TO OCCUPY TEHERAN

LONDON-It was stated authoritatively today that British and Russian troops in Iran will march today on Teheran, the capital, wit a plans for its immediate occupation. The statement was made after the Teheran radio announced the abdication of the Shah of Iran, Reza Khan, who will, it was reported, be succeeded by his twenty-one year old son.

GIGANTIC TANK BATTLE

MOSCOW-A gigantic night battle of heavy tanks for "an important point on the approaches to Leningrad" was reported by the newspaper Red Star today to have ended in complete rout of the Germans who left hundreds of dead on the field. At the same time communiques of the Soviet information bureau told of the sinking of seven Nazi troop transports and three escorting warships in northern waters.

AUGUST AIR TOLL

LONDON-During the month of August 169 Britons were killed in air raids and 136 wounded. This is the smallest list since the blitzkreig began.

BERLIN ADMITS DIFFICULTY

BERLIN-Germany admits that new British corvettes with their special weapons are making it difficult for German destroyers and submarines. Long range British guns are also proving very effective. An intensification of the sea wariare is threatened after the war with Russia is over.

RUMANIA DENIES REPORT

NEW YORK-The Rumanian embassy here denies reports that it has been necessary to shoot Rumanian officers because they refused to lead their troops across the Dneister River to attack the Russians on behalf of the Axis.

RAIDER IN PACIFIC

WASHINGTON-The United States Department of the Navy is investigating reports that a German raider has been operating out of the Ecuadorian controlled islands of Galapagos in the Pacific Gcean off South America.

HAMBURG HEAVILY BOMBED

LONDUN-The Royal Air Force dropped tons of heavy bombs on the great German port of Hamburg during the night, starting large fires and doing much damage. Cuxhaven and Wilhelmshaven as well as the French port of Le Havre were also blasted.

# FOOD TO BRITAIN

United States Not Only Arsenal But Also Bread Basket Of Demogracy .

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 16: -Secre ary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard, speaking here, said that United States was to be not only the arsenal but the bread basket of democracy. # 100 NET PROFIT ON BIG EVENT

teports Presented at Meeting Of General Committee Last Evening

The recent five-day carnival in aid of Prince Rupert's civic centre netted a sum of just about \$4000 for the fund, it was announced at a general meeting of the carnival committee last night. The meeting was called to receive reports on the highly successful event. The profit was on a gross take of about \$8700.

In presenting his report, T. N. Youngs, general chairman, attibutea the increased profits to two factors—the fact that the carnival had been extended from three to five nights and the experience gained on past events.

Mr. Youngs paid tribute to many persons who had assisted in making the carnival a success. Such people had been too numerous to mention individually. The plan of having team captains to organize the carnival games had proven a success. Family groups had done particularly valuable work.

Retaining the present committee organization, Mr. Youngs felt that next year there might be even a larger and more successful carni-

Mentioning the importance of attractions which would keep the building crowded, Mr. Youngs suggested that a strong entertainment feature, such as a dancing act, be engaged well in advance. This suggestion was later implemented by the passing of a motion authorizing Mr. Youngs, if necessary, to commit next year's carnival to such a feature up to a sum of \$600.

G. T. German, the carnival reasurer, submitted a detailed statement of finances, showing general revenue and expenditure and how each feature had come out financially.

A number of suggestions for future carnivals were discussed. One was that something more interesting should be provided for children, also that the building should be cleared of unattended children at 10 o'clock each night. The importation of Shetland ponies was mentioned. Development of the bathing beauty contest on a larger scale was proposed as well as earlier action on the carnival queen competition. The city authorities will be asked to keep out any commercial carnival next year until after the civic centre carnival.

The Prince Rupert (senior) Chamber of Commerce will be invited to appoint an auditing committee to check up the carnival finances.

## WANDERING IN ENGLAND

Canadian Seems to be Enjoying Life at Odd Times In Great Britain

A second letter from a Canadian officer in England to relatives in Frince Rupert may interest local readers. He says: "I have been wandering around the last few days and I was up near Leatherhead and Dorking, about fifteen miles from London. In that area there are quite a number of caravan clubs. Some people have been blitzed out! of their homes and some just belong to these clubs and camp there every year. The area around Headly Downs is a National Trust area. what we in Canada would call a national park like Jasper or Waskesiou. Instead of the government setting aside this area, subscriptions are taken and the land is purchased and administered by a private board for the people as a whole. On Sundays and holidays this area, which covers about ten miles, is so crowded you can hardly

The second highest point in Engid. Boxhill, is in this area. From lookout near the top and from others along the sidehill you can look over an enormous amount of country. The old Pilgrim's Way from Winchester to Canterbury skirts the area and this path must have been trodden by millions of feet. It is still used as a bicycle path. When I say this is the second highest point in England, I mean about three thousand feet but the hillsides are almost as steep as anywhere in Canada.

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

# HAS GOODS

Axis Figures America Will be Glad To Trade Minerals For Europe's Products

By LOUIS P. LOCHNER Associated Press Staff Writer

BERLIN, Sept. 16: (AP)-Walther Funk, minister of economics and president of the Reichsbank, has made it clear that Germany, as leader of the "New European Order," won't return to the gold stan-

(Some economists say that Germany dominates Europe with a barter policy in the future, it would rest of the world, observed: be serious for the United States, which controls much of the world's gold, because the gold would be useless in European commerce.)

Funk, addressing a convention of the Southeast Europe Society, declared:

"As seen by us, the gold problem isn't a problem at all. . . Our exchange is rendered more secure by the productive capacity of our people, by the authority of the state and by an authoritarian price and wage policy."

He emphasized, however, that this 'in no wise precludes economic understanding and co-operation with economic areas working according to other methods."

Pre-War Trade

Economic editors, commenting on Funk's statement, were quick to goods and declared that "Quality assert that until the outbreak of will be weighed against quality but the war economic relations with never quality against gold." Britain, which operates under quite a different system, were eminently satisfactory.

"German economy," Funk de-



elared, "plans systematically and gradually to remove the fetters from goods and money exchange, to insure healthy and just competition and to avoid sterile centrali-

Funk drew an eloquent picture of Europe's enormous capacity as a consumer once Axis victory is consummated:

"Europe as an economic area possesses tremendous productive apparatus and has a consumer capacity which at present baffles estimate but which offers a vast opportunity to other economic systems in the world."

Wolfgang Waubke, economic writer for the Voelkischer Beobachter, commenting on future trade relations between Europe and the

"The U.S. A. will be happy when, after Axis victory, a European continent capable of making purchases will again absorb those tremendous (surpluses of South American raw materials which the United States cannot absorb."

Exchange Trade



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
