# British Victory In Naval Fight

## QUIET IN ENGLAND

Has Its Eighth Successive Night Without Enemy Air Raid—Cologne And Dusseldorf Hard Hit

LONDON, March 29.—London had its eighth consecutive night without an enemy air raid and the fourth night without an alarm. Indications are that damage as a result of Friday night's raids on the great German industrial centres of Cologne and Dusseldorf was even greater than had been at first indicated. Huge fires were burning in the two cities yesterday. There were numerous casualties and residential sections as well as industrial areas suffered.

## BEAT OFF HITLER'S BOMBERS

AT AN EASTERN CANADIAN PORT, March 29: (CP)—How a British convoy beat back the challenge of Chancellor Adolf Hitler's newest long-range bombers in one of the opening clashes of the Battle of the Atlantic was described by merchant seamen last night. Five huge Condors attacked when the convoy was three days from England but the merchantmen and armed escort threw up such a curtain of fire that only one escaped. The seamen did not know how many ships had been lost but said it was less than one in ten.

## YUGOSLAVIA UNDECIDED ON COURSE

Germany Continues Pressure In Demand For Outright Adherence

## Compromise Is Not Expected

Even Britain Appears to be Expecting That Country Will Become Theatre of War

BELGRADE, March 29.—While Germany continued its pressure in demand for an outright declaration of adherence to the Axis pact and goodwill towards the Reich, the new Yugoslav government strove today to insure internal unity within the country before giving a final answer to Berlin in regard to future relations. A state of siege was declared by the government today and the people were advised to obey all orders and do all possible to halt foreign elements. There is a section of the new cabinet which has not yet agreed to repudiate the Axis pact which so far has been neither repudiated or ratified. The varying factions of Serbs, Croats and Slovenes present some difficulties. In case of a German invasion some of these sections would suffer more severely than others.

Germany, it was reported last night, had given Yugoslavia three days to decide whether or not it would observe the Axis pact. Unless this adherence is forthcoming, there was a threat that a German military and aerial blitzkrieg would be unleashed against Yugoslavia.

## More Disorders

Street fighting and demonstrations broke out again in Belgrade today between Axis and anti-Nazi sympathizers. High official quarters in Berlin declared that Yugoslavia must act quickly in ratifying adherence to the Axis and internal solidarity or suffer attack. It is assumed, however, that, before launching an outright attack, Germany will endeavour to break up the nation from within by fomenting old hatreds. Zagreb in Croatia appears to be the centre of hesitation about repudiating the Axis agreement. That northerly region, of course, would be the first to be occupied or attacked in the event of war. Neither Berlin or Belgrade last night confirmed rumors that many had recalled the minister to Yugoslavia today in addition to 1,200,000 already called to arms. The Yugoslav government was also reported to have closed the Yugoslav sector of the Danube River to German ships. The majority of the government seems to be holding out for complete neutrality. The cabinet was in emergency session again this morning.

## WAR EXPECTED

The German legation today ordered even German newspapermen to leave Yugoslavia in the apparent conviction that the new Yugoslav government will offer no acceptable compromise to Axis wishes. The British legation is, apparently, expecting the country to become a war theatre as it ordered women and children to leave. Meanwhile, the government, facing possibility of an internal rift with Croat minority leaders, kept Germany waiting for an answer to her renewed demands for a definite written statement of Yugoslav foreign policy.

## ANTONESCU HAS QUIT

Dispatch From Istanbul Says Rumanian Premier Resigns In Protest At Reich Severity

VICHY, March 29.—A dispatch received here from Istanbul says that Premier Ion Antonescu of Rumania has resigned in protest at the severity of demands which are being imposed upon his government by Germany.

## Postponement Of Churchill Speech

Was To Have Been Given Tomorrow Night But Is Postponed Owing To YugoSlav Crisis

LONDON, March 29: (CP)—A speech which was to have been given Sunday night by Prime Minister Winston Churchill has been postponed "for a few days." No reason is given for the postponement but the Prime Minister is believed to be awaiting further developments in the Balkan situation. For that reason his speech, when made, will be of even more interest and importance than it would have been now.

