# Help Of United States Is Vital

## ANOTHER ITALIAN GENERAL SURRENDERS AS MUSSOLINI CAMPAIGN SEEMS HOPELESS

British Continue to Thrust Deeper and Deeper Into Libya, Eritrea, Ethiopia and Somaliland—Derna's Fall Appears Imminent

CAIRO, January 28: (CP)—Another Italian general is reported to have surrendered personally to a British cavalry officer when British forces, charging with fixed bayonets, pushed beyond Keru toward Agordat in Italian Eritrea. Agordat had not fallen up to today but its capture by the British is expected momentarily. On this front an additional 100 prisoners have been captured, making a total of more than 1200 taken there to date. Neither the identity of the latest general to be captured or the size of his command is disclosed. The Italians have been driven from the last post on the Sudan-Eritrean frontier and the British are almost half way to the Red Sea.

## TWO NAZIS COME DOWN

Small Raids on England Result in a Couple of Bombers Being Destroyed

LONDON RAIDS RENEWED  
LONDON—After more than a week of almost unbroken quiet as far as this metropolis is concerned, Nazi air raiders renewed their visits over London today. They were bombers and reconnaissance planes. Fire bombs were dropped in one section of the city during the third of four alarm periods. Little damage was done during the first and second alarm periods with damage and casualties. Anti-aircraft guns were active all over the city. First alarm of the day came late in the morning and lasted for about half an hour, the others being in the afternoon. The fourth alarm of the day was the longest of the war. They were the first alarms since last Thursday.

LONDON, January 27 (Canadian Press)—A German bomber which dropped high explosive bombs on an east coast district yesterday, killed several persons but was shot down, the Air Ministry announced. Another lone raider dropped bombs on a northeast coast town, killing several persons.

Sunday a lone German raider dropped bombs on a northeast coast town.

Also Sunday a German bomber was brought down from over the North Sea by an armed trawler. Four members of the plane crew were captured. One escaped.

There were a few German raiders over East Anglia during the week-end.

London passed its eighth night last night without an air raid alarm but there were minor raids in the east Midlands and east of Scotland.

## WANT MORE FOR GOODS

Farmers Would Have Larger Share Of National Income

OTTAWA, Jan. 28.—Asking for a larger share of the national income in better prices for their products, a delegation representing western farmers met Premier W. L. Mackenzie King and almost the entire cabinet yesterday, receiving a sympathetic hearing.

The farmers asked that they be paid on the bases of 1926-1929 prices.

Minister of Agriculture J. G. Gardiner said that some farm prices were already above those levels.

Minister of National Resources T. A. Crerar also was active in the discussions.

## WAR AIMS QUESTION

Isolationist Senators Feel United States is Entitled to Information

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 28.—In a joint statement prior to the opening yesterday of the hearings by the Senate foreign relations committee on the "lease-lend" bill to aid Great Britain, Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana and Senator Gerald P. Nye of North Dakota, isolationist leaders, declared that United States, before going to war, was entitled to know the war aims and peace conditions of all belligerent nations such as Great Britain, Greece, China, Germany, Italy and Japan.

Secretary of State Cordell Hull, speaking yesterday at the opening of the Senate hearing, reiterated what he had said before the House committee in favor of speedy action on the lease-lend bill so that there might be no delay in extending the help which Great Britain urgently needed so that control of the seas might be maintained for democracy.

Secretary of State Hull predicted that Turkey would stand fast against aggression and that Japan would undoubtedly seize French Indo-China. Hull said there was no intention of providing United States naval convoys for British ships taking American supplies to England.

Another witness at yesterday's private hearing was Admiral Harold R. Stark who spoke of naval matters. Later Stark said he had been "wide open" in expressing his opinions.

Dr. Glidden, chief Air Raid Protection officer for the Dominion from Ottawa, who is at present in Victoria, added his congratulations to those responsible.

## Italy Claims To Have Downed Ten British Planes

ROME, Jan. 28.—Then British planes, according to Italian claims, were brought down over the weekend by the Italians in fighting in the African and Greek areas.

