Message Of President

The Russian Version

MOSCOW, Oct. 9:—Germany is hurling division after division into the critical struggle west of Moscow—the greatest battle of mechanized armies of all time—but the Red Army is fiercely resisting the onslaught and inflicting considerable losses on the enemy, the Soviet government announced today. Soviet newspapers appealed to the Russians to recognize the "gravity of the situation."

Particularly fierce battling raged through the night on the central front sectors of Vyasma and Bryansk and at Melispol in southern Russia, a communique said.

The nearest German advance toward Moscow was said to be the Vyasma area which is about 125 miles to the southwest.

The German Version

BERLIN, Oct. 9:—German spokesmen claimed today that Germany's eastern armies, ordered to crush Russia before winter and thus "remove the last English ally on the continent," have forged new rings around a million Russian soldiers, virtually deciding Russia's fate. This is the offensive, with Moscow as the principal goal, which Chancellor Adolf Hitler ordered a week ago and of which he spoke optimistically but secretly last Friday in a Berlin speech.

Dr. Otto Dietrich, Hitler's personal press chief, arriving direct from Nazi headquarters, declared today that the issue on the eastern front was at the point of decision. He ascertained the "Soviet Union is militarily finished. In the east the campaign will be developed when and how we wish."

The London Version

LONDON, Oct. 9:—Authoritative sources today declared that twin German thrusts on the central front of the Russo-German war have imperilled Marshal Timoshenko's armies but added they had no confirmation that any encirclement move had been actually carried out. The battle is described as the fiercest of this or possibly any other war.

THREE MEN USING OF PICKED UP MANPOWER

Three Missing From Seiner Great Northern No. 5 Are Safe, It Is Announced.

Canada Aims to Employ Its Resources of Labor to Better Advantage in Prosecuting War.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 9:—Three men who left the seiner Great Northern No. 5 when it was caught in a tide rip near Cape Mudge yesterday have been picked up near Campbell River, officials of the Millard Canning Co., operators of the seiner, reported late last night. The trio, which included Ole Weile of Prince Rupert, had been feared lost when they failed to appear at Campbell River where the seiner itself had arrived safely.

The three men were picked up by the Elva M., a Vancouver fish packer.

U-BOAT SUNK BY TRAWLER

Notable Accomplishment By Small British War Vessel Is Revealed By Admiralty

LONDON, October 9:—The British armed trawler H. M. S. Shirley, it was announced by the Admiralty today, has shelled and sunk a German submarine, far her superior in fighting strength. After the u-boat had been struck by the trawler's four-inch gun and machine gun fire, the crew signified its desire to surrender. The crew was then removed and the submarine sunk. The forty-four survivors were taken to Gibraltar and landed, Lieut. A. H. Kellaway, commander of the trawler, has been awarded the Distinguished Service Order.

British Convoy Dispersed, Nazi Claim Asserts

BERLIN, Oct. 9:—German long-range guns shelled and dispersed a British convoy in the English Channel, according to German claims.

Great Chinese Offensive On

SHANGHAI, Oct. 9:—The greatest offensive of the Chinese army in four years of warfare is apparently under way, Japanese army sources said today. They reported 80,000 Chungking troops had attacked Japanese forces on Oct. 3 on all fronts of central China and said that fighting remained in progress to the north, west and south of Japanese-held Yankow on the Yangtze river.

Popular Song Writer Dies

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 9:—Gus Kahn, popular song writer, whose compositions included such favorites as "One Night of Love," "Carolina in the Morning" and "O What a Pal Was Mary," died here yesterday at the age of 59 years.

TURKEY IN LIMELIGHT

LONDON, Oct. 9:—While the House of Commons was being informed yesterday that Turkey was strictly fulfilling the terms of its guardianship of the Dardanelles, some concern was nevertheless felt over a joint declaration published coincidentally in Berlin and Ankara reaffirming friendly relations between Germany and Turkey.

Meantime a trade pact, providing for the exchange of goods and materials between Germany and Turkey, was signed today after having been in course of negotiation for some time.

The position of Turkey becomes increasingly interesting in view of the critical position in the Russo-German war.

RAIN IN VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER—Vancouver had heavy rain last night. Rain also prevailed throughout the southern interior.

