Germans Are Increasing Assault

NEW WAGE REGULATIONS IN CANADA ORDERED BY MINISTER OF LABOR

Living Bonus Principle Compulsorily Extended—Increase in Basic Wage Rates Are Prohibited.

OTTAWA, Oct. 25: (CP)—Compulsory extension of the cost-of-living bonus principle to additional employment forms part of the government's new wage stabilization program as announced today by Hon. Norman McLarty, minister of labor, as he released terms of a new order-in-council replacing order No. 7440. The order also prohibits increase in basic wage rates and provides for the setting up of a national war labor board and regional war labor boards to administer provisions.

TWO DEAD IN CRASH OF PLANE

Two Machines in Tragedy Between Here and Alert Bay—Another In Yukon

Werneke Victim

Inspector Ernest Gammon, provincial police, received the following message this afternoon from Skipper Victor Bond of the police boat P.M.-L-7: "Located both missing planes in Clam Passage behind Salal Island, Milbank Sound. Werneke plane crashed. Both men dead. Crew of northbound plane safe.

The Waco plane, reported missing northbound, was sighted about fifty feet above the water, according to word received by the provincial police today. This would make it appear that two planes might be down in the same area as the Werneke plane which was last seen at Butedale which is not far north of Bella Bella. One theory was that one of the planes might have made a forced landing and the other put down to assist it.

Two planes are now missing on the coast between Prince Rupert and Alert Bay and a third is unreported out of Whitehorse in the Yukon. Search operations have been instituted for all three. Up to noon today, no successful results had been reported as a result of the searching.

The two missing planes on the coast were flying in opposite directions. One was the plane of Livingstone Werneke, prominent Yukon mining man and pilot, unreported since they passed over Butedale at noon Tuesday on their way from Hyder to Alert Bay enroute to California. The other was a Waco seaplane which left Alert Bay the same day northbound. Information received here does not reveal who was on board the latter.

The Yukon plane, a commercial machine, left Whitehorse for a lake in the north. It is said to have been sighted around its destination but, as far as can be learned, failed to land.

Provincial police are receiving the co-operation of the Royal Canadian Air Force and the Royal Canadian Navy in connection with search operations for the planes on the coast.

There has been thick fog along the coast since the first of the week and it is suggested the missing planes may be held down at some point from which it has been impossible to communicate.

According to a dispatch published in Toronto yesterday and purportedly emanating from Prince Rupert, six planes were missing in the north Pacific coast—four

Whereas order No. 7440 applied only to war industries and industries normally subject to the Federal Industrial Disputes Investigation Act, the new order also applies to employers engaged in building trades and employing ten or more persons and every other private employers employing fifty or more persons. It does not apply to employers engaged in agriculture or fishing, to hospitals and religious, charitable or educational associations operated on a non-profit basis.

Employers paying bonus under order No. 7440 are required to increase it on November 15 to an amount based on the cost-of-living index as of October. Employers not paying the bonus must start after February, 1942, on the basis of the rise in living cost from October, 1941, to January, 1942. Thus the basis of bonus for employment now brought under scope of the order will not be retroactive to the start of the war but to the coming into effect of the present order. The order, however, empowers the national board to fix an earlier date for computation of bonus in case of any employer where it finds such action fair and reasonable.

Last minute revisions of the government's order-in-council covering the wages stabilization program necessitated postponement from yesterday until this morning announcement of the details of the plan. Yesterday Mr. McLarty cancelled a press conference on the matter and said he would make the details known at a press conference at 6 a.m. (PST) today and in a broadcast at 3:45 this afternoon (PST).

