### HOLIDAY VICTIM CLAIMED BY A VICTORIA ELEVATOR

**Coquitlam Man Caught by Cage and Suffers Fracture of Spine—His Case Believed Hopeless—Wife Was With Him on Holiday Trip**

(Special to Daily News.)—Victoria, May 11.—J. G. Shearer, of Coquitlam, who came here with a number of football players who arrived in the city this afternoon, was crushed and probably fatally injured last evening by falling through the window of an elevator shaft at the Dominion Hotel. He was caught between the edge of the window and the descending elevator. How the accident occurred is unknown, but it is believed that the elevator was ascending, when Shearer stumbled and fell through the window in the shaft. He

was immediately taken to the hospital, but his spine is fractured and examination indicated the case as hopeless. Mrs. Shearer accompanied her husband to Victoria.

## COUNCIL WELL SATISFIED OVER HOSPITAL ENQUIRY

**Deceased Measles-Pneumonia Patient Did Not Die as a Result of Spartan Conditions in Isolation Shack Which Four Doctors Declare as Good as the Best Accommodation for Just Such Cases—Patient Proved to Have Had Complications Before Entering Shack at All**

"Resolved, That in the opinion of this committee, who have held a full investigation as to the circumstances connected with the death of Ray Andrews and have examined all available persons who had any knowledge of the facts, 'No blame can be attached either to those attending the deceased in the isolation tent or the hospital. At the same time the committee wish to go on record as stating that it was highly necessary that the investigation should be held so that the whole facts clearly appear.'"

"This case emphasizes the necessity of providing as soon as possible for a proper building for an isolation hospital, preferably on the hospital grounds."

Moved by Ald. Clayton, seconded by Ald. Morrissey and carried unanimously.

Last night's enquiry into the death of Roy Andrews, at the General Hospital, of double pneumonia and complications following or concomitant with measles was an interesting one. Reported verbatim it would have taken up a full page of this paper, or more, for it was very prolonged. Four doctors gave fully qualified evidence, and one professional nurse of sixteen years actual experience answered exhaustive enquiry on the matter. The managing secretary of the hospital explained a few points, and as indicated in the above resolution Mayor and Council were thoroughly satisfied that there was no one culpably at fault in connection with this unfortunate case. They were, however, in spite of the assurances of the four doctors that the tent-roofed shack was a suitable place for the patient, all convinced that it is necessary for the city to construct as soon as possible more substantial quarters for contagious cases.

A point strongly emphasized by Dr. Eggert was that this particular patient was from the first seriously ill with complications of a very grave nature. His was not a simple case of measles, which afterwards developed into double pneumonia, etc., as had been implied by Ald. Clayton's remarks in council, reported in The News.

Dr. Eggert, who attended the case at first, desired this point contradicted, especially as it appeared from the report of Dr. Clayton's words that the doctor had "fully qualified" information to the effect that the case was one of simple measles, afterwards complicated fatally perhaps, because of the defects of the temporary shack. Alderman Clayton denied having said so much, nevertheless his words most certainly carried that impression, and had they been printed in full from the short-hand note taken, might have given even a more serious impression. Dr. Eggert's statements, however, are indisputable for he saw the case at the outset, and it was then seriously complicated.

The other doctors all gave evidence all bearing out the same fact, that the patient was very ill. They almost unanimously agreed, in evidence taken separately from each alone before the council, that the tent-roofed shack was practically the best place for a measles-pneumonia patient. Abundance of fresh air is necessary in such cases, and with plenty of warm blankets for covering the danger of draughts is practically negligible. This is the sum and substance of the medical opinion regarding the shack as a hospital ward. Three of the doctors said they

would themselves wish for no better accommodation if suffering from the self-same complaint.

Nurse Macdonald, who was trained in Glasgow, Scotland, where, as she said, tent hospitals are not required, was not so enthusiastic about the shack, though she agreed that the patient well under blankets and with the stove kept going was warm enough and comfortable. But in her idea he might have been better fixed in a place with not so many draughts. Nurse Macdonald mentioned in reply to Ald. Clayton, that the deceased patient had remarked to her that he had to get up in the night to arouse his first attendant, a man, so that he might keep up the fire, as the place was getting chilly. The patient feared that this had made him worse. He had also said that his attendant had gone off down town occasionally, sometimes for two hours at a time, but the fire had been banked up those times.

Regarding this attendant, Dr. Tremayne did not know of his going down town, or he would not have permitted it. Dr. Eggert said that the male attendant, though not a trained nurse, had been closely instructed what to do with the patient, and added, "a trained nurse could have done no more than this man could do." That was at the first stages of the man's illness. A trained nurse, Miss Macdonald, was as a matter of fact called in later.

Altogether the evidence went to show that the patient died as the result of very serious complications of measles, which had most certainly not been either acquired or accelerated by the condition of the tent-roofed shack hospital housing him at first. It was the purpose of the enquiry to reassure the public on these matters or if need be to discover any fault that might be remedied. As the city solicitor put it, the council felt that it had been a very good thing that the enquiry had been held.

