Russians Themselves Admit Scrious Position-Outer Desences Are Menaced.

MOSCOW, Nov. 27: (P) - Massive German attacks near Volokolamsk, sixty-five miles northwest of Moscow, endanger the outer defences of the Russian capital today. Newspaper Izvestia acknowledged that the situation of the Soviet troops in the sector had become more aggravated during the last twentyfour hours. Resistance to the expanding German drive was continuing, Izvestia said, and the Communist narty organ, Pravda, added that in the last ten days the Germans have failed to turn the flanks protecting Moscow although they have driven closer.

QUEBEC, Nov. 27:-The remains of Rt. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Min-A ister of Justice, arrived here today from Montreal and are now lying in state in the Quebec Legislative Chamber until Saturday morning when the funeral will take place with full rites of the Catholic Church led by Cardinal Villeneuve.

From many prominent people have been received messages of condolence and tribute. General Charles DeGaulle, leader of the Free French forces, is among those who have been heard from. Others paying their tribute have been Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King, Senator Raoul Dandurand, Senator Arthur Meighen and Hon. R. B. Hanson.

Just before he died Mr. Lapointe expressed regret at "having to leave" when there was still much important work which he felt he might have been done in this time of crisis. His last thoughts were for his country.



He believed the free association of Canada and the Christmas present. other dominions with the United Kingdom each filling the role of nationhood, was an example to the world in co-operation and that human freedom generally was more secure under the British crown than elsewhere.

He was privileged to accomplish much in the furtherance of his own ideas. With Prime Minister Mackenzie King he attended the Imperial Conference of 1926 in London when the new relationship of the states of the British Commonwealth was defined in general terms. In 1929 he went back to London as head of the Canadian delegation of a conference of legal officers to work out details.

These included the framing of the Statute of Westminster under which the equality of the dominions with the United Kingdom is affirmed, repeal of the Colonial Laws Validity Act under which statutes of the parliament of the United Kingdom had effect in the dominions. LOUBSER recognition of the powers of parliaments in the dominions to enact legislation having extra-territorial validity. effective beyond their own borders, and revision of laws relating to shipping and nationality.

On several occasions Mr. Lapointe represented Canada at sessions of the assembly of the League of Nations. 
