Japanese Are Now Being Stopped

Nazi Catastrophe In Russia

Quarter Million Man Army Before Moscow Is Utterly Defeated

Vast Quantities of Materials Being Abandoned by Germans in Their Disorderly Retreat Over Frozen Plains—Is Greatest Soviet Victory.

LONDON, Dec. 13: (CP)—German set-backs in Russia, typified by Soviet announcement of the utter defeat of a 750,000-man army before Moscow, may develop catastrophically for the invaders, London military commentators said today.

Heading For Mediterranean?

LONDON, Dec. 13: (CP)—A British source said today that the bulk of the German air force, which is reportedly being withdrawn from the Russian front, might be concentrating for a terrific assault on the British Mediterranean fleet.

SALES TAX BEING CUT

Automobile Industry Is Being Assisted To Maintain Price Structure

OTTAWA, Dec. 13:—The form of assistance granted to the Canadian automobile industry, in order to enable it to maintain the 1941 price structure as the price ceiling on 1942 automobiles, has been a writing down of the sales tax, it is learned here.

Some mystery about this matter so far unclarified by the price control authorities of the War-time Prices and Trade Board, has led to reports in Eastern Canada that substantial assistance has had to be given to the motor car industry to permit it to operate under the price ceiling.

The circumstances under which it was decided to grant rebates of sales tax have not been disclosed, but it is understood that motor car production costs have gone up and Chrysler is understood to have installed 1942 improvements that justify a variation of price from the 1941 scale.

NAZIS ARE ENCIRCLED

British Forces Are Driving Westward Through Libya Toward Derna and Bengasi.

CAIRO, Dec. 13: (CP)—British forces west of Tobruk are attacking encircled Axis troops at Gazala, British headquarters declared today. A communique said New Zealand forces had cut off Gazala in a drive from Tobruk and said that other British columns well in the west were causing widespread confusion and destruction among scattered Axis units while attempting to break through toward Derna and Bengasi.

WORKING MIDWAY

No Interruption With Cable Communication Across Pacific, San Francisco Reports

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 13: (CP)—The Postal Telegraph cable department reported today it was working Midway Island without interruption. Earlier in the week Japan claimed it had taken possession of Midway, Wake and Guam Islands but it has since been learned that such was not the case.

FOUR DEAD, TRAM LINE

B. C. Electric Freight Collides With Speeder On Marpole Branch South Of Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Dec. 13: (CP)—Four men were killed when a speeder collided with a British Columbia Electric Railway freight train on the Marpole line south of here yesterday. The killed were Arnes K. Aho, Ernest Hillyer, John Dyck and Steve Porkyo.

TRANSPORT WIPED OUT

4000 Japanese and Their Boats, Enroute to Malaya, Smashed By Netherlands Submarines.

BATAVIA, Dec. 13: (CP)—Netherlands submarines were credited today with the destruction of about four thousand Japanese soldiers and four transports off southern Thailand and another naval force was said to have liquidated a Japanese settlement on the east coast of Borneo. The transports were smashed as Japanese reinforcements were being moved to the Thailand front.

Invasion Attempts In Malaya and Philippines Are Checked; Hong Kong Being Hard Pressed

DESTROY ITALIAN FLOTILLA

Three Axis Cruisers Believed to Have Been Disposed of by Allied Submarine Attack

LONDON, Dec. 13: (CP)—A pack of British and Netherlands destroyers pounced suddenly on two Italian destroyers in the Mediterranean and left another burning, the Admiralty announced today. With an Italian cruiser sunk by a British submarine yesterday, an entire flotilla of three Italian cruisers has, apparently, been destroyed.

GAS RATION NEXT SPRING

After Then It Will Be Supplied Only On Production Of Rationing Coupons

OTTAWA, Dec. 13:—Rationing of gasoline will go into effect in Canada next April 1, it was announced yesterday. There will be no gasoline supplied after that date without rationing coupons. Restrictions will be placed on the supplies to drivers of non-essential private cars.