## Axis Ships Make Dash

RIO DE JANEIRO, March 29: Three Axis merchantmen left Brazilian ports last night and early today in an apparently co-ordinated effort to penetrate the British blockade and get back across the Atlantic to their home ports. They were the German freighter Dresden, the Italian tanker Franco Martelli and the Italian freighter Frisco. Three other German vessels have also applied for clearances. All had been in refuge in Brazilian ports since the war began.

## CONTRACTS ARE HEAVY

War Expenditures In British Columbia Since January 1939 Total \$81,205,000

Contracts awarded in British Columbia by the Department of Munitions and Supply since January 1, 1939, have totalled \$81,205,000, Olof Hanson, M. P. for Skeena, has been advised in a return from the minister, Hon. C. D. Howe, filed recently in the House of Commons at Ottawa. Classified the contracts have totalled as follows: Construction of seaplane bases, \$897,000. Construction of land plane bases, \$2,047,000. Miscellaneous defence construction, \$2,186,000. Shipbuilding, repairs and rentals, \$44,725,000. Munitions, \$196,000. Tools and accessories, \$107,000. Chemicals for explosives including minerals and mineral products, \$18,698,000. Lumber and forest products, \$1,439,000. Provisions, \$1,515,000. Clothing and shoes, \$631,000. Other Contracts, \$8,205,000.

## BATTLE IN INLAND SEA

Italian Capital Ship and Two Cruisers Reported Damaged by British

LONDON, March 29.—A British Admiralty communique announced that British and Greek naval units, under command of Admiral Sir Andrew Cunningham, engaged in a running battle in the Eastern Mediterranean and as a result, one Italian battleship of the Littoria class and two cruisers of from 5,000 to 10,000 tons were severely damaged and possibly sunk. It might be assumed that at least one Italian warship had been sunk in the battle. No damage to British warships was mentioned. The enemy naval forces scattered and commenced to take flight on being sighted by the British but some of them were forced into action. The Italian force consisted of battleships, cruisers and destroyers. The first official Admiralty announcement said that British and Greek naval forces had joined battle with Italian warships in the Eastern Mediterranean and, so far at least, one Littoria class battleship had been damaged and two enemy cruisers severely damaged. The engagement took place yesterday and only preliminary reports were available. The Admiralty statement said that operations were "of some importance." A later official Admiralty communique on the engagement said: "It may be assumed that at least one Italian warship was sunk. Further information on the naval action in the Eastern Mediterranean is not yet available but rafts containing Italian survivors have been reported this morning by our aircraft. It may, therefore, be assumed that at least one Italian ship was sunk."

## AIR FORCE REPORT

A Royal Air Force communique told of a sloop on Italian warships in which hits were scored on two cruisers and destroyers but whether they were in addition to the two cruisers hit by Navy guns was not clear. The Air Force announcement emanated from Cairo and said that British bombers had made a heavy and successful attack on Italian warships in the Ionian Sea, hitting two cruisers and one destroyer with heavy bombs. The attack was made by a large bomber formation and later one cruiser stopped emitting black and yellow smoke. First Lord of the Admiralty expressed hope that the Italian warships had been sunk. There cannot be much left of the Italian destroyer fleet now, he said. (Rome claimed sinking of one British cruiser and the damaging of an aircraft carrier and another cruiser.)

## TO HELP HIGHWAY

Pattullo Tells International Commission of B.C.'s Readiness to Co-Operate

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 29: (CP)—Assurance of British Columbia's willingness to co-operate in the construction of a highway linking the United States and Canada was given by Premier T. D. Pattullo yesterday to the International Highway Commission which went into closed session to discuss possible routes and ways of financing the project.

## AIRDROME ATTACKED

Royal Air Force Strikes at Lecce in Southern Italy

CAIRO, March 29: (CP)—Royal Air Force headquarters here announced today that a successful attack had been made on Lecce airdrome south of Brindizi in southern Italy.