## REPAIRING CRUISERS

ROME, Jan. 28.—Ten British cruisers, reported to have been damaged last week in an attack by German and Nazi dive bombers in the Mediterranean, have been taken to Alexandria for repairs, it is stated here. (The British Admiralty has not as yet commented one way or another on this alleged attack.)

## ITALIANS LOSE OUT

Another Counter-Attack Thrown Back by Greeks—Sub-Zero Weather

ATHENS, Jan. 28.—A second Italian counter-attack north of Kilsura has been thrown back by the Greeks. Ground was gained by the Greeks who captured tanks and other equipment as well as taking more prisoners.

Far below zero temperature in Albania is helping the Greeks and hampering the Italians.

The Fascist-high command in Rome has admitted that German dive bombers have been used against the Greeks in Albania.

General Sir Archibald Wavell, British commander in chief in Africa, has been in Athens to confer with the Greeks on British aid to Greece.

## UNCLE SAM IS WARNED

Must Accept "New Order" in Orient—Present Attitude "Outrageous"

TOKYO, Jan. 28.—Foreign Minister Matsuoka of Japan, speaking here, reiterated that United States must accept the new order in the Pacific. The present attitude of United States he described as outrageous.

Matsuoka objected to United States including Australia and New Zealand in her sphere and declared that, if United States insisted in making China her first line of defence, it was bound to lead to trouble.

## Democracies Cannot Continue War Unless Aid Measure Passed

Great Britain Has Already Exhausted Credit and Orders For Planes Are Being Held Up, Secretary of Treasury Tells Committee

WASHINGTON, D.C., January 28: (CP)—Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau told the United States Senate foreign relations committee today that Great Britain, Greece and China "cannot continue to fight" unless Congress enacts the administration's British aid bill. Testifying that the British government had exhausted dollar exchange for buying war supplies, Morgenthau said that British orders for two thousand fighting planes were now being held up for lack of cash. He said also that he had "mentally" charged off some time ago Great Britain's first Great War debt to the United States. He strongly favored President Roosevelt's plan to help the democracies, Morgenthau said.

## Bulletins

NEW CABINET FORMED  
BUCHARIST — Premier Ion Antonescu has formed a new cabinet consisting of thirteen generals with himself as chief of state and foreign minister. The new administration is in complete accord with the German Nazi regime. The purge continues with soldiers patrolling the streets under orders to shoot without question any one found with machine guns. All passports have been cancelled to prevent escape of rebels. King Michael and Queen Helen have made a large donation for the relief of wives and families of slain officers. Antonescu is sick in bed suffering from fatigue.

RELEASE REFUGEES  
WASHINGTON—Germany offered to release 450,000 "racial and political refugees" providing they are taken to the United States. The offer is viewed with suspicion.

WEEK'S NAVAL LOSSES  
LONDON—Naval losses from enemy action for the week ending January 20 amounted to five vessels with total tonnage of 34,772, it is announced. Again this is considerably below the average.

# United States Army Transport Sinks

## War News

PETAINE'S NEW AUTHORITY  
VICHY—Marshal Henri Philippe Petain has issued a decree assuming new authority to punish all office holders for their misdeeds against the state. The decree is retroactive for ten years. Extensive cabinet reorganization is believed impending.

TO STOP GAP  
LONDON—Great Britain is taking steps to tighten up on leakage of supplies through Russia to Germany. Minister of Economic Warfare stated today. Russia has been obtaining new stocks of such materials as cotton, copper, wheat and machines, from the United States, it is said, to replace its own stocks which have been sent to the Reich.

BASIS OF EXTRADITION  
OTTAWA—Theft of a row boat in which he crossed the St. Lawrence River is being used as the charge on which to base extradition proceedings against Baron Franz von Werra, escaped German prisoner, who made his getaway after landing from England and was picked up at Ogdensburg, New York.

