## Annual Bankers' Meeting—

### Canada's Banks Are Smoothly Financing Dominion's Big Effort; Position Very Strong

TORONTO, Nov. 13.—Canada's vast expansion of wartime manufacturing and her large increase in commerce have been "so well, so simply and so smoothly" financed by the chartered banks, that the financing has "never even been a problem in Canada's war effort." So declared H. T. Jaffray, president, in his address to the 50th annual meeting of The Canadian Bankers' Association here today. He cited the substantial increase of current loans to the public as the evidence behind his declaration. Mr. Jaffray therefore found monetary reform agitations something strange and commented that all current money reform suggestions "boil down to inflation"—mainly inflation of bank note issue through the Bank of Canada. He did not think it unfair to conclude that advocates of such reform must either seek to avoid a share in taxation and in the sacrifices of war along with those of the men in the armed forces, or with the idea of profits to themselves. "Otherwise," said the bankers' president, "Why attempt to discard a smoothly-working machine at such a time?"

#### Maintain Strong Position

Their deposits increased, and high liquidity unimpaired, and their financial accommodation to business and industry greatly increased since the war, more especially during the second year of war just closed, the chartered banks, Mr. Jaffray said, "maintain a very strong position and stand ready to continue to support Canada's war effort to the fullest extent that may be required of them."

Touching monetary reform, he said that the type most generally suggested was that the government through the Bank of Canada should issue a greatly increased amount of note circulation and pay its bills therewith. "Because," he felt, people sometimes become confused on note circulation, whether of the Bank of Canada or of the chartered banks, he illustrated what is inflation by likening bank notes to men at work.

#### Only "Men at Work"

He said: "Bank notes are only sound tokens to facilitate the immediate or deferred transfer of commodities or services. They are like so many men sent out to do a piece of work, their work being to exchange commodities from one owner to another. When their work is through, just as in the case of the men who have finished the job, they go home—their home for the bank note being the bank that issues it.

"If, to follow my simile, further, you wanted to employ twice as many men to do the same amount of work and be as long employed, the only solution would be for each man to do half as much work as he did before. If you translate this back to bank notes, it means that in order to double the amount of bank notes in circulation and keep them in circulation you have either to double the business turnover of the country or you have to double the price of goods. The latter is inflation pure and simple; in no other way can the amount of bank notes outstanding be increased beyond the amount actually required to carry on the business turnover of the country. It is volume of business that calls bank notes into circulation—not the circulation of bank notes that causes business to increase."

#### Business Up, Circulation Also

Mr. Jaffray pointed out that since war began, the note circulation of the Bank of Canada had increased while, by statutory requirement, that of the chartered banks had been decreased. Bank of Canada note circulation, \$179,000,000 at the outbreak of war, stood at \$422,000,000 August 31st this year—of which \$80,000,000 was in the tills of the chartered banks. Increased business output explained the increase, export-import trade having grown from \$1,576,000,000 to \$2,869,000,000 from September 30, 1939 to September

30, 1941, and employment having increased by 888,000 wage-earners. With 338,000 men in the active armed forces this made a total of 1,226,000 people earning now who were not earning two years ago. Industrial production had increased 56 percent over the 1935-39 average; and farm purchasing power, up 15 percent (most of it in the past 12 months) was something over which all Canadians might rejoice.

"The vast increase in employment, in industrial output, in import-export trade and in agricultural marketing," said Mr. Jaffray, "fully justifies the observation that the increase in Bank of Canada note circulation is emphatically not out of line with the country's increased volume of business."

#### Wages and Inflation

Upon the wages aspect of inflation the speaker found it difficult when rising wages served only to increase commodity costs, to see how the recipients of the rising wage could benefit. He wondered, and he felt that wage-earners must be asking too, "how much of these demands are the result of activities of professional agitators who live well off labor's contributions, and who in order to ensure their jobs, spend their time making false promises which they must themselves know cannot be fulfilled in any final analysis of wealth." Nobody can benefit and many must suffer, from wage-forced inflation, he added.

