REDS HOLDING FIRM

MOSCOW, Oct. 16: (CP)—Russia indicated today that the Red Army was holding its lines firm against a steady stream of fresh German units after yielding ground at one sector in the all-out battle for Moscow. A mid-day Russian communique announced that the Red Army was continuing to fight along the whole front.