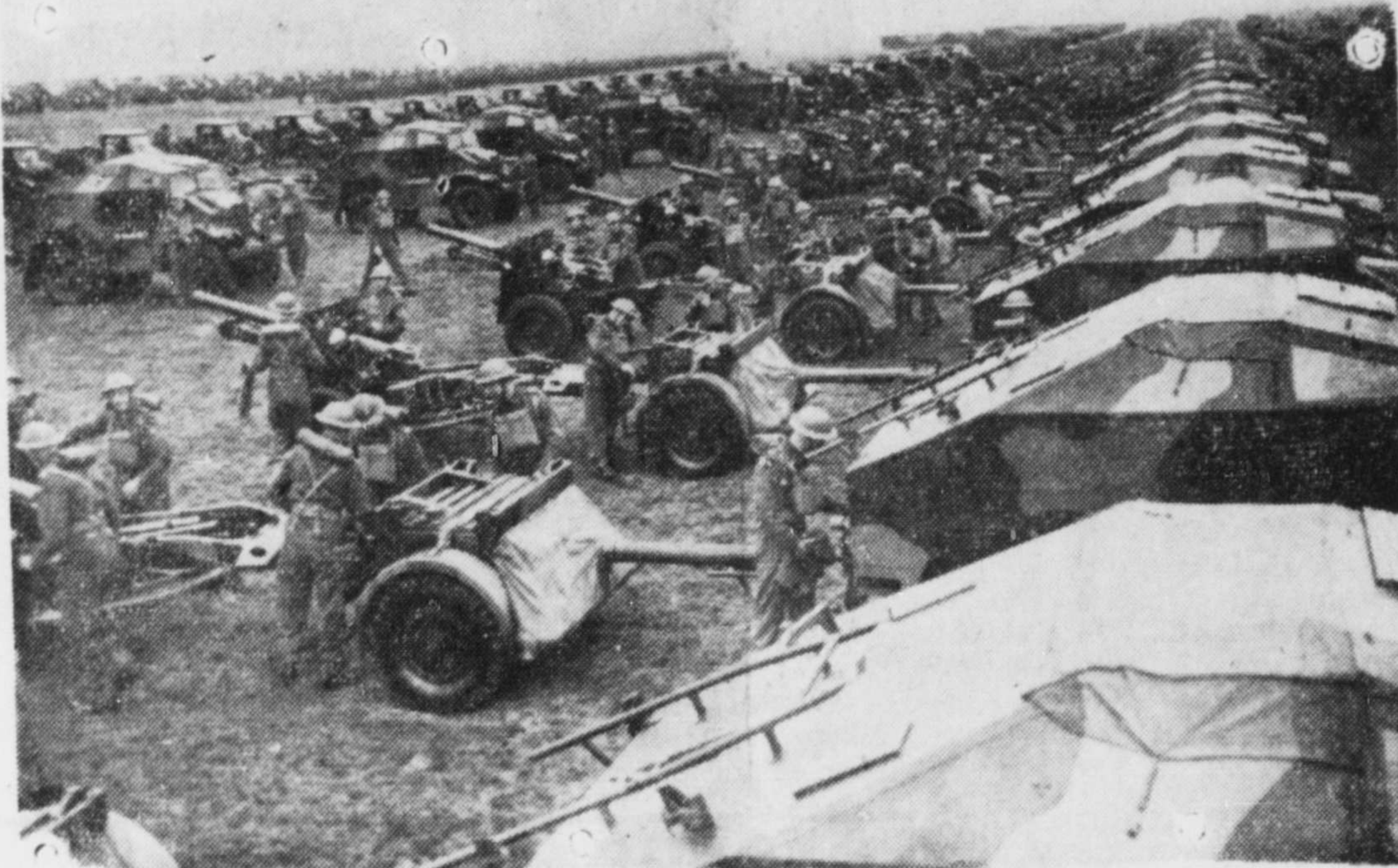

GERMAN OBJECTIVES BOMBED LONDON—The German Rhine-land, a dock in the Nazi-occupied port of Brest and Axis shipping off the Norwegian coast were Royal Air Force targets last night. Seven enemy planes were bagged without loss to themselves by Polish fighters around Cap Griz Nez in daylight raids yesterday.

TO OVERCOME DIFFICULTIES MANCHESTER—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden declared today that Great Britain would overcome many geographical difficulties in fulfilling the "immensely formidable task" of giving promised aid to Russia.

ITALIAN CRUISER SUNK LONDON—An Italian merchant cruiser has been torpedoed by a British submarine in the Mediterranean and probably sunk, the Admiralty announces.

