CITY HAS DROPPED THOSE CONTRACT APPEALS

Late C. M. Hays Died Alone, Faithful to His Life-work's Latest Charge---Remarkable and Pathetic Details of the Last Lingering Struggles for Life Gained from the Gleaners of the Sea's Sad Harvest---Search for the Titanic's Dead Still Continues

(Special to Daily News.)
Halifax, May 7.--On C. M. Hays' body were found the estimates for the future construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific. Vice-President Kelly has received these. Of the bodies buried at sea, one has been identified as another fireman. C. M. Hays' body was found several miles from any other. The Mackay-Bennett brought in 190 bodies, the Minia 15, making a total of 205. Of these 137 have been shipped abroad or buried at Halifax, leaving 68 still at the morgue.

COUNCIL TO INQUIRE INTO ISOLATION SHACK DEATH

Suggestion That Recent Fatal Case of Measles Was Aggravated by the Non-draught Proof Nature of the Building Demands Investigation---Hospital House Committee Chairman "Washes Board's Hands" of all Responsibility Over Contagious Cases Sent in by the City

An investigation into the circumstances of the death of a young man, a city patient, from pneumonia, following measles, after isolation in the temporary fever shack at the General Hospital, will be held by the whole council on Friday night. The words of Ald. Clayton on this matter last Monday night had evidently gone home to mayor and council, and every member of the council is anxious that full information bearing on this young man's death shall be obtained and made absolutely public in the interests of the General Hospital, as well as of the community at large.

The matter was re-opened last night by the bringing in of a report by Dr. Reddie on this particular case. The Medical Health Officer stated that there had been no neglect, that deceased had had proper skilled attention, that the pneumonia had not resulted from the flimsy nature of the shack, and that patient had been suffering from complications previous to his removal to isolation quarters. At the same time Dr. Reddie recommended that the tent roof of the shack be converted to a shingle roof. He also mentioned that the patient had been removed to the General Hospital building when pneumonia set in.

Again the mayor expressed himself in favor of an investigation, and Ald. Morrissey used some very strong terms in characterising the situation. The more he heard about it, the less he liked it. He wanted to know how much the city was getting in return for the hospital grants given.

Anglo-Latin Trade Exhibition Arranged for London, England, This Year to Have Rich Contributions from South America.

London, May 6.—This year's exhibition at Shepherd's Bush, for which a license has just been granted, is to be known as the Anglo-Latin Exhibition, and it will combine British exhibits with exhibits from France, Spain, Portugal and Italy, and what are known as the Latin colonies of South America.

SAME BANK AS RUPERT'S

The Bank of Montreal Will Continue to Act as Financial Agent of the City of Calgary.

Calgary, May 6.—A renewal of the agreement made last year between the bank and the city was authorized at a special meeting of the Council, held Saturday afternoon. By this agreement the Bank of Montreal will continue to hold the bonds of the city issued last year, which have not yet been sold, and agrees to advance to the city 90 per cent. of the value of the debentures of 1912.

Further, the bank agrees to advance to the city 90 per cent. of the value of the debentures of 1912. These sums advanced are to bear 5 per cent. interest up to the time the bonds are sold. The agreement last year proved satisfactory and the Council was unanimous in endorsing its renewal. By it the city is assured of sufficient money to carry on all required public improvements during the year.

THE DOMINION'S GROWING TRADE

Great Increase in Canada's Trade—During Twelve Months the Exports and Imports Amounted to \$847,372,738.

Ottawa, May 6.—During the past twelve months Canada's total imports amounted in value to \$537,282,607, 342, an increase of \$9,455,768. On the basis of total imports and exports (including foreign produce and coin and bullion) the aggregate trade for the period was \$847,372,738, as compared with \$735,940,560 for the corresponding twelve months of last year, an increase of \$93,432,178.

The duty collected upon imports for consumption totaled \$86,049,865, an increase of \$14,119,543.

