Total Black-Out In This City

Actuality Of War To Be Simulated; Whole A.R.P. To Synchronize

Is First Place West of Montreal to Have Such a Drill—Not a Gleam of Light Will Show—Traffic to Halt

The actuality of war will be realistically enacted in Prince Rupert tomorrow night when there will be held here the first black-out in any Canadian city west of Montreal. The alert will be sounded at 8:55 p.m. with the alarm at 9:05 p.m. and the all clear at 9:15. The idea is that not a single gleam of light shall show during the 10-minute period. Synchronizing with the black-out will be a full drill of the civilian protection (air raid) services.

There will be patrols to see that the black-out is strictly enforced. When the black-out is called, pedestrians must stay on the sidewalks, or preferably, indoors. It is suggested that children should be kept at home. All motor cars must immediately draw up to the curb, extinguish their lights and remain still. Shopkeepers are advised to stand by their premises as a precautionary measure. Lights on shipping in the harbor will be required to black out.

The area of the blackout will include Metlakatla, Tucks Inlet, Port Edward, the forts at Barrett and Frederick Points, Dodge Cove and Digby Island.

The entire lighting system of the city will go out during the black-out period.

The black-out is authorized by the military authorities and local army, navy and air force representatives are collaborating.

Heads of the local civil protection services met last night in the provincial police offices with J. J. Little, the chairman, presiding and commissioner T. W. S. Parsons and inspector S. F. M. Moodie of the provincial police in attendance, to make arrangements for the black-out. Major Moodie spoke of the recent black-out in Seattle which he and Commissioner Parsons witnessed. This black-out had had the co-operation on the part of the citizens and the public and had been a great success due to painstaking organization. It was hoped that the Prince Rupert black-out would be similarly successful and would prove a good example to the rest of the west.

The meeting considered various suggestions in connection with the black-out. This would be but the first of a series of successive practices which may in time also include the whole north coast as well as southeastern Alaska.

The alert will be heralded at 8:55 by five short blasts on the sirens. The alarm will come at 9:05—another five blasts. Series of three short blasts will mark the all clear. After the rehearsal there will be a general gathering of all the civilian protection workers at the Court House to hear reports.

The workers of the various services will gather tonight to make their preparations and tomorrow afternoon there will be another meeting of the general committee.

AGREEMENT IS SIGNED

St. Lawrence Seaway and Power Pact is Initiated at Ottawa Today

OTTAWA, March 19: (CP)—A St. Lawrence River power-seaway agreement between Canada and the United States was signed today in the name of the two countries.

Activity at the Department of External Affairs department at noon indicated that the signing of the agreement was imminent, it being learned from a good source that the agreement would be definitely initialed before Parliament met. This turned out to be the case.

SHOWDOWN IN BALKANS RAPIDLY APPROACHING; CRISIS ON JUGOSLAVIA

Forces Are Still Reported to be Massing for Battle in This Area Between Germany and Britain

BELGRADE, March 19: (CP)—The war-threatened Balkans edged nearer to a showdown in the British-Axis diplomatic struggle today with a German rumor that Yugoslavia would join the Axis on March 26. The rumor was circulated after a ninety-minute meeting between German Minister Viktor von Heeren and Yugoslav foreign minister Aleksander Cincar-Markovic.

Reliable reports here said that the Turkish foreign minister had left Ankara aboard a British plane for Palestine. He is believed to be enroute to Egypt to confer with British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden.

War News

HULL AND LONDON BLITZED

LONDON—The northeastern coast town of Hull and London bore the brunt of air attack on great Britain by Nazi raiders Tuesday night. The enemy planes came over in relays and dumped tons of high explosive and incendiary bombs. Great numbers of persons were killed and much damage was done in Hull, the assault on which was the worst yet. Single planes came at first over London and anti-aircraft guns went into action. The attack intensified and the alarm was the longest so far in the war. The Royal Air Force raided western and central Germany, many radio stations going off the air. Violent explosions and fires were started at Kiel and Wilhelmshaven. Emden, Texel and Rotterdam were also attacked.

DELIVER FORTRESSES

PORTLAND, Oregon—Two flying fortresses from the United States have been delivered here. They are on the way to Canada whence they will be flown to Britain.

WARNS OF INVASION

LONDON—Home Secretary Herbert Morrison warns the civilian population to stand firm in the event of an early invasion attempt. The military authorities are confident that they will not be let down.

BRITISH FACTORIES SPEED UP

LONDON—During February British factories broke the previous record for any one month in aircraft production.

TWO NORSE AIRMEN IN DEATH FALL

Lost Their Lives Yesterday When Military Training Plane Crashed At Victoria

VICTORIA, March 19: (CP)—Two members of the Royal Norwegian Naval Air Force were killed yesterday and a third was injured severely when a seaplane in which they were taking off from the Royal Canadian Air Force station at nearby Patricia Bay crashed into the water.

