War News

ALLIES ADVANCE IN SYRIA

CAIRO-The penetration of Syria on four fronts by Free French and British Imperial forces is proceeding satisfactorily. The drive has now reached a point within ten miles of Beirut and Damascus.

ATTACK ON CYPRUS

OSLO- A Norwegian radio broadcast-German controlled -said today that the German air force had launched an attack on the British island fortress of Cyprus in the eastern Mediterranean during the past forty-eight hours.

MOPPING UP ETHIOPIA

NAIROBI -- British forces continue to make favorable pregress in cleaning up the campaign in Ethiopia. Four more Italian divisions have been destroyed or dispersed.

BRITISH NAVAL LOSSES

LONDON-So far in the war the British Navy has lost ten cruisers and forty-nine destroyers, it is officially announced. This includes the losses in the evecuation of Crete.

PURSUING PRINCE EUGEN

LONDON-There is no further word of the progress of the pursuit of the German warship Prince Eugen which escaped when the great battleship Bismark was sunk recently.

FIRST TORPEDO VICTIM

WASHINGTON-It is reported here, although not as yet officially confirmed by the Navy Department, that the American merchant vessel Robin Moore, which was sunk May 21, the Brazilian ship Osorio picking up eleven members of her crew, was sent to the bottom of the South Atlantic by a torpedo from a German submarine. If so, this would be the first American vessel to fall victim to an enemy raider. .The Robin Moore had a general cargo including automobiles, steel and other commodities but no war materials. In addition to a crew of seventy-eight men, she had ten passengers including three women and a child.

LEAVING ALEXANDRIA

ALEXANDRIA-In view of the recent heavy air raids, 40,000 civilians have already left Alexandria and more are going.

WASHINGTON- Former United States Ambassador to Belgium John P. Cudahy is back from a trip to Europe including Germany. He says that the German people are apathetic about the war. EDITORIAL

Germany's Mistake - - -

Possibly Germany has made a mistake in coercing or displayed by the Liquor Control Board or by the Government of France into permitting use of Syria for military purposes in connection with the campaign to try to secure the Mosul! oil wells. Evidently the French people in Syria do not like it. That is why they are deserting and going over to the Free French army. If the invasion continues as it is going the country may soon be occupied by the British.

Most of the trouble was brought about by Admiral Darlan, the pro-German vice Premier who has been influencing Marshal Petain. There are other pro-German Frenchmen in high places in France. All of these people will find they have been badly mistaken if they think they can play both sides.

British Initiative - -

The British have been taking the initiative in the Levant. We speak of the whole country as Syria but there is a group of federated provinces in the Levant. At least one of these was hostile to the British. Most of them were friendly. Considerable pressure was brought to bear on the British military authorities to take the initiative. The reason for not pushing right ahead at once seems to have been the wish to keep on friendly terms with the Vichy government.

Use Of Gliders - - -

Neutral observers in Germany report that the Nazis have 28,000 troop-carrying gliders, each capable of holding 14 men. Two of these gliders can be towed behind a single bomber, and Americans traveling through central Germany have watched from train windows as the operators; practiced landing and taking off with full loads. The principal value of the gliders is that they make no noise. Also they can be quickly and cheaply manufactured. 