Roosevelt Urges Congress To Authorize Merchant Vessels Being Armed - To Go Further

Situation Serious—NAZIS ARE MOVING ON IN RUSSIA

Moscow And London Do Not Deny Enemy Gains And Admit Seriousness Of Situation

LONDON, October 9:—Neither Moscow nor London are attempting to conceal the seriousness of the situation today in respect to Russia's war with Germany. Causing most concern is the twin German thrust on the central front where the town of Vyasma, 125 miles southwest of Moscow, was captured yesterday and where Marshal Timoshenko's army is undoubtedly imperilled. The possibility that large Russian forces there may become encircled is admitted. The loss of an important Russian industrial centre 210 miles south of Moscow from the rear is also possible. British military authorities believe, indeed, the fate of the Soviet capital may be known within two weeks. Although the Russians may yet have something in surprise, the whole situation is regarded with anxiety in London. Russian morale, if anything, appears to be increased in the face of growing danger.

Russia, while admitting further advances by the Germans in their new grand offensive in the war against the Soviet, insists that all Nazi gains are at a fearful cost in men and equipment.

In the drive on the central front towards Moscow, the Russians admit the loss to the Nazis of quite an important town 68 miles east of Briansk.

Moscow estimates that Chancellor Adolf Hitler has thrown three million men and the large preponderance of the Nazi fleet and air force into the campaign against Russia. Red Fleet, Soviet naval organ, suggesting that Hitler has left only about twenty divisions for defence in the west, declared yesterday that the time was now ripe for Britain to essay an invasion of the continent.

ATROCITIES WIDESPREAD

LONDON, Oct. 9:—A Jugo Slav cabinet spokesman said here yesterday that the Nazis had been responsible for the massacre and torture, many to the point of insanity, of 180,000 Serbians since the conquest of that country by Chancellor Adolf Hitler's forces.

Chief Executive Leaves Way Open For American Cargo Ships Going to Belligerent Ports—Challenge of Madman Hitler Cannot Be Tolerated.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 9: (CP) — President Franklin D. Roosevelt, asserting that it was time for the United States to "stop playing into Hitler's hands and to unshackle our own," today urged congress to revise the Neutrality Act speedily to permit arming of American merchant vessels. In a special message to congress he also left the door open for further revision later to wipe out another major prohibition—that preventing American cargo ships to travel to belligerent ports.

PRESIDENT FLEES
PANAMA CITY — President Arnulfo Arias of Panama, fled the country by airplane early Tuesday in such strict secrecy that the departure was not disclosed until today when his successor was sworn in. Though no official reason was given for the departure, political circles said pressure had been brought against Arias by political opponents who accused him of being anti-American and pro-Nazi and were said to have feared that his policies would jeopardize Panama's relations with the United States.

WHEELER ROTTEN-EGGED
TUSCON, Ariz.—Senator Burton K. Wheeler, Montana isolationist, was rotten-egged when he attempted to speak here last night. The speech was abandoned.

OLDEST WOMAN DIES
CALGARY — Miss Elizabeth Margaret LePage, Calgary's oldest woman, died yesterday at the age of 104. She was the aunt of Lieut. Gov. LePage of Prince Edward Island.

MISSIONS IN LONDON
LONDON—The British and United States missions to Moscow are back in London today from the Soviet capital where they went to discuss with the Russian government means of providing war supplies.

TRAWLER SINKS SUB
LONDON—The naval trawler Lady Shirley was credited today with shelling and sinking a German submarine in a spirited sea battle. Forty-four of the submarine's survivors were rescued and taken to Gibraltar.

Red Parachutists Land in Bulgaria
SOFIA, Oct. 9:—Three Russian parachutists landed in Bulgaria yesterday, it was reported, but they were soon rounded up.

Whifflets From The Waterfront

According to figures issued by the International Fisheries Commission a total of 27,892,666 pounds of halibut was landed at various ports of the Pacific Coast from Area No. 3 for the period from April 1 to September 30 of this year as compared with 25,088,205 pounds in the corresponding period last year. Of the total this year the American fleet landed 25,518,072 pounds as against 25,536,791 pounds last year and the Canadian fleet 2,234,594 pounds in comparison with 1,551,414 pounds. During the month of September the catch from Area No. 3 aggregated 6,190,631 pounds consisting of 5,345,856 pounds American and 844,775 pounds Canadian fish. Landings from the closed Area No. 2 for September were restricted to that halibut caught incidental to other species under permit and amounted to 184,069 pounds.
