

MORE POWER TO TATOOSH

Wireless Station Which Is Always in Touch With Rupert Will Have Greatly Augmented Installation.

Bremerton, May 1 .- Tatoosh Island, hwich daily "talks" by wireless to Prince Rupert, is to have the most powerful wireless station on the Pacific coast when the plans being made by the Navy department to renew the navy plant at the entrance to Puget Sound are put into effect. Being a connecting link between the chain of station in Alaska and the United States, and being in range of the path of travel of many trans-Pacific shall be one of the most power- and Des Moines. ful in the country.

To Increase Power.

The plans contemplate putting in more powerful mechanism ands of passers-by by the display of prize and the Westminister District." with facilities for greater frequency and radius. 


