CANADA HAS LOST GREAT RY. COMMISSIONER

DEATH OF AN HONEST JUDGE

Judge Mabee, of the Board of Railway Commissioners, Has Passed Away—Failed to Survive Operations—A National Loss.

(Special to Daily News.)
Toronto, May 8.—Judge Mabee, chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners, died yesterday, having failed to rally from the effects of a double operation for appendicitis. He sank gradually, though remaining conscious to the last. All the leading public men and railway men expressed sorrow at the event, Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways, paying specially high tribute, and saying that Judge Mabee's place will be hard to fill.

News of Judge Mabee's death was received in administrative circles at Ottawa with profoundest regret. Premier Borden thus expressed the feelings of the House and his own: "It is with the deepest possible regret that I learned of Judge Mabee's death. His service to the country was of the highest value and as he was still in the full prime and vigor of life many years of increasing usefulness lay before him when the fatal illness intervened."

"He possessed exceptional qualifications for the position which he so ably filled. All who came in contact with him recognized at once his courage, his promptness, his fairness and his devotion to duty."

INSPIRATION HERE FOR PRINCE RUPERT

The Marvels of Wealth Brought to a City by Resources Behind It ---Brilliance of Buenos Ayres, City of Rapid Growth ---Special Interview With Rev. G. W. Ray

Rev. G. W. Ray, F.R.G.S., speaking on South American subjects in the McIntyre Hall last night kept his audience enthralled with the interest of his accounts of life amongst the savage tribes of the interior of the great southern continent. In spite of counter attractions, theatrical and other, in the city the hall was simply crowded and the lecturer, who is a most interesting speaker, maintained his own in manner which assures him of good audiences wherever he may go.

Certainly the experiences he tells of are unique. Himself, the only white man to penetrate into the depths of the South American interior, he has seen sights, and wrestled against odds which would have made most men quail. He so won the hearts of savages who at first would have killed him, that by and by they adopted him after their tribal fashion and gave him a tribal name weird-sounding and prolonged ad infinitum. He learned their customs, how they bury their old women alive, how they have every third-born child sacrificed by the terrible medicine man, lest the tribe exceed the population limit they set on it, and how they worship with superstitious strange spirits.



Attired in South American Gaucho dress, Mr. Ray aided by his marvellous collection of curios from these parts, was able to demonstrate in realistic manner some of the strangest customs of the people amongst whom he travelled. He showed the murderous methods of the medicine man holding in his hand the very club used by the medicine man to kill his victims with, and illustrated many other intensely interesting customs and practices.

Altogether the lecture was of surpassing interest and those who missed it last night will find a treat in store for them tonight in the further lecture illustrated with magnificent views which Mr. Ray is giving.

When the Rev. G. W. Ray, lecturer on South America, happened to remark conversationally that the city of Buenos Ayres is one of the most rapidly advancing cities in the world; that its wealth is surpassing, and that its population increases by immigration alone at the rate of 4,000 per week, while to accommodate this increase it is necessary in Buenos Ayres to build houses at the rate of 30,000 a year, a Daily News reporter resident in the also rising city of Prince Rupert grew interested.

FINANCE MINISTER AND THE CITY SOLICITOR GIVE REASONS

Explain Why Citizens Should Lend Their Signatures to the Bylaw Petition Being Sent Round—Reasons Set Forth at Some Length for Full Consideration

Dear Sir,—At the present time the rate payers of the city of Prince Rupert are being asked to sign petitions, asking the city council to pass by-laws for the purpose of raising the following sums of money:

1. The sum of \$65,000.00 for the purpose of paying the expenses of improving the electric light system in this city, the expense being largely caused by the introduction of new and improved machinery, and the extension of the distribution of light and power throughout the city.
2. The sum of \$20,000.00 for the purpose of raising the necessary funds to improve the telephone system in this city.
3. The sum of \$35,000.00 for the purpose of paying for a new City Hall, and the furniture thereof.

SECTION 2 IMPROVEMENTS

A meeting is called at the city police station, Wednesday evening, May 8th, at 8.30, to consider the advisability of important improvements at the western end of the city. All owning property in Section 2 or west of 7th St., in Section 1, are urged to attend. Committees will report.

prairie country of illimitable wealth, extending to an area of at least a million and a quarter square miles of level, fertile land. Cattle and wheat are the natural products of the prairie. There are farms there extending a hundred square miles, raising 100,000 head of cattle. Wheat fields of twenty square miles in extent are to be seen there, without a single stone on them or even a piece of wood, but all rich, fertile earth. Last harvest represented no less than sixteen million tons of wheat exported, and this year the farmers imported nine million dollars' worth of agricultural machinery. Great Britain has invested more in the Argentine Republic in six months than she did in South Africa in a year in railroads alone. I am a loyal Canadian, but there is absolutely no doubt whatever that Buenos Ayres is now the most up to date city in the whole world. There are tube street railways, the most expensive system of artificial docks in America, 189 newspapers, one of which has the most magnificent newspaper buildings in the world reserved exclusively for its use, a ten million dollar opera house, and more millionaires in proportion to its size than any other city in the world. It has also very few poor people, and no submerged class. Five thousand ships enter the port in a year and thirty-one million dollars' worth of meat exports alone are handled."

