Far East Is Still In Limelight

Vancouver Has Bad Train Wreck

Canadian National and Great Northern Collision; One Man Killed, Others Badly Injured

Continental Limited and Seattle Train Meet Head-On Not Far Out of City—Two Locomotives Overturn—Track Torn Up For Yards

VANCOUVER, July 24: (CP)—One man was killed, one is missing and nine others are in hospital, three in a critical condition, following the head-on collision of the Canadian National Railway's westbound flier "Continental Limited" and an outbound Great Northern passenger train for Seattle between here and New Westminster today.

ATTACK ON RUSSIA IS WEAKENING

Has Slowed Down if Not Entirely Halted—Raid on Moscow Not Very Effective

LONDON, July 24: (CP)—The German attack on Russia is slowing down if it has not entirely halted, authoritative quarters said today.

No change in the fighting front is indicated by a Russian communique reporting stubborn engagements continuing.

German bombers, attacking in relays for five and a half hours, subjected Moscow to its third successive night bombardment but today the Russians branded the raid like its predecessors—a failure.

BONUS TO BE GIVEN

AXIS SHIPS SENT DOWN

Royal Air Force Stages Successful Attack on Convoy

CAIRO, July 24: (CP)—The Royal Air Force announced today that its bombers had sunk at least three ships from an Axis convoy off the Italian island of Pantellaaria in the channel between Sicily and Tunisia on Tuesday. One Italian destroyer was also hit.

Unidentified Plane Drops Missiles on Dundalk in Eire

DUBLIN, July 24: (CP)—An unidentified plane dropped bombs on Dundalk Harbor during the night.

Charles J. Burchell, Canadian Commissioner to Australia, Transferred to Newfoundland

OTTAWA, July 24: (CP)—The appointment of Charles J. Burchell, at present Canadian High Commissioner to Australia, to be Canadian High Commissioner to Newfoundland, was announced last night by Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King. This is a new post and completes Canadian representation in all Dominion and colonies of the Empire.

Situation In Orient Continues Critical; Japanese Moving

Nipponese Invasion of Indo-China is Certainty—United States and Great Britain Ready

SAIGON, French Indo-China, July 24: (CP)—Well informed quarters reported today that Japanese warships had appeared off Cap St. Jacques and Camranh Bay following French acceptance of Japanese demands for military facilities in southern Indo-China. The same sources said that twelve Japanese transports were enroute to Saigon from Hainan, Chinese island off the Indo-China coast which the Japanese have been using as a concentration base for months.

ALL OUT FOR AIR TRAVEL

Hon. R. B. Hanson Fit and Good—Hamored—Comments Breezily on Variety of Things

Hon. R. B. Hanson, leader of the Opposition in Canadian Parliament, had never flown in an airplane before the trip to the Yukon following which he was in Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon aboard the steamer Princess Alice returning to Vancouver. Now he is enthusiastically air-minded. "I am going to fly every time I get a chance," he said. "Maybe I will fly across the Atlantic Ocean to England with Mackenzie King in one of those bombers" he jocularly remarked.

The Conservative leader was in high good humor and looking very fit with a fine coat of sun tan as he described the thrills of the flight over rugged Yukon territory from Skagway to Dawson which highlighted the trip north. The party travelled in a big twin-motored Boeing bomber. They made the trip from Skagway to Dawson in three hours, had lunch there, visited the mining fields in the afternoon, enjoyed a cocktail party at Dawson afterwards and Mr. Hanson spent the night as the guest of Hon. George Black, former Speaker of the House of Commons. Next day they flew back to Whitehorse, leaving the plane there and continuing down to Skagway in a railmobile through the rugged White Pass. Mr. Hanson was impressed with the scenery including famous old Dead Horse Gulch.

Before this flight into the Yukon, Mrs. Hanson said the only time he had been in the air was a balloon ascent in Florida. He is now intent on a flying trip into the Northwest Territories. "What do you think about British Columbia annexing the Yukon?" Mr. Hanson was asked. "I haven't thought of it much," replied the leader. "I did find, however, that ninety-five per cent of the people in the Yukon are opposed to it." Nevertheless he admitted that Premier T. D. Pattullo took a long view when he envisioned annexing to British Columbia a great northland in which there was enough mineral wealth to pay the national debt.

