WE ASSUME OFFENSIVE

LONDON-The Royal Air Force pounded the German inustrial centres of Cologne and Dusseldorf with many heavy ombs in overnight raids extending from the Rhineland to the nvasion coast while in the war at sea the Admiralty announced hat the submarine Parthian sank a 6,000-ton supply or troop hip and a 10,000-ton tanker in an Italian convoy in the Medierranean south of Italy.

BRITISH SHIPPING GAINS

LONDON-British shipyards are now turning out more hips than the Germans are able to sink despite the intensifieation of their war at sea. Ships completed during a period inding February 10 totalled 10,000 tons more than were lost as result of enemy action.

BERLIN, March 28: - Official Germany is indignant and impatient over the decision of the new YugoSlav government to refuse to ratify the Axis pact. Threats are made by high Nazis that German forces will march into YugoSlavia to compel that nation to live up to! the pact, threatening her with dismemberment if she refuses to do so. Drastic developments will ensue if there is not ratification.

In other German quarters it was said that the atmosphere in Belgrade was "gradually returning to normal." It was suggested that the relitical change in YugoSlavia had been made merely to tone down opposition among the people to collaboration with Germany.

After Gaining Control of Cheren

FULL FASCIST RETREAT CAIRO, March 28: (CP)-British troops are in hot pursuit of Italian forces retreating headlong toward the Eritrean capital of Asmara following the occupation of the key mountain town of Cheren yesterday by British Imperial forces, the Middle East command announced today. A large number of the 35,000 Fascist defenders are reported to have been captured by the British who battered their way into Cheren late Wednesday after seven-week siege. Remnants of the Italian forces left behind large quantities of war materials as they headed for Asmara, 42 miles to the southeast, and it is possible they might try to reach the chief port of Massaua to make a stand or escape.

CAIRO. March 28: (CP) - British forces, which yesterday entered Cheren, mountain key to the Eritrean capital of Asmara, made further important gains and captured many prisoners including a brigade headquarters, the Middle East command announced. Highlights In Career Of Rocky Mountain Rangers, Now Fifty-Six Years Old

Following are highlights in the history of the Rocky Mountain Rangers who celebrate their fifty-sixth birthday fittingly in Prince Rupert today:

March 28, 1885-Authority given by Hon. Adolphe P. Caron, minister of militia and defence, to raise four troops of Rocky Mountain Rangers. First activities: patrols from Fort MacLeod and Lethbridge along the border and reservations, engagements with Piegan Indians.

July 1, 1898-Regiment reorganized as rifle regiment with companies located in ensuing years at towns in British Columbia and Northwest Territories. August 4, 1914—Regiment took up strategic positions in the

interior of British Columbia on outbreak of Great War. October 21, 1916-Rocky Mountain Rangers Battalion sailed from Halifax for England aboard Mauretania for overseas

service under command of Lieut. Col. J. R. Vicars. May 1921—With headquarters at Kamloops companies stationed on peacetime basis at Kamloops, headquarters, Salmon Arm, Armstrong and Kelowna. .In 1928 Kelowna company ceased

to exist, being re-established in 1937 at Revelstoke. August 26, 1939-Regiment called to active service for third time, patrolling and guarding strategic southern interior points. June 7, 1940—Called to recruit up to full strength, October 2, 1940-Moved to New Westminster to continue

training as battalion. February 22, 1941-Arrived in Prince Rupert where, under command of Lieut. Col. J. E. Wood., they form an integral part

of the new Canadian Army.