Added to which is Mr. Ray's statement that Buenos Ayres has 300 sunny days in the year, and that it has through proper drainage become "the second healthiest large city of the world."

The story is an inspiration to Prince Rupert, which, after all his travels, this explorer considers "marvellous. The most remarkable example of enterprise in city building I have ever seen. A city with an unrivalled future owing to its position and resources."

being any necessity to assess the property holders, either for interest or sinking fund.

The council of 1911 thought it advisable to extend the telephone system, and this year's council have continued that policy.

In order to completely finish the necessary improvements to the telephone system, a sum of say \$20,000 was required, and it is proposed to raise this by debentures, and this is the object of the bylaw. The term fixed is twenty (20) years. The total sinking fund to meet this is \$707.22, and the interest \$900.00 per year, all of which we feel sure will easily be paid out of revenue, derived from the system without any assessment. It is submitted that it is much better to raise this sum over the term mentioned (than to ask the property holders to pay this year a much increased assessment, or to prevent many people from having the full benefit of the telephone system.

The second bylaw, namely, the city hall bylaw. It must be admitted by everyone who considers the question at all that the erection of a new city hall was an absolute necessity. It was common knowledge last year that the city would certainly have to vacate the premises formerly occupied by them without very much notice, and it followed that a new city hall must be erected. True it is that at the present time the Fire Hall is being used temporarily, but that is only a mere make-shift. The City Council of last year, seeing the absolute necessity of dealing with the matter, voted \$15,000. This Council might, if they saw fit, vote another \$15,000 to complete the building, and say \$5000 for furnishing, and this all without any bylaw at all. If this course was pursued, it would add very materially to the amount to be raised this year for taxes. The proposed bylaw is suggested, (and it must be remembered that it is only a suggestion), would spread the cost of this building and furniture over its probable life, which is put for the purpose of the bylaw at fifteen years. The total cost of sinking fund an interest for this would be, sinking fund, \$1813.00 a year; interest, \$1575.00 a year, and the question is whether it is not better as a matter of business and common sense to spread the payments over the term mentioned than to attempt to pay the much larger sum during the present year.

The third bylaw is that in relation to electric light.

The electric light system was originally started with machinery, which although it may have been fairly good turned out to be by no means economic, particularly the cost of fuel appeared to be excessive, more coal being used than such a plant should require. In 1911 the question of the hydro-electric bylaw came up and the then city council employed Mr. Ross, of Seattle, a man of very great experience as an electrical engineer, and he advised them that when the hydro-electric system was completed, that there would still be room and a necessity for an auxiliary plant, and under his advice the late council contracted for the machinery that is now here and in working order. The addition of this machinery is making it easy for the city to increase the earning powers of the electric light plant, not only for

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by at least one-tenth (1-10th) of the value of the real estate in the city. Prior to this act, revising the Statutes of 1911, this section would have applied to the by-laws for the telephone and city hall, but would not have applied to the electric light by-law. Since the revised statutes were passed, it probably applies to all three (3).

The petition that the property holders are now asked to sign, merely amounts to a request that the city council should put the bylaws in such a position that the people owning property in the city may have a right to vote "Yes" or "No," on each by-law separately, and it is submitted that every fair minded man should do all he can to allow a full expression of opinion, and by signing the petition, no person does any more than express his desire that the bylaws may be passed for submission to the people.

Having answered the first question as to why a petition is required, we promise to make a short statement, showing why these particular bylaws should be passed. First, with regard to the Telephone Bylaw; the original telephone system which was established before the city was incorporated was taken over by the city shortly after its incorporation, and a bylaw was passed in 1910 to raise \$40,000 for the purpose of establishing the system, and this bylaw was duly petitioned for and passed by the people. The telephone system has been a paying concern, and last year the interest and sinking fund upon the original bond were easily paid out of the income, and no tax or assessment was made against the property holders, and the state of affairs at the present time shows that the Telephone is liable to be, not only this year, but for years to come, a paying concern, and there is no probability of there

CLOSE ON TRAIL OF MURDERERS

Fugitive Indians Spentlam and Paul being Tracked Down by Trained Sleuths -- Further Outrages Feared--Forty Men Armed and Ready.