Exports of Canadian produce to the United Kingdom for the twelve months totaled \$147,268,630, a betterment of \$12,892,110. Imports from the United States during the same period totaled \$348,478,262, an increase over the corresponding twelve months of 1911 of \$169,534,447. On the other hand, exports of Canadian products to the United States show a decrease of \$5,952,207, namely from \$105,747,370 last year to \$99,795,163 during the twelve months ending February last. The duty collected on imports into Canada for the period amounted to \$86,049,865, an increase of \$14,119,543.

PRESIDENT OF THE G. T. P.

Many Important Minds Are Now Engaged in Deliberating on Hays' Successor, but Appointment May Be Delayed.

London, May 6.—As a result of careful enquiries made concerning the probable successor to the late Charles M. Hays, the Financial Times says: "There is no likelihood of an appointment being made for a considerable time, but when it is made it will be with the full approval of the Dominion government. The desire of the board is to select a present Grand Trunk Railway official who has passed through all grades of the service. It is also quite certain that the position of the new president will be less autocratic than that enjoyed by the late Mr. Hays. Many matters hitherto supervised by the president in person will be delegated to other officials.

"The company's financial policy will in future be a matter more generally discussed among the board than has been the case during recent years and particularly in regard to fresh borrowings.

"Communications which have been exchanged during the past few days indicate that the Dominion government may be prepared to take a more active part in any future financing of the system if it is more fully informed as to what is going on."

Bisley Dispute Settled—the Canadian Marksmen Will Go to England as Usual This Season—Sight Trouble Adjusted.

Ottawa, May 6.—The difficulty which existed as to rifle sights between the Dominion Rifle Association and the National Rifle Association has been settled following a conference between Colonel John Barlow and Colonel Grosse, representing the latter body. They came across for the purpose of allaying the difficulty and it is satisfactorily settled.

A Canadian Bisley team will proceed to England shortly and the announcement as to the commander of the team will be made in a few days, following a conference between the Governor General and the Minister of Militia and Defense. Colonel Barlow and Colonel Grosse will leave for Toronto on Sunday.

FENCING OFF OUR NEIGHBOR

Final Work on Alaska Boundary
Line Being Undertaken This
Summer by Party Now Going
North.

Vancouver, May 4.—The final stages of the determination and location of the international boundary line between Canada and Alaska along the 141st meridian as far north as the Arctic Ocean will be completed this season by a Dominion government survey party in charge of J. D. Craig, a veteran surveyor who is here outfitting for the expedition. Mr. Craig will be accompanied by forty or fifty persons, to be distributed into four sub-parties, to be occupied in various phases of the work. A gap of thirty miles only remains to be determined to bring the boundary to the shores of the Arctic. The surveyors left on the Princess May for Skagway, en route to the polar basin.

Mr. Craig arrived yesterday from Ottawa, accompanied by his chief assistants. Survey sub-parties will be in charge of Frederick Lambert and D. H. Nelles, while the monumenting work will be entrusted to parties under the direction of Thomas Reilly and E. T. Doccoeli. Twenty-five pack horses will be shipped north by the Princess Ena. At White Horse they will be augmented by fifty other horses which were used for the work last season, and which wintered in White River in the lower Yukon.

The Craig party will be accompanied as far north as Rampart House by a Dominion geological survey party in charge of D. D. Cairns, who is now en route from Ottawa. Mr. Cairns will work between the Porcupine and the Yukon rivers, completing the task started last season.

RUSH TO ALBERTA

Five Hundred Settlers in a Few Days.

Edmonton, May 6.—In the last two days upward of five hundred settlers have arrived for various points in Alberta. A large number of them were arrivals on home seekers' trains from the United States and the balance are English and Scotch farmers.

Sixty-five were from the state of Iowa and amongst these were T. P. Welch, W. P. Walker and H. Cooper, who are representing a very large farmers' association in that state, with a view to investigating opportunities for a large colonization plan that their people are interested in.