ENGLAND IS BOMBED LONDON—Southwest England towns, where some residents were buried under debris, East Anglia, South Wales and Merseyside were bombed last night by the German Luftwaffe.

BROOKLYN FIRE NEW YORK—There was a three-alarm fire in a Brooklyn dry dock this morning. Two ships were reported ablaze.

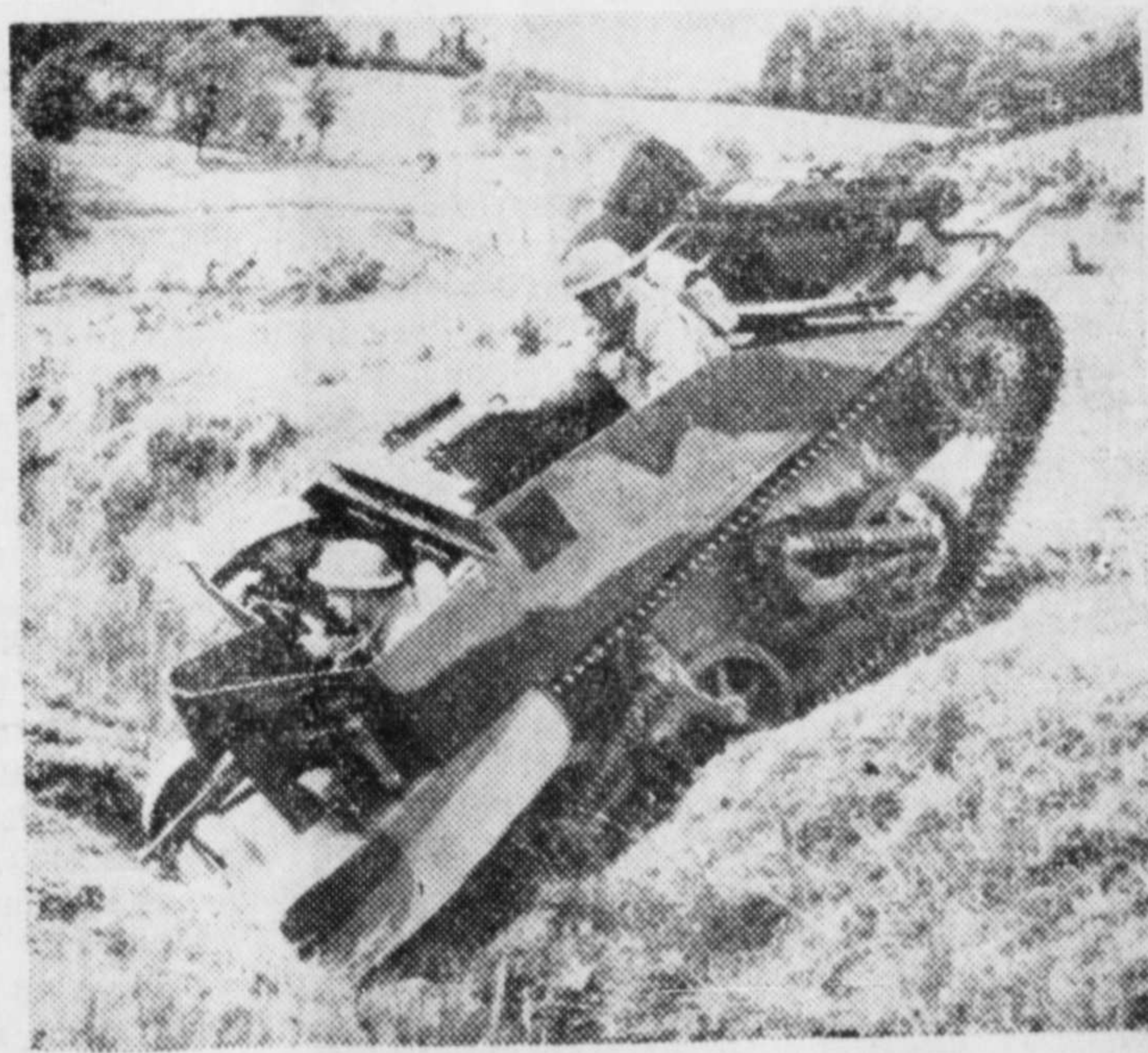

Despite Heavy Losses, Nazis Launch Greater Attack Upon Moscow

Berlin Claims to Be Within Twenty Miles of Soviet Capital and to Have Taken Kharkov, Heart of Donets Industrial Area.

