OF HESS Fresident Benes Says It Was Result Of Dispute As Germans Wanted War Stopped

LONDON, June 24:-The former President Eduard Benes of CzechoSlovakia said in a broadcast to his people tonight that the Rudolf Hess flight to Britain was the result of a six-month dispute among the Nazi leaders over what to do next since they knew they could not defeat Bri-

Benes said that the Hess trip to Scotland was made with the belief that he could persuade the British to stop hostilities.



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# BRITISH ADVANCES

CAIRO-Allied forces today reported "important advance" for columns driving toward Beirut and added that the British artillery already is in action against the Vichy position at Damlur south of Beirut.

## UNCONFIRMED REPORTS

ANKARA-Unconfirmed reports here said that German armoured columns drove 120 miles into Russian Ukraine in the first two days of the Nazi invasion. Reuters dispatch told of unconfirmed reports that Russian cruisers, destroyers and submarines were battling German aircraft off the Bulgarian coast of the Black Sea.

## BLASTING FRENCH COAST

LONDON-Heavy explosions rolling across the Channel suggested that the R.A.F. was blasting at the Nazi-occupied French coast again today after attacking the industrial targets in Western Germany for the thirteenth successive night.

# GERMANY CLAIMS ADVANCES

BERLIN-A communique declared today: "In the East operations of the German army took the planned course with great successes." The opening sentence was only a reference to the operations against Russia but the German news and propaganda agency reported that the German Army had broken through the strong line of the Soviet Bunkers in the middle of the east front after hard fighting. The agency admitted that the Russian air raiders had flown into East Prusssia this morning but claimed they were driven off by anti-aircraft fire. At Helsinki the Finnish Press Bureau said that the German Army had broken the central part of the Russian defence line but did not give details. Helsinki and other Finnish coastal towns today heard explosions in the direction of Estonia and saw smoke rising along the Estonian coast.

Many Nazi Planes Shot Down and Tanks Destroyed According to Russian Reports Given Out Today

MOSCOW, June 24: (CP)-Russia's huge army battling German mechanized columns on the far flung Balticto-Black Sea front, claimed today to have thrust the two invading German forces back across the Soviet frontier. In the first two days of fighting the Red Army claimed the capture of five thousand prisoners, destruction of

three hundred German tanks and the shooting down of 127 Nazi planes

The Soviet High Command at the same time acknowledged the loss of three frontier towns, Brest-Litovsk, Kolno and Lomsa as well as other penetrations into Sovietized Lithuania and Eastern Poland. Reuters dispatch to London said that the German spearhead has penetrated 125 miles into Russian territory in the drive through Brest-Litovsk with Minsk as the next ob-
