### HOW ABOUT A GARDEN CLUB?

Prince Rupert has now a parks commission, and one of the is still a good maxim. most important, if not the principal, amongst the duties of the new board of commissioners is to do everything possible to preserve and increase the beauty of Prince Rupert's park lands as opportunity offers, and as funds are available. More power to in progress are alike distracting. the park commission is the wish of all who possess the mindpicture of a beautiful as well as a commercially prosperous Prince Rupert.

But while some citizens are wishing, others are working plays of temper on the field interfor a beautiful Prince Rupert, not necessarily beautiful with parks, but certainly beautiful with private gardens. Private garden space collectively far surpasses in area even the lavish park space belonging to Prince Rupert, and as the city grows and citizens take pains and spend money in the laying out of bad example. gardens the result will be immensely effective.

How much can be done with the garden spaces of Prince Rupert may be seen at the government buildings, where uninviting muskeg is being laid out in lawns; at Dr. Eggert's residence, which is in a perfect oasis of tender green patiently raised from swampy ground such as can be seen all about it, and on Fourth avenue, between Dunsmuir street and Agnew place. Here the residential lots are richly improved with grass lawns and forthcoming flower beds. Isolated throughout the townsite are other vastly creditable garden plots, given over both to flowers and to vegetables. There are Mr. Jarvis McLeod's garden across Hays Creek, Mr. S. Mussallem's on Fifth avenue, near the hospital, and Sheriff Shirley's on the winding curve of Taylor street. And there are others besides, both made and in the making.

Some day soon citizens of Prince Rupert should get a good garden club in operation to set the pace for the parks commission. The value of such united effort may be gathered from the experience of Seattle, a city which rose as Prince Rupert is rising, from wet bush and muskeg. Here is what the Seattle win & Williams paints, at Howe Post-Intelligencer says of the work of the garden club of & McNulty's. Seattle:

"Of course, it is not yet possible fully to estimate the value of the campaign launched by the Seattle Garden Club, and in which the Health department has been playing an important part. For one thing it would not be possible to state the value of the work already done in terms of money. There are values which cannot be measured in dollars and cents. The work of the garden club, the improvement and beautification of vacant lots, the piling and burning of unsightly and unclean rubbish, the telling assault on the habitat of the fly and the rat, and other such useful achievements, will do for Seattle an amount of good almost immeasurable in its magnitude.

"Seattle really is a great big garden, and as we have here climatic conditions which make it possible to grow flowers of many kinds all the year round, there is no reason why an organization like the garden club should not work from year's end to year's end.

"Probably continued activity would make an extensive clean-up campaign each spring wholly unnecessary. The city dumb for life. 

\$1,000 or less, you should make application for as many Contracts as will cover the amount you wish to borrow, you deposit with us \$6.00 down for each contract and \$6.00 on or before the 15th of each month thereafter until a loan is ready for you. Sec. A. 9. How long will I have to pay in before getting a loan? The company begins making loans

in each series in six months' time, and yours will come due in its regular numerical order. By taking the past eight years' business of a Company using exactly the same plan as we are, we find that the average time for making these loans is a little less than sixteen months. 10. What determines when I shall get my lo an? These Contracts are written in series of 100 and numbered consecutively from 1 to 100. When your application is made you are given the low-

est number possible at that time. The loans are granted to the Contract holders in their regular numerical order. As loans are made or vacancies occur from any cause whatever, each series is filled up with new business and never allowed to contain less than 100 paying Contracts together with the return payments from all the loans granted. If you do, you will be compelled to pay from 25% to 40% more than the actual cash value of the house. Then you must pay 7% to 8% interest on the balance due.
