Air Attacks More Intense

Berlin Is Dealt Heavy Bomb Blow By Royal Air Force Last Night

Famous Buildings Along Unter Der Linden Destroyed or Damaged—Luftwaffe Also Felt Over Wide Area in Britain

LONDON, April 10: (CP)—The Royal Air Force dropped powerful high explosive bombs on Berlin last night, starting several huge fires in the heavy raid on the Reich capital, the Air Ministry announced. Overnight attacks were also made on an aluminum plant in Norway and on a Danish radio station. Eight planes were lost in these and daylight assaults yesterday while eleven Nazi planes were downed in attacks last night on Birmingham and northeast England including Newcastle, the latter city having its heaviest attack so far in the war. Coventry and Liverpool also were included in the heavy blows of the Luftwaffe. Berlin admitted that the magnificent German State opera house was destroyed and three palaces damaged in what the High Command acknowledged to be heaviest raid on Berlin since the war began. The usual claim was made that no military damage resulted. Other famous buildings along Unter der Linden to be hit included Prussian State Library, famous Bellevue Castle, Emperor Wilhelm Palace and Berlin University. Casualties were heavy.

ALARM NOW IN TURKEY

Considerable Portion of Population is Being Withdrawn From Istanbul

Istanbul, April 10: (CP)—The Turkish government announced today that it was found "advisable" to withdraw a considerable portion of Istanbul's population. The government offered to transport people free to the interior. The action was regarded as an indication of how seriously Turkey considers the war threat to Istanbul which is less than one hundred miles from the Bulgarian frontier. It is freely said that Turkey will be the next objective of the Nazis in their drive southeastward.

Greenland Air Bases

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 10: (CP)—The United States will establish air bases in Greenland for the protection of Greenland and the western hemisphere under an American-Danish agreement, it is announced today.

R.A.F. HITS VERY HARD

Impressive Raids Are Being Continued on German Naval Bases

LONDON, April 10: (CP)—The raid on Kiel by powerful forces of Royal Air Force bombers Tuesday night was even more impressive than the assault of the previous night which was the heaviest raid of the war on Germany. In addition to the important naval base of Kiel, the Royal Air Force also attacked Bremerhaven and Emden again Tuesday night as well as bombing oil tanks at Rotterdam. Five Royal Air Force planes were lost in these operations. At the same time as the British were carrying out these raids against the enemy, Germans were hammering overnight at Coventry and other British objectives.

TAKE OVER ALL SHIPS

President Roosevelt Seeks Power to Seize All Idle Foreign-Owned Vessels WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt asked Congress today for broad statutory power to take over "foreign-owned vessels lying idle in our ports." Although the President said Tuesday he would recommend legislation permitting purchase or charter of Danish vessels taken into protective custody by the coastguard the language of his message was not limited to Danish ships.

PALACE IS DESTROYED

YugoSlavia Protests at Indiscriminate Bombing By Germans BELGRADE, April 10.—The Royal Palace here has been destroyed as a result of Nazi bombing. The YugoSlav government has officially protested at the indiscriminate bombing of this open capital city by the Germans.

NAVY WILL BE BIGGEST

Secretary of Navy Speaks at Launching of New Battleship

BROOKLYN, April 10.—The new United States superdreadnaught North Carolina was launched from Brooklyn Navy yard yesterday. Speaking on the occasion, Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox said that the United States would soon have the greatest navy in the world which would be the deciding factor on all oceans.

Eden and Dill Back In London

LONDON, April 10: (CP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and General Sir John Dill, chief of Imperial general staff, have returned to England and are in conference with the government on the Balkan situation. Neither Eden nor Dill have made any public comment as yet on the situation.

RAIDERS CLEARED

Admiral Scheer Believed to be Only One Now in Pacific Waters

HONG KONG, April 10.—Admiral Leighton, commander in chief of the China station of the Royal Navy, says that the Pacific and Indian Oceans have been cleared of German commerce raiders with the possible exception of the pocket battleship Admiral Scheer which is being forced to hold far off shore.