Rev. Mr. Lee Consents to Favor Prince Rupert Audience—Will Appear at the Methodist Church

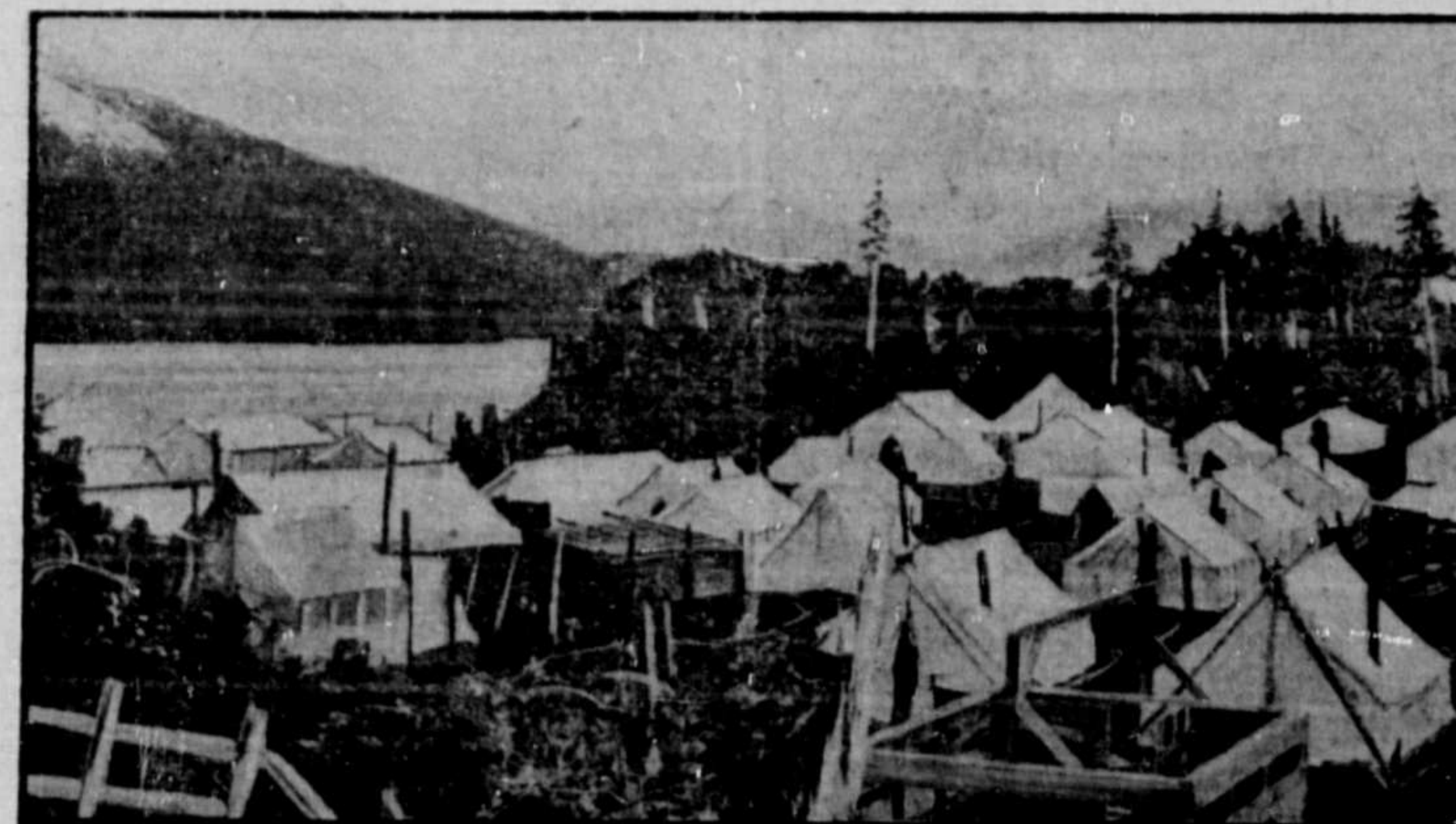

## LORD MERSEY SEA LAWYER

The Personality of the Great English Judge, Who is Presiding Over the Titanic Investigation in Britain.

Lord Mersey, better known as Sir John Bingham, the ex-President of the Probate, Divorce, and Admiralty Division, enjoys the highest of legal reputations in the Old Country, and is of unequalled authority on matters maritime. He was a pupil of that famous lawyer, the late Lord Russell of Killowen, nearly fifty years ago, and, later, enjoyed a practice at the bar of almost fabulous worth being much sought as counsel in large commercial cases. A native of Liverpool, and for long leader of the Northern circuit, litigation in connection with shipping has loomed large in his professional life. "Collision," "vis major," "alluvion," "jettison"—all these words were for many years part of his every day language. And when he was appointed president of that division of the High Court one part of whose threefold jurisdiction is concerned with ships and those that go down to the sea in them, there was general satisfaction felt among Admiralty lawyers, although he himself is said to have quoted humorously:

"May there be no moaning of the Bar  
When I put out to sea."

Lord Mersey resigned from the Bench ostensibly on the ground of advancing years. But it was generally suspected that governmental pressure was brought to bear on him on account of his somewhat latitudinarian views on divorce. He maintained, it may be remembered, before the Divorce Commission, that it was the part of a wise wife to shut her eyes to her husband's occasional indiscretions. Lord Mersey represented the Exchange Division of Liverpool in Parliament as a Unionist for three years, and was a member of the committee which enquired into the Jameson Raid. Some of his epigrams, delivered in a dry way, which added vastly to their point, have become famous with the legal profession. Here are two: "A judge who is not worth criticism is worth nothing at all." And, again: "I hope I shall still be able to do useful work, notwithstanding the ominous assurances of my friends that I look younger every day."
