Koenig Albert of 24,500 Tons Takes Water at Danzig-Tur- Real Estate bine Battleship of Modern Calibre.

Danzig, Germany, May 6 .- C. The battleship Koenig Albert, named after a former king of Saxony, was launched recently. The present King of Saxony, The Frederich August, was present and made a speech, and his sister, Princess Mathilda, christened the vessel.