Commercial vehicles will be supplied on the basis of their normal requirements. Donald Gordon, chairman of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, says that rationing of other goods in Canada may soon be expected.

JAP ENEMY TO RUSSIA

Soviet Ambassador to United States Does Not Pay Very Complimentary Respect to Nipponese.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 13: (CP)—Maxim Litvinov, Russian ambassador to the United States, today characterized Japan as "our common enemy" and called the Japanese "Axis gangsters."

Litvinov told a press conference "complete understanding exists or will be arrived at" between powers opposing Axis aggression.

NEW PRICES FOR WHEAT

OTTAWA, Dec. 13:—Consideration of western wheat prices in view of the new price ceiling policy will be before Ottawa authorities this week, it is expected.

The question whether the precedent already established with respect to Ontario soft wheat followed with respect to western hard wheat may be decided soon.

The new price ceiling on Ontario soft wheat has been defined as \$1.26 a bushel, on a Montreal basis, which means an average of \$1.12 to Ontario farmers to whom however wheat growing is a minor line.

The Wheat Board is acting as administrator of prices for the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, with respect to grains.

Spectacular Dogfight Over Manila—Domei News Agency Claims Capture of Kowloon—Better News From Singapore Today.

Sea-borne Japanese troops, which gained a foothold at Lingayen on the west coast of Luzon Island in the Philippines, 100 miles north of Manila, have been wiped out, it was reported officially today as United States fighter planes pitched into waves of Japanese bombers in a spectacular dogfight over the Philippine capital.

United States strength in the Philippines arena of war is gathering strength daily. There have been no new gains and no new landings by the enemy during the past twenty-four hours.

Several Japanese planes were shot down during today's air raids. Fifth columnists, who are said to have fired red flares to attract the enemy bombers, are being rounded up.

A Domei broadcast dispatch from Saigon, French Indo-China, asserted that British troops defending Hong Kong had withdrawn from the first line of defence following Japanese capture of Kowloon on the mainland facing the British naval base.

In London authoritative quarters acknowledged that British troops might have withdrawn from Kowloon but said there was no confirmation of the Japanese claim that Kowloon had been occupied.

Chinese declared today that their troops had recaptured Senehuan, strategic point north of Hong Kong, in hard efforts to relieve pressure on the British Hong Kong garrison.

Royal Air Force reinforcements are being sent both to Malaya and Hong Kong.

At Washington the War Department reported that the Japanese had bombed Cebu in the Philippines and said "the enemy plan is now clearly revealed as an attempt to secure improvised air bases outside the area encompassed by our ground defences."

Tonight's British communique from Singapore indicated that Japanese invasion of upper and middle British Malaya had been checked.

Bulgaria Declares War on Gt. Britain And States-Berlin

BERLIN, Dec. 13:—The Berlin radio says that Bulgaria has declared war on Great Britain and the United States. Last month Great Britain severed diplomatic relations with Bulgaria.

Blackouts Now Suspended

SEATTLE, Dec. 13:—Blackouts in Washington and Oregon are being discontinued indefinitely, civilian defence authorities announced yesterday.

Xmas Shopping Rush Expected

VANCOUVER, Dec. 13:—Vancouver merchants are preparing for a real rush of Christmas business. Shopping had been slowed down owing to the blackout at the first of the week.

War News

DARING LIBYAN EXPLOIT ALEXANDRIA—Sweeping within point blank range, a British cruiser heavily shelled Derna on the Libyan coast in a daring surprise attack yesterday and safely emerged from one of the biggest dive-bombing assaults since Crete. Axis shipping and harbor installations were heavily damaged. Meanwhile, the British forces on land are steadily moving forward against the Axis west of Tobruk. A point fifty miles west of Tobruk has now been reached.

AIR ATTACK ON MANILA MANILA—There has been a fierce air attack on Manila and Nichols air field beyond but the American military authorities state that damage has not been serious, defences proving effective. Japanese forces have been landed on Luzon Island, but the situation is well in hand.

MALAYA AND HONG KONG SINGAPORE—Japanese forces landing on north Malaya are engaged in fierce fighting through the jungle with the British defenders. At Hong Kong, according to Japanese claims, the defences have been penetrated a distance of fifteen miles.