AIR RAIDS RESUMED  
LONDON—High explosive and fire bombs fell on London today, bringing back death and destruction to the capital where air raid sirens had been silent since last Thursday. One woman was killed and considerable damage reported to houses in the residential area but no other serious casualties were reported.

BRITAIN CAN WIN  
VICHY, France—Admiral William D. Leahy, new United States ambassador to France, says Great Britain "can and will prosecute the present war to a successful completion." He made this statement in denying reports attributed to him of having said that Great Britain would be defeated.

EMPRESS IS SAFE  
LONDON—The Press Association reported today that the British liner Empress of Australia was safe in port. It did not give details about the ship which had previously been reported torpedoed 200 miles west of Dakar, French West Africa.

TO USE ITALIANS  
LONDON—Secretary of War David Margesson told Parliament today of a plan whereby Italian prisoners from North Africa would be brought to England to work in agriculture. Margesson said that a total of 111,000 prisoners had been taken in Africa and that many of these had already been sent to India.

NAVAL BAG REVEALED  
LONDON—British naval authorities made the deferred announcement today of a bag by naval planes in the Mediterranean two months ago when aerial torpedoes accounted for the destruction of two Italian submarines, a destroyer and a depot ship. This was before the raid on Taranto.

## IS SAFE IN PORT

Torpedo Attack is Reported by Canadian Steamer Empress of Australia in South Atlantic

LONDON, January 28.—The British Press Association announced today that the Canadian liner Empress of Australia was safe in port, the identity of which was not disclosed for reasons of security, although it is believed it may have been Bathurst in Gambia.

Last night Miami, Florida, reported receipt of "S.O.S." messages stating that the Empress of Australia had been torpedoed 200 miles off Dakar, French West Africa, in the Atlantic Ocean and was down by the bow. These reports at 7:30 p.m. Pacific Standard Time stated that the Empress of Australia had first flashed that she was being torpedoed, then that she was down by the bow and later that she was being shelled.

## Funeral Of Jack Cherry

The chapel of the B.C. Undertakers was filled yesterday for the funeral of the late Jack Cherry, whose death occurred suddenly last week. Rev. Canon W. F. Rushbrook officiated and Mrs. C. J. Norrington presided at the organ to accompany the hymns which were "Abide With Me" and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus." Following the service, interment was made in Fairview Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Ray Scherk, Walter Zeliski, Harry Edgar, Kenneth Lineham, Earl Brochu and Sam Currie.

## Converted Cannery Ship Aground In Finlayson Channel

Vessels From Various Directions, Including Prince Rupert, Hasten to Scene—Some of Passengers and Crew Placed Ashore

PASSENGERS COMING HERE?  
According to word received from Vancouver this afternoon U.S.S. Charleston is supposed to pick up the passengers of the Kvichak and bring them to Prince Rupert. There was one woman passenger on the Kvichak — Mrs. David Wisley.

Off Sister Rocks in Finlayson Channel between Prince Royal Island and the mainland, about 120 miles south of Prince Rupert, the chartered 200-foot American cannery tender Kvichak, now being used as a United States Army transport, is ashore and partially submerged with sixty-three persons who were on board now huddling on the beach awaiting rescue.

First vessel, apparently, to reach the scene in response to distress messages would be U.S.S. Charleston, a warship, which was reported due at 1 p.m. The Prince Rupert salvage boats Pachena, Capt. Verne Daly, and Bentinck, Capt. Reg. Green, with salvage equipment, left here at 2 o'clock this morning and should reach the Kvichak some time this afternoon. Fish packers from Bella Bella and Butedale are also reported proceeding to the scene as well as the United States coastguard cutter Nehama and tug Lapointe. The steamer Prince Rupert was also reported heading for the scene but she would be a long way off.

The Kvichak grounded last night and immediately sent out distress calls with the result that rescue vessels were soon speeding to her aid. All twenty-three passengers and part of the crew were soon taken ashore in spite of rough weather as the vessel appeared to be in a dangerous position. The captain and remainder of the crew stayed aboard.

