## HARD HIT BYNAZIS

Are Fighting Back Strongly, However, In Enormous And Bitter Battle-Victory Or Enslavement

NO WORD OF ARMISTICE

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 10: President Franklin D. Roosevelt, answering a press conference inquiry, declared today that he had no reports at all which would indicate Russia had reached a point in her resistance to Germany where she might have to accept an armistice. The Associated Press said today that a report Germany had offered an armistice to Russia was being circulated widely in Europe. A non-Axis informant, whose information has proved highly reliable in the past, said Russia was giving terms forwarded through Russia and Bulgaria serious consideration because of the present critical situation but this was denied by an authoritative source in London.

LONDON, October 10: - Although no attempt is made to disguise the seriousness of the situation which is facing Russia in the war with Germany, there is evidently still plenty of fight in the Soviet army.



"This action is taken in no spirit of harping criticism. Much that Canada has done is commendable, but! in the Legion's judgment this effort still falls far short seal Cove of 'total' war. "For Canada to claim anything like 'total' war effort, our manpower should be in the same ratio to that of the enemy we are up against," the war veterans' leader stated. "Germany today, with a population of 75 millions, has one division for every 300,000 of her population, quite apart from her vast air force, her navy and war factories, and in addition to the forces of her Italian, Hungarian and Rumanian allies. By that yardstick —and surely it is the only one we can afford to use—Can-l ada, with a population of 12 millions, should have 40 divisions in the field before claiming a 'total' effort.

"The period of grace provided by Russia's magnificent resistance may end in a few months and there may! never be another. The apparent lack of realization of this, plain fact is appalling. The day is rapidly coming when, not machines alone, but manpower will be the decisive ON EASY GOOD-LOOKING SHAVES! factor. God help us all if we are not ready when that time comes.

"Our present facilities for mobilizing and training Canada's manpower are entirely inadequate for the life and death struggle that lies ahead. The Legion knows this and so do the people of Canada. The country is united on this question as never before in history. It simply remains for the government to give the lead and this the Legion is asking it to do. That is the purpose of our special council meeting."

Dr. Olga Jardine Describes New Zealand at Gathering of Women's Canadian Club.

An interesting talk on her native land of New Zealand from historic, geographic and economic standpoints was given by Dr. Mrs.) Olga Jardine of Victoria, aison officer of the Young Wowar services in British Columbia, nadian Club last evening in the Canadian Legion Hall with Miss E. New Zealand, Mrs. Jardine said, had been discovered in 1682 by Tasman and in 1769 Captain Cook had visited the North Island. New Zealand had very nearly become a French colony rather than Britcome but it was not until 1840 that colonization under British sovereignty actually began.

The population consisted of 1,500,000 people and 90,000 Maoris who had originally come to the islands in canoes in the thirteenth century from Hawaii or the East Indies. Their history veiled in myth and legend, they were a fine stalwart people who, like natives of other countries, had been affected adversely to some extent by their association with the whites. They enjoyed the franchise on equal terms with the whites and their educational privileges were also similar.

New Zealand had been advanced in social legislation, Mrs. Jardine sald. As early as 1893 votes had been given to women and in 1917 they were permitted to enter parliament. Railways, telegraphs and telephones were public-owned and New Zealand had had the first penny postage.

Meat, butter, cheese and wool were the chief products of the Dominion and the principal market was the United Kingdom.

Lauds Government

In 1935 the Labor government had come into office and Mrs. Jardine paid tribute to it for its successful accomplishments in the way of economic and social legislation. Its marketing legislation had worked out most successfully and had been of great value and help to the primary producers. The forty-hour week had been another successful accomplishment of the Labor government. Contributory social security legislation such as old age pensions, mothers' allowances and minors' allowances, had been well planned. Old age pensions were payable thirty shillings a week commencing at the age of sixty years. Pharmaceutical and hospitalization services were also of model character. Maternity benefits and hospital care for women were also provided. Universal state medical service was for the time being in abeyance.