LONDON, Oct. 25: (CP)—Russian military dispatches declared today that, despite loss of 300,000 men in the first three weeks of the battle for the Soviet capital, powerful German forces have launched a new attack along the whole Moscow front. A round-about report reaching London and credited to German sources, being without confirmation, said that Nazi spearheads had driven to within twenty miles of the capital.

FUND IS \$22,100

Other German onslaughts have been launched simultaneously against Crimea and at the approaches to Rostov on the southern front. These were said to have been beaten back by the Red Army with counter-attacks.

The Germans today claimed the capture of Kharkov, the heart of the Donets Basin industrial area, and Belgorod, forty-seven miles north of the railway leading to Moscow.

MAY SAIL ANYWHERE

United States Senate Foreign Relations Committee Increasing Scope of Armed Ship Bill.

WASHINGTON, October 25:—The Senate foreign relations committee voted today to broaden the armed ship bill to permit United States merchant vessels to sail anywhere on the high seas. Opponents of the administration's foreign policy declared the expanded bill would stir up more prolonged Senate debate than the House-approved legislation confined to arming of merchant ships. Consideration of the revised measure will start Monday.

We are reminded by reading a popular eastern journal that when the very Baxter was in Canada recently he travelled five thousand miles, addressed twenty-eight meetings and, during the same period, visited with his wife and family at different times in different parts of the country as they moved from place to place. It was a tremendous job. How many people heard him speak we do not know but most of the meetings varied from one thousand to four thousand people. A great many people did not like some of his statements and others misinterpreted what he said. He was interrupted at least twice by blackouts, yet had to carry on in spite of the interruptions. It was a great tour and, if it went to his head a little, no one would be surprised. Evidently he touched a chord in the Canadian makeup that was appealing in the extreme. We would have liked to have heard him in Prince Rupert.

## Women's Vote . . .

Some years ago we were all stirred by the antics of a few women usually known as militant suffragettes who put on publicity stunts for the purpose of drawing attention to the injustice of not allowing women to vote. Today these antics are forgotten and few people even remember the name of one foolish woman who threw herself in front of a race horse and was killed, thinking herself a martyr to the cause.

Now we realize that the women vote much the same as other people. We are told that 52 percent of the vote is women's votes, yet there is very little appeal made to women as distinct from others voters during an election.

## LEADERS ARE NEW

First Campaign for N. S. Chiefs  
in Leadership.

HALIFAX, Oct. 25: (C)—Men of different generations, the leaders of the government and opposition in Nova Scotia have little in common as they head for an Oct. 28 general election. But in a single major respect they are as one: neither has ever led his party to the ballot boxes of the province.

The span of 31 years separates the ages of Premier A. S. MacMillan, veteran of 21 years in politics, and Leonard W. Fraser, who had held no political office up until a year ago but now leads the Conservative opposition. The premier is 70; his opponent, 39.

The premier has been through four Nova Scotia election campaigns, though never at the head of his Liberal party. It was not until June of 1940 that he became head of the party when Premier Angus L. Macdonald was called to Ottawa to become minister of national defence for naval services. He started off unsuccessfully in 1920, but thereafter was never headed at the polls, winning in 1928, 1933 and 1937.

Mr. MacMillan missed the 1925 general election because he was then a member of the appointive legislative council—the upper house now abolished. He was chairman of the Nova Scotia Highways Board from 1920 to 1924, when he became minister of highways. He held that ministry until 1928 when the Liberal government fell.

Advent of another Liberal administration in 1933 under Mr. Macdonald saw him back in the highways job, which also embraces public works. He exchanged that portfolio last year for the provincial secretaryship which means he is minister of finance.