ANOTHER DRAFT  
OTTAWA—Notices have been sent out to the fourth batch of young men to undergo medical examination prior to being ordered to national service training camps. A considerable number of conscientious objectors will be called out for non-combatant duty.

NORWEGIAN TRAINING SCHOOL  
VANCOUVER—The Royal Norwegian Air Force is to open a training school here, using planes from the United States.

NAVAL TRAINING SCHOOL  
VICTORIA—One hundred probationary sub-lieutenants have commenced training at H. M. C. S. Royal Roads (formerly Hatley Park), the new naval training school here.

DR. SKELTON DIES  
OTTAWA—Dr. O. D. Skelton, Under Secretary of State for External Affairs, died suddenly today. He was 62 years of age. First reports said he had suffered a heart seizure in an automobile. He was permanent head of the department under which Canada's growing diplomatic service functioned and acted as deputy to the Prime Minister in relation to all matters concerning Canada's relations with other countries.

R.C.A.F. RECRUITS NEEDED  
OTTAWA—James F. Duncan, deputy minister of air, who is about to retire to a private position, has issued an appeal for recruits for air crews of the Royal Canadian Air Force.

TOWN NAMES CHANGED  
TORONTO—Names of two Ontario towns have been officially changed owing to the war. New Germany becomes Maryville and German Mills is to be known in future as Parkway.

BURNABY ARMS PLANT  
OTTAWA—If present plans are approved, a \$5,000,000 armaments manufacturing plant will be established at Burnaby, Vancouver. It will manufacture naval and anti-aircraft guns and will be in the form of an addition to the Dominion Bridge Co.'s plant at Burnaby.

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### EDITORIAL

#### The World Situation . . .

Here is how one military observer thinks the developments in the very near future will go: "Allowing that the present relation of Canada with Japan is that of 'alarmed neutrality,' he sees that nation moving at the same time that Germany moves, seizing the Dutch East Indies, laying siege to Singapore and making herself a general nuisance in the Pacific. Germany is to make an "all out" invasion of Britain. Spain will enter the war and strike at Gibraltar. Germany will force a way to Salonika while Russia leaves Turkey helpless.

The military observer does not suggest that these plans will succeed but admits there is grave danger. Every part of the Empire and the United States must join in an "All out war." It is not enough to talk war. Every man and woman must carry on the war, either by taking an active part in the fighting or else by contributing money through war bonds, by paying taxes wherever possible, by the women doing their utmost for the Red Cross and holding down the household expenses, especially for luxuries and encouraging the men of the home to aid in every possible way.

Britain is proving that the best way to defend is to attack.

#### Offsetting Action . . .

In order to offset the plans of the Axis, the Greeks have been doing the unexpected in Albania and it will be months at least before much help can come from Germany there. Great Britain is rapidly clearing the Italians out of Africa and thus ending the dream of the return of the old Roman Empire. Britain has been smashing preparations for the invasion by bombing the invasion ports and also docks, factories and transportation facilities everywhere. Britain also has been steadily increasing her air strength and efficiency. Numbers do not count so much as the quality of the planes and effectiveness with which they are handled.

Britain is proving that the best way to defend is to attack and she has been doing that pretty well lately. If she keeps that up with the aid of American war supplies the great plans of the Axis may come to naught. We feel sure they will.

#### Gerry Says He Knows . . .

There is a current idea that the provincial governments are less efficient than are the provincial governments. We have been sometimes inclined to that idea. But here comes our old friend G. G. McGeer, a member of the House of Commons at Ottawa, who says:

"The Fathers of Confederation assumed that there would be more efficiency in a central government, but they were hopelessly wrong. There is no more efficiency in the Dominion government than there is in provincial or municipal governments. I have been there and I know."

## DESCRIBE STRANDING

**Steamer Cardena Bumped Twice on Thormandy Island**

The Cardena had her bow crumpled and sprang a leak in the forward hold. The vessel was due to have been withdrawn from service this week-end for annual overhaul with the Catala returning to service. The mishap, therefore, does not seriously affect service.
