Daylight Saving To Be Resumed Tonight, Much To Relief Of Many Local People

At midnight tonight daylight saving time, which has proven unpopular among not a few Prince Rupert people owing to the confusion it has caused because of non-conformity, will be discontinued and tomorrow, after setting the clocks back one hour, all will be operating uniformly on Pacific Standard time again.

Daylight was put into effect this year ostensibly to speed up war industries but it was only partially adopted.

The feeling here is that there might not be much objection if the change were made universal but, if it is only going to be partial, standard time might as well be retained and the industries, if the capital of Hunan Province necessary, just start their work one hour earlier.

Germany is short of such essentials as gasoline, lubricants, many metals, textiles and fats.

Germany has worked wonders with her economy of ostitution and use of synthetic products, but the substitution and use of synthetic products, but the methods employed are very wasteful.

The democracies are making enormous speed in turning their aluminum, copper, nickel and steel into ships ,tanks and airplanes.

The British nation and United States are now approaching the combined airplane output of Germany, Italy and the rest of Europe. A year from now the

United States' output should reach 4,000 planes a month. Air crew training plans of the Empire and United States for the current year will turn out four times as many trained pilots, navigators and gunners as Germany can expect to turn out.

While Germany and Italy lead in the number of submarines and warplanes in commission, in all other naval vessel the democracies lead and Britain and the United States are both building at a prodigious rate.

The democracies control the major materials of war such as coal, iron, copper, cotton, oil and rubber.

Hitler has long been accumulating war supplies, but the lead is being taken from him and very soon the vast increase in supplies and the ability to use them will place the democracies in a much more favorable position.