Mr. Jaffray wondered if "those who urge that we should spend our time and exhaust our energies by experimenting on their theories rather than getting on with our job, are not allowing their prejudices to interfere with the war effort," and found room for satisfaction that the government is "taking firm and energetic steps to check the tendency toward inflation which has already become evident." He added: "I am sure that not only the banks but all right-minded citizens will afford them every support in their effort."

#### Outstanding Financial Events

Touching Victory Loan 1941, the speaker recounted the totals—968,259 subscriptions, \$730,376,250 raised in cash, with conversions making up a grand total of \$86,820,250, and said that a great share of the credit for the loan's success was due to George W. Spinney, a Vice-President of The Canadian Bankers' Association. Another financial aspect of the war effort, repatriation of securities held abroad, Mr. Jaffray said, had amounted to some \$440,000,000 in two years; interest on this would, after the war, be paid in Canada instead of being sent out of the country; this would benefit the Canadian economy.

The bankers' president reviewed Canada's war effort which he said was greatly growing. Canada's own direct war costs this fiscal year, aside from financial aid to Britain, would cost \$1,450,000,000. Canadians were paying into the federal treasury in taxes and other revenues, \$1,500,000,000—enough to pay the entire ordinary operating expenses of the Dominion and 71 percent of her war effort as well—or 43.8 percent of Canada's war effort and money aid to Britain combined.

## Bulletins

ENVOY OVERDUE  
LONDON—There is no word here of an overdue plane bringing Lawrence A. Steinhardt, United States ambassador to Russia, and other officials from Moscow to London. It is thought that it might have been forced to land on account of unfavorable flying conditions.

RECRUIT TO STRENGTH  
OTTAWA—Reserve army units in Canada have been authorized to recruit up to full strength. They have been heretofore only at half strength.

IMMIGRATION CONTINUES  
OTTAWA—Despite the war immigration into Canada continues. During the last six months 5000 immigrants arrived in the country, 1150 of whom were from the British Isles.

LAPOINTE IN HOSPITAL  
MONTREAL—Hon. Ernest Lapointe minister of justice, is a patient in a Montreal hospital. Nature of his illness has not been disclosed.

TEACHERS THREATEN  
MOOSE JAW—Moose Jaw school teachers have threatened to walk out unless a thirty to forty percent salary cut which was made during the depression is restored.

## War News

### RUSSO-GERMAN WAR

LONDON—The German position around Tula is still seriously endangered by the Russian counter-offensive and the Nazi retreat to avoid encirclement and destruction is nothing short of flight, according to Soviet military advisers. Heavy fighting continues elsewhere all along the other fronts. The Moscow and Leningrad fronts are static, says Berlin, while Sebastopol and Kerch on the Black Sea are still under heavy attacks, particularly by bombing from the air.

### AIR WAR QUIET

LONDON—Bad weather prevented German aircraft from coming over Great Britain last night. It did not, however, deter the Royal Air Force from attacking enemy territory, four British planes being lost.

### JAPAN AND UNITED STATES

TOKYO—Relations between Japan and United States are undoubtedly deteriorating further, it is stated in authoritative quarters. In one place it was said that United States might already be considered at war with Japan.

### FINLAND AND RUSSIA

LONDON—A dispatch to the Daily Mirror says that Finland is agreeable to cease fighting with Russia when a safe defensive line has been reached.

## HOSTEL IS IMPROVED NEW FRONT IS DEMAND

Salvation Army Doubles Its Capacity to Take Care of Needs of Forces Here. Emanuel Shinwell, Labor Critic, Speaks Before British House and First Lord of Admiralty Replies.

Notable improvements and extensions have been made to the Salvation Army hostel for soldiers on Second Avenue, it is being found by visitors this afternoon on the occasion of a public inspection of the premises.