Balkan Situation Is Still Obscure; Greeks Holding

British Bombers Inflict Heavy Casualties in Assaults on Germans—Hellenese Army Still Intact

ATHENS, April 10: (CP)—British bombers inflicted heavy casualties in assaults on German columns of motor transport and troop concentrations, damaging bridges about thirty miles northwest of Salonika, the Royal Air Force announced today. Greek military sources said the Greek army remains intact "to deal a decisive blow at the German invader with Allied support" despite the entrapment of some forces in northeastern Greece. The fate of forces cut off by the Nazi drive to Salonika still appears obscure but they were reportedly hanging out last night. The general situation is far from clear. The Allies are endeavouring, it is understood, to establish a new defence line from Albania to the Gulf of Salonika. German planes caused two air raid alarms in Athens last night. Magnetic bombs were dropped at Pyraeus. YugoSlav forces are reported to have crossed the Drina River in Albania south of Scutari. In Berlin it is stated that the German plan is to complete the conquest of YugoSlavia and put down the British in Greece by Sunday. There is talk in London of Turkey having sold Great Britain "short." Possibility of a diplomatic and military shake-up is talked of in the British capital. German troops, according to an unconfirmed report from Budapest, entered Belgrade today.

Premier King Postpones His Holiday Trip

OTTAWA, April 10.—Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King was to have gone to Warm Springs, Georgia, for to confer with President Roosevelt and enjoy a holiday but, on account of the international situation, has postponed the trip until after the Balkan crisis has been clarified. He may leave this week-end. Mr. King said he had been endeavouring to get President Franklin D. Roosevelt to come to Ottawa. The Prime Minister said he was sure Mr. Roosevelt would be accorded a great reception in Canada.

President Sends Message To Crown Prince Of Norway

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 10.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt has sent a message of good cheer and sympathy to Crown Prince Olav of Norway on the occasion of the first anniversary of the invasion of Norway. The brave fight of the Norwegians will go down as a bright page in history, declares the chief executive.

Drive Is Now Up To \$8300

The original objective for Prince Rupert in the Canadian War Services Fund campaign was \$5500. During the campaign the objective was raised to \$7500. It is now announced that \$8300 had so far been subscribed with probably more to come in.

Rearguard of British is Engaged in Delaying Advance of Germans and Italians

GENERALS MISSING

LONDON, April 10: (CP)—The War Office announced today that three British generals are unreported in Libya. They are Sir Nugent O'Connor, an outstanding tactician, Lieut. General P. Neame V.C. and Major General M. D. Gambier-Parry. They have been missing since the fall of Bengasi and it is possible they may be prisoners of the Axis. Six British generals and 2000 soldiers are claimed by the Germans to have been captured in Libya.

Easter Monday Invasion Date

VICHY, April 10.—Vichy professes to know that April 14 (Easter Monday) has been set as the date by Adolf Hitler for the invasion of Britain.

CAIRO, April 10: (CP)—The Middle East command announced yesterday that the British rearguard was being heavily engaged in delaying German and Italian troops advancing across Libya but no mention was made of Derna which the Italians had claimed to have occupied. The British are still withdrawing.

### EDITORIAL

#### Balkan Situation . . .

With the military situation not at all clarified in the Balkans it seems as if the result of the conflict was still very uncertain. Evidently the British army had not up to this morning been in action. The country is mountainous and only those who know the terrain can be in a position to express an opinion. The Germans seem to have a decided advantage so far and the question now arises as to whether the Allies can recover from the first German onslaught.

#### Red Sea Cleaned Up . . .

The clearing of the Red Sea from enemy craft seems to have given the British a decided advantage there but in North Africa the German-Italian advance continues and the British are retreating. This may, of course, be strategy.

On the whole the news this morning has not been at all encouraging. This is part of the fortune of war and may change at any time. We are all hoping it may.

#### Great Value To Community . . .

Very few of us seem to realize the value to the community of an outstanding person who does things. Dreamers, intellectuals and poets are all right in their place but just now we need practical men who can and will do things. This reference is particularly to Alan Cormack, who is in charge of shipbuilding here. Had he not made good in building the four corvettes here we should not have had the larger vessels built at the port.