SECOND ITALIAN CRUISER SUNK LONDON—The Admiralty announced today that another Italian cruiser had been sunk by British destroyers in the Mediterranean, making the second to be sunk in two days.

CATASTROPHE FOR NAZIS LONDON—British military authorities here predict that the Nazi retreat before the Russians west of Moscow will develop into a catastrophe for the Germans. Berlin itself admits reverses, although claiming that these are only of local character. The second general offensive of the Nazis against Moscow is being completely routed, Moscow asserts, declaring that no less than 85,000 Germans have been killed between November 16 and December 10 with twenty-three out of fifty-one divisions wiped out. Enemy tanks numbering 1434 have been completely destroyed with 5416 lorries, 675 guns, 335 trench mortars and 870 machine guns.

GUAM CAPTURE PROBABLE WASHINGTON—The United States navy announced today that it was unable to communicate with the Pacific island of Guam by either radio or cable and added that capture of the island by the Japanese was probable. There is no confirmation here of reports that Honolulu was bombed six times during the first nine hours following arrival there of Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox.

UNDER PROTECTIVE CUSTODY WASHINGTON—French sailors have been removed from French vessels in American ports. This action has been taken for their own safety. French ships are still in a state of "protective custody" and are still flying the French flag.

R.A.F. IS ON FORAY

Extensive Attacks Made During Night on Occupied France, Netherlands and North-west Germany.

LONDON, Dec. 13: (CP)—British bombers made an extensive foray over the German-occupied continent last night, blasting docks at Brest and Dunkerque and bombing an oil refinery at Donges near St. Nazaire. The British airmen were also over northwest Germany.

Forty Million Men In United States Today

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 13: (CP)—National registration in the United States is expected to reveal 40,000,000 men between the ages of eighteen and sixty-four including 10,000,000 between 19 and 44 who will be liable for military service.

Alarms Are Real Thing

VICTORIA, Dec. 13:—The Western Air Command announced today that there was no intention of sounding any test air raid alarms. No such alarms will be given unless there is reliable information that the Japanese are nearby.

Look At It Again . . .

May we ask you readers to take a second look at the Blackout Rules and Regulations. They are important and should be obeyed implicitly. It is useless to make regulations if some people to whom they apply do not carry them out. Anyone wilfully breaking a blackout regulation and endangering the whole community is a traitor to the country.

Radio Improvement . . .

There is some interest taken in the fact that, while for several weeks the short wave radio reception in Prince Rupert was very poor, as soon as the blackout commenced the radio reception improved to a very marked extent. Stations that had scarcely been heard for weeks suddenly cleared right up and came through loud and clear. Not a few fans take this as an indication that all bad reception here in normal times is chargeable to atmospheric or other natural conditions.

Knocked Business Flat . . .

The entry of Japan into the war and the rapidly following blackouts knocked business flat early in the week. People temporarily stopped buying Christmas presents. They neglected the theatre and buying dropped in practically all lines. Now it means that the stores will have to make up for lost time and there will be a great rush of purchasers to get their usual Christmas shopping done.

The newspapers have felt the hold-back as much as the merchants. Those who require extra help from the newspapers to move the Christmas goods would be wise to give us as much time as possible to handle the business. Shoppers will have to get busy if they are to secure the goods they require. We strongly urge them to lose no time. Should the blackout be enforced again between now and Christmas it will shorten the days and make buying difficult.

PLAYER TRADING

Deals in Big League Baseball Players Reported—Yanks Want Camilli.

CHICAGO, Dec. 13.—The traditional tempo of the Major League meetings quickened today with half a dozen deals closed and several others, including the possible sale of Dolph Camilli to the Yanks, in the negotiating stage.
Overnight the Phillies announced the sale of outfielder John Rizzo to Brooklyn and infielder Emmett Mueller to Montreal, a Dodgers' farm; and the New York Giants bought third-baseman Bill Werber from Cincinnati and sold outfielders Joe Moore and Morrie Aronovich to Indianapolis. The Werber deal is the first move of Bill Terry, front office man of the Giants now, to give Manager Mel Ott a good start.