Taking over of the adjoining quarters which until recently were occupied by the C.C.F. Club just doubles the available space but the accommodation has been more than doubled. There are now forty-six beds instead of the former nineteen. The reading and sitting room has been extended across the entire front and an office and locker room has been installed. The hot water heating tank has been doubled in capacity and washroom facilities have been improved.

The popularity of the Salvation Army hostel is attested to by the very fact that the extensions and improvements have been made necessary.

PARIS, Nov. 13:—French shop-workers will work two hours overtime on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays during the pre-Christmas rush. They will be entitled to time and a half overtime pay.

## Neutrality Amendments Thru House

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 13:—The House of Representatives today passed amendments to the neutrality bill permitting the arming of American merchant ships and allowing them to be sent into combat zones. The vote was 212 to 194.

## Rocky Mount Trench Route Deemed Best For North Highway

Two Ways Are Considered Feasible—Final Choice Left to Government—Cost Estimated at \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13 (CP)—Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King, in the House of Commons today, tabled the report of the British Columbia-Yukon-Alaska Highway Commission which said that two routes had been considered, A and B, and were feasible but Route B would best fulfil the purpose of the highway. Route B would run north through the Rocky Mountain trench to the Liard River and down the Pelly River to the Yukon whence it would proceed to Dawson and the Alaskan boundary.

### Russo-German War—

STORMING OF KERCH BY NAZIS  
Most Critical Fighting Appears to Be Going on in Crimea Area.

LONDON, Nov. 13:—Chancellor Adolf Hitler's High Command claimed today that German assault troops were storming the fortifications of Kerch, gateway to the Caucasus oil fields, and had captured several coastal defence posts south of the town. Reuters quoted the Rome radio as announcing that German and Rumanian forces had occupied a port which lies on a narrow strait separating Crimea from the Caucasus mainland.

Dispatches to the Soviet newspaper Pravda, however, declared that Red Army troops had beaten off German attempts to turn Russian lines in the Kerch area. Russian front line reports said the Germans were "equally unsuccessful" in fighting near Sebastopol, key Black Sea naval base at the southwest tip of Crimea, and that repeated Nazi tank assaults "failed to break through our defences."

An authoritative London source said that sixteen German armored divisions and seventy infantry divisions have suffered "appreciable casualties" on the Russian front, adding that the Germans were believed to have nineteen armored and around 160 infantry-motorized light and mountain divisions on the Russian front.

## MEIGHEN ACCEPTS

Agrees to Take Conservative Leadership—Favors Conscription and National Government

TORONTO, Nov. 13:—Senator Arthur Meighen last night accepted the leadership of the Conservative party in Canada and at the same time declared himself as favoring compulsory selective service over the whole field of war. He came out also in favor of the formation of a non-party national government, declaring that there should be no party government at this time of national emergency if any other could be formed.

Senator Meighen, in becoming Conservative leader, succeeds Hon. R. B. Hanson, who retired on account of ill health. Compulsory selective service and formation of non-party government are issues receiving new emphasis today as a result of Senator Meighen's acceptance of the leadership of the Conservative party. In announcing his acceptance of the leadership last night and that he would urge "compulsory selective service over the whole field of war," Mr. Meighen said that the present government could not bring the nation to maximum war endeavor. "If a strong ministry on a wider basis can be formed, party control can no longer be justified and should not be tolerated," he said.

## Authoritative Statement On Naval Battle

LONDON, Nov. 13:—An authoritative source said yesterday that two Italian eight-inch gun cruisers "undoubtedly beat a hasty retreat" when British warships attacked an Axis convoy in the Mediterranean on Sunday. He said that the British warships annihilated ten merchant ships and two Italian destroyers at a range of two to three thousand yards at a point 220 miles south of Taranto.

## KING OPENS PARLIAMENT

Refers, in Speech From Throne, To Aid Being Given In War By United States

LONDON, Nov. 13:—King George yesterday opened a new session of Parliament amid subdued lustre and pomp, reading the Speech from the Throne in which it was stated: "The United States is furnishing my peoples and my Allies with war supplies of all kinds and on a scale unexampled in history."

