Turkey Is Preparing For Battle

With Unfriendly Huns Near, 'Tis Duty Of All To Take Up Arms Now

Becoming Increasingly Evident That Intention is to Spurn Germany and Stand by Great Britain

ISTANBUL, Turkey, March 7.—Nazi threats and diplomatic intrigue notwithstanding, it is becoming increasingly apparent that Turkey intends to fight if the Germans invade Greece. Evidently, it is the intention to reject Chancellor Adolf Hitler's overtures designed to wean Turkey away from Great Britain and to secure her neutrality if not co-operation with the Axis. Full defensive measures are being taken as the idea of co-operating with Hitler is spurned.

A leading Istanbul newspaper today warned all Turks that now, they had unfriendly Germany as a neighbor, they must be ready to fight. "It is the sacred duty of every citizen to be ready to shoulder arms," the newspaper asserted.

ROME, March 7.—Ousting the once much trusted Dino Grandi, Premier Benito Mussolini yesterday assumed, in addition to his many other portfolios, that of minister of justice.

New York Market Rallies Strongly

Values Substantially in Yesterday's Stock Exchange Trading

NEW YORK, March 7.—The New York stock market rallied strongly yesterday, more than regaining ground lost the previous day. The day's turnover totalled 480,000 shares. The industrial average at closing was 121.53, up 1.33; rails, 27.92, up .41, and utilities, 19.55, up .13. The healthy tone of the market continued today.

U.S. MIGHT IS GROWING

And Aid To Britain Is Not Hampering It, American War Leaders Declare

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 7.—Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson and General George Marshall, United States army chief of staff, told the House of Representatives foreign affairs committee yesterday that United States military might was steadily increasing and that aid to Britain was not interfering with it. United States was getting a good return in the way of information for all help it gave to Britain.

WHITEHORSE AIR FIELD

Former President of White Pass and Yukon Route is Taking Important Part

After a visit to Whitehorse in connection with the making of preliminary arrangements for extensive air field development which is to be carried out there during the coming summer, Herbert Wheeler, former president of the White Pass and Yukon Route, was a passenger aboard the Princess Norah yesterday afternoon returning to Victoria. He expects to return north shortly and spend the summer at Whitehorse.

Speaking of the air field development at Whitehorse, Mr. Wheeler stated that it was being undertaken as part of the joint defence plan of Canada and the United States. The present field will be considerably extended with changes in grades and other improvements. The main feature will, however, be the installation of a radio beam and complete lighting facilities. It will then be equipped for use both in night as well as day flying. Whitehorse is already a crossroads for airplane traffic to and from Alaska and, as defence flying organization is expanded, will come into greater use. This is why the field is being so extensively enlarged and equipped.

Mr. Wheeler says that plans are being made to handle normal tourist traffic to the north this summer.

Bulletins

NAZIS TIGHTEN UP
SOFIA—The Nazis continue to tighten their grip on Bulgaria. All doctors, chemists and nurses are being mobilized.

GERMAN MOVEMENT
ATHENS—It was rumored that Crown Prince Paul, brother of King George, may head a pro-German opposition in Greece.

BRITISH CONSPIRACY?
BERLIN—German quarters charge a British conspiracy to attack German and Italian shipping in Yugoslav waters and to carry out sabotage in this country.

TRYING TO KEEP OUT
PELGRADE—Following a special meeting of Prince Paul with the cabinet, it was announced that Yugoslavia would do its utmost to preserve its independence and neutrality in spite of German pressure. The fact that Yugoslavia is being encircled by Axis influence presents difficulties.

URGING EARLY VOTE
WASHINGTON—Urging an early vote on the "lease-lend" bill administration leaders have ordered night sessions of the Senate. Supporters of the bill are confident that they will be able to beat down serious opposition. Principal issue now is the question as to whether expeditionary forces should be sent overseas. It is stated authoritatively that the intention is to soon turn over further destroyers and torpedo boats to Great Britain.

JAPAN AND GERMANY
TOKYO—There are rumors here, lacking confirmation either at the Japanese Foreign Office or the German Embassy, that Foreign Minister Matsuoka of Japan will accompany the German ambassador to Japan on a trip to Berlin via Moscow. The rumor is neither confirmed or denied. Supposedly action to be taken by Japan should United States enter the war against Germany would be discussed.

TERMS ARE MODIFIED

Japan Makes It Possible For France To Make Peace

TOKIO, March 7.—A modified treaty between French Indo-China and Thailand will be signed in a few days, it was announced yesterday at Tokio. The concessions to be made to Thailand are greatly reduced from those at first dictated by Japan. Tension in the Far East is, as a result, greatly reduced.

Insisted On Paying Board In Prison

Saskatchewan Religious Sect Does Not Like to Take Bread Without Recompense

WALDHEIM, Sask., March 7.—Three members of a religious sect here insisted on paying the government for their board during a time they had spent in custody for failing to register under national registration. It is part of their principles not to eat another's bread without paying for it. The money was returned to them by the authorities.

