But there seems little doubt about it now. The BBC recently extended its facilities to the Daily Mirror's County Derry Irishman, William Connor-who, as "Cassandra," has figuratively sent his verbal Celtic fangs into persons of high and low estate when he has thought a case was worth his journalistic attention. Here is Connor's comment:

"I have to tell you . . . of a rich man trying to make his last and greatest sale, that of his country. It is a sombre story of self-respect, honor and decency being pawned to the Nazis for the price of a soft bed in a luxury hotel. It is the record of P. G. Wodehouse, ending 40 years of moneymaking fun with the worst joke he ever made in his life....

"Mr. Wodehouse, you said the other day that you were quite unable to work up any kind of belligerent feeling about this war? Do you know Dulwich, Mr. Wodehouse? It is the suburb of London where you went to school . . . After a bombing near me, under 50 tons of rubble, lay human beings . . . You should have been there, Mr. Wodehouse, you with your impartiality, your reasonableness, and perhaps even one of your famous little jokes."

It was natural that Connor's all-out acid throwing, in contract with the BBC's customary drawing-room argument, brought forth protests and commendation. But to those who utterly disagreed with him, Connor-who plays a mouthorgan for inspirational aid-let fly with this in his Daily Mirror column: "I have never been so pleased over anything in my life . . . The BBC is anathema to me . . . There are Americans who still think English people are Bertie Woosters calling each other 'Milord' and I thought the Wodehouse broadcasts would be very helpful to people like Burton Wheeler."

And those who know their Berlin will understand that, despite danger from Royal Air Force raids, life at the once internationally-popular Hotel Adlon, where Wodehouse is housed, is vastly different from rotting in the hells of Dachau and Sachsenhausen.

Y.M.C.A.'S POSITION Editor, Daily News:

Having read an editorial headed Y.M.C.A." in a local paper, I would numbly attempt to reply.

Whether in peace or in war, it is of vital importance to the Y.M.C.A. to gain as many friends and as wide, and sympathetic a public understanding of its activities as is humanly possible, since, without these, no organization can continue to do its best work, however high its ideals, however efficient its management, however effective its operation.

At the outbreak of war, the Y. M.C.A. offered its services to the Dominion government and the offer was accepted. What is known as the National Council of Y.M.C.A.'s of Canada War Services Committee was promptly formed with Major J. W. Beaton as senior secretary. This committee has the ideals and guidance of the Y.M.C.A., its books are audited by both the Y.M.C.A. and the Dominion government and it derives its income along with the Salvation Army, Canadian Legion, Knights of Columbus, Y.W.C.A. and the I.O.D.E. from the United Services Drive. The Y. M. C. A. proper does not get any part of these funds but donates its services in cities where they are already established to further the work of the YM.C.A. War Services. All capital expenditures of the War Services Committee must first be passed on by the Dominion government.

The following letter received by a ady in Montreal from her sister in Dorothy. Sectland tells of conditions:

My dear Sister:

Many thanks for your letter. am pleased to say that we are all 105 St. James St., Montreal, or any O.K. As you can see by above address we are in Scotland. We came here after four months of "hell." luctions.) We were not bombed out, but had the two houses either side of us demolished. We had incendiary bombs on the roof, but, fortunately. we were able to put them out, but the ceiling, windows, roof, etc. were all damaged, but the worst was that we had the sewer in the house three feet deep and typhoid broke out. I managed to get the two children to Scotland and we escaped, but tell ! Percy that Ted, a friend of ours, has been dangerously and seriously ill for four months from the typhoid. He is now on the road to recovery.

I am pleased to say that everybody at home are safe, and Sydney is married, with a baby girl. They are also all right, and although we have got in touch with everybody, it is impossible to say that they are all well. Each night brings fresh raids and tragedy.

When you wrote in your letter, is there anything you can do for me, yes; please, there is. Just look after Bennie and love her all you! can. If you would see the tragedy here, you would love everyone. Two very dear friends of mine were buried beneath the debris for four days before being brought out; two other; friends lost their legs.