The premier, a farm boy who pulled himself up by his own bootstraps, is in civil life one of the biggest contractors in the Maritimes.

### Opposition Leader.

Mr. Fraser, the opposition leader, a Halifax lawyer, had his first experience at the polls when he contested Bugsborough unsuccessfully in the 1933 general election. He was president of the Nova Scotia Conservative Association when he stepped into the provincial party leadership Oct. 9, 1941.

The provincial leadership had been without an incumbent since shortly after the 1937 election when Hon. Gordon S. Harrington, former premier, resigned after his personal defeat. Then Percy C. Black, the house leader, left to enter the House of Commons as member for Cumberland.

Mr. Fraser was given an acclamation in Cumberland a few weeks after he became head of the party. He has been re-nominated for that seat in this contest.

To this gathering the men were invited and were glad to have the opportunity of hearing Miss MacKenzie again speak. Her pleasing personality won the hearts of all her listeners. This was her first trip north and after visiting Port Simpson, Miss MacKenzie proceeded south, calling in at Powell River to address the auxiliary there. She was very impressed with the grandeur of the north and hopes some day to again be able to visit here.

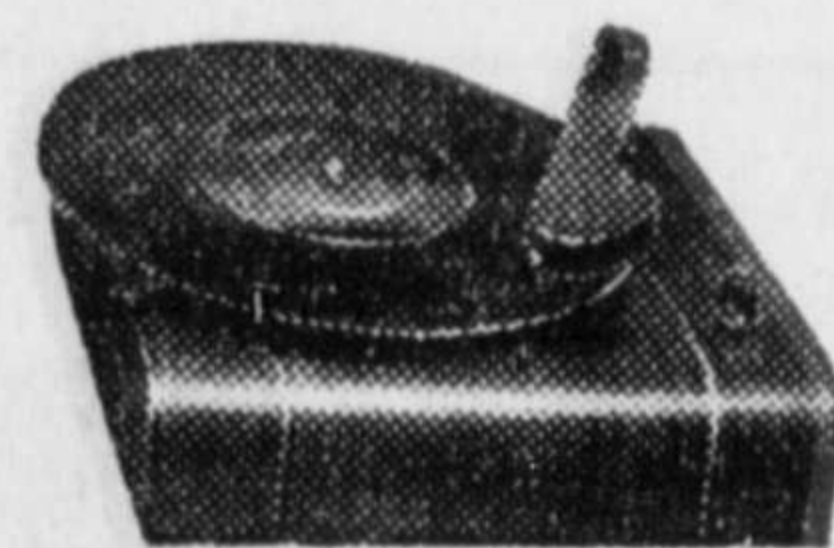

### Waterfront Whiffs

Prince Henry Scores Naval Victories—  
Salmon Pack Biggest  
in Years.

The Pacific Ocean despite its sprawling thousands  
of miles, is "home waters" to British Columbia's seamen.  
With the marking of "Navy Week," under the sponsori-  
ship of the Navy League of Canada, British Columbians  
will be able to mark the Royal Canadian Navy's successes  
in "home waters" with as much pride as they feel for

the navy's work in the Battle of the Atlantic and in the Battle of  
Britain. All Canada knows of the first prize of war made by a  
Canadian warship. She was the German merchant ship Weser,  
captured in the southern Pacific after a warning shell across her  
bows had brought her to a sullen stop, and a boarding party from  
Canada's armed merchant cruiser Prince Robert had swarmed up  
her side and taken control above and below. Her capture was a  
double victory for the Canadian navy, for not only did they lessen  
Hitler's merchant fleet by a very valuable unit, but they added this  
valuable unit to the merchant navy which is Great Britain's life-  
line. All Canada does not yet, however, know of another double  
victory by a Canadian armed merchant cruiser, in this instance  
H.M.C.S. Prince Henry, sister to H.M.C.S. Prince Robert. In one  
day Prince Henry intercepted two German ships, after a long pe-  
riod of skulking in a neutral South American harbor, they endeavored  
to run the blockade imposed by the empire's navies, of which  
Prince Henry was a worthwhile component. When the day came  
to an end, the two Nazi ships were at the bottom of the Pacific Ocean,  
into which they had sunk, ablaze from stem to stern after their  
crews, in German tradition, had set them afire. And the closing  
of the day saw H.M.C.S. Prince Henry on patrol once more, this  
time with half a hundred or more German seamen held as prisoners  
of war.

