

A thoughtful address on the subject of provision and direction the recreational activities for children and youth outside of school 'or club members, their wives and hours, particularly those who may lack adequate interest, guidance or supervision on the part of parents. was given before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at its regular weekly luncheon by Cecil Shantz who has been in charge of supervised playground activities for the club here during the past season. Mr. Shantz emphasized the value which he felt a properly directed civic centre here would be in the way of providing healthful activity and a proper and beneficial outlet for the excess enlergy of youth. Provision of such activity would go far in the curing of any juvenile delinquency problem which might exist.

Mr. Shantz spoke of the great and fine effect which proper and judicious parental influence had upon children. Unfortunately, however in many cases there was not this good influence. The schools could not be expected to fill the deficliency so it became a community responsibility to provide a means of meeting the problem of an outlet for the excess energy of the young folk which in some way must be expended after school hours were over. In addition to the facilities. it was very essential that there should be direction which provided interest and commanded respect Those who essayed this task should know something of the mentality and psychology of the young people.
