Japanese Ambassador Feels Happy

ADVOCATES TOTAL WAR

Canadian Legion to Organize Demonstration of Public Opinion Here.

The Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League at an executive meeting last evening made preliminary plans for organizing a demonstration of public opinion to support the Legion's request to the Dominion Government for an immediate implementation of a policy of "total war."

A "total war" request was presented in detail to the prime minister of Canada by the Dominion executive council of the Canadian Legion on Oct. 21 of this year. Twenty-one points stated in unmistakable language and irrefutable logic the necessity for "total war."

There was a considerable amount of Legion business disposed of at last night's meeting. Applications for membership were considered. Letters of thanks were received from individuals and organizations that the Legion had been able to assist.

War News

BATTLE FOR CAUCASUS

LONDON—A fierce battle between German and Russian air forces for supremacy over two-mile wide Kerch Strait, separating Crimea from the Caucasus, is apparently the Nazis' next major goal in southern Russia.

CHURCHILL TELLS OF RUSSIAN AID

LONDON—Prime Minister Winston Churchill told the House of Commons today that co-operation between Great Britain and Russia was as close as "geographical and other conditions allow."

FRANCE AND NAPLES BOMBED

LONDON—Strong Royal Air Force formations roared high across the channel today to attack targets in northern France. Waves of British planes bombed Naples again last night, causing considerable damage which officials in Rome claimed was "not serious."

GERMAN ACE IS KILLED

BERLIN—Colgen Ernest Udet, aged 45, German flying ace of the last war and quarter-master general of the Nazi air force in this war, was killed in an accident yesterday while testing a new weapon, it was announced.

BROUGHT TO PORTO RICO

German Masquerade Ship Taken By United States Navy Into San Juan

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Nov. 13.—The German motorship freighter Odenvold, which was captured by a United States cruiser in the Atlantic while flying the American flag, has been brought here.

Car Drops Into Trench; Man Has His Head Hurt

A Chinese grocery truck, driven by Chin John, about 5:30 last evening crashed into a pipe line trench on Second Avenue and First Street, the front wheels passing over but the rear ones dropping into the excavation.

Iraq Breaks Off Relations, Axis

BAGDAD, Nov. 13.—Iraq has severed diplomatic relations with Japan and Vichy France.

Axis Raider In Pacific

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.—An enemy raider is reported to be operating in the Pacific Ocean north from the Canal Zone. British and American naval vessels are pursuing.

CANADA'S EXPORTS

Shipments to Russia Made in October—Also Increase to United Kingdom.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13.—Canada's exports to Russia this October totalled \$1,035,000, whereas in the same month last year they were practically nil.

Exports to the United Kingdom this October totalled \$45,500,000 or two million dollars in excess of the same month last year.

AGES ARE CUT DOWN

Canada's War Chiefs Henceforth Must Be Younger Men, It Is Ruled

OTTAWA, Nov. 13.—In future no major-general may be appointed to the Canadian army over the age of 53 and retirement will be mandatory at 57.

COL. PECK'S FAREWELL CITY GETS MORE NOW

To Receive Twenty Instead Of Ten Percent Of Gross On Long Distance Calls

Under a renewed agreement between the City of Prince Rupert and the Northwest Telephone Co. the city will receive twenty percent of the gross receipts of long distance telephone business handled through the municipal telephone department instead of ten percent received heretofore.

BIG STRIKE NOW CALLED

John L. Lewis Throws Down Gauntlet to President Roosevelt.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, has called 50,000 coal mine workers into strike, defying President Franklin D. Roosevelt to call out the army.

The president assured congress yesterday that production will continue without interruption. He has resolved to see the issue through.

First Snow At Stewart

Three Or Four Inches Left On Ground Last Evening After Dropping For Several Hours

TOKYO, Nov. 13: (CP)—Foreign Minister Shigenori Togo told the Japanese Parliament today that Saburo Kuruu, Japan's special envoy to Washington, carried no new instructions but intimated that the outcome of his mission would determine Japan's interpretation of her obligation under her Axis alliance.

GAMELIN VERY ILL

Former French Army Commander-in-Chief in Grave Condition With Erysipelas.

VICHY, Nov. 13.—Marshal Maurice Gamelin, former commander-in-chief of the French army before the collapse of France, is critically ill with erysipelas, physicians declaring his condition to be very grave.

PRESIDENT HAS SIGNED

Neutrality Act Amendments Now Effective in United States.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 13.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt yesterday signed the amendments to the Neutrality Act providing for the arming of American ships and permitting them to carry cargo to belligerent ports.

Christmas And New Year Leave

OTTAWA, Nov. 13.—Canada's soldiers and airmen will receive five days' leave during the Christmas or New Year holiday season. As many as possible will be allowed off from Tuesday to Monday over Christmas and the balance over New Year.

HONG KONG, Nov. 13.—Canadian troops which arrived here Sunday are now comfortably settled in new barracks beside the sea. The men are in good health and the best of spirits.

ARE SHOT BY NAZIS

Executions By Germans Reported From Sweden

A recent telegram from Sweden gives the information that Karl Engen, carpenter, Ernst Hekkersrud, mechanic, Johan Olsen, miner, Sverre Helmersen, fireman, and Sverre Rodaas and Bjorne Langseth, laborers, have been sentenced to death and were shot.

It is also reported that shipowner Thomas Fearnley, director for Snaasen Sanatorium, Arnt Njargel, Oskar Jonassen, Lillehammer, and a former member of the cabinet, Asbjorn Lindboe, have been arrested by the Germans. The new "Quisling" Fylkesmand i Finmark, a former lawyer without any legal business, had to be arrested recently for drunkenness. The so-called "Peoples Court" has sentenced a Norwegian laborer to six months in jail.


In romantic interest, the glorious history and coming importance of the army much outranks the fine but necessarily restricted activities of the others.

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