The killed were Sub-Lieutenant Yena Riiser, pilot, and Lieut. Kaarex Kjos, gunner. Lieut. E. Bjorneby, observer, was injured.

The Western Air Command said that the plane was engaged in training operations when it slipped into the water from a turn at low altitude and sank immediately.

FINAL BULLETINS

BUDGET NEXT MONTH
OTTAWA — It will be next month, it is expected, before Hon. J. L. Ilsley, Minister of finance, presents his budget. War appropriation bills will be dealt with first. Hon. Angus MacDonal, minister of naval affairs, today disclosed that \$9,250,000 is provided in his department's estimates for the next fiscal year "to complete destroyers and to commence new destroyers." The minister said he could not say where the destroyers would be built.

CAMPAIGN CONCLUDES

But Pledges For War Savings Are Still Being Welcomed

The general canvass for pledges towards Canada's War Savings Campaign has now been completed in Prince Rupert.

Workers from many organizations have given generously their time and energy to this work but, although every effort has been made to cover the city completely, many persons have unavoidably been missed who must be anxious to help their country's war effort financially.

To such patriotic citizens the War Savings Committee is appealing that they act now in pledging themselves to buy War Savings Certificates regularly. Those who have a bank account or those who are employed by firms which have instituted the employer-employee co-operation scheme can do this best by authorizing their banker or employer to make periodic deductions from their bank account or pay cheque for the purchase of Certificates. Otherwise, information on the "Honor Pledge" scheme, or any other such point can be obtained directly from the committee.

Announcement Made by Minister of Supply Following Meeting With Olof Hanson and H. F. Pullen—No Intention to Develop Boom Town

(By H. F. Pullen)

OTTAWA, March 19.—Yesterday afternoon by appointment Olof Hanson and myself waited on Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Supply, and discussed the shipbuilding situation. The minister announced to us: "We are considering building large steel freighters at the Prince Rupert shipyard."

Mr. Howe said he understood the Prince Rupert situation quite clearly. He understood that everybody in the place was working so there could be no complaint of not having enough to do there. He wished to tell the people of Prince Rupert what he had told the people of his own home town. It is not the policy of the government to dislocate business anywhere by creating boom towns. He repeated what he had already told Mr. Hanson more than once that the shipyard at Prince Rupert would be kept busy continuously.

The minister thought a good start had already been made at Prince Rupert by building the mine sweepers. It had been intended to build more of that class of vessel. He had already told Mr. Hanson that the ship yard authorities had been asked to tender on more mine sweepers.

Mr. Howe gave Mr. Hanson and myself a most cordial reception. He showed a keen interest in the development of Prince Rupert and recalled his former close association with the city at the time when his firm designed the elevator.

Interviews were also had with Hon. Ian Mackenzie and Hon. J. A. McKinnon, the latter being interested in the Prince Rupert elevator. Mr. McKinnon said he did not see much hope of any immediate movement of grain through the port. He had looked to see the building of the railway to Prince Rupert, bring a measure of greater prosperity to the city of Edmonton but it had been disappointed. Some day he hoped to see the Peace River Railway built but that was off for the present. The grain in the Prince Rupert elevator could have been sold but it was not considered in the public interest to sell to those buyers at the present time.

Mr. Mackenzie took great interest in the defenses of Prince Rupert and in its steady development.

NAIROBI, Kenya Colony, March 19: (CP)—The British command today announced capture on Monday of Jigiga, strategic eastern Ethiopian town controlling the road to Harar, an important provincial capital.

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EDITORIAL

The Wheat Problem - - -

Whenever the Dominion government takes up a western problem and, after deep consideration from a national viewpoint, makes a decision which will mean money out of the federal treasury, the east looks askance.

For weeks the cabinet, which includes more eastern than western members, has been studying the wheat marketing problem and has decided on a policy which the cabinet, eastern members as well as west, decides will be fair and equitable to all concerned from a national viewpoint.

But eastern members of Parliament are getting fidgety about it. They don't fuss when the Dominion every year makes a straight bonus on maritime freight rates (although the western transportation problem is just as acute); nor when it is planned to spend millions on the St. Lawrence; nor huge sums to the industrial cities for relief.

The whole problem of farm economies requires a most careful balance in order that no section of the country shall suffer at the expense of any other. In wartime, however, the farmer like any other Canadian is co-operating even when it means loss to himself. When the war ends there will be a tremendous readjustment of the whole economic fabric of the Dominion but in the meantime the cabinet is having a difficult time to prosecute the war to the utmost and yet maintain as far as possible the standard of living within the Dominion.

C.P.C. (A.R.P.) GENERAL ORDER

During the period between the air raid siren and the all clear signal the use of any outdoor electric signs of any kind is prohibited. No light signs shall be operated so that they are directly visible from the sky and there shall be no lights showing from unattended premises.