We are not forgetting also the fine body of mechanics and others who are handling the work at the shipyard. It was the management combined with the co-operation of the staff and all the rank and file that made successful completion of the work possible and the carrying on of shipbuilding at Prince Rupert. Had they laid down on the job, shipbuilding would have gone elsewhere. If any reorganization is necessary doubtless the new general management will see that it is done.

#### Outlet For Energies . . .

Because the Germans are trying to cause destruction in Europe is no reason why we in Prince Rupert should not try to create beauty by improving the appearance of the city. We all realize that we should bend all our energies to the winning of the war but we must have recreation and no recreation is just as fine as gardening for those who like it. It is healthful and useful. It differs from the ordinary game in that when the game is over there is something to show for the effort put into it.

Prince Rupert has the layout for a most picturesque city. All that is needed is effort on the part of the residents to make it very beautiful.

## MANITOBA COALITION IS STRONG

But Insurgents Led By Woman Member Promise Opposition In Contest

WINNIPEG, April 10: (CP) — Leaders of all groups in the Manitoba legislature have announced support for coalition government but a division in Social Credit ranks leaves the probability that provincial-organized Social Crediters will oppose return of the non-partisan government in the April 22 election. Premier John Bracken's announcement last November 4 that Conservative, Co-operative Commonwealth Federation and Social Credit members of the legislature had united with his Liberal-Progressive followers had apparently wiped out major opposition.

Five days later, however, Miss Salome Halldorson, member for St. George and president of the Manitoba Social Credit League, broke with other members of her legislature group, declaring the coalition was "centralization which is the negation of Social Credit." The league which she represents went on record as opposing the union.

S. E. Rogers, leader of the Social Credit legislature group of five, and Hon. N. L. Turnbull, Social Credit representative in the coalition cabinet, have not commented publicly since the election date was announced March 12 and their future relations with the Social Credit League are subject of conjecture.

### Party Leadership

Social Credit leadership had changed in the province since the 1936 election when the group made its first bid for Manitoba legislature seats. Leader of the league at that time have dropped from office. After the 1936 election Dr. S. W. Fox, Gilbert Plains, was appointed Social Credit House leader but two years later resigned in favor of Mr. Rogers.

Leadership of other legislature groups remains unchanged since 1936. Conservative Leader Erick Willis and Hon. S. J. Farmer, C. C. F. leader, are members of the coalition cabinet as are two other Conservatives.

Mr. Willis announced Conservatives will run April 22 as Co-operative-Coalitionists and Mr. Farmer stated C. C. F. candidates will run under the party auspices as supporters of the non-partisan government. There will be complete constituency autonomy for all parties.

A new group in the election field is Sound Money Economics, which

claims connection with the Canadian Consumers' Union. Strength of this group is not established but it has already named three candidates in the 10-seat Winnipeg constituency.

### Coalition Support

Supporting coalition at dissolution of the legislature were the 21 Liberal-Progressives, 14 of the 15 Conservatives, the six C.C.F. members, four of the five Social Crediters and three of the four independents.

Formation of the union government led to two of the four vacancies in the 55-seat assembly. W. R. Clubb, member of the Bracken government since it was formed in 1922, and I. B. Griffiths, a minister since 1935, resigned when the cabinet reorganized. Mr. Clubb was appointed chairman of the Government Liquor Control Commission and Mr. Griffiths commissioner of the Manitoba Farm Loans Board.

Marcus Hyman (C. C. F. Winnipeg) died in 1933 and the seat was never filled. The fourth vacancy was created by passage at the last session of an act of qualifying for public office in Manitoba persons contravening the Defence of Canada Regulations. The act automatically unseated James Litterick, Winnipeg Communist, whose whereabouts are unknown but who was wanted under the defence regulations.

After dissolution Hon. W. J. Major, attorney-general since 1927, resigned to accept appointment to the Manitoba Court of King's Bench.

