

#### Athletic Circles, Loses His Life.

Peter Laporte, long prominent n athletic circles here, particulary as a baseball umpire, and for the past two or three years or so a transmission line patrolman for the Northern British Columbia out of Falls River, was accidentally drowned in the Ecstall River near Falls River on Tuesday afternoon of this week. News of the tragedy reached the city yesterday afternoon with the bringing in of the body.

Mr. Laporte had brought John Lambie, an engineer of the Northern British Columbia Power Co.'s plant at Falls River, down the Ecstall River to Port Essington aboard the line patrol boat Norbecee No. 1 on Tuesday and started back up river to Falls River with the tide. He failed to arrive there as expected Tuesday night and R. E. Walker, the other engineer, became alarmed. He notified Victor Grant, another line patrolman at Balmoral, and the latter commenced a search. Grant located Laporte's boat adrift not far down the Ecstall River from the Falls River point. He at first found no one on board but, on pulling in a line, he found Laporte's body tangled therein. He took the body on board and proceeded to Falls River from

The chart shows the extent to which Canada will curtail her 1942 output of motor cars for civilian use, and reveals that the restrictions imposed here are proportionately much greater than those which obtain in the United States.

Moreover, whilst U.S. production jumped by almost 30 percent in 1940, Canadian production in that year increased only fractionally over 1939. This year, Canadian production declined sharply and the total estimated output in the U.S. will be somewhat greater than a year ago.

In short, Canadian production has already been greatly curtailed, whereas only in 1942 will the war substantially curtail total production of civilian cars in the United States. Furthermore, in Canada, the number of models manufactured has been reduced from 147 to 79.

These comparative figures, released today by the Department of Munitions and Supply, have been compiled on a basis to adjust the U.S. restrictions, which are based on the model year ending July 31, to the Canadian figures which are based on the cadendar year. The estimates for 1942 are based on the actual restrictions now in effect.
