

CANADIAN SILK FROZEN OTTAWA-An order-in-council freezing all raw silk stocks in Canada not required for war production was announced today by Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of munitions. The order is effective at midnight tonight and is due to "uncertainty of future shipments from abroad."

COST OF LIVING BONUS OTTAWA-Agreement has been reached in principle for payment of cost of living bonus to practically all railway workers and civil servants in Canada, it was learned today from reliable authorities. Railways have accepted the bonus policy, it was said, while the government has decided to pay bonus to its employees.

Russians Claim To Be Holding Positions On Entire Battle Front

They Say, Have Lost Fifty Thousand More Men-Berlin Also Declares That Victories Have Been Recorded

MOSCOW, August 9: (CP)—The Red Army declared today that heavy losses had been inflicted on ten more German divisions—six tank and four infantry— in the battle on the eastern front. According to Soviet figures losses totalled fifty thousand in addition to losses reported previously. The Soviet information bureau described the situation on the whole front as static with key sectors unchanged.