## Major Angus Moving East

Transferred From Victoria to Ottawa as Quartermaster General's Staff.

VICTORIA, Nov. 13:—Major H. F. Angus has been transferred from here to Ottawa on the Canadian Army quartermaster general's staff.

### Dictatorship Results . . .

When Harry Hopkins, special representative of President Roosevelt, was visiting Russia recently he noted several times how dictatorship worked. Here is what he says in regard to evacuating:

"In Moscow there is no problem of evacuating children and the aged and the sick. They're evacuated. In Moscow every able bodied man, woman and youth has a specific job to do, and they do it and like it. It's somewhat different in London. I imagine it would be different in New York too. Stalin speaks and that's the Russian law. I have never dreamed of such a concentration as I saw in Moscow." And again:

"When Moscow or any other Russian city blacks out, it blacks out. You don't merely pull the curtains. The chances are you won't have curtains in Russia. But curtains or not you turn out the lights. In London if the police or an air raid warden sees a glimmer in your window he taps on the door and reminds you that there's a raid on and that you haven't closed your curtains tightly. In Russia (and I suppose it's the same in Berlin) he taps on your door but not to tell you that he can see a light from below. He's more apt to take you to jail."

### Bomber Command . . .

Those interested in the Air Force will be interested in the publication "Bomber Command," which is the Air Ministry's account of bomber command's offensive against the Axis. It is well illustrated and contains a vast amount of information in regard to operations of the Royal Air Force. It is published in Canada by the Queen's Canadian Fund for air raid victims and the net proceeds will be devoted to the fund.

year are estimated at \$1,450,000,000," he emphasized, "her total federal revenues, mostly from taxes, are estimated at \$1,500,000,000. Thus the people of Canada, this year, are paying cash on the barrelhead for their part in the war, plus \$50,000,000 more toward the ordinary running expenses of the country."

The total cost of war-and-non-war expenditure this fiscal year would be \$2,820,000,000, of which approximately 53 percent would be paid out of taxes and other federal revenue.

#### Higher Than Australia

In the fiscal year 1939-40 the Dominion financial outlay for all purposes was only 13 1/2 percent of the national income—this year, 47 percent. Some figures for other countries, which, he said, were not exactly comparable but rather illustrative, showed ratios of war expenditure to national income of about 45 percent in the United Kingdom, 25 percent in Australia and "probably 20 to 25 percent in the United States."

Mr. Jaffray completed his reference to war effort by pointing to the \$2,400,000,000 worth of contracts led by the Department of Munitions and Supply as one of the greatest indices of the magnitude of Canada's wartime expansion and concluded:

#### Confident of Victory

"This is an effort of which Canadians can well be proud. In the armed forces, in manufacturing and production and on the economic and financial fronts, Canada is contributing heavily to the defeat of Hitlerism. A year ago in my address I expressed confidence in the outcome of this war. I have not in any way changed my views—but we are not through yet and before the end we shall all have to make much greater efforts and greater sacrifices than we have made hitherto, and the sooner we face these facts the sooner the war will be ended."

In his review of bank figures the President made comparisons as follows:— Total deposits of all kinds at the outbreak of war: \$3,095,000,000; a year later \$3,142,000,000; August 31, 1941, \$3,542,000,000 (\$311,000,000 of the latter figure due to temporary government balances arising from the Victory Loan). Balances with the Bank of Canada, cash and other immediately available assets: August 31, 1940, \$640,000,000; August 31, 1941, \$663,000,000 (percentage of total liabilities 17.7 percent, "showing," said the president, "that the liquid positions of the banks has been well maintained.") Current loans to the public: at the outbreak, \$826,000,000; a year later, \$939,000,000; August 31, 1941, \$1,153,000,000 (an increase of \$113,000,000 in the first year of the war and a further \$214,000,000 in the year ended August 31, 1941). Short term Dominion and provincial securities (maturing within two years) held by banks: at the outbreak, \$443,000,000; a year later \$700,000,000; at August 31, 1941, \$839,000,000.