Mr. Goldenberg is a lace im-

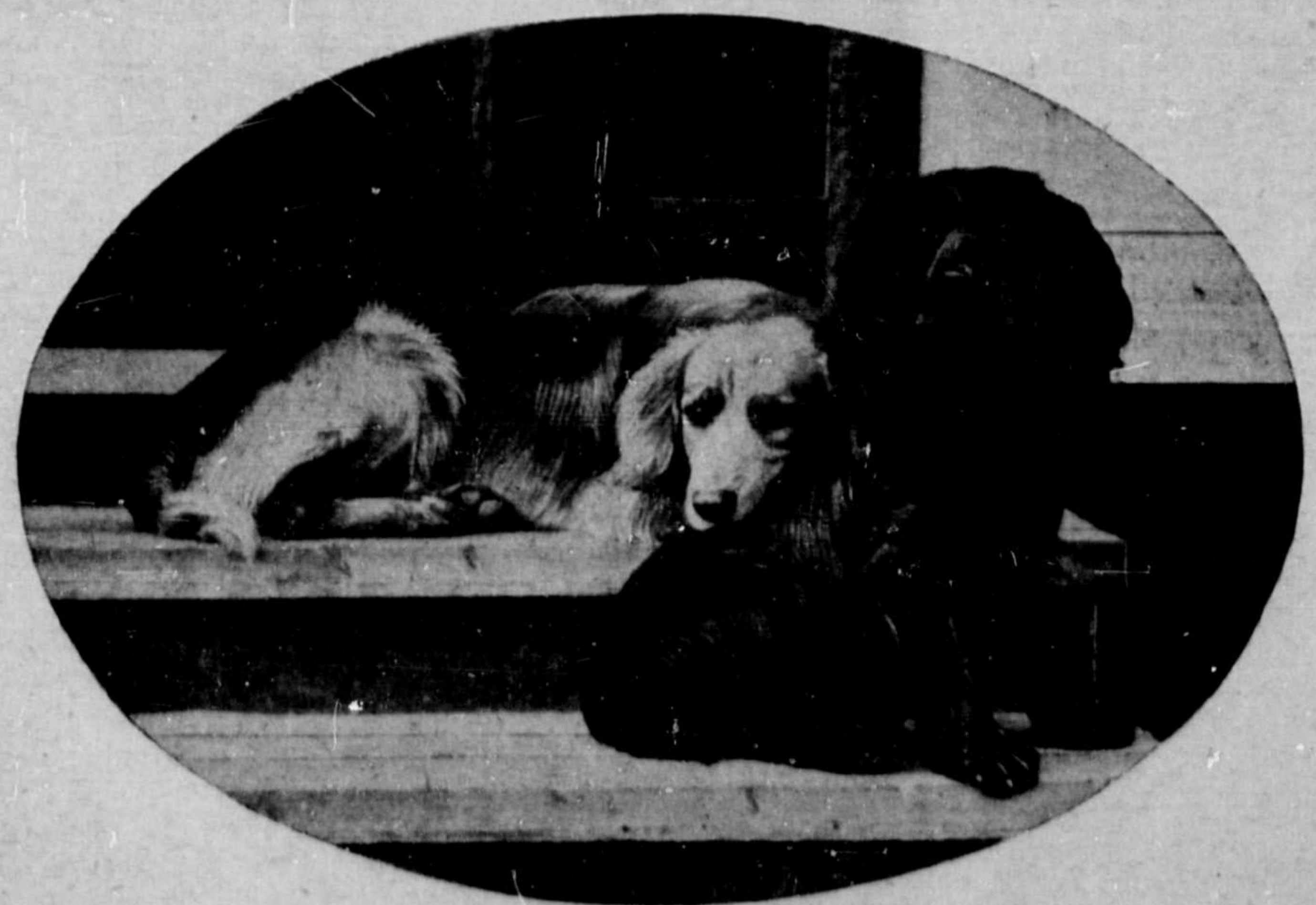

