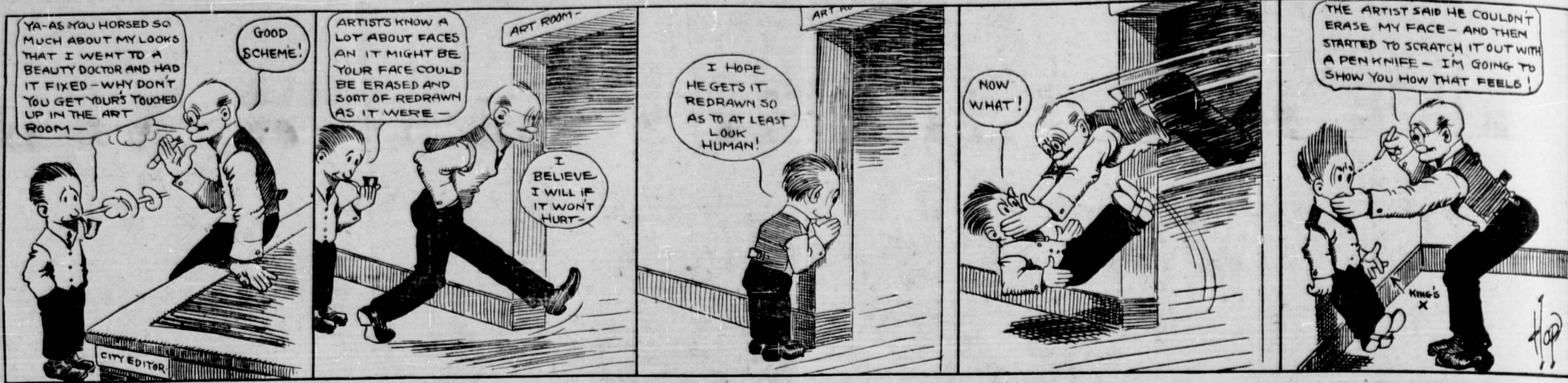