Bidding for Camilli
The big talk, however, was the bidding of the world champion New York Yankees for Camilli, veteran first baseman of the pennant-winning Dodgers, and the National League's most valuable player last season when he led in both home runs and runs batted in.

The best guess was that Larry MacPhail, Dodger president, was asking about \$75,000 for his prize, even though all other National League clubs waived on him at \$7500. President Ed Barrow of the Yanks was thought to have offered about \$50,000.

The Dodgers hoped to buy Johnny Mize from the St. Louis Cardinals.

One of the important trades of the winter sessions saw Chicago White Sox give Kreevich and relief pitcher Jack Hallett to Philadelphia Athletics for Moses, a hitter who has never averaged less than .300 in seven years in the big time.

Both the outfielders are 31 years old and came into the American League in 1935 and have been on the verge of stardom from time to time.

Browns to Stay
The American League received a surprise proposal for the transfer of St. Louis Browns to Los Angeles, but a short discussion of the transportation and other problems involved showed the owners to be unanimously against any change and President Will Harridge of the American League said no formal vote had to be taken.

Frankie Frisch's contract as manager of Pittsburgh Pirates was extended an additional year to include the 1943 season. No announcement of salary was made.

New York Yankees announced the sale of Tommy Holmes, star outfielder of their Newark farm in the International League, to Boston Braves for cash and a player to be named later.

Joe Louis, Detroit's Brown Bomber, flattened Paulino Uzcundum in four rounds at New York six years ago tonight. It was the first time the Basque was knocked out in 13 years of fighting. Joe is now undisputed champion of the boxing world.

Advertising Up Four Percent

Newspapers Are Being Used More By Retail Trade

CHICAGO, Dec. 13: — Retail newspaper advertising in one week recently rose more than 4 percent from the level of the corresponding 1940 period, Advertising Age reported.

The publication disclosed that retailers placed 24,438,523 lines of advertising in newspapers of 85 major cities in the latest week compared with 24,438,523 a year earlier, a gain of 4.2 percent.

For the year to date, volume amounted to 978,110,381 lines, an increase of 3.4 percent over the year ago total of 945,676,422.