So, in briefest form, the tale of one day's effective blow to Nazi  
hopes given by a ship of the Royal Canadian Navy. The full tale yet  
awaits release: it is a story of seamanship and decisive action which  
deserves a page of its own in the gallant history the Royal Canadian  
Navy is writing for itself with its exploits at sea. Neither, when  
presented as one day's work, does the story do justice to the tremen-  
dous task so willingly, and so capably, undertaken by Canada's  
seamen. Canada's seamen could tell of days and nights, stretching  
into weeks and months, of steady, monotonous patrols in the Pacific  
Ocean; of days when there was not a smudge of smoke to bring  
variety to an apparently empty ocean, and the ceaseless watch  
grew wearisome indeed. Vigilance, however, has never relaxed and,  
in calm or in storm, the Canadian Navy has kept the seas so  
that the seas shall be free of the enemy. Bringing home a prize of  
war is most satisfactory, but there is a true satisfaction, too, in the  
knowledge that the monotonous patrols which led to such captures,  
have been well and efficiently performed. The West Coast, too,  
has seen another phase of the Navy's work—the protection of its  
own coast line. British Columbia's coast, with its indentations and  
islands, hidden bays and sheltering points is a naval problem in  
itself. The islands have a coast-  
line of 3,980 miles; the mainland  
a coast line of 1,380 miles, or a  
total of 5,560 miles over which to  
keep watch and guard. The Navy  
tackled the problem and the coast  
is secure.

The British Columbia coast sal-  
mon pack in 1941, totalling 1,795,  
189 cases up to a couple of weeks  
ago, was the heaviest in many  
years. It compared with 1,225,156  
cases which was the pack for the  
year 1940. The Skeena River pack,  
of 363,455 cases was the largest  
since 1936 when 369,353 cases were  
put up. The Naas River pack was  
35,694 cases compared with 24,944  
cases in 1940 and 39,336 cases in  
1939. The Skeena sockeye pack for  
the current season was 110,332  
cases compared with 132,407 cases  
last year; the spring pack, 5,891  
cases compared with 7,253 cases;  
the steelhead pack, 2,207 cases as  
against 124 cases; the coho pack  
120,903 cases as compared with  
60,621 cases; the pink pack 73,901  
cases in comparison with 89,591

cases, and the chum pack 50,221  
cases as against 58,278 cases.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt.  
John Eoden, arrived in port at  
10 o'clock this morning from the  
south, sailing at 11 a.m. on her re-  
turn to Vancouver and waypoints.

To pay a visit of inspection to  
the progress of the extensive pro-  
gram of shipbuilding which is un-  
der way at the local plant, G. A.  
McMillan, manager of the Prince  
Rupert dry dock, arrived in the  
city on the Prince Rupert yester-  
day afternoon from Vancouver.

Percy Hudson sailed this morn-  
ing on the Cardena for Vancouver.  
He was to have taken the power  
cruiser Kavema from here to  
Ocean Falls for Dr. W. S. Kergin  
but the vessel blew up and burned  
out last Sunday morning at the  
floats of the Prince Rupert Row-  
ing & Yacht Club when about to  
leave.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise,  
Capt. S. K. Gray, northbound from  
Vancouver to Skagway in the  
course of a regular Alaska voyage  
arrived in port at 11 o'clock this  
morning from the south, sailing a  
couple of hours later for the  
north. She is scheduled to call  
here next Wednesday afternoon  
southbound.

in Readiness for Another  
Winter.

KITKATLA, Oct. 25.—Construc-  
tion and renovation work is in  
progress here as the village is be-  
ing put in shape for another win-  
ter. Principal building undertak-  
ing is a new six-room residence  
for Chief Councillor Matthew Hill.  
A new roof is being put on and  
other repairs made to the school  
house. The village electric light  
plant is also being repaired.