## EXPORT OF NEWSPRINT

With European Supply Cut Off More Of Canada's Product Goes South

OTTAWA, March 29: (CP)—Exports of newsprint from Canada and Newfoundland to the United States soared since war began and U. S. imports from Europe "practically ceased." D. S. Cole, Canadian Trade Commissioner at New York, said in a report to the Trade and Commerce Department. Increased exports from Canada and Newfoundland kept up the supply of newsprint in the United States and even allowed an increase of 147,495 tons over the 1939 figure. The amount, however, was 16.7 percent below the large 1937 imports of 3,317,024 tons. Canada and Newfoundland furnished 98.7 percent, or 2,728,685 tons, of the 1940 imports, compared with 2,304,651 tons during the previous year—an increase of 18.3 percent. At the same time, imports from European countries dropped to 33,850 tons from the 1939 level of 310,383 tons. Newsprint consumption in the United States during 1941 was estimated by the American Newspaper Publishers' Association at 2,709,028 tons, a gain of 4.5 percent from 1939, Mr. Cole said.

VANCOUVER, March 29: (CP)—Vancouver assumed a two game to nothing lead in the best out of five game series in the Pacific Coast Hockey League championship play-offs last night by defeating Spokane two to one.

UNITED STATES CONVOYS WASHINGTON—A plan whereby United States supply ships for Great Britain might be convoyed is studied but nothing definite has yet been decided upon.

## GIFT OF WHEAT

OTTAWA—Hon. R. B. Hanson, Leader of the Opposition, suggests a gift outright by Canada to Great Britain of 200,000,000 bushels of wheat as a gesture of goodwill and admiration. Hanson advocates an increase from the fixed price of 70c for wheat.

## UNITED STATES BOMB

LONDON—Scotland Yard is investigating the explosion of a bomb which came from the United States in Mount Pleasant post office.

## ITALIAN SEA LOSSES

LONDON—It is estimated that sixty-five Italian ships have been sunk since Italy entered the war.

## COMPULSORY LOANS

WASHINGTON—A plan of compulsory loans to the government is being considered. This would assist in defence financing and provide a nest egg for workers in case the defence program should suddenly halt. It is likely, however, that a voluntary loan system will first be tried.

## MORE GERMANS

SOFIA—Two hundred thousand more German troops are marching southward through Bulgaria. The British are also reported increasing their forces in Greece.

## ROOSEVELT GRATIFIED

President Of United States Sends Congratulations To Young King Of Yugoslavia

WASHINGTON, March 29:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt yesterday cabled congratulations to King Peter II of Yugoslavia on his accession to power and his resolve to preserve the honor and integrity of his country. The President expressed hope that relations between Yugoslavia and the United States would be mutually beneficial in upholding the principles for which both nations stand.

## RECORDING OF DAMAGE

Complete Plans and Records of London Ready for Day of Restoration

LONDON, March 29: (CP)—To the new National Buildings Record has been allotted the important wartime task of recording bomb damage to famous buildings.

The record is a centre for making, collating and indexing records of buildings of all kinds, including medieval churches, Georgian squares and palaces, Victorian banks and clubs and, in some cases, modern buildings.

"The National Building Record is expected to become a national institution of considerable importance," a spokesman said.

"It will play its part, after the war, in matters of reconstruction and re-development by helping to settle vexed questions of what to preserve, what to rebuild and what not to rebuild.

"It will be of vital importance where the decision to reinstate an old building has been taken. And it will provide for practising architects, students, artists, war historians, historians of architecture and the general public a body of easily accessible information on the architecture of Britain."

A committee drew up a detailed scheme for the establishment of the record and approached Lord Reith, Minister of Works and Buildings. Lord Reith approved the scheme and on his representations the Treasury made a grant sufficient for the National Buildings Record to come into being and tackle some of its more urgent objectives.