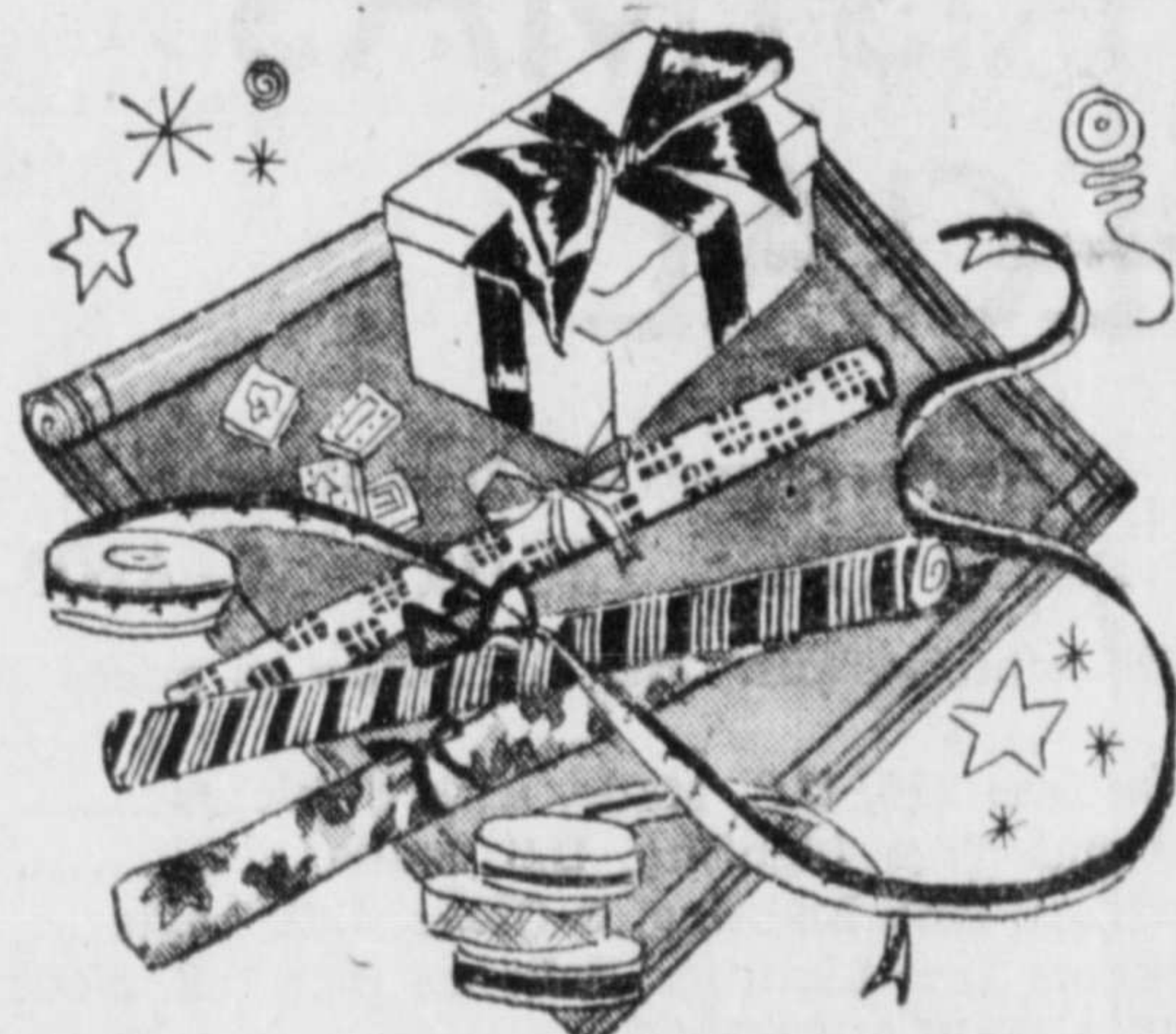

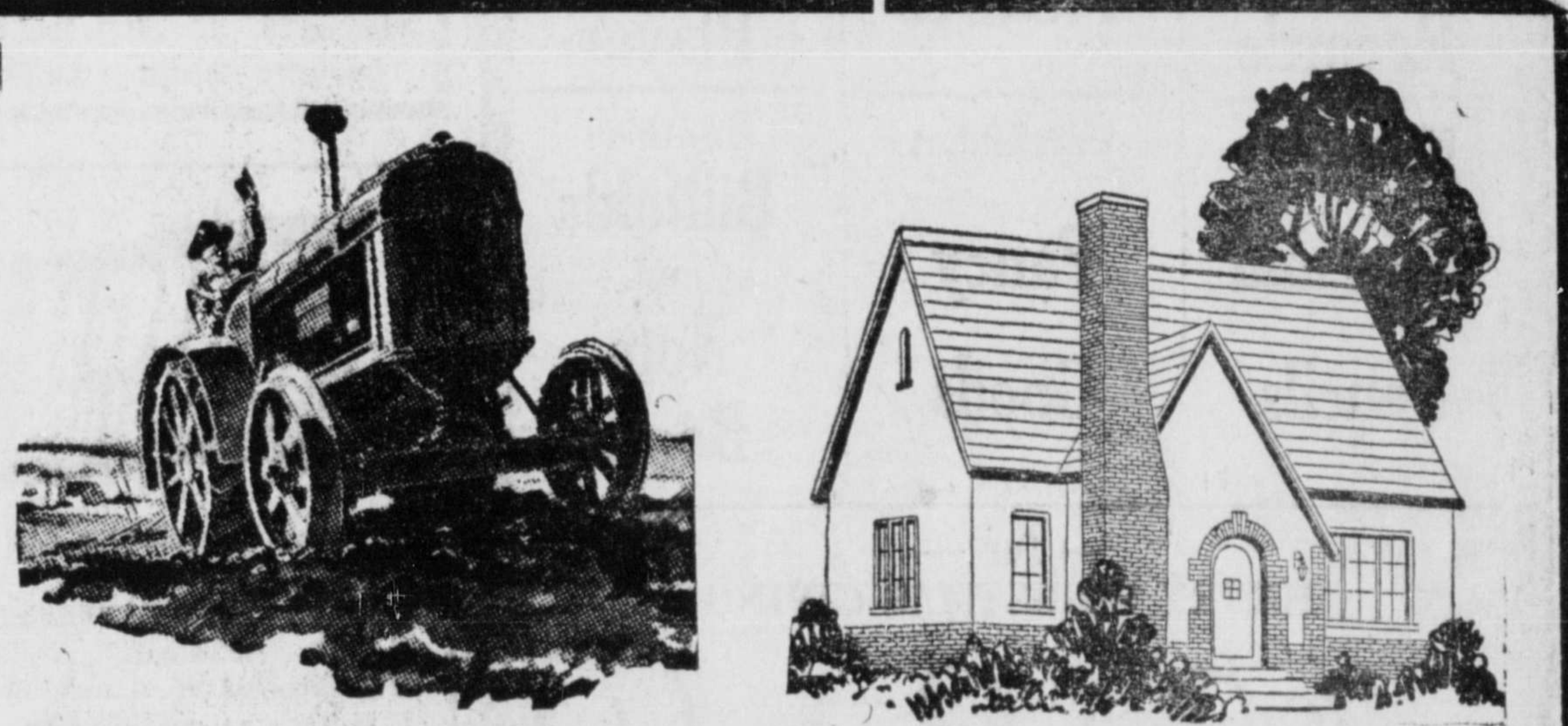

Waterfront Whiffs

Jap Fish Boats Sealed in Harbor—Falling Off in Dogfishing—Herring Now Showing Up.

Following the outbreak of war between Great Britain and Japan this week, all Prince Rupert Japanese-owned fishing vessels have been sealed up tight in Prince Rupert harbor. This has been effected simply by denying the boats clearances without which, of course, they cannot pass the naval patrols. There are about fifty Japanese-owned fishing vessels at Prince Rupert and these have, apparently, all been accounted for. A few of them were out dogfishing when the war with Japan began but it is understood have all since returned.

RED CROSS SHIPMENT

Shipment of Locally Made Articles Sent Forward to Vancouver

Another shipment of goods including articles of clothing for the forces, hospital supplies, civilian defence garments, auxiliary service garments, and civilian garments was made from the local Red Cross workroom yesterday.

The shipment included the following articles:

For the forces—64 pairs of socks, eight pairs of long seamen's socks, 21 sweaters, two scarves, one ribbed helmet, three steel helmet caps, 22 pairs of two-way mitts and three pairs of rifle mitts.

Hospital supplies—three amputation covers, two body belts, 54 face cloths, 36 pillow cases, 156 khaki handkerchiefs, 132 air force handkerchiefs.

Civilian defence garments—six long sleeve sweaters, one pair of ankle socks, seven wool flannel dresses.

Auxiliary services garments—15 laundry bags, one knitted pullover, three pairs of ankle socks, 15 pairs of knitted knickers, four dozen sanitary pads.

Class A articles for civilians made from Red Cross materials—nineteen women's nightgowns, 36 baby nightgowns, three wool skirt and sweater outfits for small girls, eleven children's cotton shirts, 16 children's sleepers, 35 combinations, 20 pairs of boys' pajamas, five pairs of boys' hatching, 53 pairs of girls' pajamas, fourteen girls' dresses, three flannel skirts, six wool sweaters, 8 girls' flannel dresses, 144 diapers, seven pillow cases, two pairs of baby's mittens, two pairs of girls' bloomers, one girl's print dress, one child's wool jacket, four children's cotton vests, eight baby's socks, three pairs of boys' socks.

