War In Iran Is All Finished Now

Nazi Vengeance— RECOVERY OF LAVAL EXPECTED

Three Executions Already Following Assassination Attempt—Ruthless Purge Going On

VERSAILLES, Aug. 28: (CP)—Authorities of German-occupied France made a sweeping round-up of enemies of the Nazi occupation authorities today in the wake of the assassination attempt at Versailles barracks on Former Premier Pierre Laval yesterday and by mid-afternoon had placed more than three hundred persons in "protective custody," some of them from the very ranks of the newly-mobilized anti-Bolshevist legion. In Paris the first three so-called Communists convicted by special courts were executed summarily. They were sentenced yesterday for alleged misdeeds not connected with the Laval shooting. Six others were sentenced to long prison terms with hard labor one to life.

Authorities apparently feared that an anti-Bolshevist legion formed to fight Russia alongside Germany contains many more members who, like Laval's youthful would-be assassin, Paul Colette, joined purposefully to be able to get French leaders favoring collaboration with Germany.

Colette, who proudly said he was a Free French follower of General de Gaulle, was rushed toward trial before one of the special courts.

Both Laval and Marcel Deat, who was shot at the same time, are expected to recover although seriously injured. Two bullets were removed from the body of Laval who was said to have had as good a night as could be expected. Deat's condition was called critical but not grave.

Invasion By Britain and Russia Becomes Peaceful Occupation

Change of Government at Teheran Results in Immediate Cessation of Hostilities—Even Germany Admits This Was Only Thing to Do

LONDON, August 28: (CP)—A reorganized Iran government, headed by Premier Ali Furanghi, announced to Parliament today, the Teheran Radio said, that orders had been issued to Iran troops to cease resistance to British and Russian forces which are rapidly advancing toward vital centres of the country. The new government had ordered the army to cease all resistance to British and Russian armies.

DISCUSS DISEASE

Public Meeting To Hear What Is Being Done In Regard To Venereal Problem

British Columbia's method of dealing with its venereal disease problem will be discussed at a public meeting in the Moose Hall tomorrow evening with Dr. G. F. Amyot, provincial health officer, and Dr. Donald H. Williams, director of the Division of Venereal Disease Control, the principal speakers. They will outline the development of this program, which is regarded by authorities as one of the foremost on the continent. Special emphasis will be given to the effect of venereal disease on national defence efforts—civil and military—and the measures that may be adopted by communities to minimize this danger.

"The strong support given to us by community organizations throughout British Columbia is a source of much satisfaction to those engaged in improving standards of public health," states Dr. Amyot. At a recent meeting, he continued, representatives of over eighty Victoria organizations went on record unanimously in supporting the policies of the Provincial Board of Health in the control of this major public health problem.

Of interest to the citizens of Prince Rupert will be the first local screening of two short sound motion pictures which have won much acclaim. One is called "With These Weapons" and the other "Nine Cents Per Capita"—a film produced and released a short time ago by the Board of Health.

REDS KEEP UP BATTLE

Fighting With Backs to Wall Against Concerted Nazi Assaults All Along Front

NAZI DEFENCE BROKEN

MOSCOW, Aug. 28: (CP)—Russians said tonight that two successive German defence lines had been broken in a counter attack on the central front which has continued six days. The offensive by troops of General Konev was in the Gomel area.

The southwestern command of Marshal Budyenny issued an appeal to besieged Russian forces at Odessa to defend the Black Sea port "to the last drop of blood." Other dispatches reported fighting on all major sectors of the front.

The Germans are expected to launch a new and even more intensive drive on the eastern front.

MOSCOW, Aug. 28: (CP)—The Russian army, with its back to the wall in defence of Leningrad and Odessa, was reported fighting stubbornly today against concerted Nazi assaults threatening both ends and the centre of the long war front.

The German High Command in Berlin claimed today that two Red Army mechanized divisions have been beaten and all but destroyed on the northern Finnish front and claimed that German operations on the entire Russian front "continue according to plan."

A Soviet communique said there had been stubborn fighting throughout the night around Smolensk, Gomel and elsewhere.

BOMB RAIN KEEPING UP

LONDON, Aug. 28: (CP)—Royal Air Force bombers attacked Mannheim and other targets in Western Germany during the night, it was authoritatively stated today. Explosives were also rained on Nazi-occupied France and, during the operations, not a single British plane was lost.

MENZIES RESIGNS

Quits as Prime Minister But is Expected to Represent Commonwealth in London

CANBERRA, Aug. 28: (CP)—Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies today announced his resignation as Premier of Australia. Earlier he announced that an agreement had been reached between the British and Australian government for an Australian minister other than the Prime Minister to go to London to represent the Commonwealth in Empire war councils. Presumably Menzies' resignation cleared the way for him to be that representative.

Arthur W. Fadden, deputy prime minister, was named to succeed Mr. Menzies as Prime Minister.

Goes to Post With Fortress Signals

He was granted his commission in the field. In civil life Lieut. Kievill was agent for the Canadian Pacific Telegraphs at Vancouver.

BRITISH CONTROL

French Somaliland is Now Completely Blockaded, Vichy Admits

VICHY, Aug. 28: (CP)—The Jibuti radio announced today that four British warships and a flotilla of armed launches and planes have established control over French Somaliland territorial waters. The announcer said the situation has reached a dramatic point in which all blockade-running launches were stopped and their cargoes dumped overboard or seized.