Walter Hindes Godfrey, who was responsible for the restoration of many famous buildings, is director of the record. For more than 40 years he has been engaged in a monumental survey of London. He is chairman of the London Survey Committee.

## WARDENS MEETING

A. R. P. Being Further Organized in Prince Rupert

In order to improve arrangements for another blackout and take advantage of the lessons learned from the last one, a meeting of the district wardens, Civil Protection Committee (ARP) was held last evening in the courthouse with Inspector Ernest Gammon in the chair.

Plans are being developed so that each district warden will be the responsible authority at each post. To him all unit commanders will report and with him will rest the final decision when any emergency arises. He will, in turn, be responsible to the central headquarters. In this way there will be a continuous chain of responsibility. The individuals will report to their unit commander, whether first aid, nursing, Women's Service, Corps, decontamination unit, special police, demolition squad, Sea Cadets or Boy Scouts. The unit commanders who will have a nominal roll of their units will check up and report to the district wardens. This will also provide a complete check.

Booklets on training for air raid wardens were also issued to the district wardens and arrangements are also being made to have maps giving essential positions of hydrants, first-aid posts etc. completed. Meetings will be held every two weeks on Friday evenings.

Those in attendance were District Wardens J. A. Teng, G. P. Tinker, H. A. Breen, J. L. Macintosh, J. G. Garrett, Louis Richardson with J. S. Wilson, chief district warden, and Corporal Smith secretary.



## Waterfront Whiffs

**Prince Rupert Halibut Fleet Going Ahead With Liver and Viscera Processing Project—Fish Packer Repairing Here After Salvage**

Having been unable to obtain a satisfactory price from the pharmaceutical purchasers to whom they have disposed of the product before, the Prince Rupert halibut fleet—boat owners and fishermen—have decided this year to process halibut livers and viscera themselves. For the establishment of a processing plant they have taken the premises on the government wharf formerly occupied by the plant of the J. H. Carson Co. Steps have been taken for the immediate purchase and installation of machinery and organization of processing staff. A committee consisting of Capt. Emil Peterson and Capt. Ole Stegavig, representing the boat owners, and R. Akram and C. Carlson, representing the fishermen, has been delegated to proceed with the project. Until the plant is established, the livers landed by the Prince Rupert fleet will be frozen. The Prince Rupert boats will sign up with their own processing organization and will pledge themselves not to sell to outside purchasers.

Temporary repairs to the Vancouver fish packer Great Northern No. 5, which was brought here at the first of the week from Camp Point in Grenville Channel where she had been salvaged after sinking, are expected to be completed this week-end at the local dry dock. The vessel will then proceed to her home port of Vancouver for permanent repairs. The Great Northern No. 5 stranded and sank last week-end while on her way to Vancouver after having been engaged in herring seining in local waters. The salvage operations were carried out by the Armour Salvage Co. with Capt. Reg Green in charge and the vessel was towed in here by the service boat Bentinck. She had hooked on to a large boulder and damaged her forefoot and keel, requiring the replacement of sixteen planks. Before being refloated and towed here she had to be patched at the scene of stranding.

Providing the federal budget contains the necessary funds, the 1941 season's work of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada on this coast will continue as planned, according to John Dybhavn of this city who has been in Vancouver this week attending sessions of the Pacific sub-executive of the board of which he is chairman. Further investigation will be made of the habits and lives of oysters, clams, crabs, salmon, herring, pilchard and other food fish. Handling of fresh and frozen fish will also be the subject of further research. Board workers, particularly at the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, are carrying out a good deal of special work on problems more or less directly concerned with the war and conditions caused thereby. Mr. Dybhavn returned from Vancouver on the Princess Adelaide last evening.

The troller Secure, Capt. N. Rudd, also cleared this morning for salmon fishing.

Union steamer Camosun, Capt. James Watt, is, expected in port tomorrow morning, possibly before noon, from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands. She was at Alford Bay at 2 o'clock this morning. The Camosun will sail Monday night on her return south via the Islands.