There has been a falling off in dogfishing operations out of Prince Rupert this week. However, a few boats are still out but they are considering quitting. The Japanese boats are tied up on account of the war and the white boats are dissatisfied with the cut in price.

Herring were beginning to show up in Laredo Sound south of Prince Rupert during the week. Scout boats have located them and seiners are preparing to start operations as soon as the run warrants. Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd. cannery at Prince Rupert has already been canning herring caught on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 11:30 last night from the south and sailed at 6:00 a.m. on her return to Vancouver and way points.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. R. C. McGachy, arrived in port at 2:30 yesterday afternoon from the south and sailed at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

With fish from Ketchikan for transshipment east over Canadian National Railways, Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Coast, arrived in port at 10 o'clock this morning from Alaska. After discharging, she will continue her voyage to Seattle.

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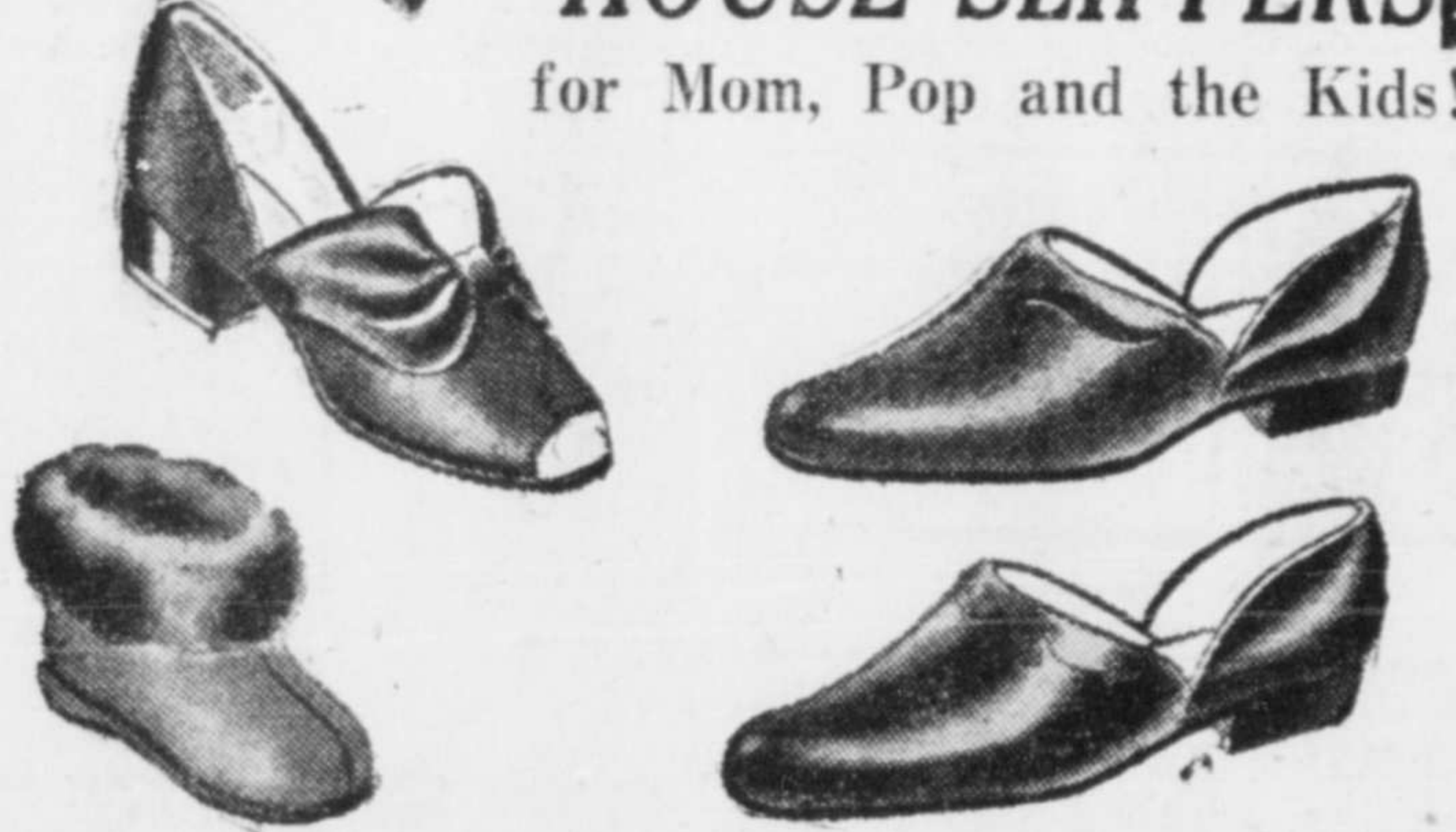