Mr. Hanson reiterated his disfavor for the Alaska Highway which subject was broached by Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, who was among those on hand to meet him. "And how does that fit in with your leader's ideas of sovereignty?" asked "R.B." of "Olof" who thought that, if the United States was willing to pay the entire cost of the road, it should be permitted to do so. The Conservative leader would not be drawn into making any commitment on the feasibility or advisability of the project. He was ready to concede that it might be a

Vichy and Japan have agreed in principle, a dispatch from Vichy says, on a basis for Japanese aid in "protection" of French interests in Indo-China. It was announced today that negotiations have now been shifted from Vichy to Hanoi where details for the Japanese military bases are being worked out.

While some British sources in London held out today that prospective Japanese occupation of French Indo-China offered no military threat to Singapore, United States quarters in London indicated mounting concern. The London Daily Express wrote that, "if Japan moves south to the Dutch East Indies, she will meet warships of the United States and Great Britain." At Washington United States and Great Britain were reported poised today for counter-action against impending Japanese occupation of strategic bases in southern Indo-China.

Mr. Hanson did not think Canada was in danger of invasion from Japan. In fact, he was still doubtful that Japan would be in the war at all. "R.B." indulged in good-natured banter with "Olof" Hanson, asking the latter when he was going to get into the Senate. The Conservative leader consoled C. H. Orme, the unsuccessful Conservative candidate in a former election, with the comment that Olof might be unbeatable but he would have to quit some time. "And remember," he said turning to Olof, "you're dead when you go to the Senate."

Scanning headlines in the afternoon's edition of the Daily News, Mr. Hanson expressed interest in the retirement of S. J. Hungerford as president of the Canadian National Railways. He paid tribute to Mr. Hungerford and said he had been doing a fine job although the going had often been tough. The Conservative leader expressed satisfaction with the appointment of R. C. Vaughan as the new railway president. "The right man," he said of Mr. Vaughan expressing hope that the politicians would leave him alone.

"The end of another chapter" was Mr. Hanson's observation on noting the formalities of the elevation of Former Prime Minister R. B. Bennett to the Senate. "You'll have to get along without your bacon for breakfast now" observed the Conservative leader to another member of the party. "But that won't bother me."

If not voluntarily, the people of Canada will have to get down to gas conservation by compulsion," asserted Mr. Hanson after asking how the public had taken to the appeal of the government for cutting down gas consumption.

Statement of C.N.R. Board Lauds S. J. Hungerford.

MONTREAL, July 24.—Associated with announcements of the resignation of S. J. Hungerford as president of the Canadian National system, including Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships Limited, Canadian Government Merchant Marine Limited and other subsidiary and affiliated companies, and the appointment of R. C. Vaughan, now vice-president in charge of purchases, stores and steamships, as president and chief executive officer of the National Railway Company and its steamship and rail subsidiaries, the following statement was issued on behalf of the board of directors:

"In submitting his resignation to the board Mr. Hungerford stated the responsibilities and activities of the Canadian National System are continuously expanding and the war has brought many new problems affecting the whole range of the railway's work. I feel that it is advisable that we take steps at this time designed to ensure continuity of executive. Judgment and action not only through the present times of stress but also in the years ahead and this can best be done in my opinion by the appointment now of a younger officer to be chief executive of the system."

"The board accepted Mr. Hungerford's resignation with regret but was gratified that he would remain a chairman of the board and that the Canadian National Railways would therefore continue to have the benefit of his great experience and knowledge of the affairs of the system. The board recognized that the expanding activities of the railway, resulting from the war, had added greatly to Mr. Hungerford's already heavy duties and that, freedom of some of the duties, he would be enabled to devote particular attention to the railways' war work in many and growing fields. In such connection it is noted that he will continue as president of National Railways Munitions, Limited. The board record their appreciation of the debt of gratitude which Canada and the national system owe to Mr. Hungerford, whose outstanding constructive and operating abilities has played so important a part in the development of the system."

"The directors of the national system are fortunate in being able to announce the appointment to the presidency of an officer having the exceptional qualifications for the post possessed by R.C. Vaughan. Mr. Vaughan's railway career extends over some 42 years. During 39 years of service with the Canadian National Railways and predecessor companies, he has occupied many responsible posts and is thoroughly familiar with all phases of the activities of the organization he has been a vice-president of the railway since 1920. In appointing Mr. Vaughan to chief executive office the directors look forward with confidence to the continued development and success of the national system."