Cash, and quickly available assets in Dominion and Provincial, Municipal and Industrial securities in Canada and elsewhere increased from 67 percent of total liabilities to the public a year ago, to 69 percent at August 31, 1941. The figure was 70 percent at the outbreak of war.

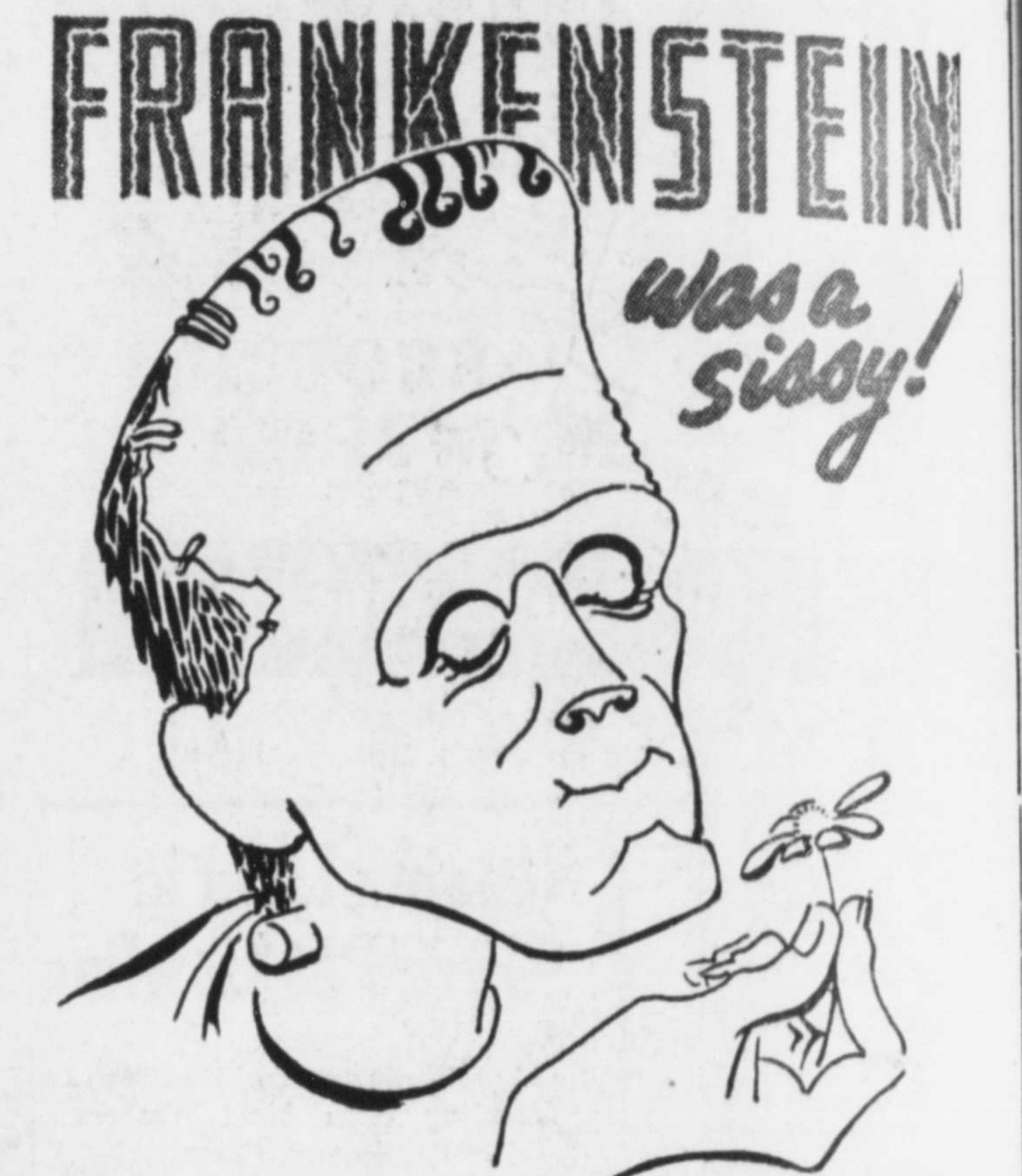

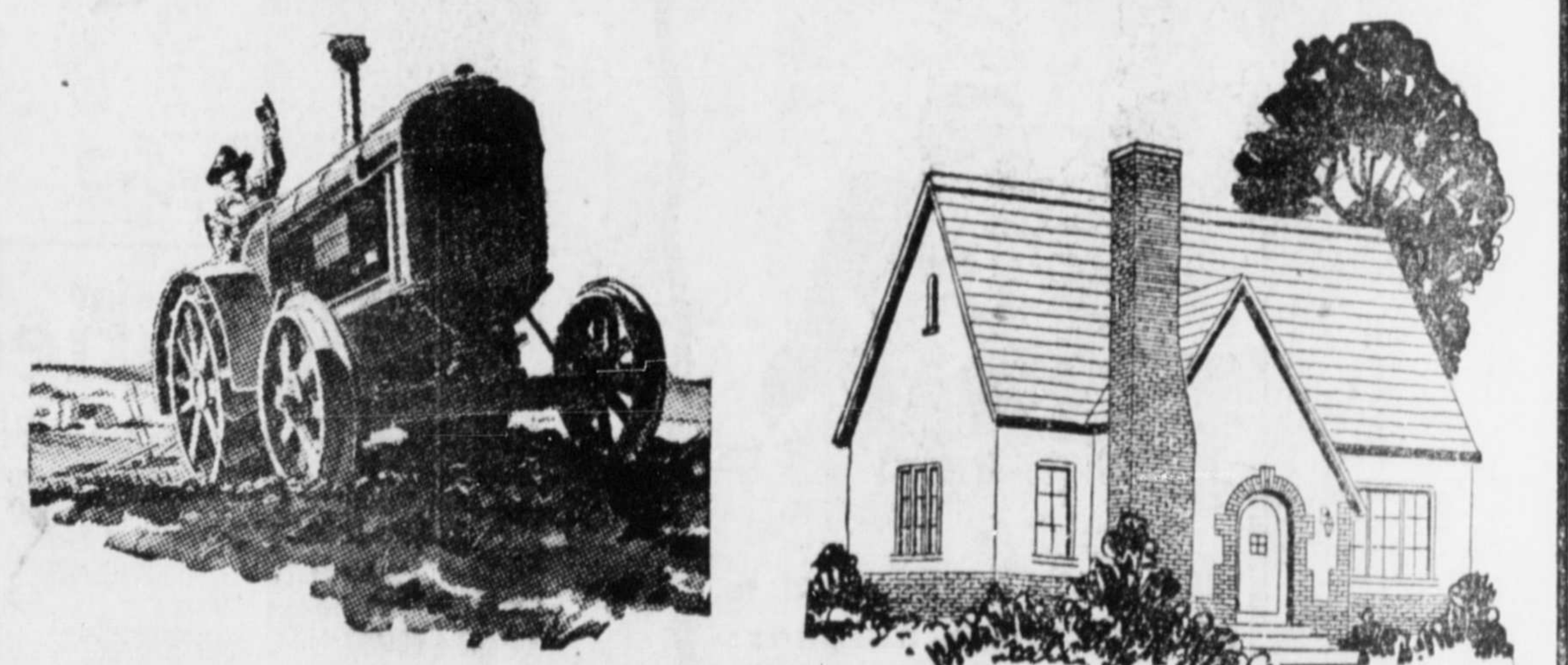