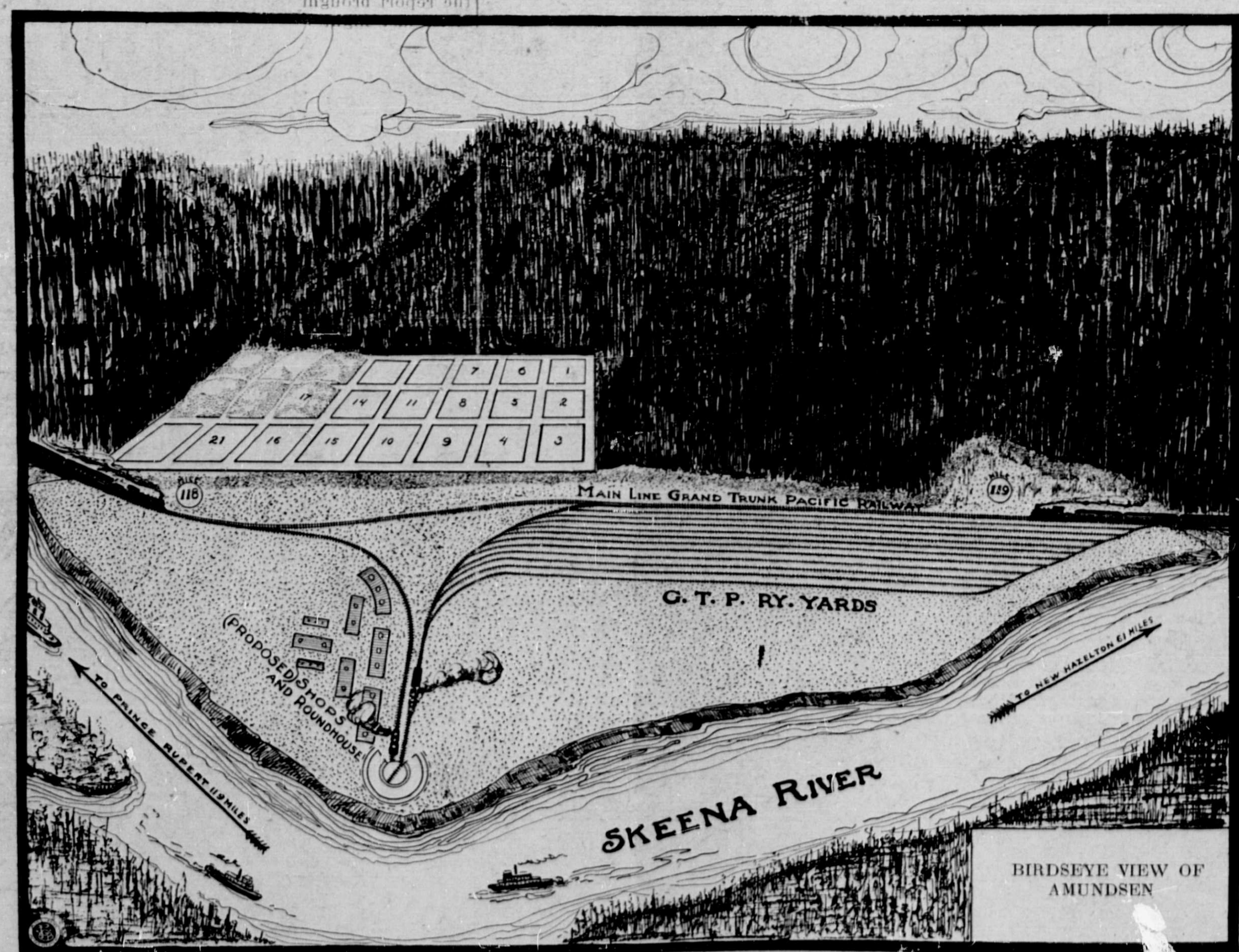
