BEING SHOT AS SPIES CAIRO—Many of the German

parachute troops who staged an invasion of Crete yesterday have been captured by the British, New Zealand and Greek defenders although it was stated that a considerable body remained to be mopped up. Berlin scoffed at the statement of Prime Minister Winston Churchill that the military situation was well in hand and declared that the operation was one hundred percent certain of success. It was suggested that German parachutists who landed in New Zealand uniforms would be treated as spies and shot. If this was done, it was suggested in Berlin that there would be reprisals on British prisoners of war. The reprisals would be 10

ALL RESISTANCE OVER LONDON-All Italian resistance in Ethiopia has now ended except for occasional patrol activity, it was stated last night. WILL BE GIVEN CHANCE

VICHY-The Vichy government and its forces may be given a free hand to try to drive the Free French out of North Africa, it was indicated here. Dakar may be armed to the teeth.

ANOTHER QUIET NIGHT LONDON-Britain had a secand quiet night from air raiding last night. Only a few Nazi planes came over and damage and casualties were light.

HEAVY FIGHTING CAIRO-There is heavy fighting between British and Axis forces along the Libya-Egyptian frontier. A German ammunition dump has been blown up.

ARE LANDED IN FRANCE BERLIN- American survivors from the Egyptian steamer Zamzam, sunk by a German surface raider in the South Atlantic, have been landed at St. Jean de Luz, France, near the Spanish frontier, it is announced. They include 62 men, 53 women and 23

children under eleven years of age. It is intimated that they will be released in the near future, after efforts have been made to extract such military information is possible from them. They will probably be provided an escort to Lisbon whence they may return home. What has been done with the Canadian passengers is not intimated.

CONCENTRATE ON TANKERS BERLIN-Nazi u-boats are now concentrating on tankers and colliers hauling fuel to Great Britain. Eighty-five thousand tons of tankers have been sunk by the German undersea vessels since May 1. it is claimed.

NAVAL CO-OPERATION WASHINGTON-Spurred by the Zamzam incident the United States is making plans for more effective use of the navy with a view to establishing an Atlantic life line to ensure safe delivery of supplies to Great Britain. This naval life line may be inaugurated in place of the convoy system.

APPEALS TO U. S. LONDON-A London newspaper today appealed bluntly to United States to enter the war at once. Unless it does so fighting may go on for years whereas, with combined forces now, "the savages can be whipped back to their caves before the end of next year.

Battle Of Crete—

GOING ON FIERCELY

Seven Thousand Parachutists Estimated To Have Been Dropped -Boat Landing Also Attempted

CHURCHILL'S WARNING LONDON, May 21: (CP)-Prime Minister Winston Churchill warned today that the Battle of Crete would continue with increasing severity as reliable sources declared that airborne Nazi shock troops were still pouring into the invaded Greek island from bases on the Greek mainland. Unofficially the total of the German invasion was set at 4500 men delivered by aerial transports, gliders and parachutes. Many of the planes crashed in landing. Mr. Churchill said that Suda Bay was the scene of a second attack yesterday in which about three thous-WASHINGTON-In answer to l and men were dropped but the greater part of them were accounted for in three hours. In Cairo the Middle East command said that German troops had ' suffered serious losses and one yesterday was quickly surrounded. Informed Greek sources at Cairo said they understood Bri-

tish forces had the situation in Crete in hand early this morning but they said some invading units were still fighting. A British Broadcasting Corporation broadcast heard in New York indicated the Nazi invaders had 'could land.

CAIRO, May 21:-British and Greek forces are in full control of the situation in Crete, it was officially announced today, following the air invasion by the Nazis yesterday. Fierce sanguinary fighting, however, raged with increased severity.

The German parachute troops kept landing from dawn to dusk yesterday and it was estimated that seven thousand were dropped on the i land. Efforts were also made to effect a landing of troops from boats.

As the assault continued with vigor, Stuka dive bombers were brought into play.

All of the original 1500 parachutists were either captured or killed, Reuters reported last night, suggesting at that time that the invasion had been crushed.

In view of the big campaign now being put on for the sale of bonds for financing the war and, in view of the! need for putting all our efforts into the war, we have to suggest that provincial politics be forgotten until the campaign comes on and then let us fight as bitterly as they do in Europe if necessary. To keep up this sniping campaign all the time is weakening our war effort. We know there are people who do not like the Premier and we know there are efforts being made to undermine him in the eyes of the electorate but we think it in bad taste to keep up the campaign night and day when there is no election in sight.

Delusion Exploded - - -

"One of the chief obstacles in the way of Canada's war effort, I imagine, is the delusion that you can soak the rich enough to pay for the whole war," says Bruce Hutchison, the well known writer. "If that were possible I would be for soaking the rich. There are so few of them FOR SALE-Tennis court to be; that the amount of suffering involved in their entire ruin would not be great and most of us could accept it philosophically. Unfortunately there are too few of them, with too little income. Yet you cannot get these facts over to the public.

"Grant Dexter, writing from Ottawa in the Vancouver Sun, explains the thing in detail, but I doubt that many readers will graspe it. The figures are too complicated and I do not propose to reprint them here. But it comes down to this: If the government were to take every dollar earned in excess of \$2,000 a year, the total revenue thus received would not meet half the government's costs this year. All the income of people earning \$20,000 a year or more would not pay the government's bills for one month.

"There are over 4,000 people gainfully employed in Canada. Less than 300,000 people earn \$2,000 a year or more. We are a nation of little men who, adding their pittance together, get most of the nation's income. Where else but from them can the money for the war be got? The rich will be soaked but even if they were liquidated and sent to Siberia (which would refuse to take them) the poor still would pay the bills. Or, if you want it in real physical terms, the poor will make the munitions and the poor will cut down their consumption of other things so that the munitions can be made. There is no way around And either you do it voluntarily, or you are forced to do it by inflation which raises prices so that you can't buy what you would like.'
