

GUARDING "THE ROCK" AGAINST ATTACK BY NAZIS





In his expected spring offensive for a knockout of Great Britain, Adolf Hitler is expected to launch a three-pronged drive. One prong would be a fierce submarine warfare of which he warned in his Munich speech of February 24. Another would be against the oil fields of Iraq, through invasion of Bulgaria. The third would be a drive down through friendly Spain and against Gibraltar, the British-controlled rock that so effectively guards the western entrance to the Mediterranean. Britain is alert to the danger to Gibraltar and has strongly fortified the place. In this top picture, members of the Gibraltar Defence Corps, a volunteer or ganization, are shown manning the anti-aircraft guns which are their specialty. In previous air attacks on the Rock they have proved their alertness and marksmanship. Bottom is a view from an accompanying British war plane high above the British Rock of Gibraltar showing another plane on patrol duty. It wings high over the harbor wherein are several men-o'-war. All are on the alert against attack by German planes from the air and German troops that might be given a "corridor" down to southern Spain by the Fascist government.





Official Figures Of Precipitation On Prairies Indicates Variation

TORONTO, March 26: (CP)-The western grain grower has one eye on the weather these days and the other on the government's program aimed at reduction of wheat acreage. The government's proposals may cause much discussion but precipitation records and similar matters become less controversial as preparations for spring planting get under way.

Fall and winter precipitation across most of the southern prairies has been well above normal and optimism prevails in those areas over the prospects for this grain clops. Elsewhere throughout Western Canada conditions have not been so favorable, but farmers hope spring rains will create a brighter pic-

Southern Alberta is most favorably placed among the various ections of the grain belt. There the excess was brought about largely through heavy rains in September and October. Under ordinary circumstances October precipitation stands the best chance of being frozen into the top-soil and thus retained throughout the winter. August rainfall was mainly responsible for west-

ern Manitoba's big increase. Monthly Review August rainfall was below nor-

mal in Alberta, Saskatchewan and nestern Manitoba. In western Manitoba nearly twice the normal amount of rain was reported. In northern Alberta, northern Saskatahewan and eastern Manitoba September rainfall was 40 to 50 percent below the average. On the other side of the account. southern Alberta chalked up an excess of more than 100 percent.

Welcome October rains were general throughout the west. Twice the normal amount of precipitation was registered in southern Alberta and southeastern Saskatchewan and the gain was well marked in the northern section of Saskatchewan. November precipitation was well above normal all over Saskatchewan and Alberta and normal in Manitoba.

During the winter months of December, January and February snowfall was normal or better in Manitoba and Saskatchewan except in the drought area of Saskatchewan where there was 40 percent deficiency. Alberta divisions also report figures below the av-

Completely Bananced Budget Announcing the first completely halanced budget in many years, Mr Hart said that the \$6,000.000 surplus expected at the end of the current year would be used as follows: Sinking funds \$751,-000, relief \$2,800,000 and debt redemntion \$2,452.248. A further \$1,156,519 would have to be taken from next year's revenue to complete retirement of maturi-

Dealing with current service expenditures, Mr. Hart said these would amount to \$21.126.580 this year despite a 100.000 population increase, as compared with \$20 .- ; 960,149 for 1930-31 the last normal year available for comparison.

On a per capita basis the service expenditure had actually decreased since the last normal year. Per capita cost in 1930-31 was \$30,05 as compared with \$26.41 during the current year.

But for the financing of unemployment relief, British Columbia would have been able to report a deduction of \$8,621,886 in the net debt. It was interesting to note at this point, Mr. Hart stated, that despite the borrowings on account of unemployment relief the interest rates on the provincial debt had been sealed down by refunding and wise investments, and now amount to very little more than they were