APPEALS FOR HOUSES

Editor, Daily News:

There is a possibility that the Rocky Mountain Rangers will be leaving this area in the near future and presumably such a departure would result in the vacating of many houses and apartments which are at present being rented by the wives of many of the men in this unit.

As you are doubtless aware there is an extreme shortage of houses and apartments in this city and the situation is likely to remain acute as long as the war lasts.

As Auxiliary Services Officer in this area it has fallen to me to do what I can in the way of finding rooms furnished or unfurnished for the wives of the men stationed in this area and I am hoping that in publishing this letter you will assist me in performing a definitely needed war-time service in this connection.

If the owners of houses, apartments or rooms, furnished or unfurnished, who are expecting to have any one of those facilities vacant as a result of the possible departure of the Rocky Mountain Rangers from this area, would let me know either by phone or in writing I should be very grateful.

It is essential that the citizens of Prince Rupert should co-operate in this way if at all possible so that no time be lost in securing this assistance for the men in uniform who will no doubt be replacing the R.M.R.'s when they go.

It is encouraging to feel that one can count upon the support of your paper at all times when matters concerning the welfare of troops in this town are under consideration.

It would appear to me that those who have facilities for housing the wives of men in uniform who from time to time are stationed in this city should feel it their opportunity for doing a piece of real war-time service by making them available.

Must Be Prepared . . .

Despatches indicated that trouble with Japan is in the offing and in the meantime we have no highway to the interior—no means of making a quick getaway such as may be needed for the women and children and no means of moving troops rapidly and in such a way as to prove most effective.

We are not likely to be given due notice of an attack on the port. What use will the highway be after the damage is done? It seems to most people here that the time for action on the highway is right now so that it will be ready for use if required. A mere three million dollars is not very much for an important defence project such as this. If Prince Rupert is worth defending, and it seems that the government thinks it is, it should be worth defending well. It looks as if it might be the old story of "If we had only acted sooner."

This week-end there is to be a demonstration of air raid prevention work. This is very important but we doubt if it is anything like as important as the building of the highway. Unfortunately, the highway is beyond the power of the citizens here. It is a federal project.

Mr. Hungerford Resigns . . .

The resignation of S. J. Hungerford, president of the Canadian National Railway system, announcement of which was made yesterday, is to be regretted. Mr. Hungerford knew Prince Rupert well and was keenly interested, not only in railway affairs here, but in the hotel accommodation and general progress of the city. All people who knew him spoke well of him. Any who did not speak well of him did not know him. We hope Mr. Vaughan will get to know the city and its affairs and needs as well as his predecessor.

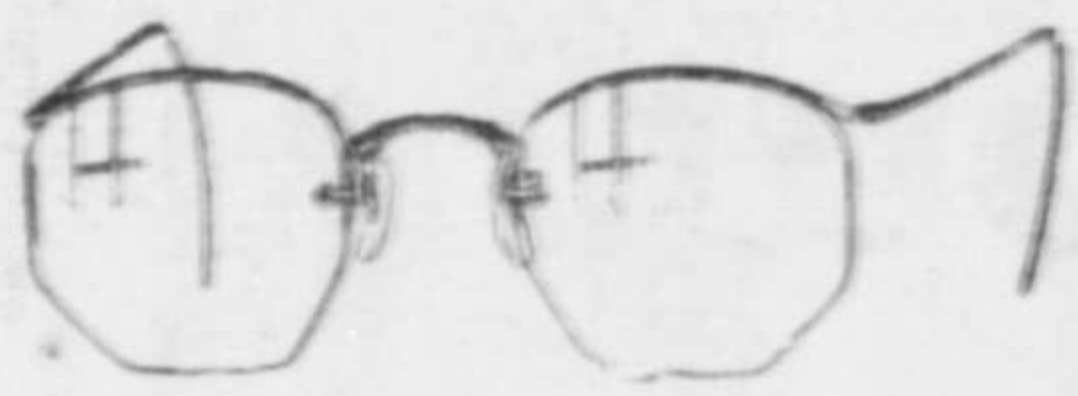