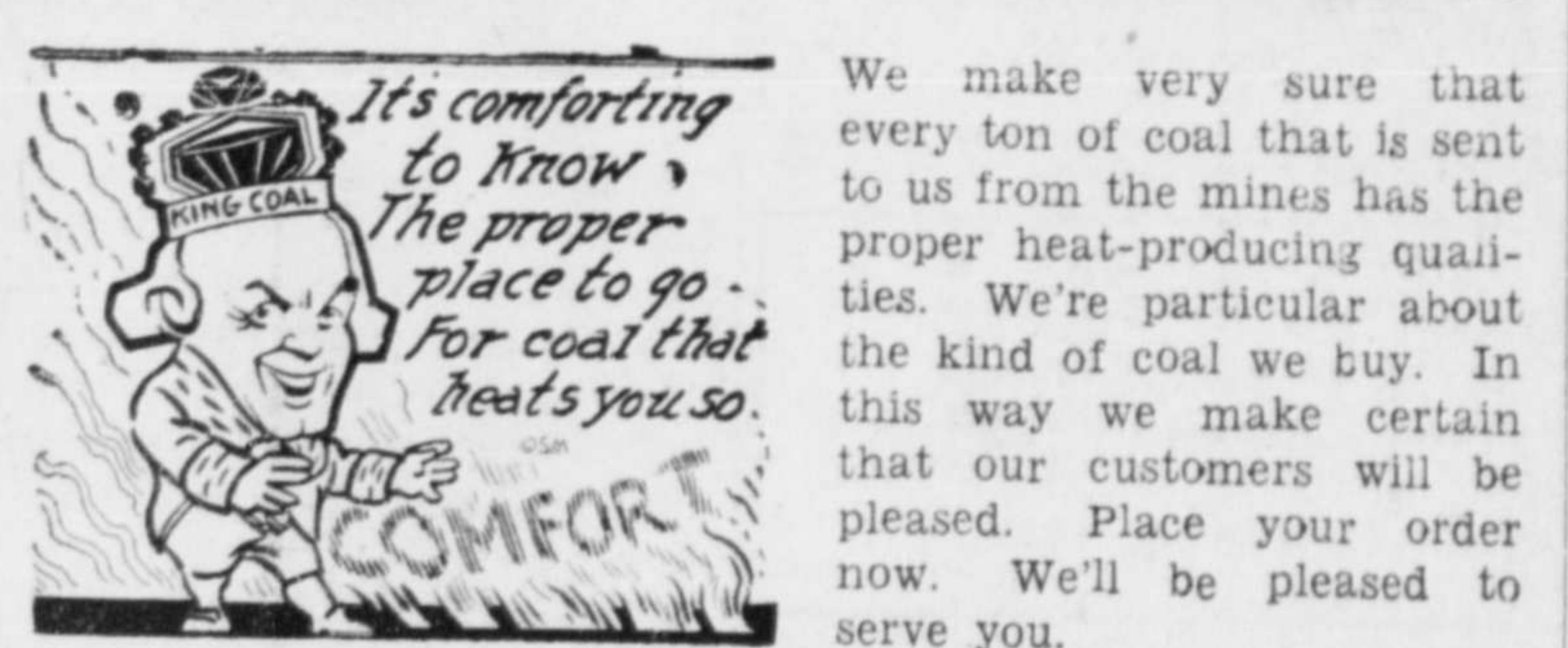
