While few of these notices have been posted in Vancouver the whispering campaign has been the subject of many warnings by the authorities.

"Not all the spies are in the pay of the enemy. Some of the most dangerous are the unwitting men and women who would scorn the suggestion of treachery. Eternal vigilance on the part of everyone is the price of our safety.'