(Special to Daily News.)
Ashcroft, May 8.—It is reported from Clinton today that Chief Constable Fernie of Kamloops, and trained trackers are close upon the trail of the murderers of Constable Kindness. Yesterday morning about five saddles and bridles were stolen from a ranch owned by a man named Jones, fifteen miles from where the tragedy took place. Trackers have been able to trace the foot steps of the murderers and since yesterday morning have been following the trail directly from where the murderers left the barn. Chief Fernie has with him fourteen men who have been trained for this work, and should be able to run down the desperadoes in reasonable time. In all about 40 men are in readiness in different localities to waylay Spentlam and Paul should they make their appearance within a radius of 50 or more miles from Clinton. Great excitement prevails throughout this and the northern districts as it is possible that these desperate men will commit other crimes before being captured or shot.

Koenig Albert of 24,500 Tons Takes Water at Danzig—Turbine Battleship of Modern Calibre.

Danzig, Germany, May 6.—The battleship Koenig Albert, named after a former king of Saxony, was launched recently.

The Koenig Albert is practically identical with the battleship Kaiser, Kaiserin and Frederich der Grosse. It has a tonnage of 24,500 and is armed with ten twelve inch and fourteen six inch guns.

The ship's turbines are constructed for the consumption of coal or oil. She has five turrets, three of which are in the centre line fore and aft and the other two amidships.

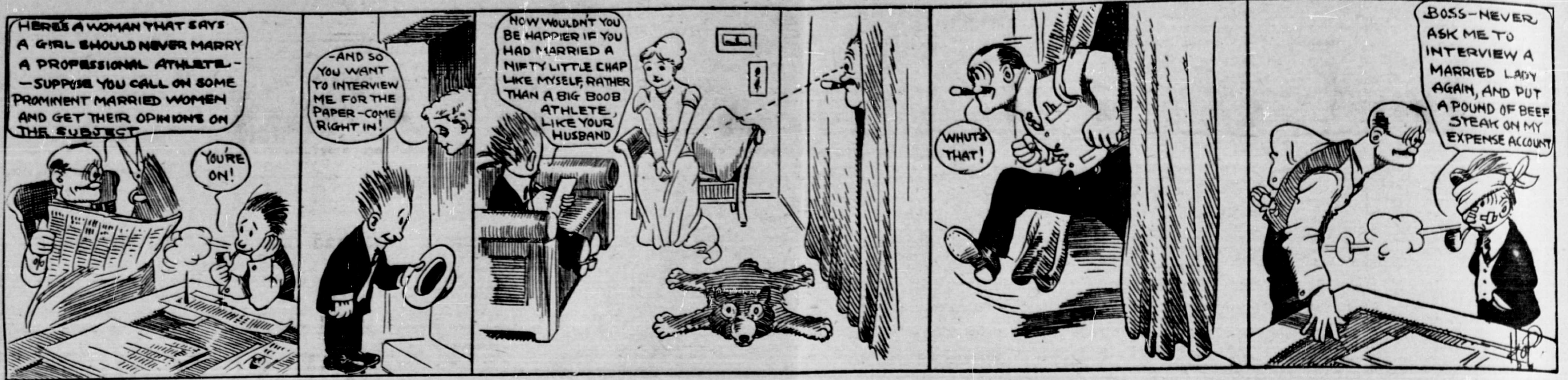

electric light, but also for the supply of small power plants, and the system is now carrying not only a night but a day load.

To pay for these increased advantages, which will always be necessary, the present sum of \$66,000 is required, which will pay for the necessary extension of pole and wire.

The city is advised by its electric engineer, Mr. Mathews, that a revenue sufficient, after paying all running expenses, will be realized to pay both sinking fund and interest on this new loan, and also on the old loan, which was previously made. We might state at this point that the system is now on a paying basis. Further that the city has applications for many new customers. It is proposed to issue debentures for twenty years. The total sinking fund for this new issue will be \$2333.00; the total interest will be \$2970.00. The estimated gross revenue is \$50,000 a year, which will, we are advised, after paying all expenses, easily pay sinking fund and interest.

Generally with regard to the three bylaws, we would point out that with regard to the electric light, and the telephone bylaws, it is hardly probable that any assessment will ever have to be made, and that with regard to the city hall, its erection is an absolute necessity and it is only fair that the expense should be spread, and not all paid by the people in one (1) year.