"BENNY" DOESN'T LIVE HERE ANY MORE

War News

AIR RAIDING LIGHT
LONDON—England had a comparatively light night from enemy bombing. London had new air raid alarms today.

FURTHER BRITISH REINFORCEMENTS
ROME—Virginio Gayda, Fascist editor, says that further British reinforcements are being landed at Salonika for the Greeks. He declared today that 16,000 more British troops had been landed in addition to two divisions already there. It has been officially denied in Athens that Canadians have arrived at Salonika. Gayda had made a statement to this effect.

ITALIANS STILL LOSING
ATHENS—The British Royal Air Force successfully attacked an Italian battery in the Tepelini sector of Albania. One Italian regiment has been completely wiped out and another has suffered heavy losses. There is heavy rain and cold weather in Albania at present.

ATTACK ON MALTA
VALETTA—German dive bombers made a heavy attack on Malta yesterday but sixteen enemy machines were brought down with loss of only one British.

SAFE IN PORTUGAL

Position There Of Carol And Lupescu Said To Be Perfectly Legal—May Go To United States

LISBON, March 7.—The position in Portugal of Former King Carol of Rumania and Madame Magda Lupescu, who escaped into this country from Seville, Spain, where they had been in protective custody, is declared to be perfectly legal. They may, if they desire, reside in Portugal until the end of the war.

There are some reports, however, that Carol and Lupescu may endeavour to proceed to the United States.

There is a price on Lupescu's head for alleged complicity in the deaths of former leaders in Rumania and, if she could be extradited to that country, she would most likely have to face the firing squad.

The former King and his mistress left Spain so hurriedly that they overlooked paying their hotel bill.

BRITONS CAN WIN

With United States Help They Will Emerge Victors In War, Says American Legion Head

NEW YORK, March 7.—Milo J. Warner, president of the American Legion, returning to New York yesterday from a trip to Great Britain, declared that England, with the help of United States, can win the war. Warner said he had been deeply impressed by the determination of all Britons who were consumed with the desire to come to grips with the enemy. He would recommend, said Warner, that full aid be given to Britain.

KENT COAST GETS BRUNT

LONDON, March 7.—The Kent coast suffered the most from Nazi raiders coming over England singly or in small groups yesterday. South and west England were also visited. London had a brief raid last night.

WANT TO BE READY SHORTLY

Office at Local Ore Sampler in Operation This Summer, Minister Announces

Announcement was made by Hon. Asselstine, minister of mines, on his visit to the city this morning that the assay plant in connection with the local ore sampling which it was announced some time ago would be established, will be ready and in operation during the coming summer. It will cost approximately \$6000 or \$7000 and will be the work of Norton Youngs as resident assayer. Mr. Youngs is already busy with the staff of the ore sampling plant and the office of the resident mining engineer.

The assay plant will be located near the ore sampling plant but exact site has not yet been definitely settled upon.

PREPARE FOR WAR

Units Are Massing in Balkans—Tanks Lining Up on Bulgarian Border

ISTANBUL, March 7.—Thousands of Turkish troops are reported massing along the Bulgarian frontier in Thrace to face the menace of a possible invasion attempt by mechanized forces.

There are reports of an agreement having been reached between Ankara and Moscow regarding Balkan strategy.

The Turkish navy is assembled between the Bosphorus and Dardanelles coast which the British navy would have to move to enter the Black Sea or the Germans to reach it.

MAY SELL NEWS NOW

Change Of Policy Adopted By Canadian Press At Annual Meeting

OTTAWA, March 7: (CP)—Members of the Canadian Free Press, at an annual meeting last night, adopted the principle that Canadian Press news may be sold for advertising under commercial sponsorship under terms and conditions to be determined by the board of directors.

Fine Stock Of Fresh Fruits And Vegetables

Fine fresh fruits and vegetables from California are being shown these days in local retail stores but merchants are warning that prices are liable to increase because of recent storms in the Golden State which have damaged crops.
Among new vegetable stocks being shown are celery at 12c, peas at 15c, carrots at 10c a bunch, spinach, 2 pounds for 25c, cauliflower, 25c and 30c each, lettuce, 10c, green cabbage, 10c, potatoes, 10c, onions, 3 lbs. for 10c, and asparagus, 25c per pound.
The new fruits include oranges, 20c to 25c per dozen, grapefruit, 6 for 25c, pears, 50c per dozen, lemons, 35c, and bananas, 15c per pound. Rhubarb is selling at 2 bunches for 15c and Yellow Newton apples at 25c per dozen.
A sharp advance in tea prices is also anticipated soon in view of the necessity of keeping up the supply for England.

the soldiers. The society had money tied up in those socks. Therefore, they were sold to get the money back.

There is another story of a sale the Red Cross made. A quantity of bacon had been donated and was shipped overseas as a gift to the British government. Due to regulations the government could not accept the goods as a gift but must purchase them. So the Red Cross sold the bacon for one dollar.

Certain articles such as blankets can be made available to the local Air Raid Protection organization from Red Cross supplies. Also the establishment of a military hospital in Prince Rupert would bring help from the society which would supply items such as bed lamps, curtains, etc., that are not given by the government.