One of the three members opposing coalition was L. St. George Stubbs (Ind. Winnipeg) who led the polls here in 1936 by a plurality of 18,000. Former county court judge, Mr. Stubbs was removed from the bench in 1932 after a royal commission found him guilty of judicial misconduct on complaint of Mr. Major. Mr. Stubbs charged the complaints were the result of personal animosity and vindictiveness of Mr. Major.

The other coalition dissenters were Miss Halldorson and Gen. H. D. B. Ketchen (Con. Winnipeg) who charged improvement could not be effected by a "temporary cause."

Lt. Col. Ralph H. Webb (Con. Winnipeg) did not attend the last session because he was on active service.

### RECRUITING PROCEEDING

Approximately 1000 men are urgently required to fill calls for reinforcements for overseas and ranks of inactive service units in British Columbia, it is announced. The call is for men between the ages of 18 and 45, it being definitely understood that eighteen-year-olds are not eligible in coast defence units and under no circumstances will be permitted to leave their local stations until they have passed their nineteenth birthday. There is a large call for all man-

ner of skilled tradesmen but, in order to help fill the large number of vacancies for tradesmen, another series of army trade training classes will commence on April 21, continuing for three months. The courses will include carpenters, motor mechanics, instrument mechanics and blacksmiths. Of course, such training will also prove of value in civilian life after military service is over. Men from Prince Rupert district will be examined and enlisted in Prince Rupert.

### Bevin Sends Message To Queen's Canadian Fund

A cable from Rt. Hon. Ernest Bevin, British Minister of Labor, received at Montreal headquarters of the Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims, reflects the British pride in the unconquerable spirit of the masses who are subjected to the fury of the enemy's air attacks. Mr. Bevin cabled to the chairman of the fund:

"Anyone who has lived in Britain during the past year has witnessed unforgettable scenes of poignancy and courage. The attack of the enemy on our civilian population has created a feeling towards Germany which it will probably take generations to eradicate. The Germans have shown themselves to be an enemy without pity or mercy and ruthless destroyers of women and children and the homes of the people.

"The thing that fills us with pride is the unbeatable character of the common folk. It must have been the realization of this amazing stoicism that has led you to inaugurate the Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims. Taxation in our country is high, conditions of living are difficult; but in spite of that, the State has instituted many forms of relief and never before has there been such common acceptance by the whole population of its responsibilities towards those who suffer.

Nevertheless, with all that State regulations can do, there remains still more to be done—comforts to be provided, extra care, the introduction of special treatment and attention for children who have been victims of these attacks. It is in all these special branches of sustenance and help that the Lord Mayor's Fund plays such an important part.

"The Fund is the expression of charity and love. It is as if those contributing were saying: 'It might have been me,' and in thankfulness they subscribe in a manner which expresses their desire to share the sufferings of their comrades.

"The knowledge that this great feeling is not limited to the people of Britain, but that it is shared by our kinsmen in Canada and the other Dominions encourages us to carry on the struggle; it buoys us up with the knowledge that we are not alone, and, coming as it does in addition to the great war effort the Dominions are making, help that can be given through your Fund to the Lord Mayor's Fund for victims of air attack is doubly appreciated."

### REPORT ON HOSPITALS

Both Hazelton And Port Simpson Institutions In Improved Position

TORONTO, April 10.—Gratifying reports from its various mission hospitals were heard by the Home Mission Board of The United Church of Canada at its annual meeting here. They included statements from Wrinch Memorial and Port Simpson Hospitals in British Columbia. The medical superintendents whose reports were submitted were Dr. W. E. Austin and Dr. J. E. Whiting respectively.

Wrinch Memorial noted an increase of nearly 2,000 hospital days making the total 13,000 for the year over any former high. The increase was said to be due largely to an agreement with the Department of Indian Affairs which allowed of better treatment for Indian tuberculosis cases. The financial position was good and a bank loan reduced by \$1,500.

Other figures showed that 472 patients were admitted during the year, of whom 42 were discharged cured. Percentage of mortality from all causes was 2.81.

Port Simpson also reported a satisfactory financial position with higher receipts and a substantial surplus for the year. A great part of the work of the hospital was declared to be among tuberculosis Indians. For these, occupational and recreational therapy
