

OTTAWA, March 18.—The housing situation at Prince Rupert is one of the drawbacks as far as fuller use of the dry dock there for war shipbuilding is concerned. The feeling is evident here that Prince Rupert is doing nothing to relieve the situation in regard to housing and the government cannot be expected to do everything.

Olof Hanson, the member for Skeena, is working hard for Prince Rupert. He already has definite promise that the shipyard will be kept busy.

I had an interview with the Prime Minister yesterday and was well received. I am meeting the Minister of Supply this afternoon to discuss shipbuilding at Prince Rupert. Ian Mackenzie was indisposed yesterday but, if he is down today, I shall meet him before leaving for home tonight.

Yesterday I lunched with Olof Hanson and several other British Columbia members. I also had talks with Senator J. H. King, Speaker J. A. Glen, Senator William Duff, the Leader of the Opposition and a number of prominent members.

I expect to arrive home Saturday night.

With so many soldiers stationed in the city, the need for such an establishment is being more greatly felt at this time than it ever was before. In fact, a community centre for Prince Rupert seems to be almost developing into a war project idea.

Certainly with the present era of prosperity the city. is enjoying, it should be a good time to raise the funds even though taxes are higher and general demands on the pocket book greater. There are some who feel that there is an opportunity now to bring the community centre project to a successful culmination which would probably not exist after the war is over.

The project is at least worthy of serious consideration at this time. There was never greater complaint than there is today at the lack of facilities here such as a community centre would provide.