ACTIVITIES FOR YOUTH

Gyro Club Hears Thoughtful Address by Cecil Shantz Who Was in Charge of Playgrounds This Year

A thoughtful address on the subject of provision and direction of the recreational activities for children and youth outside of school hours, particularly those who may lack adequate interest, guidance or supervision on the part of parents, was given before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at its regular weekly luncheon by Cecil Shantz who has been in charge of supervised playground activities for the club here during the past season. Mr. Shantz emphasized the value which he felt a properly directed civic centre here would be in the way of providing healthful activity and a proper and beneficial outlet for the excess energy of youth. Provision of such activity would go far in the curing of any juvenile delinquency problem which might exist.

Mr. Shantz spoke of the great and fine effect which proper and judicious parental influence had upon children. Unfortunately, however in many cases there was not this good influence. The schools could not be expected to fill the deficiency so it became a community responsibility to provide a means of meeting the problem of an outlet for the excess energy of the young folk which in some way must be expended after school hours were over. In addition to the facilities, it was very essential that there should be direction which provided interest and commanded respect. Those who essayed this task should know something of the mental and psychology of the young people.

Mr. Shantz told the club how he had enjoyed his work here as director of the supervised playgrounds. He acknowledged the splendid work of his four assistants at the various playgrounds and recommended that they should be used again next year if they were available. He also acknowledged the assistance he had been given by W. F. Stone, president of the Gyro Club; Frank Skinner, chairman of

the playgrounds committee, and thanked D. G. Borland, manager of the Capitol Theatre, for the donation of theatre tickets which had been popular prizes.

During the luncheon President Stone, who was in the chair, made presentations to Mr. Shantz, in appreciation of his work as playground director, and to Miss May Skinner, who was the club's popular candidate in the recent civic centre carnival queen contest.

It was announced that a picnic for club members, their wives and families would be held a week from next Sunday, the trip to be made on Dr. R. G. Large's fine new power yacht Soogwills.

Guests at the luncheon included Dr. John J. Gibson as well as Mr. Shantz and Miss Skinner.

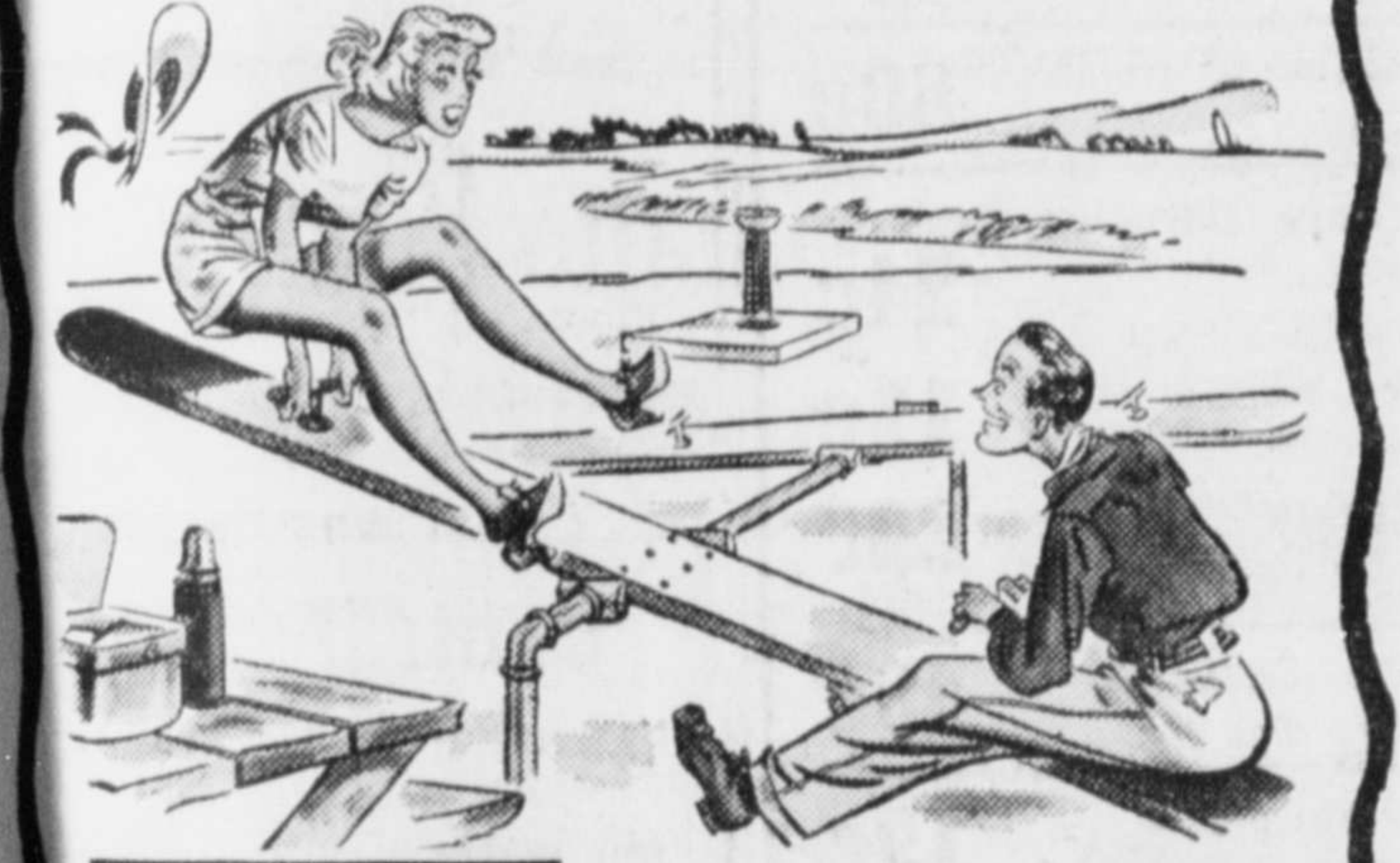
